## Obey Tornado Rules; It May Save Your Life

With the tornado season just starting, more than 450 confirmed tornado reports have been issued by the National Weather Service, and more than 100 deaths have been recorded. In all of 1983, a total of 37 persons were killed by tornadoes.

However, with proper precautions, and by observing a few safety rules, the chances of becoming injured or killed by a tornado become more remote.

Case in point -- the citizens of Matador had been thoroughly schooled by Civil Defense in that county in what safety measures to

take in the event of an approaching tornado. Thus, last Tuesday night, there was only one person injured in a tornado that devastated a large residential area of the town of 1,000 persons.

With the tornado season expected to last through June, know what to do when a tornado is approaching -- it could mean the difference between life and death.

**1. IF YOU ARE NEAR A TORNADO CELLAR:** When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave or underground excavation which should have an air outlet to help equalize the air pressure. It should be kept fit for use, free from water, gas or debris; and preferably equipped with pick and shovel. **THERE IS NO UNIVERSAL PROTECTION AGAINST TORNADOES EXCEPT UNDER-**

### GROUND EXCAVATIONS.

**2. IF YOU ARE IN OPEN COUNTRY:** Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

**3. IF IN A TOWN OR CITY:** Seek inside shelter, preferably in a strongly reinforced building. **STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS:** In homes: The corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the sides of the houses away from the tornado may be opened to help reduce damage to the building. Standing against the inside wall or a lower floor of an office building offers some protection.

**4. IF IN SCHOOLS:** In city areas: If school building is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. **AVOID AUDITORIUMS AND GYMNASIUMS** with large, poorly supported roofs! In rural schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

**5. IN FACTORIES AND INDUSTRIAL PLANTS:** On receiving a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for moving workers to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

Keep calm. It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornadoes cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornadoes, though, "just in case."

Keep tuned to your radio or television station for the latest tornado advisory information. Do not call the Weather Bureau, or your

## Fertilizing Of Grass Is Urged

Most hay supplies were depleted by the past winter's severe weather, so Bailey County producers will need to pray for a good hay crop this year, says Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

In general, nitrogen and rainfall control production form grasses such as bermudagrass and bahia. Adequate phosphorus and potassium and other conditions favorable for high yields are also necessary.

If weeds are present, they must be controlled, since they use available water and nitrogen needed to produce high grass yields.

Research and demonstration data show that nitrogen fertilization is more efficient in the spring, probably due to better moisture and general growing conditions, says Tanksley. For example, average results of nitrogen rate studies at four locations show that a ton of hay can be produced for each 30 to 40 pounds of nitrogen in the spring, while 50 to 60 pounds are needed late in the season. This means that higher rates of nitrogen can be used in the spring. It may be desirable to apply 100 pounds of nitrogen per acre in the spring and drop to 60 pounds in late summer unless available moisture is unusually good.

Under grazing management, apply nitrogen fertilizer at rates and at the best

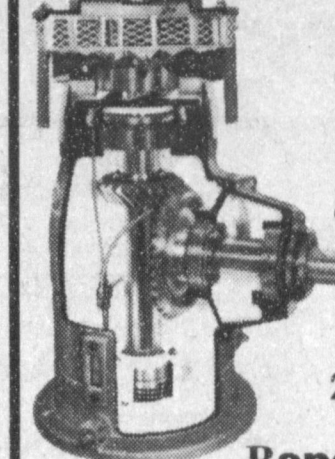

## Control Horn Flies With 'Ear Tags'

Ear tags containing synthetic pyrethroid insecticides do a good job in controlling horn and ear ticks in cattle, and more and more cattlemen are using them.

These specially treated ear tags generally give good fly control throughout the spring and summer seasons, points out Spencer Tanksley county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. They can be used safely on cattle and calves, including lactating dairy animals.

Considering their convenience and long-lasting control of flies, ear tags are relatively inexpensive when compared to penning cattle and spraying them with an insecticide two or three times during the fly season.

Despite the effectiveness of these ear tags, some cases of horn fly resistance to pyrethroid insecticides had been suspected, Tanksley points out. To avoid this possibility of increased resistant development for the upcoming fly season, several steps can be taken:

\* Use tags on all animals according to label directions.

\* Don't put ear tags on until shortly before fly season starts. This is usually about April or May for most of Texas. Tagging time will correspond with the working of cattle in the spring.

\* Always remove old ear tags when retagging cattle in the spring.

\* Use alternate fly control

methods from year to year, such as ear tags treated with insecticides which have a different mode of action, forced-used dust bags or traditional sprays with alternate type insecticides.

Several different types of insecticide-treated ear tags are available to cattlemen and all do a good job in

controlling flies, points out Tanksley. If you haven't used them in the past, this might be a good year to give them a try.

Whichever method you use, fly and ear tick control is important on cattle because it improves the animal's thrift, vigor and performance, says Tanksley.
