### ONLY CONTENTED HENS DECLARED PROFITABLE

Egg production is largely influenced by environment and food. They work together. Even though one be very good, the other must not be bad, for both contribute to the satisfaction of the hen.

There must be confidence. The hens must feel at home. Contentment alone can be secured through regular and kind attention. Architucture of house plays no part. Hens want a comfortable home, no matter how plain it may be. They also dislike being crowded; they want and need plenty of room. Domineering towls in a flock add misery to the rest, and keep up constant excitement. All "bullies" should be removed.

Confidence tames stock. As soon as they learn one's presence means no harm they become friendly. They welcome the keeper, and this lack of fear attaches them to their home. While the hen is devoid of the sense of smell, she still objects to filthy quarters.

Environment is a big word with a big meaning. It opposes exposed and damp locations, poorly ventilated quarters, unclean premises. It calls for anything and everything that applies to comfort.

The food must be of the best quality. It must be given in such quantities as the stock may properly digest. Food builds up waste tissues: it supplies heat to the body: it produces fat and meat to the carcase; it grows eggs and feathers.

The value of the food given is measured by the manner in which it is digested. Unless the digestive organs are in good working conditron, there can be no hope for a successful egg yield.

We improve our stock and in-crease its usefulness by the quantity of attention given. There must be a happiy, healthful home, and there must be confidence.
