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

Cold blast chills area

Winds clocked at 65 mph

A strong cold front blew into Pampa at exactly midnight Sunday, bringing wind gusts as high as 65 miles per hour, said local meteorologist Darrell Sehorn.

"Last night's storm was exceptionally strong for this time of year," said Sehorn. "The heavy Canadian air created quite a wind field in the Panhandle area.'

Pampa Fire Department firefighters responded to several reports of downed power lines shortly after midnight.

One unit and three firefighters responded to a report of a downed power line in the 400 block of Wynne at 12:35 a.m., but

found none. Firefighters also responded to two alarm calls in the 1500 block

of West Kentucky between 3:30 a.m. and 4 a.m. which were apparently storm related.

Around 5:30 a.m., firefighters responded to reports of power lines arcing in the 800 block of Oklahoma Street. Firefighters stood by until Southwestern Public Service arrived to repair the lines.

Gray County Sheriff's Department and Pampa Police Department reported this morning they had not received any reports of damage in the city or county.

Brenda Payne stared intently at the television screen showing her son stepping from the Continental Airlines jet that brought him to Guam after being held 11 days at Hainan Island by Chinese authorities.

He paused for a moment at the top of the stairs leading down from the jet's doorway, looked around and took a deep breath. Then proceeded down the stairs onto the tarmac

"I think he was glad to be breathing free air," she told The Pampa News.

"It felt good to be coming out into the open," Payne said of the moment. "We had been kept in little dormitory rooms with curtains closed and windows closed. It was pretty depressing. I was just thinking, 'It's over.'"

From Guam, the 24 crew members spent two days debriefing in Hawaii. The crew of the EP-3H surveillance plane that had made a harrowing landing on Hainan Island after colliding with a Chinese F-8 fighter over the South China Sea, then traveled to Whidbey Island,

said Embassy officials gave each of the crew five e-mails from their tamily.

"They were definitely edited by our government," he said. "I understand that. They didn't want anything to affect our morale. You could see (family members) were trying to be positive and still say what they could. You could read between the lines."

When Payne turned on the television that second night in Hawaii, he was astounded. "Our faces were all over the television.

"That really threw us back," he said. "Our squad had always been low profile. We weren't now. It was like a dream. Unbelievable.

Then the crew encountered the tremendous welcome at Whidbey Island, just in time for Easter. He had achieved the goal he had made for himself while waiting for the Chinese to release him.

"I couldn't believe the patriotism, the flag waving," (See WELCOME, Page 8)

Judge sets trial date in Grury gas lawsuit

WHEELER – Judge Steven Emmert has set Nov. 13 as the trial date for a lawsuit filed here by Eastern Panhandle residents in an effort to prevent a Dallas company from cutting off their gas.

Grury, a Dallas-based natural gas gathering company, notified landowners last August that the landowners would no longer have access to natural gas from wells on their land.

The landowners, who have tapped into the pipelines on their wells and have used the gas in some cases for decades, complained that Grury wanted to cut them off because of the increased prices of natural gas.

Grury said their decision was based on safety considerations.

The landowners filed suit to prevent the Dallas company from shutting the natural gas off to their homes.

Judge Emmert set the timetable for the lawsuit to proceed in 31st District Court. He also let an earlier order stand preventing Grury from cutting off the gas to the homes and buildings of the landowners.

Attorneys for Grury agreed to a temporary injunction which will remain in effect until further order of the court, ural gas.

John Mann, attorney for the plaintiffs in the case, said.

"That injunction has the practical effect of simply maintaining the status quo. Nobody is going to have their gas cut off until the judge orders otherwise." The judge ordered the two sides to

attempt to mediate their differences. He said he wanted the mediation completed by June 29. The attorneys on both sides are in the process of selecting a mediator.

"There's not going to be a problem on that," Mann said. "We're kicking around several names, but none of us seem to object to any of them."

The two sides are to pick a mediator by May 25.

"If we haven't picked one by then, the judge will select one," Mann said.

The two sides have until May 31 to add additional parties to the suit.

Both side have to designate their expert witnesses by July 15, discovery has to be complete by August 31 and the case is set for trial before a jury on Nov. 13.

Mann said there would be a meeting of the landowners at 7 p.m. Monday at the Irish Inn in Shamreck concerning an anticipated change in mineral and royalty valuations and the likely result on their tax bills due to the increased value of nat-

HOUSTON — Helping children eat five or more servings of fruits and vegetables can be easier than parents think. Just be sure to have plenty of supplies — and creativity - on hand.

Mash carrots with potatoes and mix with low-fat milk and cheese. Toss mushrooms and chopped vegetables into chunky tomato sauce and serve over pasta or on top of pita bread. Sprinkle diced red peppers, corn and peas into rice and flavor with beef or chicken stock.

Compound cures arthritic mice

WASHINGTON (AP) - A compound called VIP has been found to cure a form of arthritis in mice, a discovery that could direct new research into the disease in people.


Rheumatoid arthritis afflicts millions of people worldwide, causing painful inflammation and swelling in the joints of the hands and feet. Over time it can be crippling. A team of Spanish researchers reports that mice with a different form of

arthritis were helped by a compound called vasorestrictive intestinal peptide, a combination of amino acids found in the lymph system.

Their results are reported in the May issue of the journal Nature Medicine. Mice don't get rheumatoid arthritis, so the team led by Mario Delgado of Complutense University in Madrid performed their experiments on

mice with another form of the disease, called collagen-induced arthritis. Treatment with VIP significantly reduced the incidence and severity of the disease, they reported, eliminating joint swelling and damage to connective tissue.

Delgado said collagen-induced arthritis is the animal version of the disease most similar to human rheumatoid arthritis. Most drugs used at this time for treatment of rheumatoid arthritis in humans have been previously tested in collagen-induced version, he said.

 Tantrums, which generally occur between the ages of 1 and 3, may rattle parent's nerves, but they are a normal part of development as a child learns self-control.

These crying, screaming and stomping sessions are a way for children to let off steam when confronted whit frustration, anger or disappointment.

When tantrums do occur, it is best to remain calm, said Dr. Teri Turner, a pediatrician at Texas Children's Hospital.

"Minor outbursts generally can be handled by ignoring the situa-tion or by holding your child until he or she calms down," Turner said. "If you need to take action, try distracting the child by engaging him or her in another activity, averting attention or removing the child from the situation."

If the child is engaged in an activity that could be harmful, take action immediately.

Check out summer camps for special-needs youth

HOUSTON — Spring is in the air, but it is not too soon to start exploring summer camp options for children with serious illnesses or special needs.

Parents can start by contacting their children's doctor or local hospitals and asking about day and overnight summer programs and activities. Hospitals generally offer an array of camps target-ed to children with specific problems, such as cancer, heart disease and diabetes.

"Families often are separated because of a child's illness," said Lauren Wilk Baylin, a social worker at Texas Children's

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

Some research has suggested that taking estrogen reduces the risk of getting Alzheimer's disease for post-menopausal women. In a study reported in the New England of Journal, researchers looked at the effect of an estrogen alternative, Evista, on mental ability. Evista, an osteoporosis drug also known as raloxifene, mimics estrogen in strengthening bones but without the increased risk of breast cancer.


In the study, 7,478 women with osteoporosis were given either one of two doses of Evista or a dummy pill for three years. They were periodically given a series of tests that measure such things as

The researchers concluded that Evista did not have an overall effect on cognitive function. There was some evidence that Evista may lower the risk of decline in verbal memory and attention, but more study is needed, they said.

The study was conducted by researchers at the University of California at San Francisco and San Diego and at Eli Lilly, which makes Evista and supported the study along with the National Institutes of Health. Some of the researchers have received research support from Lilly or other drug makers.



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

"He couldn't handle the surface," Ward said. "It's like a person running in deep snow. Or like a golfer in a sand trap. It doesn't matter how hard he hits the ball if he doesn't have the right club."

Baffert said Point Given "felt comfortable" at Pimlico. At the Derby, "the track was too firm, he didn't like that," the trainer said.

In the Belmont, the track surface might not matter as much as the distance of 1 1/2 miles, the longest race of the Triple Crown series.

Both trainers said their horses

"That's his race, a mile-and-ahalf," Baffert said of Point Given, who is ridden by Hall of Famer Gary Stevens. "He'll just sit back there and cruise around."

Baffert returned to California on Sunday, and said he won't make a Belmont decision until he checks on Point Given's training next week.

Ward has said all along that Monarchos should perform at his best in the Belmont. And owner John Oxley agrees: "He will run 1 1/2 miles, he will run two miles and only lengthen on the field."

Now that Point Given has reverted to his earlier form that carried him to a convincing win in the Santa Anita Derby on April 7, Baffert was asked if he had any regrets about the colt's failure to fire at Churchill Downs.

"The vice president and I are thrilled to be able to look you in the eye and say thanks for your service to the country," Bush told them, saluting them for their "class and dignity" throughout their 11-day ordeal in Chinese custody.

Pilot, Lt. Shane Osborne, received the Lynch also wrote of his encounter with her Distinguished Flying Cross for his heroic efforts to safely land the crippled aircraft. Payne and the others received the Air Medal for exceptional achievement. Osborn and the senior enlisted member of the crew, Senior Chief Nicholas Mellos, also received the Meritorious Service Medal for their leadership roles during the 11 days in China.

Looking back, Payne said the tremendous support he has received has helped him decide to stay in the Navy and continue with his career. "I plan to keep on track with my training and to go ahead and get back on the road."

He believes the ordeal has also strengthened his marriage. "It brought things up that we had never talked about. Now we talk about them," he said. "It brought my wife and I even closer."

He's scheduled to be deployed again in June this time to the Middle East. He looks forward to getting back to work. "It's time to go ahead and get back on the road. The sooner I get back out there, the better," he explained.

Besides, if he leaves then he'll be back home by Christmas, "so my wife'll be happy," he laughed. He regrets not being able to come back to his hometown as planned, he said. "I hope to get back to Pampa soon. I want to say thanks for all the


