Norman Thomas Begins Ambitious Speaking Tour

NEW YORK, Sept. 22. (AP)—A man rode alone today into the west, seeking the presidency of the United States.

He will campaign in 17 states. There will be speeches by day and speeches by night and he will match his tent in sleeping cars as he rolls into the northwest, to California and to Texas.

Norman Thomas, a socialist candidate for president for the second time in four years, made no sanguine claims of victory as he left New York last night. He said: "I've always got a chance if enough people vote. But even if I'm defeated, an organized socialist movement with a big vote may stop present destructive trends."

His is the most ambitious speaking program of any candidate, for it calls for day-by-day and often two-day speech-making. And he travels alone.

Funds are skimp—less than \$60,000 is being spent on the entire campaign, he said. There can be no extravaganzas.

ed sidewalk. Death was instantaneous. The body was identified as that of Miss Haden by B. P. Haslitt, Worth hotel, Dallas, who told police the woman made arrangements with a Dallas travel bureau to ride in his car with several other passengers to Houston.

"During the drive to Houston, Miss Haden had nothing to say to any of the passengers," said Haslitt. There was nothing in the woman's purse to identify the body. From a pair of shoes the woman wore the maker's mark had been carefully cut away.

Spanish Grandees Exiled To Africa

MADRID, Sept. 22. (AP)—The of the old Spanish aristocrat forlorn group of marquises, and high army officers whose eastern commanded flotillas Spain's power was mighty of seas, was bound for exile in a hidden Africa today, in the bunks of a prison ship.

Rounded up by the new republican government following the cent monarchist uprising of General Jose Sanjurjo, the aristocratic group set sail last night the Espana V, while on the dock the moonlight, weeping wives sisters, sons and brothers w sorrowfully, knowing many of deportees never will return.

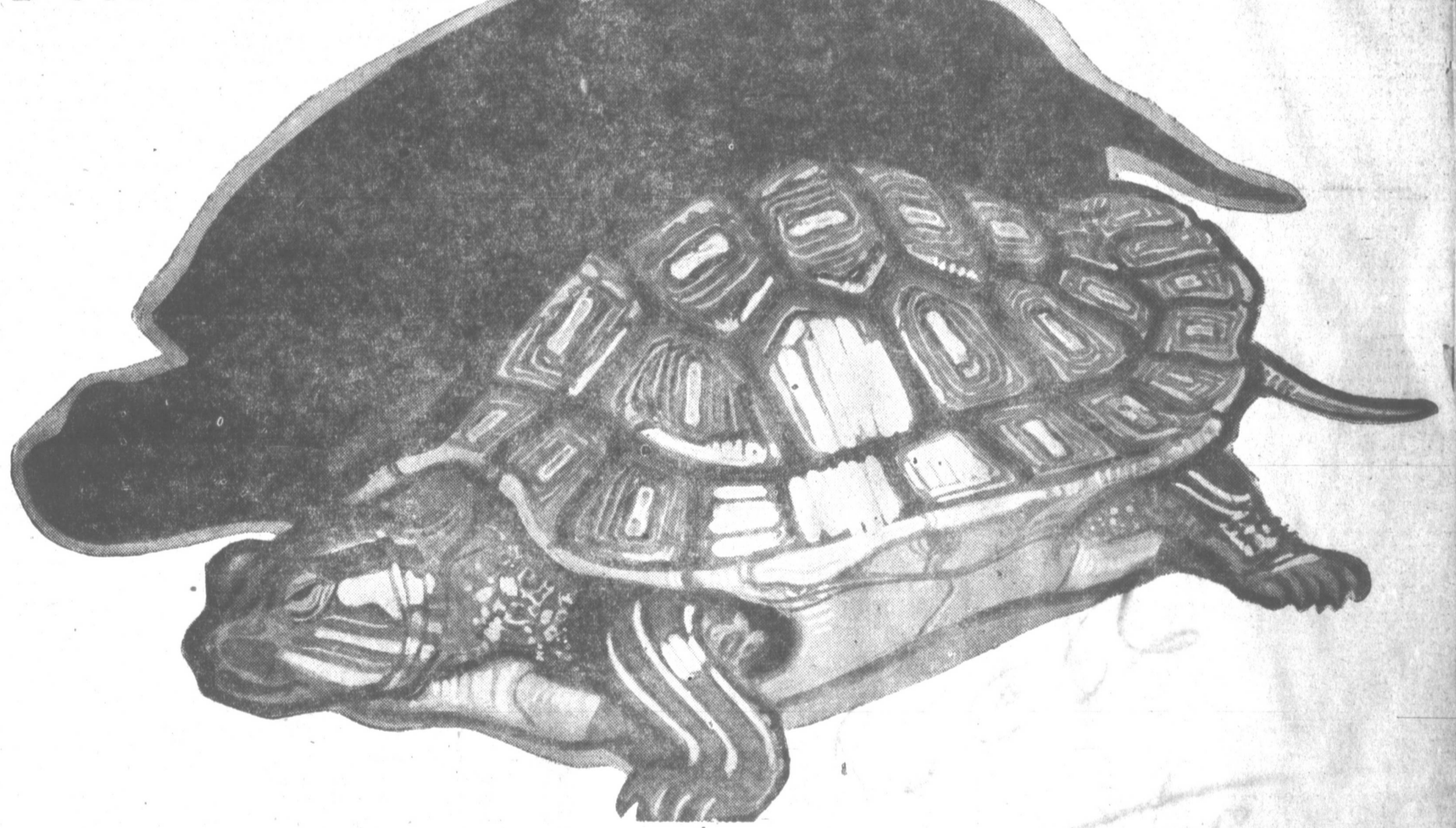

Sniffen Sniffs At Thought Of Vanishing Race

ST. PAUL, Sept. 22 (AP)—The war cry of the Indians has been replaced by "crooners" and the closest semblance to war paint is the rouge used by Indian flappers.

That was the picture of the modern Indian drawn by M. K. Sniffen of Philadelphia, secretary of the Indian Rights association, as he stopped off here yesterday on his way back east after making a survey among Alaskan Indians.

"Sitting Bull undoubtedly would roll over in his grave," Sniffen said, "if he could witness the transformation a few years of civilization has wrought in the Indians."

The war cry — the huns — the chiefs in war regalia — dancing around the camp fires preceding battle — are a thing of the past, he said. The sons and grandsons of the old Indian warriors who roamed the plains, living on Buffalo and other wild game, now work in factories or till the soil.

"The modern American Indian is as industrious and ambitious as the average white man," declared. "The Indians are not a vanishing race as they are depicted. In 1890 there were 250,000 Indians in the United States while there are 345,000 at present living on 200 reservations."

Rebel Chief Snorts At Marching Along With "Damyankes"

MEMPHIS, Sept. 22 (AP)—General Charles A. Desaussure, whose twinkling eyes and military bearing belie his years, says he can't even imagine confederate and union veterans marching arm in arm.

The general is a retired commander-in-chief of the United Confederate veterans and he said today he was opposed to a joint review as proposed to delegates to the 66th annual encampment of the grand army of the republic.

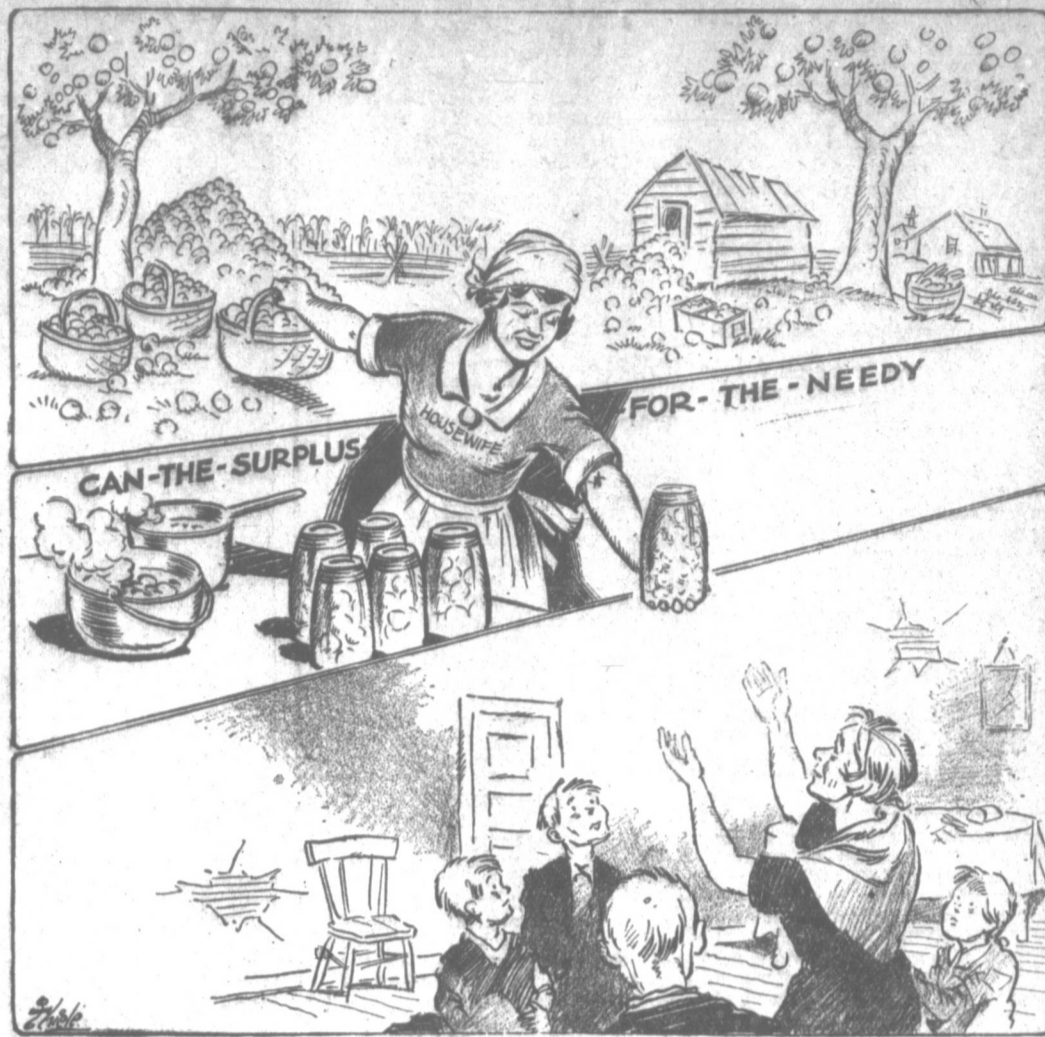
"I hold no bitterness in my heart towards the brave soldiers of the north," he said, "but I am stoutly against the suggestion that the men of the south and the men of the north join in a grand review before the president of the United States."

"I speak as an individual, but I believe I speak the sentiment of the majority of the confederate veterans."

"There is no need for such a parade. It would only serve to revive unpleasantness. Things should remain as they are. There is no advantage to be gained by attempting such a step."

A union veteran, an editor, proposed the grand review in a letter sent to the 2,000 veterans at the encampment of the grand army of the republic at Springfield, Ill.

Louisiana Will Free Convicts To Save Money

BATON ROUGE, La., Sept. 22 (AP)—Several hundred prisoners in the state penitentiary soon will be freed — to save money and because Louisiana thinks they are not very bad boys.

Gov. O. K. Allen's secretary said yesterday many short terms would be liberated when the governor could act on recommendations of the general manager of the prison. A list of prisoners doing time for minor offenses is being prepared for the governor.

The penitentiary general manager said the prison population had doubled in four years. He issued an appeal to judges and district attorneys to "help relieve congestion" by refraining from sending prisoners to the penitentiary for short terms. He said a continuation of the practice would result

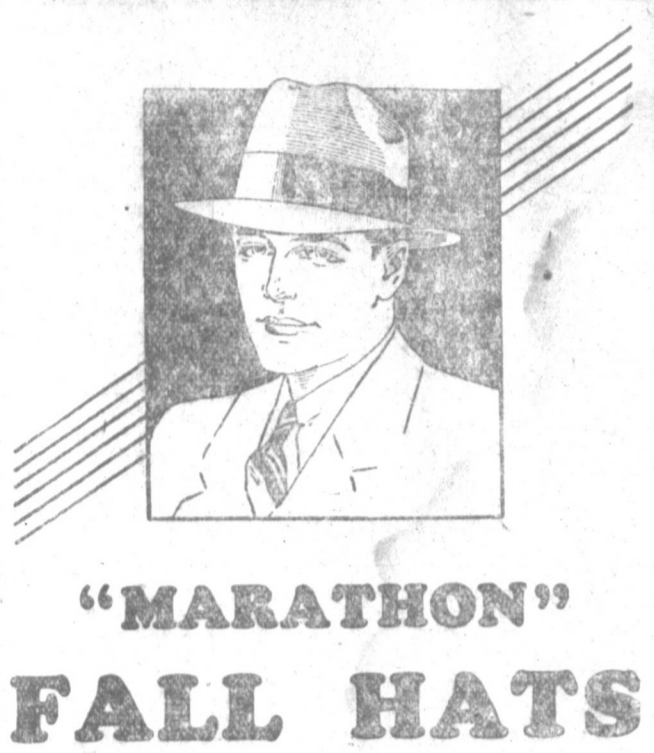
It was necessary in 1929, when hard time started riding down main street, to borrow \$24,000 to run the government. An economy program was ordered and next year only \$10,000 was borrowed. Last year Bainbridge got \$4,000 in a loan and this year no money was borrowed.

Property valuation declined about a million dollars—a lot of dollars in a little agricultural city like this. But working on the theory everything should be reduced, the city fathers cut the tax rate five mills; then they fixed the budget within the income and held it there.

Tax payers were unable to pay promptly so an installment plan was started and citizens now can pay their taxes a little at a time.
