Terraces Can Reduce Loss Of Topsoil

reduce erosion, conserve moisture, prevent gullies, and increase yields.

The manner in which most rainfall is received in Morton, where he was this area is too rapid to be absorbed by the soil. As the rainfall runs off the Funeral services for land into roadside ditches and playa lakes, it carries tons of topsoil with it. The majority of our topsoil losses due to water erosion are the smaller clay particles in the soil. 
Revocation Of Rule No. 9 Dismays NFV







Fireworks Can Become **Dangerous**

Fireworks stands that have begun business a long roadsides in Texas reminder not only that July Fourth is near, but also that fireworks bodily injured at least 6,139 people in America last year.

That statistic includes 1,207 serious eye injuries. Most resulted to some degree in permanent vision loss or impairment, Texas Society To Prevent Blindness (TSPB) spokesman Bobby Williams said.

Most accidents--about 60 per cent--occurred to children younger than 15. In one Texas accident, the child was merely a bystander not using the fireworks that damanged his eye, the TSPB Eye Safety chairman added.

The statistics, compiled by the Consumer Product Safety Commission, are probably low, since they include only people who were treated in hospital emergency rooms, Williams pointed out.

"Such injuries are needless," he said. "The TSPB urges that all fireworks be restricted to licensed public display."

Most eye injuries were caused by bottle rockets and most injuries, according to the American Pyrotechnics Association, were caused by improperly handling fireworks.

"But all fireworks are

danerous," Williams stressed. "To take only two examples, sparklers burn at about 1,500 degrees Fahrenheit, and punks can rodeo. cause lacerations, punctures and severe burns."
