disasters
Red Cross chapters over the
country are constantly on the watch for disasters large and
small. Each is expected to maintain an organized con-
mittee on disaster relief with subcommittees on food, shel-
ter, clothing, medical aid, fin ane, clothing, medical. aid,
and transportation. When disaster strikes, the
chairman of the chapter calls into action, offers the authori-
ties the Red Cross relief sources and telegraphs or tele-
phones the manager of the Red Cross division to inform
him of the nature of the tou-
ble, the estimated number of
dead, injured, homeless, de-
stroyed homes, families affect-
ed and the kind of her ed and the kind of help mo
needed. If the disaster sumes large proportions the di-
vision manager calls on nation al headquarters in $W$ ashing-
ton.
The duties of the chairman of the disaster relief commit-
tee are to put the subcommittees to work, open centrally located headquarters and stick a Red Cross flag on top, keep
