

# Internet sex case extends to Indiana town


Pampa Police Department's investigation of alleged sexual abuse of children through the Internet has now extended into a small town in Indiana.

A fourth felony charge related to the investigation was filed against Jerry Lee Cooper, 44; 320 S. Houston, Det. David Conner said. The warrant was served Thursday, he said. Cooper, an oil field worker, has been charged with sexual assault - criminal solicitation of a child, a third degree felony.

Cooper remains in Gray County Jail today in lieu of a total of \$800,000 in bonds. Justice of the Peace Joe Martinez set bond of \$100,000 and \$500,000 respectively on the first two charges - sexual assault - criminal solicitation of a child and sexual assault of a mentally impaired person.

#### Some jails turning to teen-age turnkeys

HOUSTON (AP) — Staffing shortages at some Texas jails are forcing officials to consider hiring turnkeys not yet old enough to drink.

Several 18-year-olds are in the middle of background checks, psychological evaluation fitness examinations and drug tests necessary to get jobs at the Harris County Jail overseeing inmates charged with anything from drunk driving to capital murder. Those hired will be deemed ready for the task.

"They will be able to handle the job both physically and mentally," Harris County Sheriff's spokesman Lt. Robert Van Pelt said.


Like many people across the country and the Panhandle, she knew the world would be changed forever. She just didn't realize the impact upon her personally.

### WEDDING

Judy and her fiance, John Minier, had planned to be married in November. John had proposed to her on Nov. 5, 2000, and she had planned the wedding around that date.

A member of the Texas Army National Guard, John was notified a few weeks ago that he could be called up for active duty. They just didn't know when.

About 11 p.m. Monday night, John and Judy were watching a movie, "Enemy at the Gate", when the phone rang. She said John answered the phone and his expression became very somber.

"I knew what the call was," she said, "and I just started crying." Sitting on the couch as he talked on the phone,

John asked when and where, she said. He was told to report in Amarillo by 7 a.m. the next morning. He is a member of Pampa unit's Company B which is to be a part of the Homeland Defense following the Sept. 11 attacks.

John explained to the caller he had to personally notify his mother before he reported, but he would be there soon after.

Judy said she and John were both in shock. "We didn't sleep hardly any that night," she said. A former army recruiter in Pampa and a member of the Pampa National Guard for 22 years, this is the most serious national emergency he has encountered during that time frame.

Ironically, the movie which the couple was watching was set during World War II and was about Germany and Russia fighting snipers, she said.

The next morning the couple took Judy's two older children — Jessica, 13, and Jordon, 6 — to school. Jared is 3 years of age.

Then, they went to notify John's mother, Virginia Minier, before he left. He also told his children Darren, 12, and Brenna, 7, who live in Canyon.

"When we arrived at the Amarillo location Tuesday morning, the soldiers were taken into one gymnasium-sized room and the family members were routed to another room for family resource information," she said. Support groups are available for National Guard members' families.

The soldiers began the processing which must be completed before they will be shipped out to their final destinations.

"Wills had to be updated, financial arrangements made-JAGs were everywhere," she said. "Soldiers even had to decide how to their families would be notified in the event of death and life insurance matters updated. It was awful."

#### Father listens to music during shooting Family of jailed American aid

"Your expectation when you get married is to spend your life together," she said. "It's hard getng married in anticipation of them leaving."

A registered nurse for eight years, Judy works in obstetrics at Baptist/St. Anthony's Hospital. She said her mentor was Elizabeth Ivona Houdashell, whom she calls Nurse Houdashell, and she wanted to attend funeral services for Nurse Houdashell Wednesday morning.

Judy wore a black top and black and red skirt to the funeral, and also as her wedding dress.

That evening they planned a wedding reception for the many friends and family members who they had planned to invite to the wedding in November. However, John didn't arrive until 10 p.m. "There were still a few there, waiting for him," she said.

Justice of the Peace Jim Tipton married the couple in Amarillo. Judy said the judge's staff assisted them in getting their marriage license and getting the three-day waiting time waived.

"We don't know what is going to happen," she said. "There are so many uncertainties. John's going to be gone with no certainty of when he's coming back.

She said the National Guard soldiers have said they will be gone a minimum of six months. "President Bush has told the American people to be prepared for a "sustained military action, " she said, "so that sounds like it's going to be quite awhile.

Judy said many military families in Pampa and across the area are being affected by the call-up of the National Guard and the deployment of active duty military.

"I don't think people realize just how many local people are involved and directly affected by Sept. ," she said.

"Terrorists took a whole lot of lives on Sept. 11. They are continuing to take away fathers and mothers from their children as they protect our country in the United States and abroad," she said. "Our homeland is threatened.

"I don't know what I'm going to do without him," she said. "John is one of the most honest, moral and ethical people I've ever met. He is a good person to be defending us."

Loss' 14-year-old son, Craig, escaped Wednesday night as his father wounded him twice in the back. He fled into the street and flagged down a motorist.

Police investigators later found a 9mm semiautomatic handgun in the Highland Park house, along with seven shell casings. The eldest son said the shooting began after Loss,

who had recently returned to Dallas to establish a relationship with his two sons, came to ex-wife Bonnie Loss-Murphy's home in the affluent North Dallas suburb to pick the boys up for dinner.

Instead, Craig Loss told Detective Marshall Bearor, his father told his ex-wife to "come here." Then, he grabbed her around the neck and shot her in the head with a silver-colored pistol, the teen said.

The Highland Park High School freshman attempted to shield his 7-year-old brother Evan from bullets, but became too frightened and ran said court officials in Kabul were willing to allow out the front door, police said. The younger son was also fatally shot in the head.

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sexual assault - criminal solicitation of a child and fourth charge, Justice of the Peace Curt Kurfman set additional bonds at \$100,000 for each charge.

Conner said the second and third charges constiute second degree felonies, while the first and ourth charges are third degree felonies. The third harge, aggravated sexual assault - criminal soliciation of a child, is upgraded to a second degree elony because it involved an 11-year-old child, he explained.

The probe intensified after police received a report from a 14-year-old Pampa girl and her parents involving the suspect in the San Antonio investigation, police said.

Det. Conner posed as the girl and continued communicating with the man over the Internet through e-mail and chat rooms for approximately 2 1/2 weeks. The suspect began using sexually-explicit dialogue over the Internet during these communications, police said.



DR. JAMES DOBSON is a psychologist, author and president of Focus on the Family, a nonprofit organization dedicated to the preservation of the home.

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What are the special needs of a compliant child - one who goes along to get along? Does he have any special needs?

That's a great question, and the answer is yes. When one child is a stick of dynamite and the other is an all-star sweetheart, the cooperative, gentle individual can easily be taken for granted. If there's an unpleasant job to be done, he may be expected to do it because Mom and Dad just don't have the energy to fight with the tiger. When it is necessary for one child to sacrifice or do without, there's a tendency to pick the one who won't complain as loudly. Under these circumstances, the compliant boy or girl comes out on the short end of the stick.

The consequences of such inequity should be obvious. The responsible child often becomes angry over time. He has a sense of powerlessness and resentment that simmers below the surface. He's like the older brother in the parable of the prodigal son told by Jesus. He. didn't rebel against what his father. He stayed behind and ran the farm while his irresponsible brother squandered his money on fun and games. Who could blame him for resenting his little bro? His response is typical of the compliant, hard-working sibling.

I strongly recommend that parents seek to balance the scales in dealing with the compliant child. Make sure he gets his fair share or parental attention. Help him find ways to cope with his overbearing sibling. And, within reason, give him the right to make his own decisions.


There's nothing simple about raising kids, is there? Even the easiest of them need our very best effort.

You have recemmended for many years that parents take their preteens away from home for what you called a "Preparing for Adolescence" weekend, during which they talk about the physical and emotional changes about to occur. I'm interested in your comment that kids want this information before they become teenagers, but they won't want to talk about it after puberty. Do their attitudes really change that much overnight?

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As a matter of fact, they do. A study of 1,023 children between 10 and 13 showed that the number who felt uncomfortable talking to their parents about sexuality nearly doubled after puberty occurred. Prior to that, they were very open to instruction and guidance at home.

Ninety-three percent of those aged 10-12 felt loved by their parents "all the time," says Dr. Alvin Poussaint, a psychiatrist at Harvard University. He said: "I think parents may be surprised that children of this age are saying, 'We want to be close to you. We need you and we're still afraid. We need the sense of safety and security that you supply.""

The study showed, however, that attitudes changed dramatically when the children reached the eighth grade. Those who had been open to advice the year before were suddenly unwilling to talk to their parents. The window of accessibility had closed.

The moral to the story? Invest a little time in the months before puberty to get your children ready for the stresses of adolescence. The effort will pay big dividends.


What advice would you give parents who recognize a tendency within themselves to abuse their kids? Maybe their afraid they'll get carried away when spanking a disobedient child. Do you think they should avoid corporal punishment as a form of discipline?

> That's exactly what I think. Anyone who has ever abused a child - or has ever felt himself losing control during a spanking should not expose the child to that tragedy. Anyone who has a violent temper that at times becomes

unmanageable should not use that approach. Anyone who secretly "enjoys" the administration of corporal punishment should not be the one to implement it. And, grandparents probably should not spank their grand kids unless the parents have given them permission to do so.

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

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

In Panhandle equivalents that means that Texas. during His life Jesus barely made it to



'See how they run! See how they run!" They all run after ... duties, assignments, appointments, demands, deadlines. Run, run, run! Plans, programs, and people, run, run, run!

How about taking a moment or two to sit down, let your motor idle, take another sip of coffee? Think about your pace. Even if your activities are for the church, have you become part of a rat race? Do you feel trapped?

James Sullivan knows exactly how you feel. Back in the 1960s, he blew Oklahoma City wide open developing the world's largest Young Life Club. But that's not all he blew apart. In doing it, he sacrificed his family and his health, for he became not only a very hard man to keep up with, but a very hard man to live with.

His wife and family were tired. Running his life at full-bore was in reality an escape technique. He wrote the book "The Frog Who Never Became a Prince," and I lift a couple of lines from it: "I was a man who existed in a shell. Guilt, resentment and hatred welled up within me. The resulting hard feeling I developed became almost insurmountable."


Wasn't James Sullivan working for Jesus Christ and the kingdom of God? you ask. Yes, but he substituted activity for living.

One Thanksgiving Day his wife, Carolyn, asked a question as he was once more racing out the door to speak at some camp: "Do you know, or do you even care, that from the middle of September until today, you have not been home one night?" Not very long after that, she broke emotionally, and he contemplated suicide. Does this story sound familiar? There are many churches in our

land who proudly boast, "Something every night of the week for everybody!" What a shame!

God's Word speaks often and loudly about cultivating a calm, peaceful inner spirit. Instead, we offer Him a life full of activity, noise and more and more running. Is it possible that the reason we run so much is to deaden the pain of an empty life?

To change this activity, I suggest we start by admitting we are too busy; then we learn the art of saying the small two-letter word "no," and mean it. Admittedly it may take some practice, but it can be done, politely but firmly. If you like being quite active, examine it closely. Workaholics get too much outside help ("Great job!" "I really appreciate your doing that!"). Remember, rusting out has more alternatives than just burning out. Moderation is certainly an option.

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



CANYON - The Panhandle Plains Historical Museum in Canyon will present "American Indian Portraits: Elbridge Ayer Burbank in the West (1897-1910)" Oct. 13- Jan. 13. This nationally touring exhibition, organized by the Butler Institute of American Art in Youngstown, Ohio, is comprised of more than 60 portraits of American Indians selected from the more than 1,000 Burbank painted between 1897 and 1910. This will be the only west of the showing Mississippi.

On March 12, 1897, the Chicage painter Elbridge Ayer Burbank (1858-1949) arrived at Fort Sill, Oklahoma Territory, to paint a portrait of the famous Apache, Geronimo. Immediately taken with his subject, as well as with the West, Burbank never really returned to Chicago.

By 1910, Burbank had completed nearly 1,000 oil portraits of American Indians in his aim to paint "every single Indian tribe in America." Burbank's painting endeavor is one of the most comprehensive of its kind, second only to that of George Catlin, who worked nearly 70 years earlier.

The exhibition will also include a rich survey of American Indians from all areas of the West — from Montana to New Mexico and from Missouri to California.

Burbank's portraits have appeal due to their variety, visual integrity and psychological sensitivity. The portraits not only give ample evidence of Burbank's capabilities as a draughtsman and colorist, but humanity of their subjects.
