IRVING (AP) — Go ahead and try it. Tell a Texas kid not to look up to and imitate Cowboys icon Troy Aikman. These days, the Cowboys quarterback is attempting to do just that. Aikman embarked Tuesday on a don't-be-like-me campaign against chewing tobacco.

In a series of public service spots and posters, Troy Aikman entreats kids to eschew habit-forming snuff. "I know what these kids go

'Silent time' in locker room replaces prayer

Chisum: Area needs to unite behind tourism

The panhandle needs to band together and promote what is unique about the area if it wants to attract more tourism to the area, according to Texas Representative Warren Chisum. He was speaking at the Panhandle Iourism Marketing Council meeting held at the Pampa Chamber of Commerce Tuesday.

He said tourism is the second largest industry in the state and generates about \$16 million in the panhandle and over \$20 billion statewide. He pointed out that Lake Meredith is listed as the second largest tourist attraction in the state bringing in \$1.6 million. Statistics show that 11,000 people in the Texas pan-


handle are involved in the tourism industry. Chisum said.

"We actually have some of the original country around here and places like the XIT Ranch (whose founders) actually built the capitol of Texas.

"People can go to amusement parks in Europe and in Japan and once you've ridden the ferris wheel and stood in line if you're like me vou've had enough of that," Chisum said. "We have the western heritage up here and it's something we can sell."

When asked by an audience member how the panhandle can attract tourists away from San Antonio and the like, Chisum said, "You have to prove to them (tourists) that you have a different market, this area still has the cowboy heritage and that sort of

Aikman speaks from experience: the Cowboy is himself a one-time tobacco chomper. But the quarterback quit his chewing habit after the 1997 Superbowl, spurred by letters from concerned fans.

"It's him," said a wideeved voungster as No. 8 flashed on-screen during a Tuesday preview of the spots.

"They're in awe," said state Sen. Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound. "There is no individual that they look up to more than Troy Aikman.

Aikman described his vears of struggle with a nicotine addiction at Tuesday's screening. He started chewing at age 15, and gnawed his way through high school and college, the football hero told the audience.

The paper reported that 12 percent of Texas middle school boys chew the addictive tobacco.

But the Texas Cancer Council is hopeful that Aikman will reach young boys across the state.

While local church leaders are organizing opposition to the Pampa Independent School District's decision to not allow prayers over the public address system just prior to tootball games, another decision restricting formal prayers has been implemented at Pampa High School

Pampa Harvester tootball players are no longer allowed to have a prayer time in the locker room lead by Head Coach Dennis Cavalier.

Coach Cavalier said this morning he based his decision on a statewide directive he received from an organization which he said he believes was from the Texas Education Agency. He said the directive went to all school districts and was distributed to administrators of various programs. Cavalier said the directive was in regard to the current status of pravers not being allowed to be given over public address

"I want to personally assume responsibility that there is no longer a praver time in locker rooms lead by me," said Cavalier. He went on to say that he had asked for counsel from his superiors within the school district before he made his decision. Cavalier said emphasized he made the final decision on how to handle the matter.

The head coach said there is a "silent time" for the players to use as they wish in the locker room prior to the game. He said the players may pray silently, meditate. He said it is a personal and private silent time. Cavalier said he asks for silence, and that the period of silence is not unorganized.

"As the years passed, the number of attacking Indians grew at each white man's telling of the stories and the valor of the defenders came to equal that of the Athenians at the Battle of Thermopylae," Baker said.

As a new staff member at the Panhandle Plains Historical Museum in 1979, Baker joined Billy R. Harrison, curator of archeology, to excavate and

document a historical and archeological study of the 1874 Adobe Walls site stories, about two dozen

Baker was to find all the intermation he could on Adobe Walls, then write a history of it and the selves against repeated tight that took place attacks from Comanche, there to go with Billy Harrison's archeological report.

What he had not considered, he said, is the myth and tolklore which had arisen around the events that took place that hot summer of 1874. "Up to that time, most

of the books that I had written," Baker said. "dealt with topics so obscure that they didn't merit the creation of too much tolklore.

He said he had occasionally dealt with conflicting evidence, but never had come up against analyzing an event like the 1874 Battle of Adobe Walls where virtually all the evidence disagreed

The Adobe Walls trading post had been established in March, 1874, as a branch operation of Dodge City merchants. By the winter of 1873-74,

Judge reverses verdict in Briscoe County murder trial

reversed himself in a Quitaque murder trial and will allow the jury to see evidence that he initially ruled was obtained in an illegal search by investigators

Judge John "Randy" Hollums Tuesday reversed an earlier ruling that a .22-caliber rifle, a .22 magnum shell casing and fingerprints on a beer bottle found in the home of John Miller "Corkey" Garner, 64, were obtained by law enforcement officers illegally. Hollums ruled Tuesday morning that the items could be introduced as evidence in the case against Garner for the murder of Roye Pigg, 48, a Quitaque restaurant owner.

Pigg was killed early the morning of June 4, 1998, in Garner's home. A Lubbock pathologist Tuesday testified that Pigg suffered wounds to the left forearm and chest. Pampa District Attorney John Mann, who was appointed special prosecutor in the case, said following the day's testimony that timony resumes in the case.

Pigg appeared to have lifted his arm in a defensive LUBBOCK -- A Briscoe County district judge manner, a .22 magnum bullet went through the forearm and lodged in Pigg's heart.

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The defense admits that Garner killed Pigg, but they claim that it was 3 a.m., and Garner thought Pigg was an intruder.

Pigg was shot in Garner's kitchen.

An employee of Pigg's restaurant, The Sportsman Cafe, was the first person to take the stand Tuesday as testimony began. Kelly Payne testified that Garner came to The Sportsman Cafe about 6:30 p.m., June 3, and was still there drinking shortly after 11 p.m. when she left.

With the destruction of the Kansas herds, hunters turned south into the Texas Panhandle where the bison remained in the tens of thousands. Fearing the loss of the hide hunters' business, the Kansas merchants shifted their attention also to the Texas Panhandle. They established a trading post on the north side of the Canadian River in present day Hutchinson County.

According to often told stories, about two dozen white men and one white woman defended themselves against repeated attacks from Comanche, Kiowa and Southern Cheyenne warriors which continued from early morning until about midday, Baker said. A siege ensued that lasted about three days.

One of the longest running inconsistencies is that the ridge pole of the saloon reportedly broke, awaking the buffalo hunters prior to the attack so they were not taken by surprise.

"The generally accepted story of the Adobe Walls fight remained more or less like this for 60 years until all the principle white participants in the fight were dead," Baker said.

quite that way. Mooar said Army Scout Amos Chapman, who lived with the Cheyenne, had secretly warned the saloon keeper and two merchants at Adobe Walls of the pending attack, but Baker said newspaper reports indicate that the two merchants were in Dodge City at the time.

But there is still a third version of the story. In 1929, James E. McAlister, who was with Chapman when they rode into Adobe Walls, said they warned everyone there, but the hunters wouldn't believe them.

'Questions about the roof remain and the mystery may never be cleared up," Baker said.

There is also the question of who fired the shot that killed a mounted warrior on a bluff estimated to be three quarters of a mile away on the third day of the siege. Although generally credited to Billy Dixon, Baker said Dixon never claimed credit for the shot during his lifetime. Even the distance is in question. It has been reported being anywhere from 1,000 yards to 1,500 yards.

Arkansas has fastestgrowing Hispanic population

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — Every day, Honduran native Oneyda Rugg welcomes about a dozen newcomers, pointing them to jobs, schools, doctors, homes and social service agencies.

For the past seven years at the Northwest Arkansas Multicultural Center in Springdale, she has been devoted to making immigrants - particularly fellow Hispanics — feel at home in Arkansas. Apparently, it's working.

During this past decade, the Hispanic population has grown at a faster rate in Arkansas than any other state, according to U.S. Census Bureau figures released Tuesday.

Most Hispanics who come to Arkansas have stayed, despite the general dearth of other Spanishspeaking residents or of ethnic attractions,

"We could consider that this is one of the very rare places where your children feel safe," Ms. Rugg said. "It's healthy, it's green, it's beautiful, there are plenty of jobs. The cost of living is not as high as other parts of the country."

Nationwide, the Hispanic and Asian populations of the United States have surged during the 1990s, with the number of Hispanics growing by more than 35 percent and Asians more than 40 percent, the Census Bureau said.

In Arkansas, the Hispanic population rose from 19,988 in the 1990 census to 49,473 last year — a 148 percent increase — according to Census Bureau estimates released Tuesday.

"Arkansas is really at the forefront. However, we're not talking about a lot of people," said Sabine Henning, a demographer at the Institute for Economic Advancement at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock. "The numbers are still relatively small, and I think we always have to keep that in mind, too.'

Despite the influx, Hispanics still comprise a little less than 2 percent of the state's 2.5 million people up from just less than 1 percent in 1990.

By comparison, Hispanics comprise 40 percent of New Mexico's population. And the Hispanic population in California increased by 2.4 million to 10.1 million people. California's total population is 32.6 million.

The increase in the Hispanic population alone in California was almost as large as Arkansas' current in California is more than four times Arkansas' entire population.

Grading mistakes send thousands to summer school

NEW YORK (AP) - Scoring errors on school tests last spring may have resulted in as many as 3,000 pupils being sent to summer school by mistake, officials said.

Rudy Crew, the city schools chancellor, announced the problem in a news release Tuesday, but declined to answer questions. An aide estimated that about 10 percent of the 300,000 tests. 6. were graded erroneously by test publisher Barnard is not a suspect in the CTB/McGraw-Hill.

The national Hispanic population is expected to overtake the non-Hispanic black population to become the largest minority group by the end of 2004, said statistician Larry Sink.

The Hispanic growth in Arkansas has attracted plenty of attention from local residents. Not all of it has been encouraging - particularly from those who resent employers hiring Hispanics.

"I think it's an absolute atrocity what the cheap labor advocates are doing to these people, they're just using them," said Scott Leachman, a general contractor and vice president of Americans for an Immigration Moratorium.

The group is based in northwestern Arkansas' Benton County, which has the state's fastest-growing Hispanic population - up 221 percent from 1990 to 1998.

But in Sevier County in southwestern Arkansas, where nearly 10 percent of the population is Hispanic - the largest percentage in the state local officials say Hispanic immigrants have helped spur the economy.

"Them being here has boosted the economy. They shop here, they spend their dollars in the city, so the county gets tax money, the city gets tax money," said Fonda Hawthorne, director of the De Queen-Sevier County Chamber of Commerce.

Population estimates show more males than females among Hispanics in Arkansas, the opposite of the rest of the population and an indication that male Hispanics are coming first to find work and then bringing their families, Ms. Henning said.

In Sevier County, for example, the Hispanic population is nearly 68 percent male, while the rest of the population is 49 percent male, Ms. Henning said. The county's largest employer is a poultry plant, and many Hispanics work in the poultry business, Ms. Hawthorne said.

At Springdale-based Tyson Foods, the nation's largest poultry producer, about 20 percent of its 66,000 employees around the country are Hispanic, said spokesman Ed Nicholson. He said roughly the same percentage applies to Tyson's 24,000 employees in Arkansas.

Tyson has not specifically recruited Hispanics, Nicholson said.

"Once the word got out that there were these jobs population, and the total population of Hispanics available, word of mouth pretty much brought the newcomers in," Nicholson said. "We're grateful that those jobs have been filled."

Automaker, union talks extended

AUBURN HILLS, Mich. (AP) - Negotiators for the United Auto Workers union and the automakers extended their contract talks beyond their midnight deadline Tuesday.

DaimlerChrysler spokesman David Barnas said the union granted the company an indefinite extension, and talks would continue into the night. The union had earlier granted indefinite extensions to General Motors Corp. and Ford Motor Co.

The contracts that were due to expire cover 407,000 workers.

Trade deficit at record high

WASHINGTON (AP) - America's trade deficit soared to another record high, but the overall economy remained unfazed as consumers went on a buying binge in August.

The Commerce Department reported Tuesday that retail sales jumped 1.2 percent last month, the biggest increase in six months, as consumers snapped up new cars, furniture and clothing at a rapid clip.

In a second report, the government said the U.S. current account trade deficit climbed to an all-time high of \$80.7 billion in the April-June quarter of this year. That was up 17.5 percent from a first-quarter deficit of \$68.7 billion, the previous record.

Y2K woes predicted for Russia, China

WASHINGTON (AP) - Problems such as power failures, telephone outages or water shortages are likely in China, Russia and some other large nations because of the Year 2000 technology problem, the State Department predicted Tuesday.

The warnings, intended for Americans considering traveling overseas during the New Year's holiday, provided the most detailed picture to date from the U.S. government about where it anticipates trouble.

No country's Y2K situation was severe enough to issue a formal "travel warning" to discourage Americans from visiting, the State Department said. The 196 country-by-country advisories were published on the agency's Internet site - http://travel.state.gov.

Group studies tax on internet buys

NEW YORK (AP) — A commission made up of government and business representatives that is studying how to tax purchases New York.

More than a third of registered voters who are active Internet users, or 36 percent, would be less likely to vote for a political candidate who supports taxes on Internet purchases, according to the poll, released Tuesday by the Gallup Organization and (at)plan, an online market research firm. All told, 73 percent of active Internet users oppose an Internet sales tax, compared to 14 percent in favor.

GOP critical of aid to Russia

WASHINGTON (AP) - Republican lawmakers criticized the Clinton administration's support for aid to Russia, as investigators widened their inquiry into allegations that Russian gangsters

laundered billions of dollars through a U.S. bank. Majority Leader Dick Armey, R-Texas, called the Clinton policy toward Russia "the greatest U.S. foreign policy failure since Vietnam.

White House spokesmen didn't immediately return a telephone call seeking comment. The administration has been put on the defensive by suspicions that International Monetary Fund loans and U.S. food aid to Russia may have been illegally diverted.

Boxy family cars unveiled at show

FRANKFURT, Germany (AP) — Automakers unveiled a number of boxy family cars at the Frankfurt auto show Tuesday, offering a glimpse of Europe's automotive future that looks decidedly practical.

Volkswagen's new Polo, new versions of Ford's Fiesta, the Audi A2 and concept vehicles by Opel and Chrysler all have a similar shape - drawing cues from the minivan with their conventional car hoods and a hatchback-style rear.

There were also new advances at the high end of the market as Mercedes showed its S600, a V-12 luxury car, and a coupe version of its SLR super sports car. BMW showed off its Z8 roadster and an X5 "sports activity vehicle" that combines design elements of a station wagon and sports utility vehicle.

The Frankfurt International Motor Show opens to the public Thursday, but automakers held media preview days beforehand to showcase their latest models.

'Black tax' exemption nets jail time

DALLAS (AP) - A judge sentenced a Fort Worth man to two years in federal prison for causing three people to file false tax forms by claiming "black tax" exemptions.

Willie Foster, a 35-year-old part-time minister who said his great-grandparents were slaves, got \$30,085.89 back from the Internal Revenue Service after filing for the so-called "black tax." The IRS rejected the claim, but Foster never gave the money back.

Foster also convinced three other people to file for the credit, which he said was a federally authorized reparation for descendants of slaves freed after the Civil War. No such reparations have been authorized.

Foster'said he believed what he did was right. "I've still never talked to an IRS agent who told me this is incorrect," he said.

New U.S.-backed narcotics unit may intensify conflict

The new army unit, a 950-man battalion — trained and equipped by the United States - was inaugurated Tuesday by President Andres Pastrana.

Since 1996, guerrillas of the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia, or FARC, have consolidated their control over some 40 percent of the countryside, making it perilous for helicopterborne police alone to destroy drug crops and laboratories. +

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Over the past two years, coca and earn tens of millions of dol- cultivation increased by 170 percent in two southern Colombian states, according to Col. Leonardo Gallego, the anti-narcotics police commander. The new battalion will be based in the heart of that zone at Tres Esquinas, a base where the military is creating a Joint Intelligence Command with U.S. guidance. It is expected to be up and running by October. While there is scant evidence the rebel groups have evolved into drug trafficking organizations, there is no doubt the drug trade has made them stronger, officials say. In accordance with U.S. law on military aid to Colombia, only soldiers with clean human rights records were permitted into the battalion, officials said. Colombia's military has a history of supporting paramilitary death squads, although Pastrana this year fired three generals accused of such links.





"Bill Russell won't do an interview, but we did speak to his daughter, Karen," said ESPN's Mark Shapiro, who heads up the project. "He has chosen to decline.'
