

FAMILIES EVACUATED Flood Waters Cover Central Texas Areas

BASTROP, Tex. (UPI) — Flood waters that already killed at least 11 persons in Central Texas moved downstream today and forced the evacuation of some families.

The Department of Public Safety said six bodies were recovered from Dry Creek in Travis County and authorities planned to resume searching today for the body of a missing child who is presumed drowned.

The Colorado River, swollen by driving rainstorms Saturday and Sunday, was expected to crest here at 31 feet, six feet above flood stage.

"We've had to help a couple of people evacuate," a county sheriff's spokesman said.

"The water is supposed to continue to rise another foot and it might flood some homes especially in the low areas."

More than eight inches of rain were recorded in less than three hours Saturday night and early Sunday in parts of Travis County.

Austin police said a father and his two children were killed when their car was washed off a city street by a ramping creek. They were identified as Joe Rivas, 28, Joe Jr., 5, and Cynthia, 8.

A spokesman for the Texas Department of Public Safety said the bodies of two women were recovered from a flooded creek near Kyle in Hays County.

Authorities said seven persons were injured.

Four were hospitalized for exposure after being trapped in their cars by

flood waters Saturday night about 15 miles south of Austin, and more than 50 motorists were reported stranded on U.S. 183 for more than four hours until help arrived.

Ethiopia Military Rulers Announce 60 Executions

ADDIS ABABA (UPI) — The Ethiopian military government plans to follow up the weekend executions of 60 former officials by court-martialing an estimated 140 "one-time leaders seized on corruption charges."

Radio Ethiopia said the new military trials would take place immediately, but

the government-run station did not say whether the regime would ask for more death penalties.

The radio said 60 of an estimated 200 former officials arrested by the military rulers since coming to power last February were put to death for "crimes against the Ethiopian people."

"Other officials now in detention on corruption charges will be brought immediately before the general and district courts martial," the station said Sunday in three identical broadcasts.

The station said the officials, including a grandson of deposed Emperor Haile Selassie, the head of the military regime and two ex-prime ministers, were executed for "attempts to disrupt the country's popular movement."

"Those executed have been found guilty of trying to sow dissension and division within the armed forces, of putting their own personalities above the general welfare of the state and of grossly abusing authority," the radio said.

The executions left an estimated 140 former leaders — cabinet ministers, educators, military men, members of the royal family and government aides — still being held.

The men executed included Gen. Aman Andom, who was ousted in a power struggle Saturday as chairman of the ruling Provisional Military Ad-

visory Council.

The radio said a noncouncil member would be picked in a few days to succeed the American-educated general, considered a moderate on the 120-man council.

There was no mention of Selassie. The 82-year-old ruler of Ethiopia for a half-century was arrested Sept. 12 and has not been seen in public since.

The broadcast said all 60 men were already buried, but gave no indication when, where or how the executions took place. The radio said "nobody would be granted access to the bodies."

Heart Group Plans Class

FOR WOMEN Rehabilitation Stressed After Cancer Surgery

NEW YORK (UPI) — Doctors are stepping up efforts to rehabilitate women treated for breast cancer and ease their return to a full life at home and work, a Syracuse, N.Y. surgeon said today.

Dr. Daniel Burdick, professor of surgery at the State University of New York told a national conference on advances in cancer therapy that the five-year survival rate of between 50 and 75 percent shows that women can lead long productive lives after breast removal.

He said most women are able to return to full activity and even strenuous physical activity may be performed without limitations.

"New efforts are under way at present to emphasize these facts to insurance and industrial leaders so that the post-mastectomy patient can take her rightful place alongside other members of the working force," Burdick said in a paper prepared for

a session on breast cancer opening the three-day conference.

The National Cancer Institute which is sponsoring the meeting with the American Cancer Society estimates 89,000 new breast cancer cases will be reported in the United States this year.

Burdick said rehabilitation of the breast cancer patient should begin with her first visit to her surgeon and follow with honest and considerate discussion on the nature of the problem and plans to deal with it. After surgery Burdick said the favorable aspects of the case should be emphasized to provide "constant hope and encouragement."

"No patient is beset with more anxieties and concerns than the woman who has been treated for breast cancer," the paper said. "With the development of any new symptom the patient will relate this to her disease and to the possibility that this represents recurrence until she is reassured by her physician after adequate examination has been carried out that no recurrence exists."

Burdick said meaningful relationships must be developed between the patient, her family and all members of the medical team.

Texas Gains Tourists' Approval

AMARILLO — "During our two-month vacation," a New York City man wrote, "so far we have visited 34 states and we were welcomed best in Texas. We have different outlook on Texas now. Thanks."

A New Jersey party in route to Albuquerque, N.M., remarked, "Intended only to pass through. Thanks to tourist counselor we visited Palo Duro Canyon and made other stops. Many thanks." Comments to thaw the heart of the coldest travel counselor, the above remarks were printed on questionnaire postcards returned to the Amarillo Tourist Bureau. Travelers who stopped at the bureau located on East Interstate Highway 40 this summer were asked to mail in the cards that leave room for and encourage anonymous comments.

Most questionnaire postcards received at the Texas Highway Department Tourist Bureau offer constructive criticism. "The purpose of the cards is to draw a profile of our visitors," according to Archie "Skip" Birkner, director.

Detailed responses about origins, destinations, purpose of visit and expenditure of the travel dollar are asked in the questionnaires. The following opinions of Texas and its people are responses plucked from some of the green questionnaire cards:

The only state where I saw it rain and also saw the dust blowing in the rain. (response from an Ohio party)

The stars at night (sic) are big and bright (sic). We enjoyed excellent Chamber of Commerce. (from Vermont)

Proverbs 3:5&6. (remark from a Fresno, Calif., party whose destination was the Bible Memory Camp in Ringgold, La.)

People were very friendly. Thought there could be more shade trees. (Maryland)

Enjoyed it, but should have more rest areas with comfort facilities even if out houses. (California)

Rich country — friendly people. Cities and highways impressive. (Nebraska)

We enjoyed the scenery in the Great Plains. Tourist books excellent. (Ontario, Canada)

You'all (from New York) have a state to be really proud of and the friendliest people I have ever met. Plan to retire in your state.

Birkner, Amarillo tourist bureau director since May, has a November observation for the public: reserve a fireside chat this winter for discussion of travel in Texas, especially after you have visited the nearest bureau (Amarillo's at least once).

The most frigid months of the year do not necessarily have to be travel unconscious times, claims Birkner. The Bureau staff, Birkner, Mary T. Hudnell,

Terry Hurst and James Creek, will help you plan a Texas trip to visit relative during the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays, or that bikini-clad vacation next summer.

Birkner reminds us of bureau services, claiming, "If there's a town of any size in Texas, we'll find it for you at the bureau." Examples of small municipalities he cites extemporaneously are Cut'n'shoot, Lajitas, Old Dime Box and of course New Dine Box. Birkner's staff refers to an exclusive directory when asked the pronunciation of Texas towns.

The bureau offers plenty of Texas maps and some out of state maps, many city maps, 16 pieces of travel literature published by the Highway Department's Travel & Information Division, as well as a multitude of other tourist-nabbing pamphlets and brochures produced by cities, chambers of commerce, tourist attractions, etc.

How far is it to...? What's the population of...? What is the exact location of... museum, when will it be open and what are the admission charges? Birkner or one of his counselors can tell you.

The bureau also receives a monthly report on new industries in Texas, information on the best time to track flower trails and up to date knowledge of road conditions through the state.

Soon the bureau will receive notice of new state hunting and fishing laws.

Birkner's brigade issues permits for oversized loads. Bureau hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. every day of the week year round, except for summer months when closing time is advanced to 6 p.m.

The director said 36,543 travelers stopped at the tourist bureau situated just west of the Amarillo Air Terminal exit in June, July and August of 1974.

In June, a man called the bureau who claimed he had spent three extra days in Texas after he looked through the booklet "Texas-Land of Contrast."

Birkner recalls that in July a bus load of weight watcher from Mississippi stopped by. There were only 38 weight watcher on the bus.

During the summer, a man, who said he was a professor at the University of Kansas, and his wife, were following Coronado's trail. The man said he had received a federal government grant, but that money had run out and he was continuing on his own resources.

Tourist visits are beginning to slow down," was noted Aug. 29 in a daily reminder book kept at the bureau.
