

Shaved, bathed, and keenly alert the fliers were conducted to Rathaus where the ceremony took place. The action of officials in conferring the honor was confirmed by a rousing demonstration from the crowd of about 5,000 inhabitants who packed the market place.

Chamberlin has been too busy since his arrival here to figure out the distance covered by the Columbia, but Klinge totaled 4,400 miles.

SAN SABA, June 7 .- "Treaty Rock" commemorating a treaty between United States Army officers and depredating Comanche, Cherokee Kickapoo and other warring Indian tribes, is in the possession of the San Saba Fair association.

The treaty was scrupulously kept, history records, and this section, once a sanguinary battle ground in the pioneer wars between the whites and Indian raiders, became comparatively peaceful. Local records do not fix the date

of the treaty but indicate it was entered into sometime between 1847 and 1850. Previously, in 1841, it appears, Chief Egg and Chief Bowl, long powerful leaders of the Cherokeees went on the war path. They murdered men, women and children. burned their homes and pillaged their property. Aroused by the depredations, the Texans gathered a band known as minute men and under the leadership of a Captain Lynch overtook them at McAnelly Bens on the Colorado River. In a battle of three days Chiefs Egg and Bowl were killed and the band practically annihilated. Many relics of this battle recently have been found, including rusted guns and knives.

French children in general attend schools where they sit on benches, without support for their backs. They learn to sit up fairly straight but although they thus become accustomed to such seats, the sewing requires the girls to bend over and in time they become narrow chested and subject to lung trouble, say those who are seeking to improve work-shop conditions.

Employers object that stools are much more convenient; they enable the girl to alter her position without moving her chair and they take up much less room.
