ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Rick Helling pitched the Texas Rangers' first shutout in nearly two years and got as big a kick from the look on the face of teammate Craig Monroe.

Helling pitched a four-hitter for his fourth career shutout, and Monroe hit his first major league homer as the Rangers beat the Tampa Bay Devil Rays 2-0 Sunday.

"The expression on his face back in the dugout, it's something I'll never forget," said Helling. "It's been a dream of his to play here, being from Texas, and then to get a homer on his first hit, it's a great day for him and for the team."

Monroe's homer in the second extended the Rangers' advantage to 2-0. Monroe also made a leaping catch against the right-field wall in the eighth to deny Jason Tyner's extra-base bid.

Monroe was playing in his second game since his call-up on Friday from Triple-A Oklahoma.

The native of Texarkana, Texas, was anxious to put on a good show for his parents, who were in the stands.

"What a day," said Monroe. "It's gone by so fast. To be from Texas and to be playing here, this is a day I'll never forget. My heart was just pounding."

Monroe said he saw his first major league game at old Arlington Stadium as a 12-year-old on a trip with his youth baseball team.

"I told my dad I was going to play here someday," said Monroe. "To be playing right field, it's just a dream for me."

Helling (8-8) threw the Rangers' first shutout and second complete game of the season. He struck out four and walked none. Texas has won six of seven.

"After 1-6, it didn't look like it was going to be a great season," said Helling, 7-2 with a 3.67 ERA in his last 13 starts. "It's nice to even it up. It's a lot better looking at 8-8."

The Rangers had gone nearly two years — and 302 games — without a pitcher throwing a shutout. Aaron Sele was the last Texas pitcher with a shutout, doing it Aug. 22, 1999, at Boston.

After his bad start, Helling ironed out some flaws in his delivery.

"He changes speeds well, locates well, and had a good breaking ball," said Rangers manager Jerry Narron. "The thing about him is the way he competes, the way he works. I hope our other (starters) take something from the way he competes."

Devil Rays rookie starter Joe Kennedy (3-6) was also sharp, allowing two runs and five hits in 6 2-3 innings.

Memories of Pampa versus Plainview

Carl Irlbeck's return to the coaching profession brings back some basketball memories. The memories aren't all that pleasant for Pampa fans.

Irlbeck's Plainview Bulldogs met the Pampa Harvesters in the 1992-93 Class 4A regional finals with the winner advancing to the state tournament. The game was played at Greyhound Arena in Portales, N.M.

Plainview would use scoring spurts in the second and fourth quarters to beat the Harvesters 75-55.

The Harvesters were young that season. Future Texas Tech star Rayford Young and Coy Laury were freshmen starters.

The team's leading scorer was senior guard Dwight Nickelberry, a southpaw who averaged 25 points a game. He scored 22 against Plainview.

Nickelberry was probably the best Harvester basketball player to never play at the collegiate level.

The Harvesters were going for their third consecutive Final Four trip to Austin, but Plainview spoiled their plans.

The Bulldogs would go onto win the state title. A year later, Irlbeck would retire from coaching because of health problems.

Laury, Young and head coach Robert Hale would have their night in the spotlight three years later when the Harvesters won the state crown by beating Dallas Madison.

Irlbeck, now a math teacher at Hart, will be coaching the Class 1A Longhorns next season after bringing his diabetes under control. The story has it that Hart principal Digger Elam had talked Irlbeck into becoming a coach again.

We can't discuss Pampa and Plainview without mentioning the 1993 football bi-district tilt between the two schools.

It turned out to be one of the most exciting, intense football games ever played.

Plainview came away with a 9-7 victory at Buffalo Stadium in Canyon.

That thriller would have everything a football fan would want — breakaway runs, touchdown-saving tackles, circus catches, goaline stands, field goals and blocked field goals.

Most fans figured the outcome would be a tossup and they certainly weren't disappointed.

The two teams had met during the reg-

ular season with Plainview posting a 14-8 decision.

In that bi-district battle, Pampa scored the only touchdown on a 6-yard run by fullback Matt Garvin in the second quarter. Tim McCavit added the extra point.

All the Plainview points came on three field goals by Tony Santos.

There was no scoring in the second half as both teams exhibited that bend, but don't break defense.

The Bulldogs had a fleet back by the name of Samien Nails, who finished with 118 yards rushing. Nails has some exciting runs, but the Harvester defense tightened whenever the Bulldogs got near the goal line.

The Harvesters were quarterbacked by Tony Cavalier, son of head coach Dennis Cavalier.

That '93 meeting between Pampa and Plainview remains the best high school game I've ever witnessed.

Vikings make Randy Moss a richer man

Randy Moss arrived at training camp a wealthier man. David Terrell guaranteed he'd do the same after ending his nine-day holdout.

Moss, who signed an eight-year, \$75 million contract last week with the Minnesota Vikings, arrived Sunday in Mankato, Minn., the site of the team's training camp for the last 37 summers.

Vikings coach Dennis Green issued his annual assurance that Minnesota wouldn't let the loss of several key starters deflate its Super Bowl aspirations.

"It's great to have everyone signed," said Green, entering his 10th season as head coach. "There will be no distractions. We'll be able to zero in on football."

Moss might still face inquiries about the contract that made him the highest-paid non-quarterback in the NFL, and Cris Carter will face questions about whether this is season will be his last.

The Vikings, who started 11-2 last season and reached the NFC championship game, will have an accelerated 2 1/2 week training camp.

"It's a high level of intensity in a short period of time," said Green. "This is where you start building your football team."

In Chicago, the Bears added to their thin receiver ranks by signing Terrell, the eighth overall pick in the NFL draft.

Terms of the contract were not announced, but the Bears admitted to making concessions in an effort to get Terrell in camp, especially after Marcus Robinson went down with a back injury that is expected to sideline him 4-to-8 weeks.

Robinson led the team in catches in 1999 and shared the lead last year. His surgery Friday took away the Bears' chief big-play threat.

"I understand why he's not here, but I'm not going to speak for him as to why he's not here," Dungy said. "We just have to take a position now like he's an injured guy. He's not here and we've got to get other people ready."

General manager Rich McKay said the Bucs have been trying to redo Brooks' deal since last November.

Ravens

"We can't hide from the fact that we're the defending champions," coach Brian Billick said, "and we don't choose to. What I want to tap into this year with this team is that most of the guys have enough money, so let's all remember why we play this game in the first place."


