SALES TAXES ON WRONG BASIS

The proposed tobacco tax which comes up for a hearing before the committee of revenue and taxation today will be opposed vigorously for a number of reasons. If the tax were limited to tobacco alone, it would not be so bad, but experience of other states shows that it would be a fore-runner for scores of other similar levies. Wartime experience with sales taxes will be remembered with distaste by many citizens. The sales tax is a nuisance because it must be applied to so many different commodities and passed on to the people. Were such taxes applied to a hundred articles, Texas would have a tremendous collection agency to collect the taxes. The trouble is that collections require a large per cent of the total received, and that evasion by dealers is always extensive. How would you like to pay a tax on each purchase of canned goods, patent medicines, tooth paste, shaving cream, candies, soft drinks, tea and coffee, sundries, sporting goods, and many other things? South Carolina placed sales taxes on shot gun shells, candy, cut glass, footballs, gloves, golf sticks, fishing reels, theater tickets, soda water, ice cream, and many other items. The issue is not whether sale of cigars will be curtailed. The tax should be put a few cents per package and would not diminish the consumption. The proposition is whether Texas shall adopt the sale tax idea and force residents of this state to pay heavy taxes in little dribbles—a little here and a little there, making change with pennies on nearly every much used article. In New Mexico and Oregon the tobacco tax issue was submitted to the people in the form of a referendum and was overwhelmingly defeated. Other states have repealed the law. Tax equalization is the prime need in this state, and this necessity would be in no way met by imposing sales taxes on articles which most people use.

LIVERPOOL IS LOWER
NEW ORLEANS, March 4. (AP)—The cotton market today had a quiet and irregular opening. Liverpool came in lower than due and first trades here showed losses of one point on near months and gains of three to four points on the more distant positions. Prices rallied slightly after the start, gaining three points on May but the market soon eased off again owing to an irregular stock market. May eased off to 11.25 and October to 11.25 or four to six points down from the opening figures. At the end of the first hour the market was quiet and near the lows.

CHICAGO, March 4. (AP)—Rain or snow predicted for most of the United States wheat belt resulted in early lower prices on grain today. The primary receipts of domestic wheat counted also as a bearish factor, and Liverpool reported pressure of offerings from Australia. Opening 5-8 cent off to 5-8 cent up, wheat afterward underwent an all-around sag. Corn started at 6-2 cent decline to 1-4 cent advance, and later kept near to the initial range.

country "fell for" the idea. The nuisance tax on tobacco was almost unanimously selected for the purpose of the experiment because it seemed easy of collection. Sometimes, to disarm opposition from the rural districts, the state tax was limited to cigars and cigarettes, with chewing and smoking tobacco expressly exempted.

When two or three states had "broken the ice" and piled on the nuisance levy, tax hunters in many other states introduced similar proposals to their respective legislatures. For a time it seemed that the state nuisance tax might put on the proportions of an epidemic. But the tobacco nuisance levy has been rejected by no less than 33 of the 48 states. Louisiana tried it, but repealed it at the next legislative session. In Michigan, New Mexico and Oregon it was beaten by referendum vote. Wyoming's legislature voted for it on one occasion, but the governor vetoed the bill and it could not be re-passed over the veto.

In many states the nuisance-tax advocates were reluctant to accept defeat. The tobacco nuisance tax was proposed and beaten in Oklahoma, Kentucky, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Ohio and West Virginia and twice voted down in Arizona, Connecticut, Delaware, Illinois, New York, North Carolina, Vermont and Virginia.

Several states which adopted the levy have succeeded in collecting therefrom only a fraction of the revenue promised them by its champions while the cost of collection has greatly exceeded the estimates. 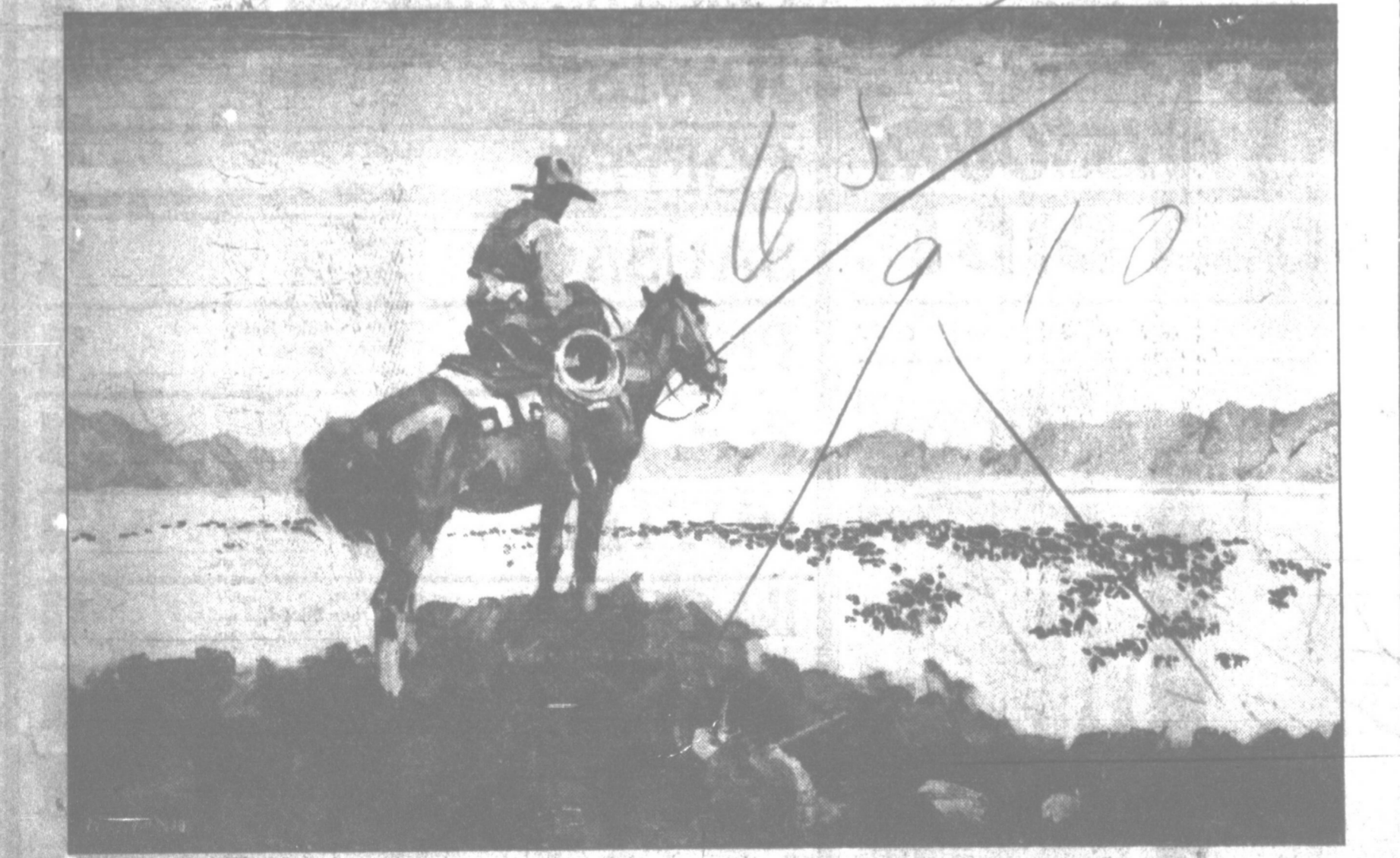

MENU for the FAMILY

Within the last few years scientists have presented definite evidence that the food substance known as vitamin B is a mixture of several vitamin factors, each playing an important part in nutrition.

Dr. Walter H. Eddy warns us that "the absence of this vitamin from the diet results in the cessation of growth, the growth ceasing relatively quickly following the deprivation of the factor, for unlike vitamin A, the body cannot store this vitamin and its removal from the diet results in fairly rapid evidence of the absence. Its absence also results in a multiple inflammation of the nerves which is called 'poly-neuritis' and this inflammation is succeeded by loss of control of certain muscular activities." "This is one of the indications of the disease known as beriberi and its direct relation to this disease has given it the name of anti-neuritic vitamin."

The chief factor of vitamin B is considered a preventative and also a curative if the disease has not gone too far for palliative.

In children, lack of growth, failure of appetite, loss in weight and digestive troubles are apparent long before actual evidences of the disease appear. The conditions usually indicate lack of the B vitamin in a child's diet, and if foods rich in vitamin B are provided, the trouble can be easily corrected.

Where Vitamin B is Found
Yeast is the richest known source of vitamin B, but it is widely distributed in whole cereals, vegetables,
