Philippine Cadets May Join Chinese

MANILA, P. I., Feb. 12 (AP)-Newspaper reports here that 700 cadets of the University of the Philippine Islands planned to enlist in the Chinese army brought an immediate announcement from Japanese consul Komura today he would protest to the governor-general.
Inquiry disclosed, however, that

only two Filipino cadets and one cadet officer have said they planned to go to China. A number of Chinese students who are not cadets planned to enlist in the Chinese army but they have not yet resign 1 from the university. An undetermined number of Chi-

nese have sailed for Shanghai, presumably to join in the defense of that city against the Japanese, during the last two weeks. However Chinese consul Kwong denied any one was soliciting recruits for the Chinese army.



DIPLOMATS AT DINNER WHEN FIGHTING IS RESUMED

CHINESE MORALE HAS SURPRISED EVEN ENEMIES

By JAMES P. HOWE SHANGHAI, China, Feb. 12. (P)
Guns blazed again across the
Chapei ruins tonight while American, British, and French miniaters were discussing over their dinner the possibilities of restor ing peace.

They had met at the invitation of Nelson T. Johnson, United States minister to China, who had been asked by the city's Chinese merchants to mediate with the hope of establishing a permanent peace.

The diplomats had just reached the demitasse stage when the capnonading began, heavier than usual. From their dining room windows on the tenth floor of the hotel Cathay they could see the gun flasher along both the Japanese and Chinese fronts. For awhile they watch ed from windows, then mounted the stairs to a tower where they watch-

ed the battle through binoculars. The Chapei shooting began som time after the Japanese fleet in the

Whanspoo had resumed the toni-bardment of Woosung.

They fired on the village and the fort and both sides had machine gun sections in action on opposite banks of the river. The Japanese said they had inflicted heavy losses.

Japanese airplanes were over both
Chapei and Woosung, bombing the latter but flying high over Chapel and avoiding the international settlement. Thus far they had used none of the 500-pound bombs which have been made available to them




