





KANSAS CITY, June 9-(AP)-Seven years of controversy over a question which has stirred the Republican party will focus next week when the convention undertakes to decide its position on farm relief.

Mention Defeated Bill

Middle western farm leaders are to press demands for a declaration in the platform for relief along lines of the McNary-Haugen bill. On the other side is the administration with its more moderate proposal for solution of the problem.

The presidential candidacy of at east one man is directly concerned with the farm disturbance. He is Frank O., Lowdn, who several months before President Coolidge issues his 'do not choose" statement received middle western delegations who were ncensed over the first veto of the McNary-Haugen bill and who asked him to lead their cause.

Of candidates in the convention Herbert Hoover has come to mean the leader of adminstration farm views although one other candidate, Goff of West Virginia, voted against the McNary-Haugen bill. Watson of Indiana, and Curtis of Kansas, voted for the bill but Curtiss supported the president on the motion to override he veto.


In the center position, Robinson re-turns to hold it down together with Captain Bob Kahl.

Studebaker Lines Hold Many Records of Fine Performance

Last October two Studebaker Dicta tors established a new record for stoch cars under \$1400 by traveling 24 hours on the Atlantic City Speedway at an average speed of 61.79 and 61.73 mile per hour, respectively. Since that timno other car selling for less than \$1400 has even approached those marks.

The result: On April 20, 1928, two Dictators again started a dash agains' time on the Atlantic City Speedway and three days later a new record in less than 4,800 minutes. The first Dictator covered the distance at an average speed of 63,138 miles per hour and the second at 61.312, all stops for fuel and changing drivers included.

Almost any car can attain high speed and hold it for a short space of time. But to be able to run at milea-minute speeds hour after hour and day after day demands more than flashing performance.

Shortly after the two Dictators left the track with their new laurels won. two other members of the undefeated Studebaker strain set out to improve upon their own records. As the starter's flag snapped down. two Erskin Six Club sedans started toward their goal, 1,000 miles away, on April 26. 1928. The checkered flag signaled the end of the run for the first car after 984 minutes of dirving at an average speed of 60.97 miles per hour. Four min utes after the finish of the first Clu! Sedan, the second shot past the flag with an average of 60.716.

Six months ago, when The Erskind Six set a record of better than 54 miles per hour sustained speed for 24 hours. motor cars critics prophesied that mark would stand for years as the highest for cars selling for less than \$1,000. Now the 1,000-mile record in that class has been broken-but it took an Erskin Six to do it.

Then out swung The President Straight Eight—a five-passenger se-dan, with the 2,000-mile record for fully equipped stock closed cars as its goal. For 27 hours and 34 minutes it circled the track at an average speed of 72.525 miles per hour. When its meteoric flight was concluded, American Automobile association officials announced that it had smashed twelve existing records and set new marks for every official period up to 24 hours and for every official distance up to 2.000 miles.






