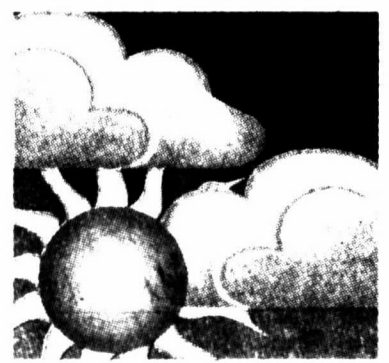

## Three indicted on murder charges

BEAUMONT, Texas (AP) — A Jefferson County grand jury has indicted two Port Arthur men and a woman from Groves on murder charges for their roles in fatal beating of 17-year-old girl with a beer mug last month.

James William Hornsby, 20, and Kevin Wayne Coffey, 31, were indicted this week. Melissa Marie Frazier, 23, also was indicted on a murder charge.

The three were arrested last month after Teri Ann Hardy's body was found in a canal by two fishermen a day after her July 13 death.

Police allege that Hornsby beat Hardy in the head with a beer mug and then Frazier strangled her with an electrical cord.

They say Coffey helped destroy evidence and dispose of the body.

## Pampa to welcome World War II vets 29th Army Air Field reunion Aug. 15-17

World War II veterans who served at Pampa Army Air Field (PAAF) will return here Wednesday for their 29th annual reunion, Aug. 15-17.

Special guests for the four-day event include Bob Hite of Conway, Ark., one of the Tokyo Raiders and first veteran to be inducted into the PAAF Hall of Honor and Heroes; Bob Lizard of Amarillo, former radio personality and historian; and Jimmy Bryant, an archivist from the University of Central Arkansas.

Approximately 300 people from across the nation remain on the PAAF mailing list, according to Thelma Bray of the PAAF Reunion Association.

"But the numbers are diminishing as everyone is aware," she said. "At least 14 people will be named as deceased since the last meeting during a memorial service."

Registration for the reunion begins at 2 p.m. at the Best Western Hospitality Room on Perryton Parkway. A visitation period with refreshments is also planned at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 318 N. Cuyler, from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m.

A car pool embarking on a field trip to the Cross at Groom, leaves from the Best Western at 10 a.m. Thursday.

## ACCORD to hold first meet Friday

The Pampa chapter of Active Citizens Concerned Over Resource Development in Agriculture, Inc. (ACCORD), will hold its first meeting Friday since electing officers.

The group chose officers after a public meeting last week regarding the application filed with the state to place a swine facility near Pampa.

Memberships in the organization are available at \$35 per year. The Friday meeting will be 7:30 p.m. at the Lovett Memorial Library. Persons attending the meeting should enter through the north entrance.

A membership drive will be the main topic of the meeting. The organization was formed after it was learned National Pig Development may locate in Gray County. The group is concerned about the possible pollution of the Ogallala Aquifer supply from hog waste lagoons.

NPD has filed for a permit application with the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission to locate a genetic research facility 11 miles east of Pampa. The application is for 3,700 sows with a total number of swine at 50,000 as the sows will keep their piglets with them at the research facility.

## Chisum to speak on redistricting

Redistricting will be the topic which State Representative Warren Chisum will speak about when he addresses the Pampa Chamber of Commerce luncheon at noon Tuesday.

The Legislative Redistricting Board voted 3-2 on July 25 to remove Gray County from State Senator Teel Bivins' 31st District and to place the county under the representation of State Senator District 28 Robert Duncan of Lubbock.

Bivins will represent Howard County whose county seat is Big Spring due to the action taken by the LRB if lawsuits regarding redistricting issues across the state does not stop the implementation of the LRB's decision.

Several organizations and entities are considering court action.

Chisum's district was also rearranged in the redistricting process. He lost Carson, Dallam, Sherman and Hartley counties. While Carson is adjacent to Gray County, the other counties are in the northwest Panhandle.

Added to his district were Parmer, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Bailey and Lamb. He will now be representing 19 counties instead of the previous 16.

The redistricting is a result of the 2000 Census data, and is done every 10 years.

While most states' redistricting is done by the state legislatures, Texas' was done by a five-member committee.

plan to celebrate the agency's 30th reunion, three graduates look back on what their experience there means to them.

Michael, 16, came to Genesis House on Jan. 26. He successfully completed the drug and alcohol treatment program on July 28.

"I feel like it's been a help," Michael said of his stay at Genesis House. "It gave me time to think about how I'd been screwing up my life, drinking and partying and getting in trouble."

Michael came from a home where his father, an alcoholic, left beer around where his son could easily get to it.

"I remember seeing a beer on the table and trying it. I didn't like it," he said.

His older sister and three brothers also drank and partied a lot when they were teenagers, he said.

"They were like me. They (See TEEN-AGERS, Page 2)

## New Texas hunting, fishing licenses go on sale Wednesday

New Texas hunting and fishing licenses for 2001-2002 will be available Wednesday, and Texas Parks and Wildlife is urging customers to buy early and avoid the Labor Day weekend rush.

All current annual hunting and fishing licenses expire on Aug. 31,

and the dove hunting season, which opens the next day will bombard the state's current electronic license sales system with nearly 300,000 license transactions amounting to more than \$6.7 million in sales during the Labor Day holiday weekend.

Texas issues 3.5 million hunting and fishing licenses annually through 28 TPW field offices, more than 100 state parks and at most sporting goods retailers across Texas.

As an added incentive to buy early and avoid possible delays,

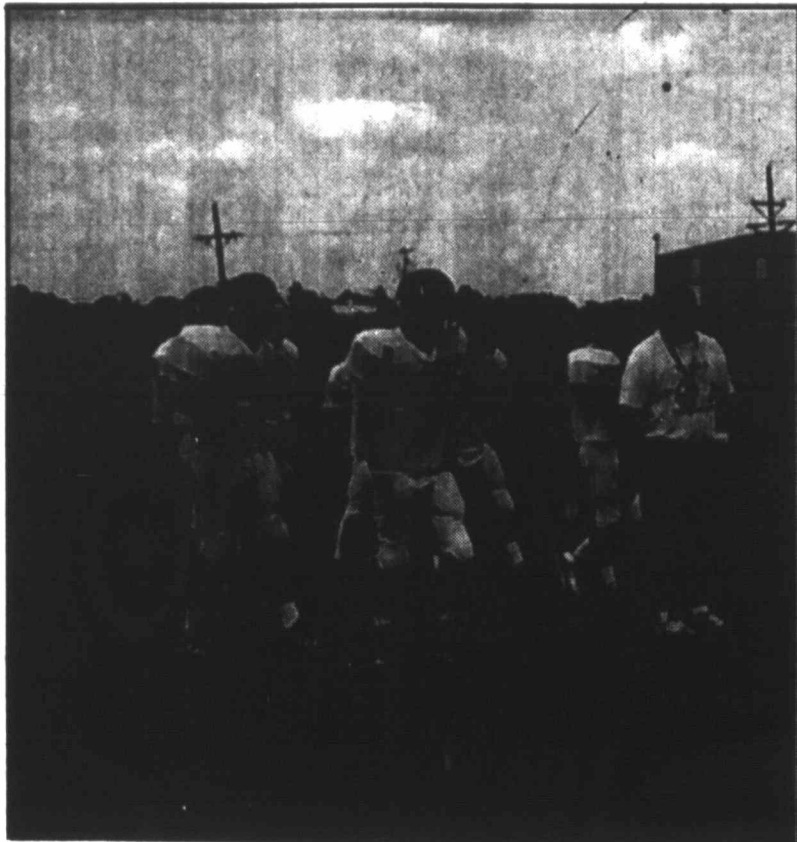
anyone that purchases a hunting and fishing license Aug. 15-25, 2001, will be automatically entered in a special drawing for shotguns, fishing gear and other prizes.

Anyone planning to hunt migratory game birds such as dove and waterfowl this year must be certi-

fied under the Harvest Information Program, HIP certification will automatically be printed on the license at the time of purchase after the purchaser answers a few brief questions.

Annual resident hunting and fishing licenses cost \$19 each, \$32

for a combination hunting and fishing license. For the avid outdoorsman, the Super Combo license includes a resident combination hunting and fishing license, plus all seven state hunting and fishing stamps for \$49.

## Astros take over first in NL Central

HOUSTON (AP) — Moving into first place wasn't much cause for celebration among the Houston Astros.

Houston finally caught and passed Chicago after a long chase, and moved into first place in the NL Central with a 9-5 victory over the Cubs on Monday night.

Yet it caused only a mild ripple of satisfaction.

"It's a great way to start the series," Daryle Ward said. "We put a stamp that we're ready to play. But we're not going to jump up and down like we'd won the World Series. We've just got to get some rest and come back and play our best again tomorrow."

The Astros have won 10 of their last 13 while the Cubs have dropped eight of their last 12 to fall one-half game behind the Astros, who had been in second place since June 30.

In other games, Arizona blanked Pittsburgh 3-0 and St. Louis rallied past Cincinnati 3-2.

The Astros hadn't been alone in first place since April 14, although they shared the lead for one day on May 19.

"I'm rejoicing that we won tonight, but right now we've just got to think about winning the series," Jeff Bagwell said. "We don't have to sweep, but we do need to try to win this series. I don't know if you'd call it floundering, but we were playing .500 ball and that's not going to get it done."

"We finally started putting the pieces together and we've played a lot better baseball."

Craig Biggio hit the first pitch from Jason Bere (8-6) for his major league-leading seventh leadoff homer this season and his second in three games. Biggio has 28 career leadoff homers. Bobby Bonds holds the NL record with 30 leadoff homers. Ward and Vinny Castilla also homered for the Astros, who had 13 hits.

The Cubs think the Astros are wise to keep a low profile on their rise to first place.

"This is the first time this year we've been in this situation and we know we have to come out of it," Sammy Sosa said. "We've got a few more games with the Astros. We are a competitive team and we will do everything, we can to win."

Shane Reynolds (11-10) improved to 7-0 with a 2.03 ERA in eight starts against the Cubs since Aug. 4, 1998. He pitched 7 1-3 innings, allowed six hits, walked three and struck out three.

Sosa hit a two-run homer on the first, his 42nd of the season.

The Astros got four runs in the first starting with Biggio's 18th homer. Biggio also led off Saturday's game against Florida with a home run on the first pitch.

After Jose Vizcaino singled and Jeff Bagwell walked, Lance Berkman doubled off the right-field wall, scoring both runners. Ward's groundout scored Berkman for a 4-2 Astros lead.

Castilla hit his 17th homer in the fourth, and Vizcaino had a two-run triple and Ward a two-run homer in the four-run fifth.

Sosa's RBI single and a grounder by Michael Tucker gave the Cubs two more runs in the eighth, and Matt Stairs added a solo homer in the ninth.

The Astros have beaten the Cubs in six of their eight meetings this season with nine games remaining between the teams.

**Diamondbacks 3, Pirates 0**

At Phoenix, Randy Johnson pitched a five-hitter for his 30th career shutout and Luis Gonzalez and Matt Williams homered as the Diamondbacks won their fourth straight.

Johnson (16-5) became the second 16-game winner in the majors, behind only teammate Curt Schilling's 17. He struck out 10 in his first complete game since April 23 when he blanked Florida 9-0.

The victory stretched Arizona's NL West lead over San Francisco to one game.

Johnson didn't walk anyone, but he hit a batter and committed an error to account for two of the seven baserunners he had to contend with.

Jimmy Anderson (6-13) allowed only five hits in 6 2-3 innings, but gave up three runs on Gonzalez's solo shot in the first inning and Williams' two-run blast in the sixth.

**Cardinals 3, Reds 2**

At St. Louis, Edgar Renteria capped a three-run eighth inning with a two-out, two-run single as St. Louis gained its fifth straight victory.

The Cardinals, winning five in a row for the first time since June 15-19, had just five hits in the first seven innings against Elmer Dessens (8-9) before Fernando Vina and Placido Polanco started the eighth with singles to put runners at the corners.

Mark McGwire hit a sacrifice fly, Albert Pujols walked and reliever Hector Mercado walked Jim Edmonds before Scott Sullivan struck out Craig Paquette.

Renteria then grounded a 2-1 pitch between shortstop and third base to drive in two runs.

Andy Benes (7-6) faced just one batter and got the victory.
