However, the form, which asks the residents to assess their land productivity, could possibly help lower their taxes, explained Jim Clauser, a member of the tax equalization board for the district. He said, "Residents are required by law to fill out the first page of the tax form, but are not required to fill out the second page. "But I would like to add that it would be to their advantage to fill out all the form and get it back to us as soon as possible," he continued.

The equalization board member explained that failure to fill out the first page of the form carries a felony offense, punishable by a jail term and fine. He also said July 16 is the deadline to complete the tax form and return it to the Three Way School Tax office, but an extension can be granted.

## Taxing Considered In Board Meeting

Members of the Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees met in special session Thursday night and approved two resolutions in conjunction with the passage of HB1060.

In one resolution, the directive reads in part ... WHEREAS, the 66th Legislature of the State of Texas has enacted H.B. 1060, and "WHEREAS, H.B. 1060 provides for the exemption of all small trucks owned by a family for the year 1979 unless the governing body of the jurisdiction elects to tax the vehicles for the year 1979, and ...

"NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District elects to tax such vehicles for the year 1979, and ...

1979, and "The Tax Assessor/Collector is hereby instructed and directed to tax all vehicles in the jurisdiction for 1979."

Another resolution also pertaining to H.B. 1060 on the taxation of farm lands on net per acre value of land based on productivity.

The resolution concluded, "NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the

Board of Trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District elects to implement agricultural values in said jurisdiction for the year 1980, and the Tax Assessor/Collector is hereby instructed and directed not to implement agricultural values until the year 1980."

The school board outlined four reasons for not implementing the produc-

## Donkey Ball Game Scheduled Monday

Thrills and spills, and hilarious action are all promised sports fans who attend the Donkey Baseball game tomorrow (Monday) night at the Little League Park in Muleshoe.

Scheduled to start at 8 p.m., the ball game will be preceded by a T-ball game, featuring 'the littest players.' They are the young boys who will form the nucleus of the Little League and Babe Ruth teams when they are a little older.

Tickets are on sale right now for \$2 for adults and for ages 6-14, \$1 each. At the gate, tickets will be \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for the six to fourteen year old spectators.

In action, probably egged on by their teams, will be the minor league coaches playing the major league coaches. They will show their form? and other actions, during a fulfilled evening.

There are no strike-outs or walks in the game and when the batter hits a fair ball, he must mount the donkey and ride around the bases in proper order.

The base playing donkey must have one foot inside or on base and player must be on the donkey and have the ball in his hand before the runner arrives at his base in order to make the 'put-outs.' Base running donkey must also step inside or on the base to be safe. The player must be tagged out, not the donkey. Force and tag-outs are the same as in usual baseball.



**Hance Give Boast To Protect Farmers**

WASHINGTON -- The House Agriculture Committee Wednesday approved an amendment by U.S. Rep. Kent Hance (D-Tx) which protects irrigation farmers from the possibility of being eliminated from federal farm programs. The amendment by Hance was specifically designed to offset a proposal which was on of a series of staff recommendations by the President's Water Task Force last year. The proposal would have prohibited all underground and stream irrigation farmers from participating in any government farm programs. "This was a very dangerous proposal and could have been subject to implementation by the Water Resources Council," Hance said. "It would simply have been disastrous to a large majority of farmers in the High Plains and Western states who farm by underground or stream irrigation. I really find it difficult to believe that this type of recommendation was ever considered by the Water Task Force. Hopefully, we have eliminated any chance of irrigation farmers being hurt by proposals such as this." The recommendation by the Water Task Force last year was aimed at all farmers who use irrigation of all forms except trapped rainwater. Hance's amendment states that no person can be prohibited from participating in government farm programs unless specifically stated in law.

"This easily could have been one of those cases where an agency takes the authority of law in implementing a program," Hance said. "More than 80 per cent of all water consumed in the U.S. goes for agricultural purposes and one-sixth all irrigation is in Texas."

PIVOT TALK by Arnie

One disadvantage of center pivots is the wheel tracks left after several revolutions around a field. The depth and severity of wheel tracks are directly related to both the system design and the operation in the field. The greater weight each wheel is called upon to carry will of course determine to a great deal the depth to which it will sink to float the tower. To some degree high flotation tires will absorb some of this weight, however, in problem soils it is best to eliminate as much weight per tower as possible either with more spans or smaller pipe. Some manufacturers comprise the entire system capability by going to six inch pipe the entire length while Lockwood now incorporates two (2) or three(3) pipe sizes in one machine to keep the friction loss as low as possible the entire length of the machine and yet get the lighter weight towers out to the end of the system where most tracks are made.

**Terraces Can Reduce Loss Of Topsoil**

Parallel terracing will reduce erosion, conserve moisture, prevent gullies, and increase yields.

The manner in which most rainfall is received in this area is too rapid to be absorbed by the soil. As the rainfall runs off the land into roadside ditches and playa lakes, it carries tons of topsoil with it. The majority of our topsoil losses due to water erosion are the smaller clay particles in the soil. These clay particles are more fertile than sand particles and also hold more water for crop use than do the sand particles which remain.

Parallel terraces can be installed to stop these losses. The layout for these terraces can be adjusted to fit any equipment regardless of size.

There are other benefits besides preventing topsoil losses. Terraces "trap" water on the land. As this water cannot run off, it is held on the soil surface until it can be absorbed. In many instances, terraced land may produce a crop while unterraced land is too dry to produce.

If this sounds like it can benefit you and solve some of your problems, contact the Soil Conservation Service in your county. Government cost share assistance may also be available for this land saving practice.

**Revocation Of Rule No. 9 Dismays NFV**

National Farmers Union President Tony Dechant today expressed dismay at President Carter's decision to revoke Special Rule Number 9, which permitted agricultural producers to receive needed supplies of diesel for planting and harvesting this year's crop.

"Many agricultural producers are still in a critical energy need situation," Dechant said. "There are several significant production regions which need diesel fuel to power irrigation pumps during the

summer. At the same time harvest season is upon us and we will need diesel to get the drops out and to market points. It will have been in vain to have provided farmers with the necessary diesel to plant their crops if they don't have the ability to harvest and transport those crops to market."

"We are, however, mindful of the fact that many perishable agricultural products are rotting in the fields for lack of transportation services. Additionally, there is a need to move industry equipment and supplies if we are to avoid a serious economic disruption," Dechant acknowledged.

The Administration now

needs to give immediate attention to establishing procedures that will put into priority position the fuel needs generated by the production and harvest cycle in the immediate weeks and months ahead.

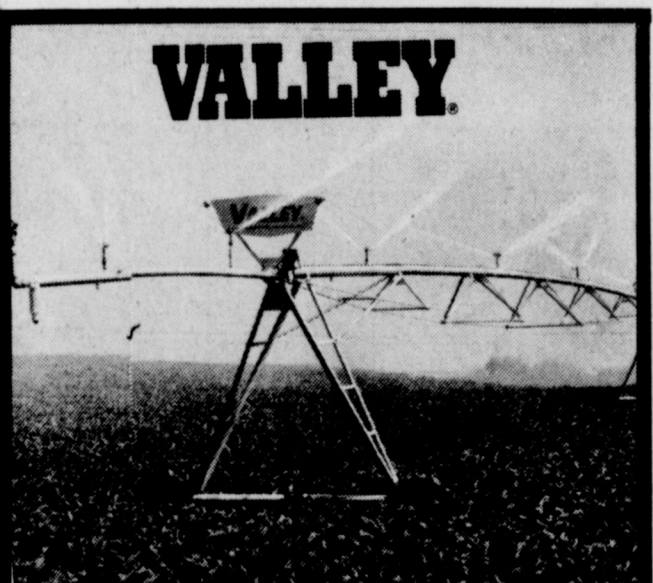

**Fireworks Can Become Dangerous**

Fireworks stands that have begun business a long roadsides in Texas

this year should be a reminder not only that July Fourth is near, but also that fireworks bodily injured at least 6,139 people in America last year.  
 That statistic includes 1,207 serious eye injuries. Most resulted to some degree in permanent vision loss or impairment, Texas Society To Prevent Blindness (TSPB) spokesman Bobby Williams said. Most accidents—about 60 per cent—occurred to children younger than 15. In one Texas accident, the child was merely a bystander not using the fireworks that damaged his eye, the TSPB Eye Safety chairman added.  
 The statistics, compiled by the Consumer Product Safety Commission, are probably low, since they include only people who were treated in hospital emergency rooms, Williams pointed out.  
 "Such injuries are needless," he said. "The TSPB urges that all fireworks be restricted to licensed public display."  
 Most eye injuries were caused by bottle rockets and most injuries, according to the American Pyrotechnics Association, were caused by improperly handling fireworks.  
 "But all fireworks are

dangerous," Williams stressed. "To take only two examples, sparklers burn at about 1,500 degrees Fahrenheit, and punks can cause lacerations, punctures and severe burns."  
 TSPB is an affiliate of the National Society To Prevent Blindness. The parent organization, established in 1908, is the oldest voluntary health agency nationally engaged in preventing blindness through service programs, education and research.
