

Thrills In Golf—Mrs. Stetson's Victory

PHILADELPHIA, May 16. (AP)—Mrs. G. Henry Stetson, national women's golf champion, finds no thrill comparable to the thrill of overcoming a seemingly insuperable lead on the late holes and winning on the extra green.

Mrs. Stetson recalls her victory over Miss Virginia Wilson in the semi-final round of the national at the Merion Cricket club last year. Miss Wilson had just toppled Miss Glenna Collett from the throne and was the favorite over the remaining players for the title.

"I was two down with only three holes to be played," Mrs. Stetson recalls. "I had made several foolish mistakes, but I managed to win the sixteenth hole with a good brass

shot and square the match on the eighteenth.

"This restored my confidence somewhat, but the first hole, which we were to play as the nineteenth, was not one to make me feel sure of myself. I had started the round there by pulling my drive badly and losing the hole. The second time, though, I drove well. Then with my mid-iron I went for the green, almost hidden by the bunkers. It seemed a year before the ball dropped, but when it did it was right on the green. When Miss Wilson sliced her iron shot to a bunker, and I won the hole and match with a par 4, I felt my greatest thrill in golf.

"It was pleasant to win the final

next day, but during that match my nerves were not so taut."

Mrs. Stetson's victory in the national was regarded as an upset. The first hint that she would be a factor in the national came in the eastern, in which she took a big lead over the field the first day by scoring 81 in a driving rain. She won the 54-hole tournament by three strokes over Glenna Collett. She had previously held only the Philadelphia championship.

William C. Fowles Jr., president of the U. S. G. A., accounts Mrs. Stetson one of the best short game players in the country. Her work with the short irons and the putter place her in a class by herself. A notable feature of her game is her reliance upon her spoon.

Gold Fish Hobby Becomes Business

WATTS, Cal.—A 50-foot backyard is a goldfish "factory" for Mrs. Anna G. Gray, who once kept a few pets in one glass bowl and since her first experiment in breeding has built up a market for 12,000 goldfish, 130,000 snails and 2,500 water lilies annually.

She has developed an infinite variety of fish strains through interbreeding. The results show fish of silver striped with black, others spotted and some are totally black with only tints of the virginal gold tone.

The raising of snails was a by-product of her first hatchery. The snail accumulated at the bottom of the tanks, and the snails, in turn, are sold to gardeners as scavengers.

Big Pipeline Work Will Begin About June 1 At Pampa

The contract for the construction of the 250 miles of natural gas pipeline being built by the Empire Gas and Fuel company and affiliated companies from the Texas Panhandle to connect with their pipeline and distributing properties in the Mid-Continent has been awarded to the firm of Booth and Flynn of Pittsburgh, Pa., who will establish headquarters at Woodward, Okla.

This line will be of 20-inch diameter. Pipe is now being strung along the right-of-way and construction machinery and material assembled along the route of the line which will begin at a point near Pampa, and extend in a northeasterly direction through Woodward, Ok., and Anthony, Kan., and connect with the Empire Natural Gas system near Wichita.

Actual construction work, the digging of ditch and laying of pipe, will begin about June 1. This line will have a carrying capacity of 70 million cubic feet of natural gas daily. The construction work will give employment to a large number of men all along the line until late this fall. The line is to be completed and ready for service by January 1, 1928.
