

A local woman may have to undergo rabies shots if the dog that attacked her Thursday morning is not located soon.

Local authorities are searching for a tan and white pit bull dog which was reported to have attacked the woman in her yard in the 1000 block of Huff at 10:50 a.m. Thursday. Monty Montgomery, Animal Control Officer for the City of Pampa,

said he was notified by the emergency room staff at Pampa Regional Medical Center shortly after 11 a.m. that the woman was being treated there for a dog bite.

Montgomery said the unidentified woman received injuries to her leg, shoulder, hip and side. She was treated and released from PRMC.

He said he was told by area residents that the dog was dragging a tow chain when the incident occurred. Montgomery said he also received reports another person in the area was chased by the pit butt.

He said he believes the animal is still in the area of the 1000 block. of Huff. The gender of the dog is not known, he said.

Authorities are asking anyone with knowledge of the animal to contact them at 669-5775. He said if the animal is not found it is like-If the woman will have to undergo the rabies shots.

#### Warning signs to be placed near site of four drownings

HOUSTON (AP) — Authorities on Friday plan to post signs warning of dangerous currents off a stretch of the Houston Ship Channel near the Galveston Island's east end, where four waterrelated deaths have occurred in the last week.

Six warning signs will replace the two that Galveston officials say were removed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the Houston Chronicle reported in its Friday editions.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers took down signs on June 21 that it had placed on the beach area in order to put them on metal posts. The signs warned that jetties placed by the corps of engineers off the shore were not intended for public access. Signs warning of the dangerous currents, which had been erected by the city of Galveston and were attached to the ones by the corps of engineers, were also taken down, said Phyllis Bledsoe, a spokeswoman for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' Galveston district office.

#### Two teen-agers killed at Austin house

AUSTIN (AP) - Family members remembered Veronica Vasquez and Nancy Venegas as teen-agers trying to balance school and motherhood.

Vasquez, 17, and Venegas, 16, were found shot to death early Thursday morning outside an Austin home, according to the Austin Police Department. Police said they may have been victims of a double murder-suicide.

Law officers were called about 3:15 a.m. to a house where they found the two girls dead of gunshot wounds to the head. Vasquez was found in the driveway, and Venegas in the front yard. About four miles away, a 17-year-old boy was found dead beneath a tree about half an hour later at Winn Elementary School. Oscar Rangel

#### against construction of weir BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) - The Rio Grande

could continue to stop several hundred feet short of the Gulf of Mexico if a proposed dam is built, according to a report by an Austin-based environmental group.

The Texas Center for Policy Studies said in its four-page newsletter that if built, the Brownsville Weir could cost nearly \$80 million and wreak substantial environmental damage, The Brownsville Herald reported for its Friday editions.

But the Brownsville Public Utilities board said the structure would cost only \$39.9 million and that the higher estimates include other projects, such as a new water plant that would be needed regardless.

The Brownsville Weir is a dam that would be built eight miles downriver from Gateway International Bridge to divert water that normally flows into the Gulf.

# Sale tax holiday set

AUSTIN (AP) — Back-to-school shoppers mark your calendars. The third-annual sales tax holiday will be Aug. 3-5, Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander announced Thursday.

Shoppers-will save an estimated \$31.2 million in state sales tax and \$8.4 million in local sales taxes, Rylander estimated.

Most children's and adult clothing and footwear under \$100 are exempt from tax.

"The sales tax holiday provides much-needed tax relief for hardworking Texas families and lets them stretch their budgets a little farther as they shop for school clothes for the kids and work clothes for

The 1999 and 2000 tax holidays saved taxpayers a combined \$69.6

Texans spent more than \$400 million on tax-exempt items in 1999 and \$467 million on those items in 2000.

Legislators rejected an effort this past session to expand the sales tax holiday" to include school supplies and safety equipment such as bicycle helmets.

"Next session, I will again urge the Legislature to make Texas families and the sales tax holiday expansion a top priority," Rylander said.

"It's the second (burglary) where there's blood evidence," Conner said.

At Pampa Concrete, officers found an undetermined amount of cash was taken from a vending machine, a pickup truck had been "gone through" and numerous power tools were stolen, according to the police report. Officials had not completed a total loss and damage estimate by this morning.

"Every single business burglary we've had, we have the same names coming up as suspects," Conner said, explaining that the victims had either had contact with the people or some past association with them.

Despite this, the police detective said he doesn't have enough evidence to charge anyone in the burglaries.



# Minister's musing

H.F. Gerecke isn't among the most familiar names in our churches today. But I hope that his story will impact you like it has me. Gerecke was an American minister who in late 1945 was appointed chaplain to the high Nazi Criminals during their trials at Nuremberg. In his personal account of his experience, he very honestly described the talk that he had with himself.

"Before having to visit these Nazi leaders in their cells, I asked myself the question: Must I greet these men who had bought such than they could have imagined; may Christ unspeakable suffering on the world, and the cause of the sacrifice of so many millions of lives? My only two sons were also victims of their misdeeds. How should I comport myself before such men so that they would be willing to receive God's word?'

His "church role" had 15 names: Karl Dönitz, Wilhelm Frick, Hans Fritzsch, Walter Funk, Hermann Göring, Wilhelm Keitel, Konstantin von Neurath, Erich Raeder, Joachim von Ribbentrop, Alfred Rosenberg, Fritz Sauckel, Horace Greely Hjalmar Schacht, Baldur von Schirach, Albert Speer and Julius Streicher.

He visited each of them the evening before the trial started, Nov. 20, 1945. Later that same night he said, "The night I passed in prayer, asking God to give me a message for them. These men must hear something of the Saviour who suffered and died also on the cross for them."

Here is Gerecke's description of the impact of his ministry on that strange flock. "Sauckel was the first who opened his heart to the gospel. He was the father of 10 children and had a Christian wife. After a few visits, we knelt down by his bed and prayed the publican's prayer: 'God be merciful to me a sinner.' I know that he was perfectly sincere."

"Then Fritsche, Von Schirach and Speer asked permission to take the communion. As I saw these three men receiving the bread and wine I was seized with emotion, for God had worked mightily through His Word and Spirit in their hearts, and as repentant sinners they accepted pardon through Christ."

"Raeder, the Chief of the German Navy, read zealously his Bible. He often came to me with difficult passages. Keitel, the Chief of the German Army staff, asked me to convey his thanks to those who had provided for lost sinners." heir spiritual welfare, being criminals. With tears he said, They have helped me more sentences, I had a long interview with



sustain me.' With Von Ribbentrop, at first I found no response, but later on he commenced also to read the Bible."

After the verdicts came in, Goering, Von Keitel, Kaltenbrunner, Ribbentrop, Rosenberg, Frank, Frick, Streicher, Sauckel, Jodl and Seyss-Inquart were condemned to death by hanging. The greater part of the remaining time Gerecke spent in the cells of the condemned. Gerecke described some of what he witnessed.

"Through a favour of the prosecution, the condemned men were allowed to see once more their wives. It was a very sad meeting. I heard Von Ribbentrop ask his wife to promise to bring up their children in the fear of the Lord.'

"Sauckel asked his wife to vow to bring up their numerous family beneath the Cross of Jesus. Goering asked what his little daughter Edda said when she heard his sentence, and had to hear that the child hoped to meet her Daddy in heaven. This affected him, and it was the first time I saw him in tears."

"Day and night I remained with those who had committed their souls to God. I visited some of them often five times daily. Von Ribbentrop read his Bible the greater part of the day. Keitel was most moved by the portions which spoke of the redeeming power of the blood of Christ. Sauckel was very upset and said many times that he would collapse before the execution of the sentence. He prayed out loud continually, 'O God be merciful to me a sinner.' These three took the communion for the last time with me in their cells. God had changed their hearts, and now in the presence of death, having lost all material things and their unworthy lives, they were able to rely on the promises of God for

"On the evening before the execution of the

Goering. I put before him the necessity of preparing himself to meet God. In the course of our conversation, he ridiculed certain Bible truths, and refused to accept that Christ died for sinners. It was a conscious denial of the power of the blood. 'Death is death' was the substance of his last words. As I recalled to him the hope of his little daughter to meet him in heaven, he replied, 'She believes in her manner and I in mine.'

"An hour later I heard many agitated voices and then I learned that Goering had taken his life. His heart was still beating when I entered his cell, but when I questioned him, there was no answer. A small empty glass tube lay on his breast, and he had gone into eternity - a frightful end!"

"As the hour of the execution of the sentences approached, now that Goering was dead, Von Ribbentrop was the first to mount the gallows. Before he left his cell, he declared that he put all his confidence in the blood of the Lamb that took away the guilt of the world, and he prayed that God would have mercy on his soul. Then came the order to proceed to the execution chamber. His hands were bound. He mounted the 13 steps to the gallows, I uttered a last prayer, and he was no more. Keitel also went into eternity confiding in the pardoning grace of God. Then Sauckel went to his death, and with a last greeting to his wife and children and a last prayer, he exchanged his earthly life for an eternal one."

"Frick assured me before his death that he believed also in the cleansing blood, and that during our simple gospel services he had personally met Jesus Christ."

"Of the last group was Rosenberg, who had constantly refused all spiritual aid. To my request that I might pray for him, he replied with a smile, 'No, thank you.' He lived and died without a Saviour."

"Now came Streicher's end. At first he refused to give his name, but as the moment of the execution came, he mentioned the name of his wife, and went into eternity with a cry of 'Heil Hitler.' A dreadful end!"

Surely if the grace of God can reach some of these men, there is never anyone with whom we should fail to share Christ. After all, if the simple gospel can convict Saul of Tarsus and several of Hitler's henchmen, then who is unreachable? May we never try to read hearts. May we only plant the gospel seed everywhere.'

#### **TURNING PROBLEMS INTO OPPORTUNITIES**

Bill Alley, by any standards, would be considered a success in life. First, he set a world record in the 1960 Olympics, throwing a javelin 283-feet 8-inches. He had won an athletic scholarship and received an engineering degree from the University of Kansas. Along the way in his life pursuits, Bill adopted the philosophy that there were no limits to what he could achieve.

It worked well for a while, but later proved an erroneous assumption. Problems began to develop in his throwing arm. He endured several operations on his elbow but without success. Bill had to stop throwing javelins. So he went into the business of manufacturing them. His aluminum-shafted javelins were an improvement over the wooden shafted ones and had better aerodynamics. But then another problem: The market for javelins in this modern world is very limited.

However, Bill observed that the javelin handle resembled the shaft of a golf club. Now anyone knows that golf is more popular than javelin throwing, so he decided to manufacture golf putters. It was a tough time; in fact, Bill wasn't eating very regularly.

But contracts were signed, and his small company manufactured 4,000 putters with an aluminum shaft. As the putters were rolling off the assembly line, Bill pulled one out for testing. It was to flex only 2-inches when the head was attached at the end. Instead, it bent 17-inches, almost in half. Panic ensued. All the shafts had the same problem. The formula had been calculated incorrectly.

In anger, Bill bent one of the putters over his knee. At the same time, he was struck by the thought, "That's what someone does when he misses a putt!" At that moment he gave up his search for the correct formula to pursue another opportunity.

He bought an ad in a golf magazine to market his flexible golf putter as the Silly Putter, and sold 6,000 of them at \$19.95 each. It made a great gift for the erratic and unpredictable golfer. The income was sufficient to let Bill pursue a brand new opportunity, making items using carbon fiber. Today he employs 35 people and is doing very nicely, thank you!

Let that be an inspiration to you. If you simply solve problems, you arrive back at the same place you were before the problem occurred. How about taking off in a different direction, perhaps the way of opportunity?

# The Father-Daughter project

**Dancing with Dad**

HOUSTON - When the Rev. Paul McKinney picks up his Bible and speaks, the congregation listens.

But last week, as he rehearsed for a different kind of performance, it was McKinney who needed to listen. And that command came from none other than his 18-year-old daughter, Shanica.

"I thought, 'You are telling me to listen? I've been telling you to listen since the time you started school," said McKinney, a Pentecostal preacher and evangelist with the Holy Temple of Jesus Christ.

Shanica McKinney's complaint about her father's lack of concentration came as the two rehearsed for the Father/Daughter Project, a DiverseWorks presentation at the Jewish Community Center two weeks ago. The program features Houston religious leaders dancing, singing and performing with their daughters or fathers.

But listening was also a theme for the McKinneys in their performance of a duet created by choreographer Victoria Marks with musical composition from Shanica, a sophomore at Prairie View A&M University

"I'm all grown up now, and I have a mission all of my own," Shanica sings to her father.

"In the church," Paul McKinney sings in reply.

"Out of the church," his daughter responds.

The Father/Daughter Project featuring clergy members is the product of one of DiverseWorks' ongoing "diverse dialogue residencies." As part of this program, the Houston performing and visual arts group has hosted artists such as Marks, who comes to Houston for up to three months to create works involving local residents, said Loris Bradley, who curates performing-arts events for the group.

Marks has worked with professional dance companies in New York and London. In recent years, she also choreographed for father/daughter teams and nonprofessional dancers.

With the Father/Daughter Project, Marks has created a collection of seven duets between religious leaders and their daughters, fathers or granddaughters. The duets are stitched together by group dances. The performance begins and ends with dances that include the entire group of 15 performers. After an intermission, the performers participate in an interfaith panel discussion moderated by the Rev. Timothy Sloan of Interfaith Ministries for Greater Houston.

"It's amazing how (Marks) can take regular, ordinary people and make the most beautiful pieces," said Jane Vora, a 15-year-old Bellaire High School sophomore who performs with her Buddhist father, Ted Vora. "I cried when I watched them."

In addition to the McKinneys and the Voras, the performers include the Rev. Harvey Clemons Jr., senior pastor of Pleasant Hill Baptist Church and his 14-year-old daughter, Harvetta; the Rev. Gail Lindsay Marriner, a minister at First Unitarian Universalist Church, and her father, Malcolm Lindsay, a retired physician from Minnesota; and Rabbi Eve Ben-Ora, director of Jewish education at the Jewish Community Center, and her father, Avi Ben-Ora.

Also, Tom C. Mesa Jr., a candidate for ordination as a Catholic deacon, and his 17-year-old daughter, Naomi, a recent graduate of Deer Park High School; and the Rev. Don Sinclair, a retired Methodist minister, and his two granddaughters, Kate and Ann Sinclair.

"I think the things that the fathers and daughters are doing are wonderful," Mesa said. "I love what we are doing. But it is very draining for me."

'We are both sort of adventurous and say 'yes' and figure it out later," Eve Ben-Ora said of herself and her father, a retired radiologist from Arizona.

"When she asks me something, I always say yes," Avi Ben-Ora added.

But religion is not just about theology and houses of worship. It permeates everything, including father/daughter dances, Clemons said. And it certainly is part of relating to family and even fellow cler-

gy performers. "Faith is about relationships," he said. "My faith should move me to have a relationship with a supreme being, with Jehovah. But if my relationship with Jehovah does not help me in my relationship with humans, then there is something lacking in my faith."

Focusing on the underlying ministry of her husband, Don's, artistic gift, Jonas will share some of the experiences she and Don have had since God led them into a career change that ultimately established them as manufacturers of framed art and wholesale suppliers to both the Christian gift market and the major general gift and home decor markets.

### **Racers return** to Daytona

**By EDDIE PELLS AP Sports Writer** 

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) - Rusty Wallace recalled the exquisite relief he felt the last time. he raced at Daytona after dodging the careening cars and coming out the other side of the wreck unscathed.

Then, he relived the sadness of the wreck that killed Dale Earnhardt.

"I remember that melee," Wallace said Thursday. "I was in the middle. Earnhardt shot across my bow. I got on through and said, Whoa, this is cool, the world just opened up.' I didn't know he had been killed in that corner."

For the first time since Earnhardt's death in the final lap of the Daytona 500, Wallace and the rest of the NASCAR family is back at Daytona. Once again, they're all being confronted with the realities of a sport with a preciously thin margin for error.

"We miss him, and to come to Daytona certainly reminds us of the night we left here," car owner Robert Yates said. "He helped build our sport, so the best thing we can do to honor him is to do it the way he did.'

The Pepsi 400 is Saturday and, as the drivers return, they come back to a different track — a different sport.

Most notably, they've lost their most colorful, independent character in a sport that has become more buttoned-down and businesslike as it has grown exponentially over the past decade.

They also lost the rival they respected the most, and one of the few athletes in any sport who simply couldn't be ignored.

"There have been many times this year when I've looked in my mirror waiting for him to come up and give me a tap or something, Bobby Labonte said. "No one will ever realize how much he is missed.'

Of course, with everything happening at speeds reaching 190 mph, there will be very little time to reminisce or grow teary-eyed over the loss of an icon.

But Floyd wasn't among the selections for the NL team, and on Thursday, Valentine said Floyd "misunderstood the conversation" — prompting an angry response from Floyd.

"If he said I misunderstood, then he's lying," Floyd said in Montreal, where the Marlins were playing.

About all Floyd, his agents and Valentine could agree on Thursday was that someone wasn't telling the truth.

Floyd and Valentine have been having a spat since May, when Floyd called the Mets skipper "a stupid manager" during a testy series between the teams.

Valentine later said Floyd's remarks could be a tiebreaker in his All-Star picks.

Valentine and Floyd<sup>®</sup> tried to clear the air Tuesday — the day before the selections were made - when Mets public relations director Jay Horwitz called Floyd's agents to let them know Valentine wanted to speak to Floyd.

"The point of the conversation was to clear the air for both of us," Floyd told the Sporting News Radio. "I wasn't losing sleep over it, but it was bothering me that every time I got asked a question, it wasn't about baseball, it was about comments I made about Bobby Valentine."

The phone call only exacerbated the situation.

Floyd's agent, Seth Levinson, said the player told him Valentine said: "I'm not supposed to tell you today because it is against league rules. But congratulations, you're on the team.'






