

On Oct 21 at a banquet given to the governor in Dallas Senator Bailev stated that the Standard Oil Co. was doing business in Texas in violation of the law and that the Attorney General should move in the matter. Whereupon that officer expressed his gratitude for the information in a courteous letter, and his desire to use him as a witness. But Mr. Bailey ailed to produce the testimon y.

The pay of a United States senator is 7500. per session, usually of about 6 months, If Senator Bailey's services are worth that much to Texas, his campaign is costing the State more than \$40.00 per day, His investigations and his campaigns to vindicate his character, is costing the State dearly.

In a speech in the Senate, June 17, 1906, Mr. Bailey said "I despise those public men who think that they must remain poor to be considered honest. In another address hesaid if I work half my time for you, ought I not be allowed to work the other half for Mrs. Bailey and the boys. The people pay him for all of his time to look after their interests, and not to serve the Standard Oil Co, and other trusts as he said under oath he had done, and that he would do again.

Read what David R. Francis writes to Bailey,

Hon. Jos. W. Bailey, Dear Sir: I today paid H. C. Pierce 4,800 and asked him to send me in exchange therefor whatever drafts or receipts for money made by you, he might have in his possession. He made no reply excpt to send me the inclosed receipt for 3,3000, which voucher he designated as a demand

for 1,500.

Gov. Francis had given Pierce a letter of introduction to Bailey tor advice in what he no doubt understood to be legitmate business, and when he learned from Pierce that Bailey had accepted a fee from him he repaid it himself. The Governor did not wish his name to be associated with Bailey in what he regarded as a shady transaction. Bailey has lost caste, is a discredited man a stain and a reproach to the good name of our state.
