Mayor Reid Calls Special Meeting of Councilmen

CLARK NO. 2 MAKES 1,100 BARREL FLOW

WELL IS EXPECTED TO BE BEST IN TEXAS PANHANDLE FIELD SAY OIL EXPERTS HERE TODAY

Combs-Worley No. 1 locate in the NW quarter of section 32, bl. 3 Gray Co., came in a producer Thursday afternoon at 5:30, making close to 250 barrels the first five hours it flowed.

This well shows every indication of being one of the best wells in the Pampa or Hutchinson County fields. It logged very closely with the Clark well about three quarters of a mile north, which latter well is now making around two hundred and fifty barrels per day.

It is thought that this well will make one of the best wells in the entire Texas Panhandle field. It is located about three quarters of a mile north of the big gas well that supplies Pampa with natural gas.

The Combs-Worley No. 1 was drilled by the Shamrock Petroleum company, the controlling interest of which is owned by C. H. Clark. Mr. Clark expressed the opinion that this well would make one of the best in the field when it was spudded in.

Operations in a large portion of the field have been held up during the past few days waiting for something definite from this well.

A shortage of water is another thing that has held up operations for several days.

Activity has been brisk on the H. F. Wilcox leases since the Phoebe Worley No. 3 came in a big producer more than thirty days ago.

Mrs. J. E. Seitz is Fatally Burned in Stubblefield Fire

Mrs. J. E. Seitz was fatally burned in a stubblefield fire on the J. E. Seitz farm six miles north of Pampa last Tuesday, and J. E. Seitz suffered severe burns about the face and hands.

Mrs. Seitz died Wednesday at three o'clock from the effect of the burns. Mr. Seitz is reported being severely burned.

Mr. and Mrs. Seitz, accompanied by their three sons, Jones, Worth and Earl their nephew, Andrew Evans, Miss Gladys Daly, and Ernest Middel, were attempting to get out of the stubble field in a car, but the acre stalled only a few yards from the fence. Earnest Middel rushed the boys and others to the fence, broke thru it and saved the youngsters with only minor burns.

Mr. and Mrs. Seitz attempted, it is understood, to break thru the wall of flames when they saw they could not reach the fence and safety. Both were burned severely about the face and limbs.

Ernest Middel rushed Mrs. Seitz to the local hospital where she was given immediate attention.

Funeral services were held at three o'clock Thursday afternoon at the Baptist church and her body was interred at the local cemetery.

VOTERS ASKED TO CAST BALLOTS EARLY SATURDAY; EXPECT CLOSE COUNT FOR ALL OFFICES

Mrs. Lefors is Killed in Auto Accident Sat.

Mrs. Emmett Lefors was instantly killed Saturday night July 17 about midnight when the car in which she and her husband, Emmett Lefors were riding, collided with two other from Pampa on the Husted Hill. Clarendon highway about seven miles cars. The accident occurred on the road from Pampa to the Husted Hill. Mr. and Mrs. Lefors were returning from Groom, where they had spent the day visiting with Mrs. Lefors' brother, Earl Stephens.

It seems that Mr. Lefors on seeing the approaching cars and attempting to avoid a collision threw on his brakes and in doing so caused the back-end of his car to slide over and hit one of the cars. This caused a head-on collision with the other approaching car and turned his car over in the ditch. The jar of the car threw Mrs. Lefors out of the car door enough to catch her head as the car turned in its side. Her head was crushed, killing her instantly.

The drivers and occupants of the other two cars were young boys. They assisted Mr. Lefors in turning his car back up and one remained with him. It was over an hour before either of the men could succeed in stopping a car. Finally a truck came by and when they learned that there had been an accident, the driver stopped.

Mr. Lefors is a prominent cattleman of this section and is the son of the late Perry Lefors, founder of the county seat of Gray County, Lefors. Both Mr. and Mrs. Lefors have many friends in this and the surrounding sections. The tragedy came as a great shock to everyone.

Mrs. W. L. Harless of Dallas, sister of Mrs. Lefors chartered an airplane Sunday morning at the city. They left there at 2:30 a. m. and arrived here at 3 o'clock that afternoon.

Mrs. J. E. Nutter of Los Angeles, Mother of Mrs. Lefors arrived Tuesday from that city. Mrs. Emma Lefors, mother of Mr. Lefors also of Los Angeles was delayed on account of the telegrams being misread to her, and did not arrive until Wednesday night.

Sheriff Graves Asks Citizens To Help in Crime Prevention

Graves issued the following statement Wednesday night of this week in an appeal to automobile owners and others to aid in the prevention of petty thefts that are being committed in Pampa and Gray Co. PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9

A resolution proposing an amendment to Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by changing Section 3, eliminating the provision authorizing the Legislature to create special districts and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution be so changed as to read as follows: (creating new Section.)

"Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State Occupation taxes and pol taxes of one dollar on every inhabitant of the State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars valuation, as with the available school funds arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said use of children attending the public free schools to this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be sufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general laws; and all such school districts may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and for the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one (\$1.00) dollar on the hundred dollar valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constitut-

ing separate and independent school districts created by general or special law."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first

Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1926, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provision which authorizes the Legislature to create special school districts."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Section 4. That the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary,

is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Foreign Dishes Bring Added Zest to Dinner

By MRS. WM. C. POST

Height of my culinary ambition always has been to make dinner each day a gastronomic poem, rounded and perfect like a stately rime. A meal that pleases eyes, nose and palate alike!

A well-turned dinner is like a pretty woman in that it unlocks men's hearts with a magical key. Exotic dishes give a tang of other lands to the inner table. Things foreign awaken a romantic sense. Taste of codfish la Benedictine transports one for the minute to the Montmartre in gay Paris. Dash of Piroski and we are supping at a quaint cafe on the Nevsky Prospekt in Leningrad, while the crunch of English tea cakes may bring visions of the rolling moors of Sussex.

As an aid to the housewife in carrying out this new and fascinating idea in cooking, the following of my recipes may prove of particular interest:

Italian Potatoes.

1 cup hot-cooked 1 1/2 tbsp. butter
rice or mush or olive oil
Beat the butter into the mush while it is hot. Turn onto a hot serving plate and pour over the following cheese sauce:

Cheese Sauce.

1/2 cup evaporated milk diluted with 1/2 cup meat stock
1/2 cup grated cheese
1/2 cup fat 1/2 cup evaporated milk diluted with 1/2 cup salt 1/2 cup meat stock 1/2 cup pepper 1/2 cup grated cheese

Melt the fat, add the flour, salt and pepper, and stir until the mass is smooth. Add the diluted milk and cook in a double boiler. Stir occasionally to keep smooth. Add grated cheese to the hot sauce and stir until melted or about three minutes.

Buffet Kuchen.

1/2 cup sugar 1/2 cup flour
1/2 cup butter 1/2 tsp. baking soda
1/2 cup evaporated milk 1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup evaporated milk 1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup diluted milk 1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup water 1/2 cup granulated sugar

Cream butter and sugar, add yolks of eggs and the lemon rind, stirring constantly. Mix flour and baking powder; add to the butter mixture, alternately with the milk and lastly stir in the stiffly beaten whites of eggs. Place in well-greased shallow coffee cake pan, sprinkle with granulated sugar, cinnamon and a few almonds, sliced or chopped. Bake in a moderate oven.

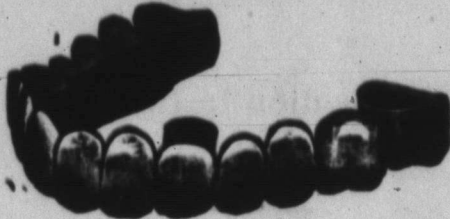

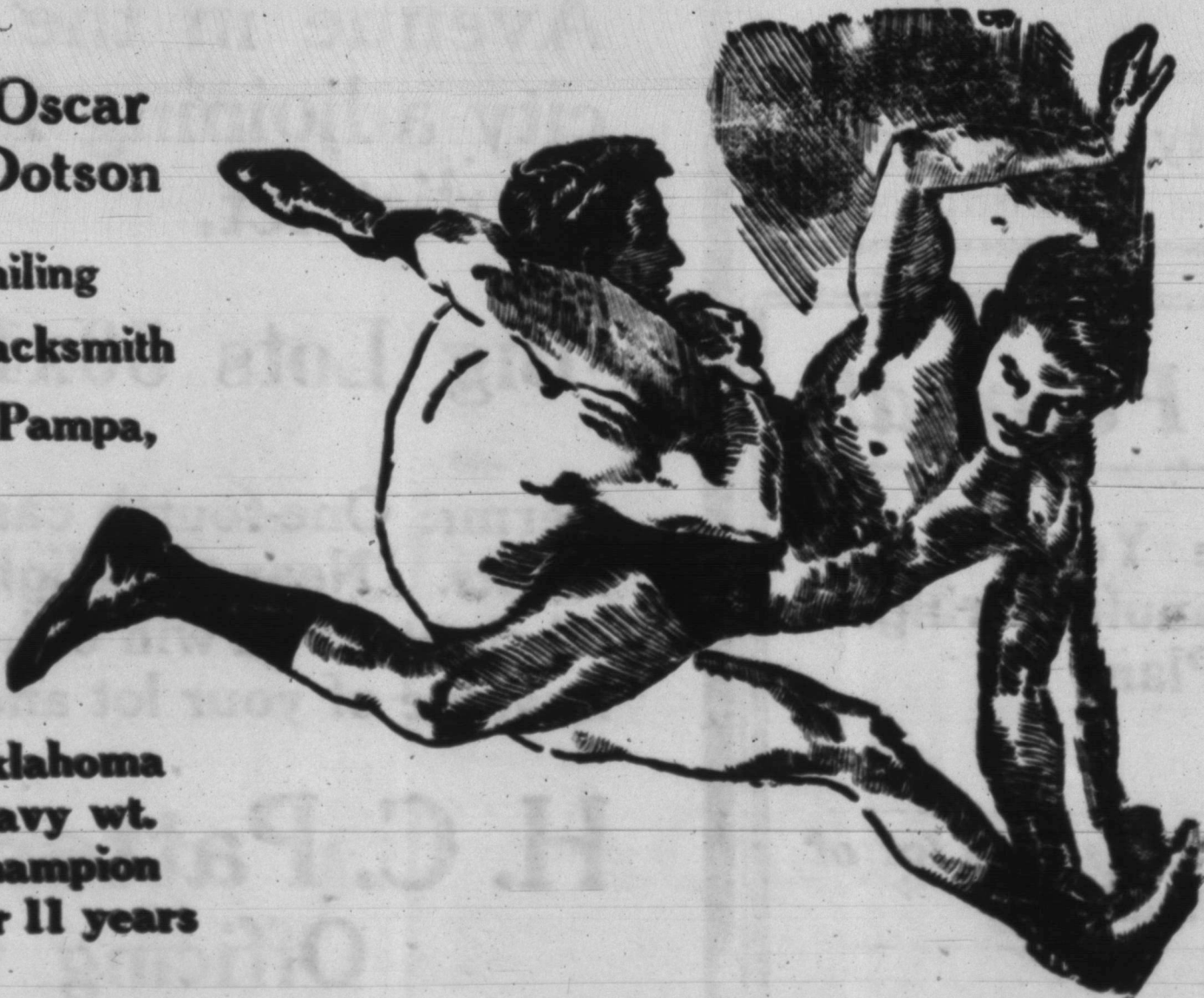

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 and Section 40 of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit officers of the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States to hold public office in Texas.
Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 33 of article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States; except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that his restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States."

Section 2. That Section 40 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"No person hold or exercise at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, officer of the National Guard, the National Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer, or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States from holding in conjunction with such office any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States.

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in November A. D. 1926, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional amendment permitting officers and enlisted men of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, and officers of the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the Organized Reserves of the United States, to hold other offices or positions of honor, trust or profit under this State or the United States."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9
A Joint Resolution relating to the amending of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners; providing for the supervision and management of the Prison System, under such laws as may be provided for by the Legisla-

ture.
Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 16, Section 58 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 58. The Legislature shall have full power and authority to provide by law for the management and control of the Prison System of Texas; and to this end shall have power and authority to place the Prison System under the supervision, management and control of such trained and experienced officer, or officers, as the Legislature may from time to time provide for by law.

Section 2. The above Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a general election to be held November 3, 1926, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "For the amendment of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "Against the amendment of Article 16 Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners."

Section 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by law.

Section 3. The sum of \$5,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State, and not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution providing for taxation of school lands owned by counties.
Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas.

Section 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 6 thereof 6a, which shall read as follows:

Section 6a. All agriculture or grazing school land mentioned in Section 6 of this Article owned by any county shall be subject to taxation except for State purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, thereon "For the Constitutional amendment providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land owned by any county, to the same extent as land Constitutionally amended providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land owned by any county to the same extent as and privately owned.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the necessary said election and have the necessary published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

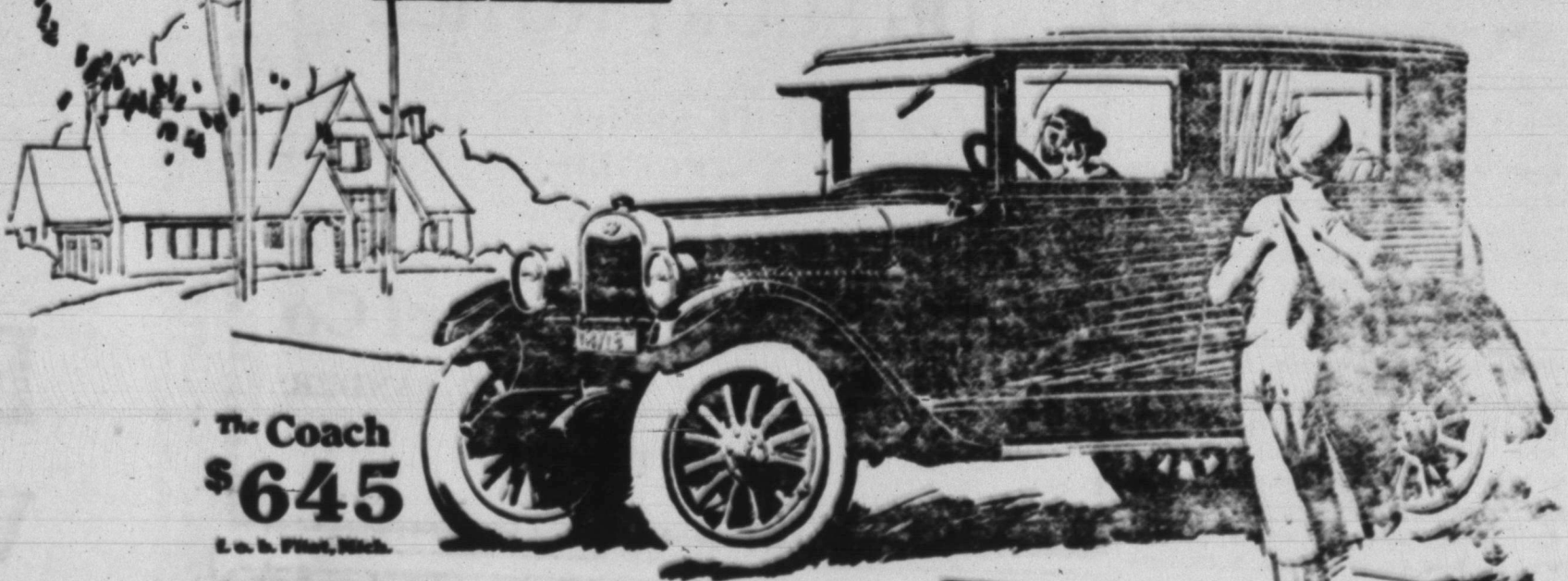

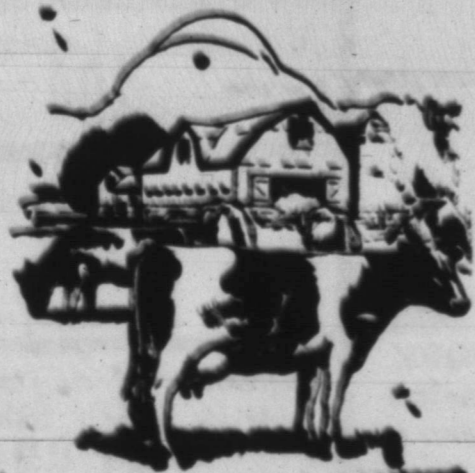

City Manager of Ranger During Boom Gives Views on Pampa

(Note—This article was written for the News by M. A. Turner, city manager for the City of Ranger during oil boom. Mr. Turner has been in Pampa for several days and states that he sees a great future for this town.)

It is seldom that an oil field is found so close to a well organized city as is the one in the Pampa field.

As a rule the principal town in the field starts up after oil is discovered and just grows up after oil is discovered and just grows up after oil is discovered, without any well directed authority or control.

As a result of this for a time the under world element, the boomers and riff-raff that usually follow the discovery of oil practically have things their own way.

This lasts until the oil companies or better class can stand it no longer and they then organize and attempt to take control, they succeed but sometimes at tremendous cost.

Pampa has a great opportunity and the making of a fine town such as it has organized throughout Tulsa, Okla. It has organized, incorporated city government, water and sewer systems and all of the things in a limited way that are most needed and is making every attempt to handle the situation that now confronts it.

Tulsa is trying to handle the moral and health situation and all the other things that go to make a "boom" with some success and is doing remarkably well considering the suddenness with which the new conditions have been thrust upon them.

The newcomers should realize that, each one who has a problem to solve have come from all corners of the country, from different states and towns, where laws and ordinances, due to different conditions are different from those here, and that those who have made this town what it is, cannot change the existing order of things all at once or for the personal gain of any one class or party.

They must look upon the situation with wisdom and due caution as there has been cases where a flourishing community has suddenly come into the lime-light through oil, have heavily taxed property, put in many public improvements and issued bonds to cover the cost, only to have the

"boom" play out in a short time and the id settlers left to pay heavy bills that should not have been incurred.

In many respects condition are different here than in most boom towns.

It is true that many shacks of a temporary nature are being constructed but many of the older business houses are being torn down or moved and new substantial brick buildings are taking their places. This indicates that there is great confidence in the future of the field and there is no question but that Pampa will be an oil field for years to come.

We should therefore as far as possible build for the future, not forgetting our old friends the farmer and his wheat, who has made Pampa what it is today and at the same time, develop a safe and sane policy that will not leave any regrets when the boom is over.

The newcomer, no matter what his business may be, should put his

shoulder to the wheel and instead of criticizing the ordinance and the city government and condition, adjust himself to his new surroundings, remembering that in most instances he has a wife and family back home away from the excitement and conditions that usually exist, who he leaves at home for their protection, while we have our wives and families here, of whom we try to be just as thoughtful. To the stranger who is here and to those who see this article, we bid you welcome. If you come to Pampa we will try to take care of you and do our best to surround you with those conveniences to which you are accustomed. Come however to make this your home, come with the idea of helping to make Pampa a clean, white city in which to live.

Remember that the men who are serving you as mayor and aldermen are doing so as a civic duty, not for personal gain and that their business interests, while just as important of them as yours are to you, are to some extent being neglected to serve you, and the same degree of service you owe to this community.

Lets pull together and work together for the good and gain of all.

PIONEER PANHANDLE ATTORNEY IS DEAD

Judge L. D. Miller, pioneer lawyer of the Panhandle, passed on, to me at the Great Judge, Thursday morn July 8, at 5:55 o'clock, bringing to a close a colorful career forty years of which were spent as a practicing attorney in Wheeler county.
Lorenza Dow Miller was born in Titus county, Texas, October 25, 1856 and died July 8 at 5:55 o'clock. Soon after he finished law school he came to Wheeler county. Shortly thereafter he was elected District Attorney of this Judicial District when it was comprised of territory greater than the area of Kentucky. He served for a number of years in this position.
In 1916 he was elected county judge of Wheeler county and served in that capacity eight years. He was at one time a law partner of empte Houston and is the last of the early pioneers who held sway in the courts of the Panhandle during the frontier days to pass on.
Funeral services will be held at Baptist church here tomorrow afternoon at three o'clock.
Judge Miller is survived by his wife and a daughter, Mrs. Winnie Davis Pierce of Marlin, Texas.—Wheeler News Review.

CARSON COUNTY ROAD BONDS CARRY

Carson county voted overwhelmingly in favor of a million-dollar good road bond issue Wednesday of this week. The total vote was 648 for the issue and 281 against, with every box in the county with the exception of three smaller precincts voting in favor of the issue, or 86 votes over the necessary two-thirds.
The issue of \$1,000,000 together with probable \$1,500,000 federal and state aid will enable Carson county to construct a permanent system of roads of approximately 86 miles.
Included in the 86 miles, is highway No. 33 between White Deer and Panhandle; highway No. 75 from Groom to Conway and a paved road from Panhandle twenty miles north to the oil fields.
Following the announcement of the result of vote last night, practically every community in Carson county staged a spectacle in celebration. At Panhandle where the vote was 453 for and only 15 against the issue, a parade was scheduled to be staged through the main streets followed by impromptu speaking.
The quality of the gravel found in Carson county which will likely be used in constructing the roads is of high grade, can be purchased at a low figure and will enable a durable road to be built, it is declared.
Leaders of the movement declared last night that this is one of the greatest forward steps ever taken by Carson county in developing the resources of the county.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The West Texas chamber of commerce inter-
vened in the recent hearing of the Department of Agriculture relative to control of the Thurberia weevil, which is ravaging the cotton fields of Arizona.
