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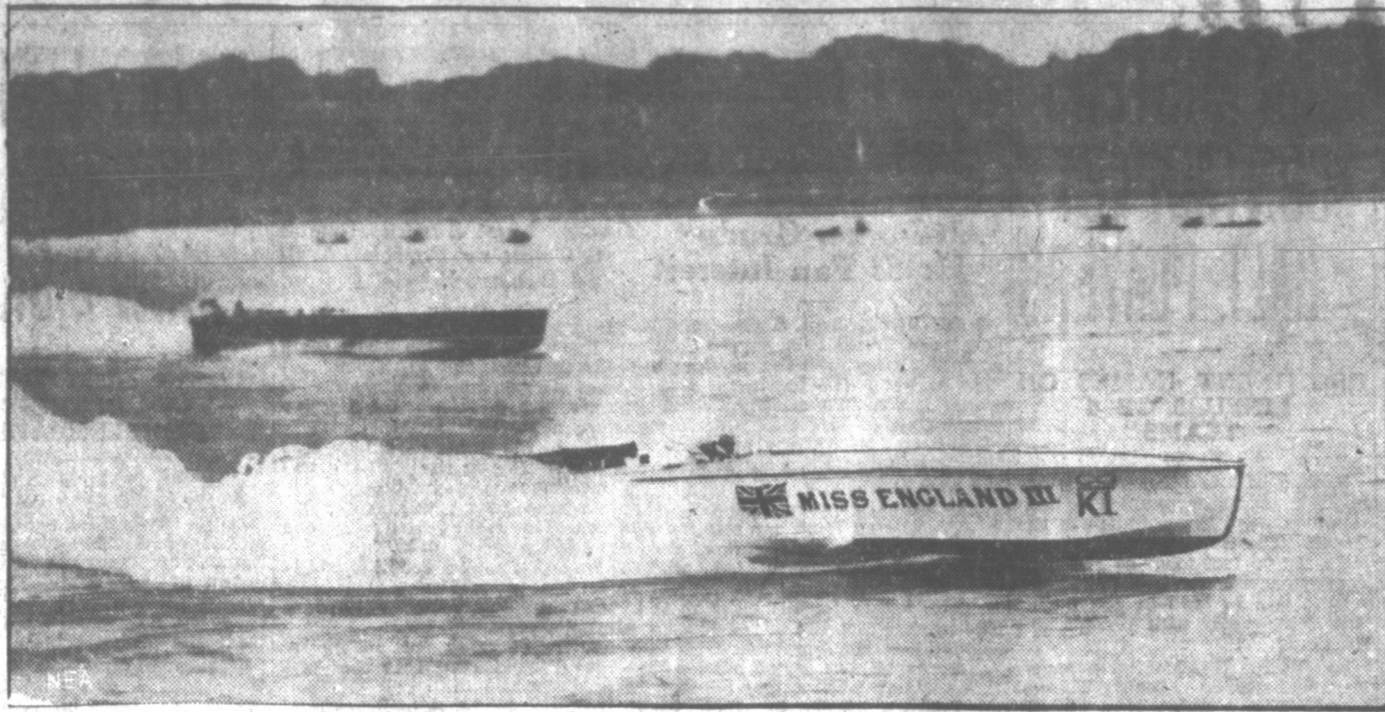
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As Miss America Won First Heat

Miss America wins! After trailing Kay Don's Miss England for 28 miles in the first heat of their 35-mile speed race at Detroit, Gar Wood passed the Briton and finished two miles in front. This picture was taken as Wood flashed past the Miss England at 80 miles an hour. Wood's time was 30 minutes, 48 seconds. Don finished in 33 minutes, 55 seconds.



Wood and Don Plan Further Tests of Ships

DETROIT, Sept. 6 (AP)—Gar Wood and Kaye Don, victor and loser respectively in the Harmsworth trophy race that ended yesterday when the British challenging craft, Miss England III, broke down and withdrew, today planned further tests of their hydroplanes.

Wood, whose Miss America X coasted to a slow victory in both heats of the race because of mechanical troubles to Don's craft, were making arrangements for an assault on the world's one-mile championship, now held by Miss England III at 119.81 miles an hour. The time and place for the trial have not been determined.

Don, disappointed at the second failure of his craft, but smiling nevertheless, will leave tomorrow or Thursday for Toronto. There, if repairs can be effected to his white-hulled hydroplane, he will take it out again for a speed demonstration.

The Harmsworth trophy competition may be run under different rules next year.

J. Lee Barrett, secretary-treasurer of the Yachtsmen's association of America, announced late yesterday that the Royal Motor Yacht club of England had suggested several changes, principally intended to soften the rules which now disqualify for succeeding heats any boat which fails to finish a race. Neither suggested revision would have changed the result of this year's races.

Comrades Hold Hundred Aces in Air Speed Derby

CLEVELAND, Sept. 6 (AP)—The roaring mounts of two Missouri flying comrades have turned in a grand slam in aviation's high speed classics.

Major James H. Doolittle, riding his red-nosed monoplane, completed the supremacy at high speeds demonstrated during the national air races by his wide margin victory in the 100-mile free-for-all race yesterday. His flying comrade, James Haislip, a week earlier had flashed across the continent to a new trans-continental speed mark of ten hours and nineteen minutes. Haislip's wife, May, a few hours before he pushed the unofficial women's land-plane speed record to 255.113 miles per hour, and Doolittle himself Saturday had boosted the men's land-plane speed record to 296.287 miles an hour.

Mrs. Haislip's performance, which replaces the 210-mile-an-hour record of Miss Ruth Nichols of Rye, N. Y., came on the same day Miss Nichols lost to Marye Hiltz of France her women's altitude record. The Aero club of France yesterday recognized Mme. Hiltz' mark of approximately 31,900 feet.

FORT WORTH, Sept. 6 (AP)—A 24-year-old man was held here today as one of two who robbed the First National bank at Bridgeport of \$3,500 August 29. He was identified last night by Frank Turner, president of the bank; Roger Ray, assistant cashier; and T. J. McAfee, a customer present at the time of the robbery.

New-Fashioned Meeting on Liner

ROTTERDAM, Sept. 6 (AP)—The "mutiny" aboard the Holland-American liner Rotterdam, near the end of the ship's voyage from New York, ended today in the hands of the police.

When the liner entered this port this morning under escort of the mine-layer Meerlandt, four policemen went aboard immediately with arrest warrants for the rebellious members of the crew, charging insubordination.

On request of the captain, 30 Dutch marines met the liner yesterday near West Hinder lightship when members of the crew were reported to have insisted on proceeding to Rotterdam from Boulogne in spite of the fact the company's and the captain's orders were to disembark passengers at Southampton.

Fears that the crew would join a seamen's strike here if they came to this port were given as the reason for the order to proceed to Southampton.

Yesterday's reports said the captain finally acquiesced in the demand to proceed here.
