



CY LELAND IS **REAL THREAT** TO ANY TEAM

Associated Press Sports Writer Cy Leland has answered those skep tics who thought he would be just an other halfback. He is the reigning sensation of a season replete with sen sation. He has displayed Shelley, Mason, Grubbs, Wilson, and other great halfbacks. The long-legged loper from the plains of West Texas has proved himself even a greater football playe than he is a sprinter, and there probably are not five men in the country who can beat him consistently in the dashes. He has beaten three South west conference elevens almost single handed with his dazzling runs.

Leland is not entirely dependent upon his speed. No ball carrier ever gave a finer exhibition of darting, dodging and squirming out of the arms of tack lers than he did in the first twenty yards of his 92-yard run against Bay lor Saturday at Waco. The entire Bay lor team was almost upon him when h started, and it seemed impossible he could get away for more than a yard or two, hemmed as he was against the sideline. The crowd roared its appreciation as he dodged the first two tacklers and edged forward a few yards It roared some more as he darted past another, then hesitated so that his rolling interference could sweep him a path. The din reached its crescendo as he deftly passed the last Orange jersey and sped down the field. It was pretty to watch.

There are those who hold, or rather held, that the Frog flash was not a great back because he could not do enough things well. They know now that any player who can carry a football like Leland doesn't need to know anything else, except, possibly, the rules and direction his team is tarveling. The fact of the matter is, though, that Leland is quite an all-round star. He is about as fine a pass receiver as the conference lists and has the height to make him doubly effective in that department. He is a splendid blocker and a crack defensive man, as attested by the fact that Francis Schmidt trusts him with the very important safety position. They say he also is a capable passer, but there is no chance of anybody else getting to peg the ball around as long as Howard Grubbs is on the Horned Frog team, and Leland's stiff arm has been a scourge to the tacklers of every outfit he has met this year. It may be recalled that a fellow named Red Grange did no kicking or passing to speak of in his college days, yet was known as a fairish football player.

Coach Ray Morrison of Southern Methodist already is setting his best traps for the Frog speedster. Leland will be a marked man when the Methodists and Christians clash Saturday at Fort Worth. He will be the greatest individual threat in the championship game and the Frogs will never be beaten as long as there remains a minute to play and Leland has his health. The Mustangs may bottle him up and keep him there for four quarters, but the odds are against it. Three conference teams have seen their title hopes wither inder his flying cleats.

Kansas production was 110,320 barrels daily as of the week of Nev. 23 compared to 109,410 barrels for the week ending Nov. 16. The Gulf Coast, Southwest Texas, Eastern and Rocky Mountain areas de-




