(By The Associated Press.) SHANGHAI, March 22.-The reign of terror which started here yesterday with the capture of Shanghai by the Cantonese continues unabated today. Buildings have been looted of all valuables. Latest reports state that many dead bodies are laying in the streets.

A number of disorders are also reported along the boundaries. The International settlement problem is said to be one of the disturbances causing the boundry trouble.

British troops shot and killed 12 and wounded at least a score more Shangtungese when they attempted to break through the barriers. Settlement was officially announced today, however, when General Pi Shu-A Chen, commander of the Northern forces agreed to surrender.

Mystery About Snow Pile Long Preserved

Some years ago at Minersville, in Schuylkill county, Pa., there was being operated the Wolf Creek washery. The business of the operators was to reclaim the immense banks of culm that have been deposited on the surface during the Civil war. With the aid of modern machinery they were able to obtain thousands of tons of marketable sizes of anthracite at the rate of about 2,000 tons a month.

These culm banks were more like mountains than refuse oiles . In some Instances they were 50 feet high and covered the surface for approximately a half mile. The culm was taken in conveyor lines to a breaker, where it was washed through revolving screens and the coal reclaimed.

One day in the month of June, when the thermometer registered from 90 to 100 degrees, the operators uncovered in the heart of one of the banks a large quantity of ice and snow. They reasoned that this deposit was covered with culm during the winter, and, thus protected from the air, had been preserved for about 44 years. It seemed almost incredible that such a condition was possible in the temperate zone, and yet no other theory seems satisfactory. The snow was protected, of course, from the elements by the tons of culm 50 feet high and hundreds of yards wide; and yet, if this theory is not tenable, then some scientist may offer a more convincing theory for its remarkable state of preservation.

Canary Islands Prize

of Many Adventurers The Canary islands have the distinction of being the most bought-andsold islands known to history. They were known to the ancients and named Canaria by Pliny from "the multitude of large dogs that do there abound," Warren H. Miller relates in "All Around the Mediterranean." A French vessel was driven ashore there in 1834, and in 1400 Jean de Berthencourt sailed from Rochelle to take posssion, but the natives would have none of him, and he sold a bad bargain to a Spaniard. From then on these islands were sold and resold to various Spanish adventurers, all of whom had bad luck with the natives, until one, Parazza, finally sold them to the Spanish crown. In 1476 a group of 1,000 Spanish soldiers set sail for the Canaries to reduce the islands to the glory of God, under Alonzo de Lugo, who completed his task in 1495.

The results showed that approximately one-third of the gross acreage of the National Forests is still sufficiently "untamed" to come under that class, and that there are large areas which are in no immedate danger of the encroachment of gasoline fumes, bathtubs and other marks of civilization.

In making its study of the wilderness areas, the Forest Service adopted the widest possible margin of safety to minimize the possibility that some person might lay a finger on a part of the map classed as pointments and schemes oft buffled; wilderness and assert that he had and men fall in their schemes not so driven his automobile to that point. The minimum size of a real "wilderness" area was taken as comprising 10 townships, 360 square miles, or 230,000 acres. It was determined that at present there are 74 areas ranging from 360 to 10,859 square miles in extent, which, so far as can be determined, are without roads. The grand total area is 85 .-750 square miles, or an average of 1,159 square miles per area. If the proposed Forest Road system, as at present planned on paper, were 100 per cent completed, there would still be 61 areas ranging in extent from 360 square miles to 5,000 square miles, with a total area of 52,920 roadles square miles, and an average of 868 sections per area. These figures are exclusive of Alaska.

"The situation is not so bad as some had feared," says L. F. Kneipp of the Forest Service. "At present one-third of the gross acreage of the National Forests, exclusive of Alaska, is in roadless areas of more than 230,000 acres in extent. After all the roads our field officers have plan-

Carson Pays Much In Animal Bounties

PANHANDLE, March 22.—Carson county still has something of a frontier character, judging from the predatory anmals the county paid bounty on this winter. Thirty-six coyote scalps have been brought into the county clerk's office in the last thirty days to receive the reward Carson county pays for the slaying of these varmints.

The county pays \$1 for each coyote scalp, 10 cents for each pair of snake rattlers, and 5 cents for a pair of jack rabbit ears. The total bounties paid this month were \$131.-15. Thirty-six dollars of it was paid on coyotes. Snakes were not out much, so most of the remaining \$85.-15 was paid for jackrabbit ears. This would indicate that 1,700 rabbits were killed. One hunter brought in 113 pairs of ears Saturday.

fronting education today is whether the present generation is going to more Christian or more pagan. The responsibility for the answer lies at the door of universities, colleges and the public schools. This factor cannot be igored in our system of education if he present generation is to make an equate contribution to the development of the social order. Shall the standards of a pagan or Christian philosophy of life rule the future? The problem is one for which education is

HOUSE MAID REACHES

FINNISH CABINET HELINGSFORS, Finland - Finland's new woman cabinet member. Miss Miina Sillanpaa, was once a chamber maid.

A factory hand at 12, she became a domestic servant in Helingsfors six years later and educated herself at odd moments. She joined the labor movement spreading over Finland and helped organize a servant's union.

Since 1907 when Finland granted them the franchise, Miss Sillannaa has been in Parliament, representing the social-democratic party. She is a prohibitionist and is interested especially in labor legislation. Miss Sillanpaa is assistant minister for social affairs in the department of labor with full cabinet rank. She is 51 years old.
