





City mourns slain officer

Bond denied shooting suspect

CANADIAN – Services for a Hemphill County deputy sheriff killed in the line of duty will be Wednesday morning.

Deputy Jim Bruce Graham, 54, was shot down on a Canadian street Sunday morning as he stopped to arrest 27-year-old Christopher Chad Britton about 10:30 a.m. Sunday.

Britton remained in Hemphill County jail today on capital murder charges after Justice of the Peace Frankie Hill denied him bail Monday afternoon.

Hemphill County Sheriff Dean Butcher said Deputy Graham was on his way to a residence on Red Deer Street Sunday morning to arrest Britton on outstanding misdemeanor warrants when the deputy apparently met Britton's blue 1985 Blazer on the street.

Butcher said that the two vehicles stopped, and as Graham got out of his patrol pickup, he was

shot in the head by a sawed-off weapon.

Area, state and federal law enforcement officers joined in a manhunt Sunday trying to locate Britton.

Britton was arrested shortly (See CITY, Page 8)

Priorities change for cancer survivor

Editor's Note: This is the second in a five-part series on cancer survivors.

While a cancer diagnosis caused Pampa teen to grow up in a hurry, Deborah Elliott says the disease gave her childhood back to her.

She was having problems with heartburn and went to see her doctor in December 1999. Her family doctor ordered a gallbladder sonogram and a colonoscopy to determine what was causing the symptoms.

Deborah said she had been experienc-

ing a great deal of pain at the site of her kidneys so her doctor referred her to a urologist.

An examination and additional testing determined she had cancer of the kidney.

Deborah, 38, had a kidney removed on Jan. 5, 2000. Fortunately, she said the cancer was completely encased within her kidney even though it had metastasized.

She did not require further treatment as she said her oncologist told her she did not need chemotherapy because the cancer hadn't spread outside the kidney.

While she said she doesn't notice any difference since having her kidney removed, she does take more precautions.

"I don't miss the kidney at all," she said. "I do have to be more careful and I watch my salt intake a little closer."

Taking care of her herself and her body has become a priority with Deborah. "I have more annual check-ups, and I have become more in tune with my body," she said.

"Being diagnosed with cancer does make you re-evaluate your priorities in life," said Deborah. "It gives you your childhood back."

Elliott said she has learned so many things she thought were important in life were not nearly as important as what she thought.

Cash for Trash pays out \$6,342

Nearly 300 refrigerators were turned in during the Cash for Trash Buy Back program in Pampa Saturday.

Pampa residents were paid a total of \$1,460 for the 294 refrigerators turned in to the local landfill.

A year's experience caused the Saturday program to go a little smoother this year, said Jim Benton of the sanitation department, in the 2nd

annual Cash for Trash program.

"People were lined up at 6:30 a.m. Saturday with their items," he said. "Some of the people waited as long as two and one-half hours, and they were so cooperative."

"We really appreciate all the cooperation," he said. "We learned a lot during last year's and it helped this year."

Benton said it will take awhile for the sanitation department to get the freon recovery completed (See CASH, Page 8)

MCLEAN – Officials listed a California man in satisfactory condition in an Amarillo hospital today with injuries suffered in a one-vehicle rollover on Interstate 40 Monday.

Todd Joseph Caufield, 33, Sanger, Calif., was airlifted by LifeStar helicopter to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo Monday after the sports utility vehicle he was driving rolled just west of McLean.

Texas Department of Public Safety officials said Caufield was westbound in the outside lane of Interstate 40 about 1 p.m. Monday when he apparently fell asleep at the wheel.

Garza executed

TERRE HAUTE, Ind. (AP) — With an apology for "the pain and grief that I have caused," murderer and drug kingpin Juan Raul Garza was executed Tuesday, eight days after Timothy McVeigh became the first federal inmate put to death since 1963.

Garza died at 7:09 a.m. by chemical injection, strapped to the same gurney where McVeigh was executed last week.

He nervously flexed his feet as Warden Harley Lappin tied the curtains back on the witness rooms. As the chemical entered his veins, he kept his head cocked to the left, toward the room assigned to his own witnesses. His eyes slowly closed half way and his lips turned a light blue.

He went to his death calmly and, unlike McVeigh, with remorse. "I just want to say that I'm sorry, and I apologize for all the pain and grief that I have caused," he said. "I ask your forgiveness and God bless."

Texas Round Up

Concerns remain in Texas prisons

AUSTIN (AP) — Although Texas' prison system has improved, a federal judge says constitutional violations persist in connection with inmate safety, use of force and segregation of some inmates.

U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice terminated federal oversight Monday of several areas of the state's prison system and ordered the two sides in a 29-year-old lawsuit to reach an agreement within 90 days on measures to resolve the three remaining issues.

"Over the past 29 years, the TDCJ-ID (Institutional Division) has vastly improved the system that at one point was incapable of description — the conditions so pernicious and the inmates' pain and degradation so extensive," Justice wrote Monday in a 33-page ruling in the case begun in 1972.

"Yet, constitutional violations persist in the Texas prisons as was determined by this court two years ago."

Justice terminated federal oversight of several areas, including staffing, support services, discipline, access to courts, crowding, health services and death row in the nation's largest prison system.

He said in three major areas — condition of confinement in administrative segregation, the failure to provide reasonably safety to inmates against assault and abuse, and the excessive use of force by correctional officers in Texas prisons — prisoners "remain victims of an unconstitutional system."

Affidavit says doctor found evidence of neglect and sexual abuse to child

HUTCHINS (AP) — A starving girl who was imprisoned in a closet for months had also been a victim of repeated sexual abuse, according to a specialist's affidavit.

One of the victim's sisters told police that a paddle kept under a bed was used to "strike" the girl as punishment. A search warrant affidavit released Monday did not state who hit the 8-year-old girl or whom police believe sexually abused her.

But Hutchins Police Chief Gregory Griffin said the department sought the search warrant after

receiving "credible" allegations of sexual abuse.

Law officers on Friday searched the Dallas County trailer where they say the girl was imprisoned in a urine- and feces-contaminated closet for at least four months.

Barbara Calhoun Atkinson and Kenneth Ray Atkinson, the girl's mother and stepfather, were arrested last week on charges of injury to a child, a felony that carries a sentence of five to 99 years in prison.

The 30-year-old mother remained Tuesday at Dallas County jail in lieu of \$100,000 bond. Her 33-year-old ex-husband will not be released on bond because he also faces charges of probation violation out of Ellis County, police said.

One dead in West Texas explosion

BIG SPRING (AP) — A West Texas woman died in an early-morning home explosion that damaged more than 20 other dwellings and could be heard more than eight miles away.

June Carothers was killed Monday when her home exploded and burst into flames.

As splintered debris showered across the block, the 75-year-old woman's neighbors were shaken from their beds. Shane Mayhall saw a stream of gas or fuel shooting 20 to 25 feet into the darkness from the back of the house.

"I heard the boom. I saw it (the home) on fire," Mayhall, 37, said. "To me, it looked like a gas fire."

Fire inspectors on Tuesday were still trying to determine the cause of the blast, which also destroyed a second home.

Police evacuated residents after the 3 a.m. blast in the neighborhood, where a house was blown off its foundation. At Mayhall's home, across the street from the blast, the garage door was blown in. Other residents sustained severe damage.

Energas employees and the Texas Railroad Commission were also investigating the blast.

City Fire Marshal Carl Condray said lumber and other debris was scattered up to 70 yards.

Former Paracelsus officials settle fraud lawsuit

HOUSTON (AP) — Four former high-ranking officials of Paracelsus Healthcare Corp. have settled a civil suit alleging they used fraudulent accounting to mislead investors about the company's profits.

The Securities and Exchange Commission said Monday the four agreed to pay thousands of dollars in fines and to not violate federal securities provisions regarding reporting, record-keeping and fraud.

The SEC said the four officers maintained two separate ledgers and earnings reports and kept several receipt files.

Paracelsus, a privately held California company, merged with Houston-based Champion Healthcare Corp. in 1996.

Total Subscriber Minutes equals the total subscriber served by Company at mid-month multiplied by 1440 multiplied by the number of subscribers affected in each separate outage multiplied by the total down time in minutes for such outage.
G. The agreement also provides as follows:
5.1 Customer Service Standards: Company shall at all times comply with the more stringent of the provisions of the customer service and consumer protection provisions of the Cable Ordinance, or those from time to time adopted by the Company or the FCC. This requirement is in addition to the specific provisions of subsequent sections of this Section 5.
5.1.1 Company shall continue to comply with the NCTA's On-Time Customer Service Guarantee. The guarantee "promises on-time service calls or the customer receives \$20.00, and on-time installation calls or the customer receives a free installation."
5.2 Blocking: Upon request by a subscriber, Company shall provide a device to enable a subscriber to entirely block receiving both the audio and video portion of any channel, such as a scrambling box or a video filter which prevents the frequencies containing a specific channel or channels from being transmitted into the subscriber's premises. The preceding blocking shall be provided at no charge to a subscriber receiving such service.
5.5 Pay Per View: Subscribers shall be given the option of blocking access to analog pay per view programming by their households upon the subscribers providing a security number selected by each subscriber.
5.8 Converter Companies: Converter companies shall make available for rental by subscribers the converter equipment necessary for subscribers (such as those with "non-cable ready" television sets) to receive the service through a pay per view program, and by Company. There are provisions on telephone and service call response times, log on complaints, payment options for the service and billing procedures disconnected; and privacy and monitoring.
I. The Company will be required to provide a number of PEG channels, i.e. public, education and government channels at no charge.
J. The following are the franchise agreement provisions on "Fees and Payments":
8.1 Franchise Fee: Company shall pay Municipality throughout the Term of this Franchise Agreement of franchise fee in an amount equal to five percent (5%) of Company's Cable Gross Revenues computed as set forth below. In the event that the FCC, Federal or State government, or the courts, in the future alter that upper limit of what may be charged as a franchise fee, Municipality or Company may petition for amendment of this Franchise Agreement to reflect the change in law.
8.1.1 Company shall pay franchise fees on an annual basis with the payment

being due on Feb. 1 of each year.
8.1.2 Company shall file with the Cable Administrator by June 1 of each calendar year an annual report, prepared and audited by an independent Certified Public Accountant showing the yearly total Cable Gross Revenues of the preceding calendar year. Such annual franchise fee report shall be accompanied by a written report to Municipality (in the form set forth on Exhibit C, unless otherwise specified by Municipality), containing an accurate statement of Company's Cable Gross Revenues and the computation of the payment amount.
The term of the franchise shall be effective for five (5) years as of October 1, 2000. The extension agreement reads as follows:
10.2 Extension: The term will be extended for an additional five (5) years effective October 1, 2005, unless any of the following have occurred:
10.2.1 There have been numerous events of default, as defined in the Agreement, and they have not been cured in a timely manner; or
10.2.2 Company attempted to evade any material provision of the Franchise Agreement to practice any fraud or deceit upon the City or its subscribers or customers; or
10.2.3 The Cable System's quality, performance, programming offered, and the technology of the system, taken as a whole, not commensurate to the other Cable One systems in a comparable market in Texas, unless the Company commits to a time when the upgrades will be accomplished based upon a Company-wide upgrade schedule.

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

"Family is so important," she said. "My family was so supportive."

She and her husband, Dean, are the parents of two active teenagers, Cody, 18, and Cristina, 15.

Deborah said she and Dean were totally honest with the children about the disease from the initial diagnosis.

"We were honest with our kids from the get-go," she said. "They knew exactly what was going on from the beginning."

Deborah was amazed at the support she received from her family, friends and people she did not even know.

She said there was no family

history of cancer before her diagnosis.

"There were some good stories, some wonderful stories," she said. "There were some bad ones, too."

Deborah said the prayers came in from throughout the community, and said the prayers played an important part in her recovery.

"The prayers I received...it was just amazing," she said. "The church was so supportive."

She said cancer survivors gave her immense support, also.

"Lots of cancer survivors came forward," she said. "Their support was great."

Deborah has been employed as a physical therapist assistant with Shepherd Crook Home Health Agency the past seven

years. She said the support she received from her employers and co-workers was impressive and inspiring.

Deborah was off work three months following the surgical procedure, and said she has not experienced any reoccurrence of the disease since her surgery.

"Everyone at work gave me tremendous support," she said. "It helped so much."

Singing is something Deborah loves and has always been a pos-

itive outlet for her. A member of Sweet Adelaines, a group of singers out of an Amarillo, she began singing during her recuperation period.

"I really think the singing helped me recuperate much faster," she said. "It gave me back my stamina."

She is back to singing with the group once a week. She said she has been to Little Rock, Ark., two times to compete in singing competitions with the group since her surgery.

"Life is wonderful," said Deborah, who now takes time to encourage anyone who has been diagnosed with cancer.

"The survivors' support was so important to me," she said. "I just want to help someone else."

The innovative method for clean-up paid out \$6,342 to Pampa residents Saturday as residents kept the city workers busy throughout the day.


Rick Stone, Sanitation Department Superintendent, said 228 vehicles took the numerous items to the city landfill.
