Two more blocks on West Foster Ave. have been included in the paving program, but will not be paved until the original nine and one-half blocks in the paving program are completed. The city will pay one-fourth of the cost of paving and the property wners will pay the remaining three-fourths. The portion of t he cost in three equal installments divided equally over a three-year period from the date the installments divided equally over a paving is accepted by the city. Any person may pay their share all at once, but they must also include accrued interest for the three-year period on the amount that they

DAILY OIL PRODUCTION OF GRAY COUNTY ESTIMATED TO BE 3,450 BARRELS; ONE WELL TO 10 ACRES

With the Finley well extending the Gray County oil field more than four miles east, and the Jackson No. 1 promising oil in a new territory a mile further south of the original field, Pampa is being watched with keen interest by the oil operators. The Gray County Petroleum Co. is drilling in the northwest corner of section 147, Block 3, and this well will extend the field toward Pampa from the northwest.

The Finley well is located in sec-@ tion 17, block B. S. F. The Jack-son well is in section 60, block B-2. New Machinery And The present indications are that the field is opening up from Pampa south, and nearing Pampa from the northwest.

Youngblood, director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment station in Bulletin No. 345 which has just come from the press and is entitled, "The Possibilities of Brazil as a Competitor of the United States in Cotton Growling."




