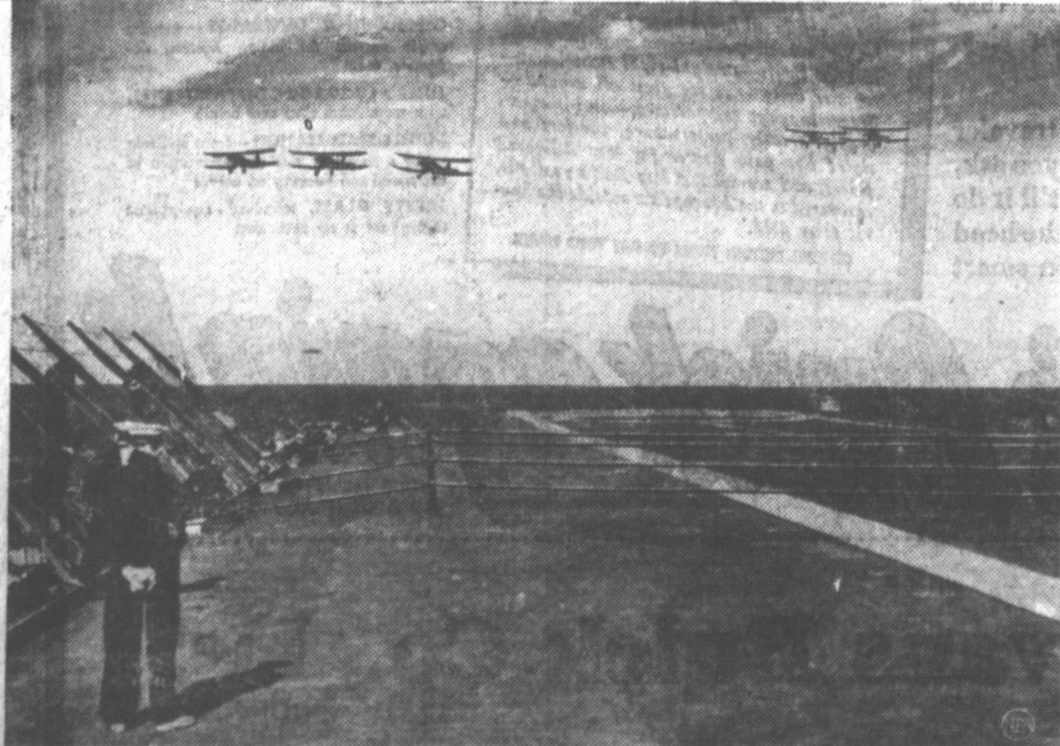


Packed and jammed into Detroit's Cadillac Square, this crowd, variously estimated at from 60,000 to 250,000, gathered as a protest against eviction of sitdown strikers. Hundreds of police surrounded the demonstration area, but took no action except to keep traffic moving. The strikers, union sympathizers and the curious gathered with them heard Homer Martin, president of the A. A. U. W., direct his remarks at city and state officials, at manufacturers and once at Henry Ford. Martin told the mass meeting that workers were going to get everything they had coming to them if "we have to move every public official out of office to do it."

British Planes Returning to 'Floating Airport'



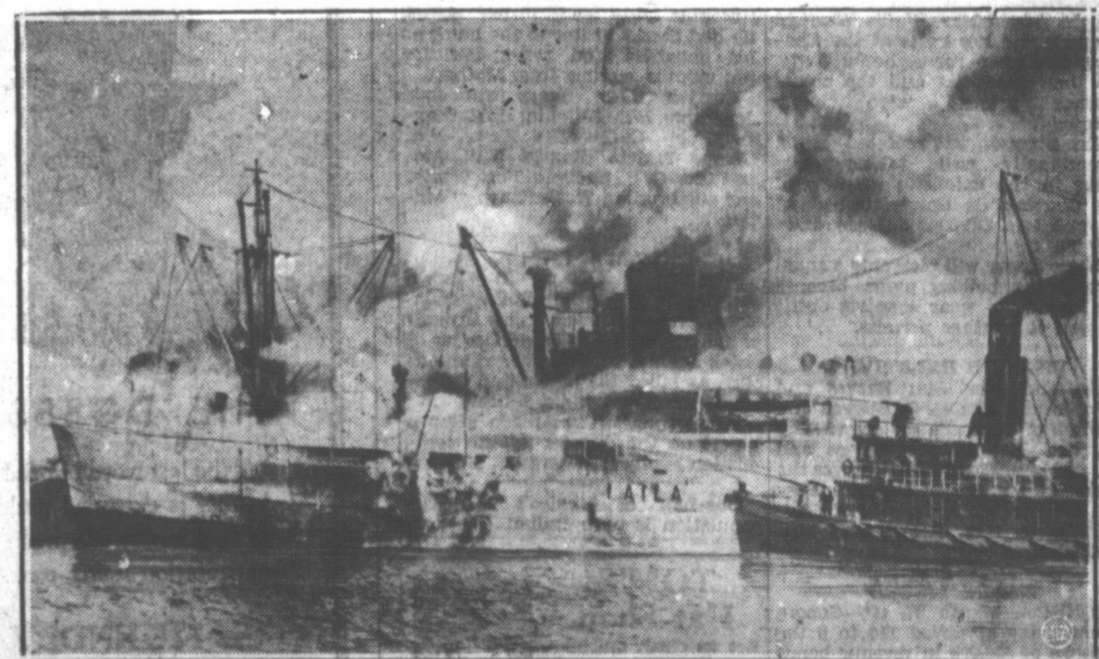

SERVICES TO BE HELD FOR BLAST VICTIMS

RADIO NETWORK WILL BROADCAST PROGRAM TODAY

NEW LONDON, March 27 (AP)—Bereaved families of London's school explosion victims return to the wrecked building tomorrow to seek consolation in the resurrection.

Easter memorial services at the very doorstep of the structure, torn by explosion 10 days ago, will supplant services planned prior to the disaster. Surrounded by the ruins survivors and families assemble to pay tribute to students and teachers killed in the blast.

Gov. James V. Alred, speaking from Austin, will read a message from President Roosevelt at the opening of a 30-minute radio program at 3 p. m. (Texas Quality Network).

The Oil Belt Ministers' association, headed by the Rev. Cecil Lang of Kilgore, arranged the program.

church will offer the opening prayer. The Rev. A. D. Sparkman of the Old London Baptist church will give a scripture reading.

The sympathy of 8,000,000 school children throughout the nation is to be expressed in a floral cross. The cross, made of thousands of red carnations on a field of white, will be nine feet high and five feet wide.

Luther McClure, surviving student who was captain of the football team, will make the presentation to the parents of victims, in behalf of the National Junior Red Cross.

The memorial address will be made by the Rev. R. L. Jackson, Methodist minister of New London.

The Rev. R. L. Colley of the New London Church of Christ will offer the closing prayer.

A pause in the program will come immediately after the governor's address when a minute's silence is to be observed.

While plans for the memorial services were being made here, Gov. Alred issued a proclamation in Austin asking Texas school children each to contribute a penny on April 7 to help finance a memorial to the victims of the explosion.

At the same time plans were made for resumption of classes here Monday. Both high school and grade school will resume session after a general assembly Monday morning.

MARKET BRIEFS

NEW YORK, March 27. (AP)—There were individual strong spots in today's stock market but the list as a whole ended in restricted territory.

Transfers of \$51,990 were the smallest for any session since Sept. 12, last year. The Associated Press average of 60 issues edged up .3 of a point at 71.5.

New was fairly comforting from a market standpoint, but brokers found the few customers who appeared in the boardrooms inclined to do little or nothing while waiting for final accord in the Chrysler labor controversy.

The general disposition to go lightly was also attributed partly to the thought the Supreme Court Monday may hand down a ruling on the Wagner labor relations act which might push the list one way or the other substantially.

Some of the stocks, oils, rails, alcohols and specialties performed well on the upside.

The Mometake mining "Blue Chip" jumped 37 points at the best on the proposal of a 5-for-split-up of this issue for the purpose of affording it a broader trading market. It closed up 33 points at 425.

Steeles were still able to reflect the highest net operating rate since 1929 and the heaviest demand in some instances since the world war.

A sharp return in 1936 net for Texas Corp. gave a handful of oils a lift. The utilities finished around their Thursday's closing levels, although earnings for the week were interpreted as favorable.

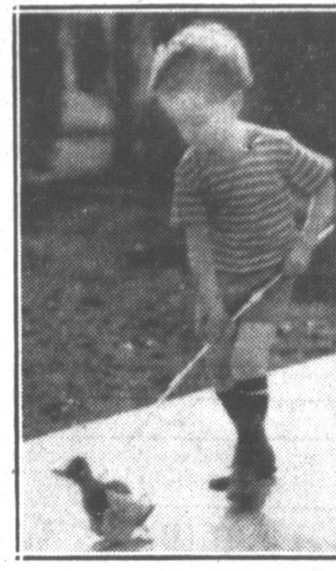
