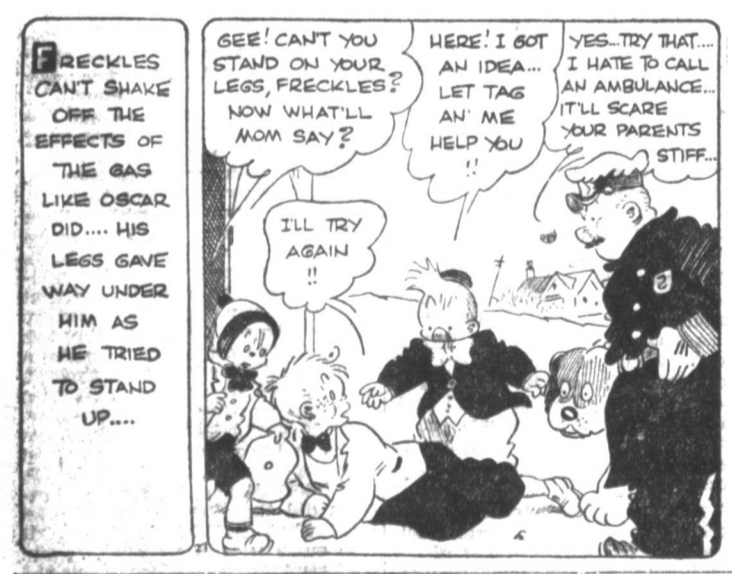

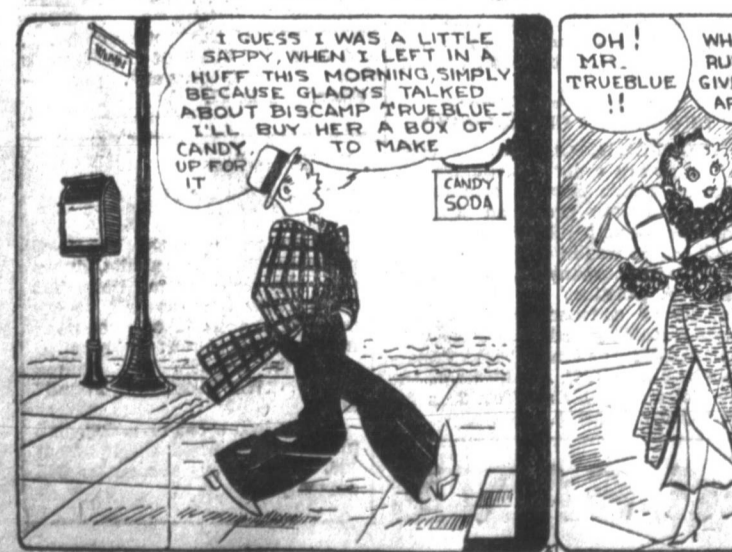

# AMERICANS AND BRITISH WILL TAKE HAND IN SHANGHAI NOW WHILE CHINESE TRY FOR QUIET

SHANGHAI, Jan. 27. (AP)—A force of about 2,400 United States and British marines prepared today to take over the defense of the international settlement in Shanghai as approximately 10,000 Chinese troops were deployed, apparently determined to defend the city from occupation by the Japanese.

Late in the afternoon Japanese consular officials said a representative of Mayor Wu Teh-Chen called at the consulate and stated unofficially a reply would be issued accepting the Japanese demands in their entirety.

At the same time, however, it was learned that Japanese authorities today began to evacuate their nationals from nearby places in the Yangtze valley.

TOKYO, Jan. 27. (AP)—Ting Chao, former ally of Marshal Chang Hsiao-Liang, appeared today to have won an engagement with forces under Yu Shen Cheng, who wants to be governor of Kirin, near Harbin, Rengo news agency dispatches said today.

During the engagement one Chinese faction brought down a Japanese scouting plane which had been flying over the area without participating in the battle. One of the men aboard hurried to Harbin and brought a crew of Japanese engineers.

They planted a mine under the wreckage of the plane and fell back. When the Chinese approached the engineers exploded the mine and 20 or 30 Chinese were killed.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27. (AP)—A possibility is seen here of further action by the United States in regard to Japan's operations in China. Advisers within the administration are divided, some favoring a more drastic course than heretofore taken, others, including Secretary Stimson, urging a policy of conciliation.

The decisions is up to President Hoover who has held frequent cabinet discussions on the subject but is still withholding judgment.

## PUBLIC FORUM

Editor, THE NEWS—Every red-blooded man and woman is interested in the government of his country. Almost the only way a private citizen can have a hand in his government is by voting in any and all popular questions. To pay a tax, called a poll tax, because it is a personal tax, qualifies a citizen to vote. He can help select his national, state, or county officers.

If a citizen does not pay his poll tax, \$1.75, he is disqualified for voting for one year. When a citizen pays a poll tax he is a franchised citizen.

The money he pays to the county tax collector is used for school and county purposes. One dollar goes to state treasury for school purposes. Fifty cents goes to pay jury expenses, etc. Twenty-five cents goes to the county school fund.

If a man gets so low in his life that he would vote for an issue that vitally concerns the country and would vote for something for his selfish desire, if he has that low, he generally has not the price to pay his tax.

It is getting more difficult to find men buying votes. Laws have been put into effect that make it increasingly difficult to get votes illegally.

Therefore good citizens should certainly pay their poll tax and insure the election of good men and women to public office.

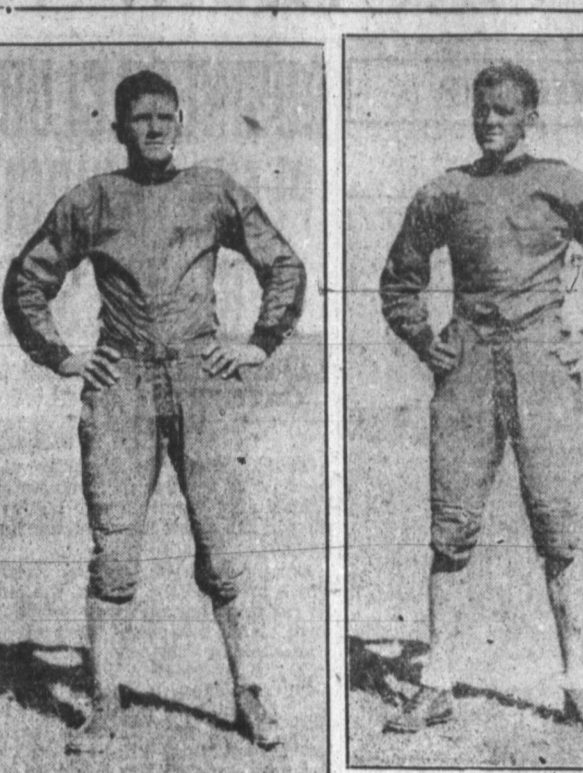

## To Require Bonds of House Movers

A city ordinance requiring persons moving buildings in the city of Pampa to be bonded has been prepared by the city commission, which met yesterday afternoon.

The ordinance will receive its last reading next week. The bond was set at \$5,000 and is meant to protect persons and property. Many accidents have resulted from moving buildings and the city commission deemed it advisable to protect the city and citizens by the ordinance.

Before a building can be moved, permit must be secured and the route designated. Should a building be moved into Pampa by an outside company, a temporary permit and bond will have to be procured.

The maximum fines for violation of the new ordinance will be \$200.

## Labor Measure Is Upheld Today

AUSTIN, Jan. 27. (AP)—The court of criminal appeals today upheld the constitutionality of the ninety-four hour law, limiting the hours of employment for women, in affirming conviction of E. D. Butcher, prosecuted in Harris county for its violation.

The law provides that it shall be unlawful for employers to work women more than 54 hours a week, or nine hours daily, for six days each week.

Butcher was convicted in the county court and remanded to jail.

## Books Will Be Used Until They Are Worn Out

The only way for a high school student to obtain a new book is to wear out the one he has, according to Supr. R. B. Fisher. That goes for this year as well as next, although it applies particularly to the 1932-33 session, when newly adopted high school text books will be introduced into the schools.

Mr. Fisher said that Pampa high school will heed the recommendation recently made by the State Board of Education that the books now in use will be used until worn out, for the sake of economy. The new text books will be gradually introduced into the local high school, Mr. Fisher said. Usable high school text books will not be displaced by new adoptions as long as they are usable.

The board's recommendation was sent to Mr. Fisher by State Supr. S. M. N. Marz who wrote, "In this period of economic readjustment it is necessary for the school funds of the state to be conserved by exercising strictest economy in the purchase of books and materials. School officials can materially assist the state in conserving the public school funds by continuing in use text books in good condition that have been displaced by new adoptions."

Thousands of people used to attend his round-ups. At one time, Joe Bartles was worth more than eight million dollars. He is in the realty business at Amarillo.

## Students Need Help to Remain in School Here

Bearing in mind that there is a tendency, even in normal times, for students to drop out of school between semesters, Supt. R. B. Fisher this morning emphasized the need for community efforts to encourage and assist their young people to remain in school.

The need for encouragement and help is accentuated at this time because of economic readjustment under way and because the first semester has just ended, he said.

Quoting recent statistics of the federal office of education, Mr. Fisher pointed out that there are enrolled in the high schools of today 324,815 more students than a year ago and that enrollment in vocational schools and courses increased more than 60,000. These are significant figures and they speak well for the school of America, it was said. Obviously, Mr. Fisher said, young people throughout the nation are taking advantage of the depression by going to school.

The National Education association, the National Congress of Parents and Teachers and kindred agencies, also the President's Organization of Unemployed, Relief, recently urged the community to focus its efforts upon encouraging and assisting young people to remain in school.

"The splendid spirit put forth by school officials and teachers during this period when financial conditions have caused great hardship has been one of the bright spots of the depression," it was stated. "Even when schools are crowded and teaching loads are heavy, educators have deeply realized that it is far better for young people to be enrolled in schools than to be found merely forming habits of idleness."

### Wood Declares Better Business Now in Prospect

### Murder in Second Degree Considered As Defense Gain

HONOLULU, Jan. 27. (AP)—Second degree murder indictments had been returned by the grand jury today against Mrs. Granville Fortescue and three naval men, charging them with slaying Joseph Kahahawai, suspected assaulter of Mrs. Fortescue's daughter.

The indictment was returned only after Circuit Judge A. M. Cristy once refused to accept the jury's proffered report and raised the question of anarchy.

The defense immediately seized on the grand jury's apparent unwillingness to return an indictment and Attorney Montgomery Winn prepared to ask the court to quash the indictment. His plea is based on the contention that coercion was used to make the jury return the formal indictment.

Bail also was to be fixed today for the defendants, who include Lieut. Thomas H. Massie, Mrs. Fortescue's son-in-law, and E. J. Lord and Albert O. Jones, enlisted men. They have been held at Pearl Harbor naval base without bail since their arrest nearly three weeks ago. Both Lieutenants Massie and Mrs. Fortescue expressed gratitude at the returning of the indictment and indicated they expected ultimate vindication.

### MORE ABOUT WILSON

Two more volumes of Ray Stannard Baker's intensive biography of Woodrow Wilson are now out—covering, respectively, Wilson's years as governor of New Jersey and as president up to 1913.

Baker has done exhaustive research on his subject and has arranged his material so that the development of Wilson's life and character, and specialized interests is illustrated by the facts themselves of his life.

Instead of viewing Wilson through the felling lens of a biographer who is selling a personal opinion, we scan the events of his life, and his comments in speech and letters, and may form our own conclusions.

### Streams Spread Over Farm Land

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Jan. 27. (AP)—Swollen tributaries of the lower Mississippi today rolled over lowlands of three states, flooding farms and towns and threatening life and property.

So far the Mississippi delta has been hardest hit by the unruly waters but their force also was felt in sections of Arkansas and Louisiana and the accumulating influx has swelled the Mississippi river itself down toward Natchez.

Today, the fight in the Mississippi delta was concentrated at Belzoni, in Humphreys county, where 100 convicts worked to hold protecting levees against the Yazoo river.

The Red Cross cared for some 2,500 refugees at Charleston, Miss., and relief work went ahead in the Tallahatchie valley in the vicinity of Glendora, Miss., where thousands

have been routed from their homes in half a dozen counties.

Heavy rains in Northern Louisiana led the weather bureau to issue warnings for precaution against loss of lives and property along the Ouachita, the Black river and the Red below Shreveport.

The Red river in South Arkansas has gone on a rampage and between 10,000 and 15,000 acres of farm lands have been inundated.
