**In Bandit Attack On Mexican Train** 

MEXICO CITY, April 21.-Survivors in Tuesday's train tragedy stated on arriving here today that they estimated the dead at about 100 in the bandit attack upon a passenger train.

There were several Americans on the train, but it is said none was injured.

Survivors said the bandits or rebels who derailed the train and set fire to it shouted "Long Live Christ the King" as they attacked it.

They robbed the express coach of 200,000 pesos but did not lock the passengers in the burning coaches as stated in earlier reports.


### WHAT PRICE ATHLETICS?

The resignation of Dr. Splawn as president of Texas university, it is known, grew in part out of the athletic situation, which itself merely involved the problem of picking coaches who can produce winning teams.

Thus has athletics come to be the most acute problem a college president has to solve, and Splawn, apparently tiring of the mess, asked to be replaced in the less glorified but more academic atmosphere of the economics classroom.

Splawn has the nerve, or at least desire, to do what many other college presidents would like to do; namely, get back into a position more to their personal liking. Criticising a college or university is no longer a pastime, it is mere statement of facts well known to exist. Glorified athletic clubs, which give a smattering of instruction in an atmosphere less cultural than that of many high schools, strive for numbers

## Americans Learn **English Over On Trips In England**

(By The Associated Press.) LONDON, April 21 .--- The vanguard of the American tourist army in learning 'English as she is spoke' by what a psychologist would call "trial and error."

If an American man meets a similar worker of English nationality he soon learns that his English cousin is a "railway employe," not a railroad man.

The English "railway employe" speaks of a coal car as a mineral wa gon. He calls a roadbed a permanent way; a switch , a point; a freight car, a goods van; a brakeman, a guard; a switchman, a signalman; an engineer, an engine driver. Grade crossings are level crossings, and baggage would be luggage.

If the visiting American chances to be in the motor-car business he is obliged to say bonnet instead of the hood of an automobile, petrol instead of gasoline, the windscreen instead of the windshield, sparking plug instead of a spark plug, a lorry instead of a truck, and a spanner instead of a monkey wrench. He learns to spell tire, tyre; aluminum, aluminium; and curb, kerb.

The American in England may send letters by express, but not as he thinks, by special delivery. He places letters in a pillar-box, not a mailbox, or gives it to the post-man, not the mail-man. It travels in the mailvan, not the mail-car.
