Attorneys wrangle over evidence in Canadian

District Attorney Rick Roach told the judge that the investigation was still in progress and that he was passing along the information to which the defense was entitled as he received it.

Clark told the judge that since the defense had filed a motion to compel discovery, the defense had received a great deal of the information that they had expected.

Texas Ranger Gary Henderson, lead investigator in the case, testified Monday afternoon that much of the physical evidence in the case - clothing, weapons, saw blades - were at the Department of Public Safety laboratory in Lubbock.

Henderson said the DNA testing had been completed as well as the initial round of ballistics tests. Henderson said he had copied a tape recorded interview he made with Britton on June 17 and sent it to the DPS lab in Lubbock for transcription.

The Ranger said that much of the physical evidence would be forwarded to Austin for further testing.

Clark questioned Henderson about two video tapes of the crime scene, photos of the crime scene and autopsy, a diary and bible seized by officers and tapes of the 911 call and officers' radio traffic.

Henderson assured the defense attorneys that there has been no feet dragging in this case. He said there were more (See Britton, Page 2)


The Local Emergency First Response Teams include the police department, sheriff's department, fire department, safety risk management team, department of public safety and emergency medical service.



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

There are too many contradictions





Our country was founded by people whose main interest was in liberty. Liberty is most easily defined as the freedom to make your own decisions about nearly all the matters that affect your life. The measurement of a free society is how many areas a private citizen is left to make his own decisions in as opposed to being coerced into accepting the government's decisions.

None of the Founding Fathers ever intended to create anything but a government with clearly limited powers. To limit the powers, both at the federal level and at the state level, they resorted to constitutions, which are, in effect, charters for government that spell out the government's specific powers. The very idea that a citizen must surrender all of his rights to a government would have been anathema to them. The idea that rights come from government was likewise a contradiction of the philosophy of the American Revolution. It is also illogical. Anything you can do only with permission is not a right.

True Americans believe our rights are a gift of God. We establish governments to protect those rights. We give to government only limited powers to do that job. We reserve the right to withdraw those powers should the government become abusive of our rights.

Try peddling those ideas in Washington, and you'll be branded a radical, militant bad guy. Excuse me, I meant bad person.



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

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Source: NFL to new contract

NEW YORK (AP) — The NFL and its officials have agreed to a new contract, all but ending the lockout that had forced the league to use replacements, a league source told The Associated Press. The deal, which must be ratified by the 119 officials, is for the same amount of money the league had offered on Sept. 4, although some details are differ-

It calls for a 50 percent raise this season and 100 percent by the fourth year of a six-year contract, the source said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

Tom Condon, chief negotiator for the union, had no immediate comment.

Sources on both sides said the agreement was speeded up in the wake of the terrorist attacks, which cast a whole new perspective on sports events in general. Both sides agreed the horror and destruction trivilized the labor dispute.

The deal was worked out with Bill Carollo, the executive director of the NFL Referees Association, and Jeff Bergman, two of the four members of the negotiating committee, the source said.

One official, who also asked anonymity, confirmed that Dan Rooney, owner of the Pittsburgh Steelers and Jeff Pash, the league's lead negotiator, had been talking with Carollo and Bergman. Rooney, one of the NFL's most respected owners, has been the catalyst in ending past labor disputes — the man the league brings in when it wants to make a deal

The officials were to vote on the deal via e-mail, a process expected to be finished by Wednesday morning.

Flags, tributes and tears as baseball resumes

The American flags were everywhere — sewn on players' uniforms, stretched across fields, waved in the stands and emblazoned on bases.

With a tear or two, baseball resumed Monday night and showed its true colors, from coast to coast and across the border to Canada.

Stadiums were awash in red, white and blue for six games in the majors. Montreal infielder Geoff Blum even dyed his hair to match.

The fans returned, too, ready to pick up where they left off six days ago, when cheering came easier. All over, the scenes were decidedly different than ones before the terrorist attacks on America:

"The country is looking over our shoulder," Philadelphia outfielder Doug Glanville said. "You have to go on with your life. Baseball is a fabric of this country. It can be a process of turning things around."

Dodgers lose to Padres 6-4

LOS ANGELES (AP) - His major league debut pushed back by baseball's six-day stoppage, Jason Middlebrook outpitched Kevin Brown as the San Diego Padres beat the Los Angeles Dodgers 6-4 Monday night.

The 26-year-old Middlebrook, called up Sept. 4 from Triple-A Portland, gave up one run and two hits in six innings.

Ray Lankford and D'Angelo Jimenez hit solo homers for the Padres, and Trevor Hoffman pitched the ninth for his 37th save in 40 chances

Middlebrook (1-0) held a 1-0 lead before Los Angeles tied it with four walks in the sixth inning — the last to Paul Lo Duca on a 3-2 pitch with two outs.

But Middlebrook struck out Eric Karros to end the inning, and the Padres took a 3-1 lead in the seventh on Phil Nevin's two-run single off Chan Ho Park.

Park pitched in relief for the first time since April 25, 1997, and did not retire any of his five batters.

Park (13-11) gave up two hits and three walks before leaving with a left Achilles' strain. He was charged with four runs.

PITTSBURGH (AP) - Rey Ordonez's RBI single started a three-run ninth inning, and the New York Mets returned from their trying week off and beat Pittsburgh 4-1 Monday night.

Ordonez's hit - it easily could have been scored an error - and pinch-hitter Mark Johnson's tworun double made a winner of John Franco (6-2), a native New Yorker and the Mets player probably most personally affected by last week's terrorist attacks.

Pirates reliever Mike Fetters (3-2) started the ninth by hitting Tsuyoshi Shinjo with a pitch, then walked Jay Payton two outs later. Ordonez's shot then hit off third baseman Aramis Ramirez's glove and went into left field, with Shinjo just beating the throw the plate.




