sexual assault - criminal solicitation of a child - and fourth charge, Justice of the Peace Curt Kurfman set additional bonds at \$100,000 for each charge.

Conner said the second and third charges constitute second degree felonies, while the first and fourth charges are third degree felonies. The third charge, aggravated sexual assault - criminal solicitation of a child, is upgraded to a second degree felony because it involved an 11-year-old child, he explained.

"I have another victim - a 15-year-old female from Hagerstown, Ind.," Conner said Thursday afternoon. He said the victim and the suspect had been corresponding through e-mail, chat rooms, and through handwritten letters.

In one of the handwritten letters, Conner said, the victim confirmed the suspect's plans for her to come to Pampa and meet him at the end of this month.

The police detective said the wording of the various forms of correspondence was sexually explicit.

"It was obvious solicitation had been made," he said.

"I have contacted the victim's family and the police department," Conner said. He said that the victim used a computer at Hagerstown Junior-Senior High School to correspond with the suspect.

He said Hagerstown is a small community in Indiana with a population of approximately 2,000 persons.

"The Hagerstown police are offering all the assistance in the world," Conner said.

He said he is filing charges on behalf of the Indiana victim and her family because "it started in Texas."

Dallas Hardin, District Attorney's Investigator; Sgt. Gary Henderson of the Texas Rangers; and Special Agent Steve Vandiver of the Amarillo field office of the Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI) are assisting with the investigation.

Police said that the suspect used a home computer and public computers at Lovett Memorial Library for Internet correspondence.

Law enforcement officers continue to follow up on several address books filled with names and addresses that were found in the search of Cooper's truck and residence after his arrest.

The sexual assault charges are the results of an investigation that began this summer when police here learned through the San Antonio Police Department that a man in Pampa was communicating with an under-age girl over the Internet.

The probe intensified after police received a report from a 14-year-old Pampa girl and her parents involving the suspect in the San Antonio investigation, police said.

Det. Conner posed as the girl and continued communicating with the man over the Internet through e-mail and chat rooms for approximately 2 1/2 weeks. The suspect began using sexually-explicit dialogue over the Internet during these communications, police said.

On Sept. 28, a meeting between the suspect and the "girl" was arranged at the Pampa Super Playground with a decoy officer posing as the girl. Undercover police officers staked out the playground. When the suspect arrived at the pre-designated time, officers arrested him.

Report: Economy under pressure prior to Sept. 11

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's unemployment rate remained stuck at 4.9 percent in September as American businesses shed 199,000 jobs, the largest job loss in more than a decade.

The Labor Department's unemployment report released Friday showed the labor market was under intense pressure even before last month's terrorist attacks. Manufacturing companies laid off 93,000 workers last month, the 14th consecutive month of job losses at factories. Over that period, 1.1 million workers have lost their jobs.

Because of the way the government gathers the employment statistics, the September report captured none of the more than 200,000 layoffs in the airline and travel industries that occurred after the Sept. 11 attacks. Those layoffs will show up in the October report.

Top officials in the Bush administration conceded the October figure will show a worsening of the unemployment rate.

"We are going to see a rise in the unemployment rates. That's not in doubt," Treasury Secretary Paul O'Neill told reporters.

"You can call those numbers the bin Laden numbers," Labor Secretary Elaine Chao said of the expected jobless rise in the October report as a result of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks that the administration says was masterminded by Osama bin Laden.

Many economists are predicting that the unemployment rate in October could surge to 5.3 percent or higher because of the widespread layoffs that have already occurred.

"We had a weak situation going into the Sept. 11 shock and now we have that blow hitting us at a time of weakness," said Robert Dederick, who said he believed the country was now in a recession that would last for at least six months.

Dederick said the jobless rate was likely to go as high as 6.5 percent before a recovery begins encouraging companies to start rehiring workers next year.

The September jobless rate of 4.9 percent was the same as the August level, with both months

showing unemployment now at the highest rate since the country entered the yearlong economic slowdown last summer. Unemployment last year had fallen to a three-decade low of 3.9 percent.


The jobless rate remained unchanged in September even though a separate survey of businesses showed the sharp reduction in non-farm payroll jobs. Over time, the two surveys generally reflect the same trends.

Many economists are predicting that the shock of the terrorist attack will push the country into a full-blown recession, the nation's first downturn since the 1990-91 slump, which occurred in part because of the economic disruptions from skyrocketing oil prices after Iraq invaded Kuwait.

President Bush, whose father was in the White House during the last downturn, is working with Congress to fashion an economic stimulus program of as much as \$75 billion in an effort to make sure that any downturn will be mild and brief.

Democrats in Congress have complained that the administration wants to tilt the stimulus package too much in favor of tax cuts for the wealthy. They are seeking bigger increases in benefits for low-income workers and those who have been laid off as a result of the terrorist attacks.

For September, the drop of 199,000 payroll jobs was the largest one-month decline since payroll jobs fell by 259,000 in February 1991, when the country was mired in the last recession.

"See how they run! See how they run!" They all run after ... duties, assignments, appointments, demands, deadlines. Run, run, run! Plans, programs, and people, run, run, run!

How about taking a moment or two to sit down, let your motor idle, take another sip of coffee? Think about your pace. Even if your activities are for the church, have you become part of a rat race? Do you feel trapped?

James Sullivan knows exactly how you feel. Back in the 1960s, he blew Oklahoma City wide open developing the world's largest Young Life Club. But that's not all he blew apart. In doing it, he sacrificed his family and his health, for he became not only a very hard man to keep up with, but a very hard man to live with.

His wife and family were tired. Running his life at full-bore was in reality an escape technique. He wrote the book "The Frog Who Never Became a Prince," and I lift a couple of lines from it: "I was a man who existed in a shell. Guilt, resentment and hatred welled up within me. The resulting hard feeling I developed became almost insurmountable."

Wasn't James Sullivan working for Jesus Christ and the kingdom of God? you ask. Yes, but he substituted activity for living.

One Thanksgiving Day his wife, Carolyn, asked a question as he was once more racing out the door to speak at some camp: "Do you know, or do you even care, that from the middle of September until today, you have not been home one night?" Not very long after that, she broke emotionally, and he contemplated suicide.

Does this story sound familiar? There are many churches in our land who proudly boast, "Something every night of the week for everybody!" What a shame!

God's Word speaks often and loudly about cultivating a calm, peaceful inner spirit. Instead, we offer Him a life full of activity, noise and more and more running. Is it possible that the reason we run so much is to deaden the pain of an empty life?

To change this activity, I suggest we start by admitting we are too busy; then we learn the art of saying the small two-letter word "no," and mean it. Admittedly it may take some practice, but it can be done, politely but firmly. If you like being quite active, examine it closely. Workaholics get too much outside help ("Great job!" "I really appreciate your doing that!"). Remember, rusting out has more alternatives than just burning out. Moderation is certainly an option.

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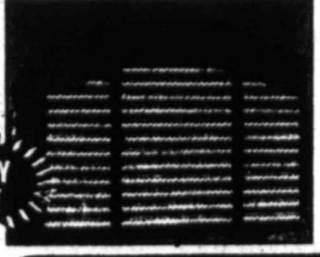

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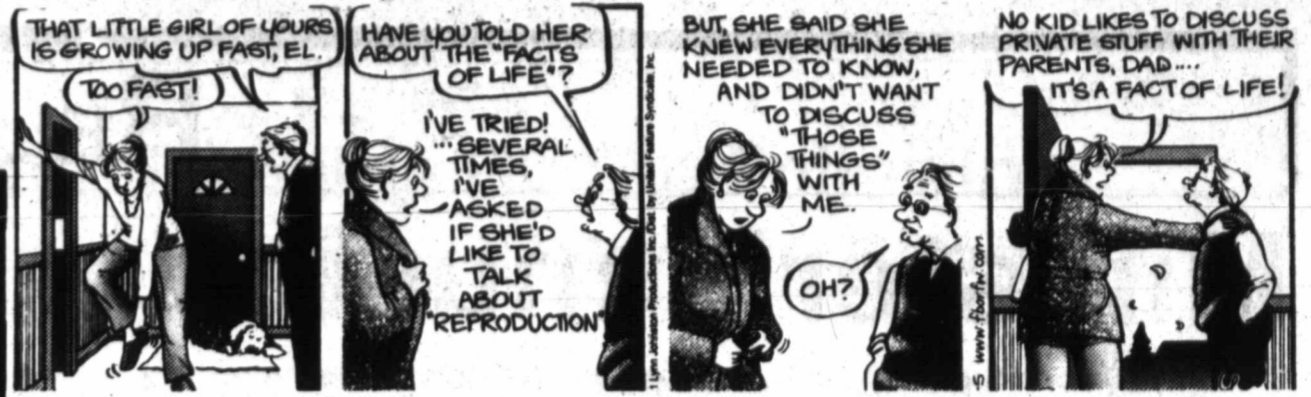

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — The defense thinks it's ready and so does the offense. Now all the Baylor Bears have to do is get No. 24 Texas A&M to agree.

Baylor (2-1) travels to Kyle Field on Saturday to continue a rivalry with the Aggies that dates to World War II. Although the Aggies (4-0) usually win out, the Bears (2-1) expect to present a good fight.

"You go back and watch the film and they're right there, they're so close," Baylor defensive coordinator Brick Haley said. "But so close doesn't get you real far in this business. We had guys in position to make plays."

Baylor's defense gave up 509 yards in a 41-0 loss to Iowa State last week, but Haley has great hope the team can contain the Aggies.

"A couple of times we had guys who slipped down, and then we had a guy take his eye off the quarterback here or there," Haley said. "Just a few technique things. But I think our kids will respond. They'll come back and do the things that we ask them to do and play hard."

Bear quarterback Greg Cicero believes the Bears' spread-formation, no-huddle offense can work. It didn't against Iowa State, mustering only 13 rushing yards.

"It does work," Cicero said. "We just haven't scored points."

Bonds hits 70th homer, ties McGwire's record

HOUSTON (AP) — With one last swing, Barry Bonds put an end to his Houston walkathon and put himself in the record book.

Bonds finally saw a meaty pitch and sent home run No. 70 sailing into the right-field upper deck Thursday night, tying the record Mark McGwire thought might last a lifetime when he did it a mere three years ago.

"It was electrifying," Bonds said. Frustrated after drawing eight walks and being hit by a pitch in three days at Enron Field, Bonds broke into a big smile and slow trot after leading off the ninth inning with a 454-foot shot against rookie Wilfredo Rodriguez.

"I was happy I made contact. It's hard to just take pitches all the time," he said. "You really don't have an opportunity to swing."

Bonds, son of an All-Star and godson of a home run king, has three games left to make history all his own.

The San Francisco Giants, who beat the Astros 10-2 to stay in the NL West chase, start a series against Los Angeles at home on

Friday night. Bonds' homer came on a day full of major achievements in the majors.

Earlier, Rickey Henderson scored his 2,246th career run and broke Ty Cobb's record. Later, Seattle won its 114th game and tied the Yankees' AL single-season mark.

When McGwire finished with 70 home runs in 1998, it looked like that might become baseball's new magic number.

"I think it will stand for a while," McGwire said at the time. "I know how grueling it is to do what I've done this year. Will it be broken someday? It could be. Will I be alive? Possibly."

"But if I'm not playing," he said, "I'll definitely be there."

Bonds went 19 plate appearances, including 10 walks, and twice was hit by pitches since hitting No. 69 on Saturday.

He immediately raised both arms in the air — in celebration, and maybe a bit out of relief — when he connected.

The record crowd of 43,734 at

Enron Field, which booed when Astros pitchers walked him, responded with a standing ovation.

"The way the fans embraced it was excellent," Giants manager Dusty Baker said. "It showed a lot of class."

Bonds' teammates poured out to greet him at home plate along with young Nikolai Bonds, whose 37-year-old father hugged him tight at the plate. Bonds then pointed to his wife and two daughters behind the third-base dugout as he returned to the bench, smiling and waving his cap.

"Everybody was telling me just be patient, be patient. I'm glad it's over. I'm glad my family was here. My wife gets to sleep now," Bonds said.

With fans still cheering, Bonds came out for two curtain calls. He took his position in left field to start the bottom of the ninth, was mobbed by teammates who were in the Giants' bullpen, then was replaced and walked off, waving to fans.

It looked like Bonds would

never get a chance against the Astros, who lost their sixth in a row and fell out of the NL Central lead. He drew three walks in the game, all on four pitches, boosting his record total to 175.

"I got frustrated when it was 8-1 and they intentionally walked me because it was not a really crucial situation. That's when I got really frustrated," Bonds said.

Bonds hit his 564th career home run, moving him past Reggie

Jackson — a distant relative — for seventh place on the career list.

Among those cheering for Bonds was his godfather, Hall of Famer Willie Mays, who ranks third on the career list with 660 homers. Mays hit his 500th homer at the Houston Astrodome in 1965.

Bonds' father, former major leaguer Bobby, was with Mays in the Giants' clubhouse and watched the historic homer on TV. They left the park a few minutes later.

9th graders rout Randall

PAMPA — Pampa's undefeated freshmen team rolled to a 27-6 win over Randall Thursday night at Harvester Stadium.

Mark Williams scored twice for the Threshers on runs of 1 and 68 yards, while Seth Foster added a 39-yard scoring run. Foster also kicked three extra points.

The defense scored a touchdown when Q.B. Cobb picked up a fumble and ran 55 yards to the end zone.

Shea Brown had an interception, his fourth of the season.

On the offensive line, Aaron Hunt opened up some big holes for the Pampa running backs.

Pampa plays at Dumas at 5 p.m. next Thursday. Dumas is the only team to beat this current group of Pampa 9th graders when they were playing middle school football. The 7th grade team went unbeaten and lost only to Dumas as 8th graders.

Texas Tech looks for a fresh start

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Texas Tech wants a fresh start. Kansas just wants to play again.

The Red Raiders (2-1, 0-1 Big 12) are ready to put a disappointing performance at No. 5 Texas — a 42-7 loss in their Big 12 opener — behind them.

"We played flat and soft," said Tech coach Mike Leach. "We as a team have got to stay on track. The biggest thing is we've got to stay focused."

Kansas (1-2, 0-1) comes into Saturday's game well-rested. The Wildcats played just once in a 27-day stretch, with weeks off before and after their 27-16 loss to Colorado in the Big 12 opener on Sept. 22.

Last week's open date was planned. The earlier weekend off came after the terrorist attacks that led to the postponement of every Division I-A game on Sept. 15.

For Texas Tech, nothing on either side of the ball worked well against Texas. Quarterback Kliff Kingsbury had good numbers (40 of 57 passes for 260 yards) but didn't throw a touchdown. The Red Raiders had only 37 yards rushing while allowing Texas to gain 433 total yards.

Leach called that performance a "meltdown" at most every position. He hopes that the Kansas game will be a fresh start and believes it is crucial to gauging the team's resiliency.

Texas Tech has never lost to Kansas, winning 45-39 last year to extend its series lead to 7-0 — including all four games since the Big 12 formed.

The Red Raiders join Oklahoma (10-0 vs. Baylor), Texas (3-0 vs. Iowa State) and Texas A&M (5-0 vs. Iowa State and 6-0 vs. Missouri) as the Big 12 teams to have unbeaten records against a fellow league team.

Kansas is expected to be without defensive tackle Ervin Holloman, one of the Jayhawks' top players with 16 tackles in three games. He is expected to miss the game because of his mother's death.

Holloman's absence could leave the defense hurting as it defends against Tech's passing attack. Kingsbury leads the Big 12 Conference by completing 105-of-153 passes (69 percent) for 303 yards per game.

"The key is to have patience defensively because they are going to throw the ball sixty times," said Jayhawks coach Terry Allen.

Tech's Ricky Williams is the nation's leading receiving running back with 9.8 catches per game. He has also rushed for 190 yards, more than the Jayhawks' two top rushers combined.

"The thing they have done this year more than other years is they have really gotten him involved," Allen said.

Mariners tie AL record

SEATTLE (AP) — The Seattle Mariners tied the American League record of 114 wins set by the 1998 New York Yankees, routing the Texas Rangers 16-1 Thursday night as Tom Lampkin hit a pair of two-run doubles.

Ichiro Suzuki, who leads the AL with a .351 average, went 1-for-4 to raise his hits total to 240, matching Wade Boggs (1985) for the most hits in the AL since Heinie Manush had 241 for the 1928 St. Louis Browns.

The AL West champs (114-45),

who matched their season high for runs, have three regular-season games left and can break the major league record for wins set by the 1906 Chicago Cubs (116-36).

Former-Mariner Alex Rodriguez hit his 52nd homer, connecting in the third inning off Brett Tomko (3-1). Rodriguez became the fourth player with 50 homers and 200 hits in the same season, joining Babe Ruth (1921), Hack Wilson (1930) and Jimmie Foxx (1932).

Texas-OU should be a quite a game

It's been a year since the game Texas longs to forget, and not a minute has gone by without the Longhorns' players, coaches and fans being reminded of what happened: Oklahoma 63, Texas 14.

"We were just in shock," Texas quarterback Chris Simms said. "We didn't know what to think, what to say, didn't even know what happened."

The Sooners' 49-point victory in the 2000 Red River Shootout, one of college football's grandest rivalries, launched OU on its way to a perfect season and first national title since 1985.

The Longhorns, meanwhile, regrouped to win their next six before losing to Oregon in the Holiday Bowl and finishing 9-3.

On Saturday, it's the No. 5 Longhorns (4-0) vs. the No. 3 Sooners (4-0) for the 96th time. On this go-round, the stakes are huge for both teams. It's the first matchup since 1984 with both ranked in the top 5, and first since '85 with both undefeated.

The winner moves a giant step closer to the Big 12 title game on Dec. 1, and stays in the national championship chase.

The game figures to be a doozy. Both defenses are solid, but can be scored on. Kansas State put up 37 points against Oklahoma last week, but lost 38-37.

Houston scored 26 points against Texas on Sept. 22, but lost 53-26.

Texas beat North Carolina 44-14 on Sept. 8; Oklahoma beat the Tar Heels 41-27 on Aug. 25.

The game figures to ride on the arms — and perhaps legs — of the quarterbacks, Chris Simms for the 'Horns, Nate Hybl for the Sooners. This year, Simms is the Heisman

Trophy candidate after winning the job from Major Applewhite. Last year, OU's Josh Heupel began his Heisman run in this game, and finished second behind Florida State's Chris Weinke.

Simms is coming off the most consistent game of his career — 21 of 26 for 224 yards, one touchdown and an interception in a 42-7 victory over Texas Tech. He also ran for two TDs.

Wide receiver Roy Williams caught 10 passes for 98 yards and a touchdown.

Hybl was hammered by K-State last week, but fought off the bumps and bruises to throw for 283 yards, including two long TDs to Antwone Savage.

The 'Horns are averaging 45 points per game, the Sooners 40.

Game time is 3:30 p.m. EDT on ABC. Sit back and enjoy what promises to be a true shootout.

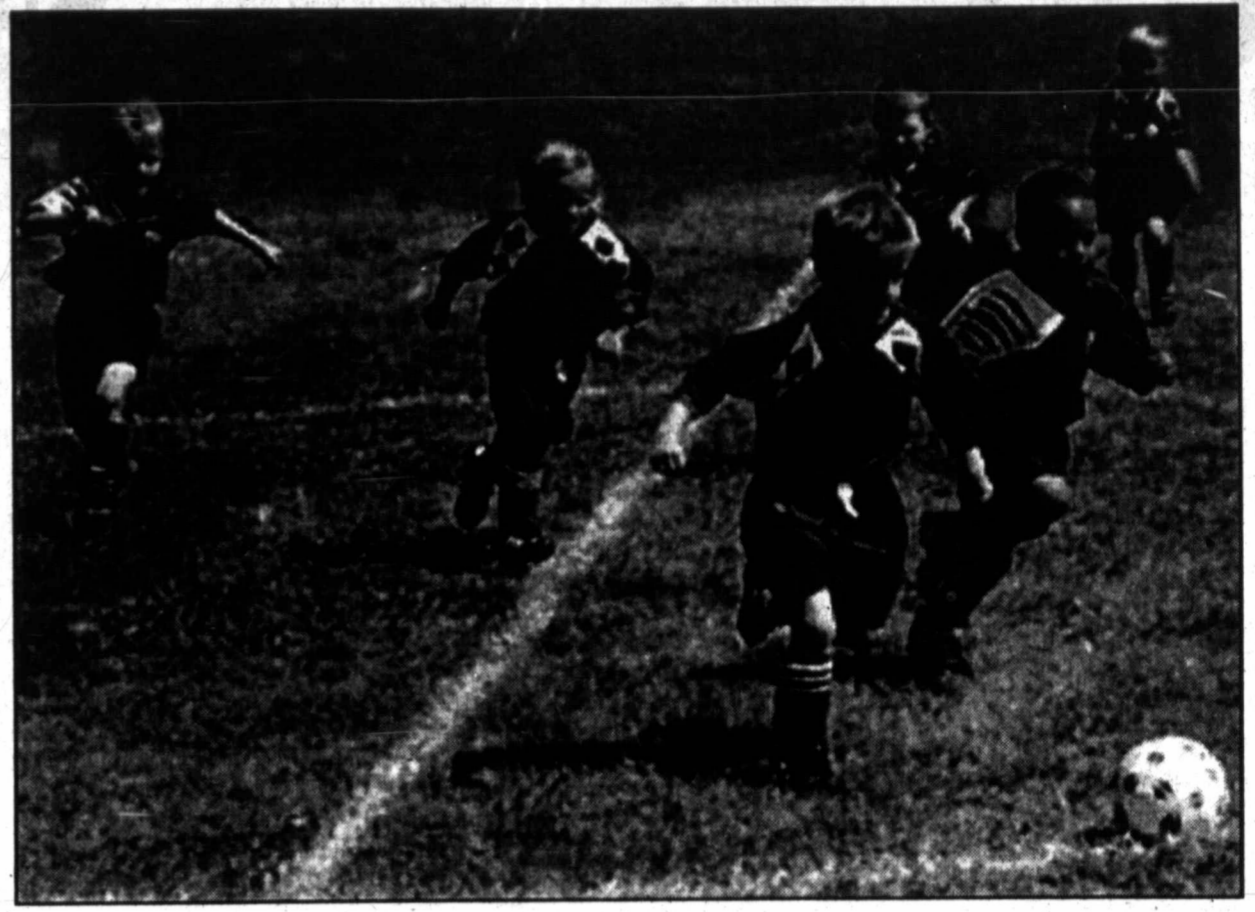

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'American Indian Portraits' exhibit coming to PPHM

CANYON — The Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum in Canyon will present "American Indian Portraits: Elbridge Ayer Burbank in the West (1897-1910)" Oct. 13- Jan. 13. This nationally touring exhibition, organized by the Butler Institute of American Art in Youngstown, Ohio, is comprised of more than 60 portraits of American Indians selected from the more than 1,000 Burbank painted between 1897 and 1910. This will be the only showing west of the Mississippi.

On March 12, 1897, the Chicago painter Elbridge Ayer Burbank (1858-1949) arrived at Fort Sill, Oklahoma Territory, to paint a portrait of the famous Apache, Geronimo. Immediately taken with his subject, as well as with the West, Burbank never really returned to Chicago.

By 1910, Burbank had completed nearly 1,000 oil portraits of American Indians in his aim to paint "every single Indian tribe in America." Burbank's painting endeavor is one of the most comprehensive of its kind, second only to that of George Catlin, who worked nearly 70 years earlier.

The exhibition will also include a rich survey of American Indians from all areas of the West — from Montana to New Mexico and from Missouri to California.

Burbank's portraits have appeal due to their variety, visual integrity and psychological sensitivity. The portraits not only give ample evidence of Burbank's capabilities as a draughtsman and colorist, but they also give evidence of the humanity of their subjects. The exhibition will present

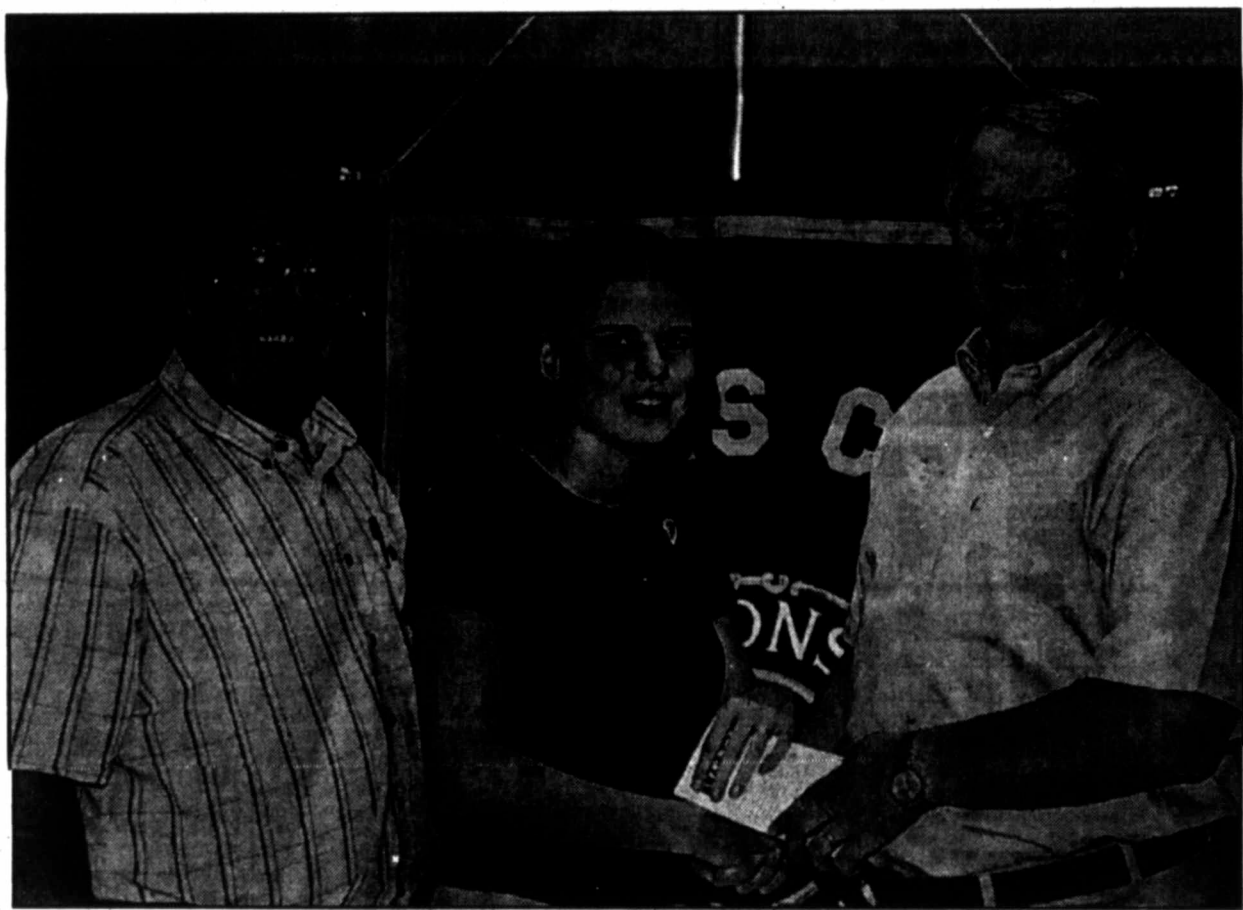

the portraits in the context of the reservation environment in which they were produced, as well as descriptions of their culture and how the subjects were presenting themselves.

Southwestern Bell advising customers to beware of disaster relief scams

EL PASO — SBC Southwestern Bell recently issued information and tips to consumers for protecting themselves against telemarketing donation scams that are being reported across the country in the wake of the national tragedy.

In some cases, con artists are taking advantage of consumers' generosity by claiming to be from a charitable organization requesting a donation for the relief efforts in New York City and Washington, D.C.

As part of ongoing efforts to educate and protect customers from these donation scams, SBC is offering these tips:

—Ask questions. If a caller claims to be from a charity, ask

questions to ensure you understand whom the caller represents and how your money will be allocated. Be sure to ask for a name, address and phone number to check the validity of the charity.

—Request identification. If a solicitor comes to your door claiming to be with a disaster relief fund, ask to see company or charity identification.

—Send a check. Always pay your donation by check. Make sure to make the check payable to the full official name of the charity, not to the individual solicitor collecting the donations.

—Control your calls. Products offered by SBC, such as Caller ID and Privacy Manager, can help you identify

where these calls are coming from, as well as keep solicitors who block their caller information from being able to get through to your line.


—Trust your instincts. If a solicitor seems suspicious for any reason or is pressuring you for an immediate decision, take time to verify the charity before you make a contribution.


