### City Council Favors Move: People to Cast Vote

Miami, Texas .- At a meeting of the city council in Miami Friday night of last week, the council disposed of the city light and power plant to the Panhandle Light and Power company, of near Borger, for a consideration of \$67,500.

An election will be ordered for early in January and the sale will be submitted to a vote of the people, which in all probability will carry by a large majority.

The Panhandle company is a subsidiary of the Kansas Light and Power company, and have only recently completed a large power house near Borger in Hutchinson Mobeetie and Wheeler in Wheeler stockyards and its trade territory, electrical systems, and is exchanging country has need of them, so, county, as well as many other towns in the upper Panhandle.

Bids were also submitted by the Amarillo Light and Power company for th Miami plant but the amount of the bid lacked several thousand dollars, it is said, of landing the husiness here.
