People do not protest against taxes when they have the money to pay them. That is why, in normal times, they vote bonds so freely for such things as parks, playgrounds, swimming pools, scenic boulevards, and the like. Not many months ago a certain group here was crying to high heaven for a municipal airport, the expense of which would have been \$25,000 to \$50,000, including cost of the land. Amarillo has such an airport, little used. The Pampans were panned unmercifully for not demanding a bond issue here.

Remember the Roads

When good roads were first projected in Gray county, the total sum proposed was small. The voters rejected the issue. District bonds were voted, with results unsatisfactory to both sides of the county. Finally, some of the opponents of concrete changed their minds and brought out the biggest issue of all—the one now being spent. The biggest issue passed with comparatively little opposition, though smaller ones had been effectively killed. Had the first or early issues carried the advantage of oil values would have been enjoyed several years earlier. Taxpayers should shoulder their share of the responsibility for public expenditures. There were no worse orgies than those of bond voting which swamped the market.

We do not forget, however, that the super-era propaganda, ably inflated by Mr. Hoover and the other perpetual prosperity evangelists, had the taxpayers and everybody else pretty well fooled. We hope the readers read what Rodney Dutcher, THE NEWS' brilliant Washington correspondent, said on this subject. He said that

County Districting Issue Is in Court

EL PASO, April 7 (AP)—The eighth district Court of Civil Appeals today affirmed the decision of District Judge C. R. Sutton, who sustained a general demurrer in the suit of Mabour L. Harris against the county judge and commissioners of Upton county. Harris and others sought a mandamus to force the commissioners to re-district the county to allow McCamey more representation in the Upton county commissioners court. McCamey, with 4,000 population, now elects one commissioner, while Rankin, with 1,000 population, elects two.

Dairy Show in Plainview to Be Held April 11-14

PLAINVIEW, April 8 (AP)—Catching announcements for the Plains Dairy Show have been mailed to 100,000 dairymen in 13 counties of eastern New Mexico. The show will be held at its permanent headquarters here April 11 to 14. Approximately \$3,500 in cash premiums has been posted. For the first time in the show's history, the auction sale on the closing day will include a consignment of Guernseys. Herebefore only Jerseys, the leading breed exhibited here, have been offered in the annual sale.

STATES RESTS IN TRIAL

HENDERSON, April 7 (AP)—The state rested today in the murder trial of Bascom Owens, accused of shooting Rube Barker south of Henderson Dec. 19 and defense testimony was begun. Deputy Sheriff L. W. Jackson testified for the state that Owens had threatened to kill Barker several weeks before the shooting. The defense objected to the admission of this testimony, claiming the alleged threat was made too long before the killing to have any bearing on it. The court overruled the objection.

PIG IS RESCUED

LIVINGSTON, April 8 (AP)—A pig belonging to A. L. Loyd, who lives near Livingston, was rescued after spending three days at the bottom of a 45-foot well.

Murray's Claim Quickly Denied

LINCOLN, Neb., April 8 (AP)—Charges of Gov. William (Alfalfa Bill) Murray of Oklahoma that \$50,000 in eastern money had been sent into Nebraska to buy delegates for Gov. Franklin D. Roosevelt have brought a back fire of rapid and indignant denials.

Arthur Mullin, democratic national committeeman from Nebraska, home last night, termed the charges untrue and declared the total expense of Roosevelt work done in Nebraska amounted to less than \$200 and he (Mullin) has paid that personally.

James A. Farley of New York, Roosevelt's campaign leader, said it was not necessary "to buy what we already had. No funds have been sent into Nebraska by Gov. Roosevelt. Five hundred dollars would cover the entire expense of such literature as has been sent into the state from time to time."

Veterans Demand Cash Payments

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP)—Behind the army band, several hundred veterans tramped across Capitol Plaza today and presented congressional leaders with a huge petition demanding full cash payment of the bonus.

The veterans of foreign wars, sponsors of the demonstration, said there were 2,500,000 signatures on the petition, delivered in 20 packing cases.

They were delivered to Representative Rainey of Illinois, the Democratic leader, Snell of New York, the republican leader, and Senator McNary of Oregon, the assistant republican leader, who were grouped on the capital steps with other members from both branches of congress.

Many University Degrees at Stake

AUSTIN, April 8 (AP)—Two hundred and ninety five students at the University of Texas are candidates for bachelor's degrees at the June commencement.

Of the total, 244 are seeking bachelor or arts degrees; 14, bachelor of science in home economics; 28, bachelor of journalism; eight, bachelor of science in medicine and one bachelor of science in geology.

"Well, didn't you know that would get you in trouble," Judge Adams asked.

"Sure, Judge, but wasn't I already in trouble with dem beating on me every day?"

When it developed that the state had no evidence other than the negro's "confession", Judge Adams dismissed the case.

"Now don't tell any more stories on yourself," the judge advised the negro.

"No sah, I ain't jedge," the negro grinned, "jest dey beat me some more. When dey put dat rubber hose on you it's not the truth what hurts."

Recapture Clause May Be Abolished

WASHINGTON, April 8 (P)—The Rayburn bill to repeal the recapture clause of the transportation act and establish a new rate-making board was approved by the house interstate commerce committee.

The measure retroactively repeals the provision that requires railroads to give one-half of all their earnings over five and three-quarters per cent to a revolving fund administered by the interstate commerce commission to aid weaker roads.

TWO BOYS CHARGED

GARNETT, Kan., April 8 (P)—First degree murder charges were filed here against two 18-year-old boys, Lowell Lloyd and Lawrence Richardson, in connection with the death of Evelyn Patterson, 19, of Lawrence, found unconscious along highway near here Friday night.

In filing charges Raymond O'Hara, Anderson county attorney, said he believed the girl either was fatally injured when struck by or pushed from the car driven by the two boys.

Natives Shoot Sergeant to Death

BLUEFIELDS, Nic., April 7 (P)—Sergeant Charles J. Levenski, U. S. Marine corps, of New York, a lieutenant in the Guardia Nacional of Nicaragua, was killed early yesterday in a mutiny led by discontented native sergeants at Kisalaya, a guardia outpost at which he was in command. His lieutenant, Carlos Reyes, a Nicaraguan, was wounded.

The extreme remoteness of the outpost is believed to have inspired the natives to start the mutiny. Kisalaya is located on the Wanks river. Twenty-five men were stationed there with the two officers.

After the two officers had been made casualties, ten loyal guardia joined the nearest garrison while 15 fully-armed men went up the river for Jinotega.

RADICALS ARE WATCHED

HOUSTON, April 8 (P)—Grigardier General J. J. F. Wolters of the Texas National Guard, Ranger Captain Frank Hamer and Chief Percy Heard conferred today with Mayor Walter Monteith here more than an hour. None would reveal the nature of the conference. Captain Hamer is known to have interested himself in investigating alleged radical activities recently in this section, particularly in port cities in Houston and Galveston.

DALLAS, April 8 (P)—A schedule increasing prices for crude oil 10 to 15 cents a barrel in some fields of Louisiana and Arkansas, posted by the Magnolia Petroleum company was in effect today. Fields affected were the Lockport, Iowa, Cameron Meadows, Pine Island, Haynesville Bull Bayou and Cotton Valley of Louisiana and the Eldorado, Balmow, and Smackover of Arkansas.

SHOOTES HUSBAND

SAN ANTONIO, April 8 (P)—Mrs. Thelma Schleming was at liberty on \$1,000 bond here and charged with assault to murder, after the shooting of her husband, Fritz W. Schleming Jr., a railway clerk. Schleming was shot in the back and taken to a hospital in a serious condition. Eye witnesses said there was argument over custody of a child.

Good Things to Eat For Less

Price Schedule For Oil Menaced

HOUSTON, Apr. 7. (AP)—Two major purchasing companies here today were paying 83 cents for East Texas crude, 15 cents less than the price in this area, and recent price increases throughout the mid-continent area obviously were in danger.

The Humble Oil and Refining company announced last night it was paying 83 cents, seven cents under the price it paid for the period from April 1 to April 6. The Gulf Production company said today it was maintaining its 83 cent figure, which had not been changed for some time. Neither, of course, had met the general midcontinent increases.

The Texas company, which had followed advances in the midcontinent area in general to a top of \$1 per barrel and in East Texas in particular to 98 cents, had made no change. T. J. Donoghue, vice-president, already had revealed, however, the matter of going back to the old lower schedule was under consideration, though no decision, he said, had been reached today.

Meanwhile, W. S. Farish, president of Humble, declined to comment on the telegram sent by Charles Roemer of Fort Worth to major purchasers, in which the latter urged the maintenance of the recent price advances.

"I have just read the wire," said Mr. Farish. "There will be no answer."

Underwood Nazro of the Gulf was out of the city, but the assistant said there had been no answer to the Roemer wire, and indicated there probably would be none.

Three Convicts Finally Caught

MCALISTER, Okla., April 8. (AP)—Trailed nearly 60 miles, three convicts who fled from the state penitentiary with two captives were recaptured today near Dustin, Hughes county.

The trio apparently had hiked all night after the motor car in which they fled was disabled near Scipio, 20 miles from the prison.

Riding to the women's ward of the prison to do some dental work, the convicts, one of them a dentist, overpowered L. H. Lackey, guard, and E. L. Bassett, prison druggist, as soon as they were out of sight of the walls. Lackey's pistol was taken and Bassett was ordered to drive to a point near Scipio, where he and the guard were put of the car.

Hoover Ready for Showdown Session

WASHINGTON, April 8. (AP)—A showdown session on government retrenching is in prospect when President Hoover and the special house economy committee get together tomorrow morning around a white house conference table.

Since his quick acceptance of the invitation and challenge contained in the committee's formal request for specific savings recommendations the chief executive has been energetically gathering material for the meeting in a long succession of consultations with cabinet members and department heads.

State of Siege Declared in Chile

SANTIAGO, Chile, April 8. (AP)—President Juan Esteban Montero, backed by the congress, declared a state of siege through Chile today. He struck swiftly at political opponents whom he charged with responsibility for a stirring day yesterday which began with a run on the National bank and ended with a new cabinet.

Immediately after the congress approved his request for martial law, the president issued a manifesto in which he denounced an alleged conspiracy of opponents of the government to undermine the administration and seize power.

Free Music May Be Provided Next

PHILADELPHIA, April 8. (AP)—If prosperity fails to round that corner there will be at least one redeeming feature—Leopold Stokowski presenting free, in the streets, the music he feels it his duty to provide "music is the life and drink of the people," said the famous conductor. "I will lead street bands, I will give free concerts, when this depression prevents folks from hearing music they must have."

He wasn't joking. Stokowski already has assembled a band of 200 pieces for a benefit concert here.

MUST ABANDON TOWN

SANTO STEFANO, Italy, April 8. (AP)—Complete abandonment of this 2,000-year-old town of 2,400 people was ordered by Premier Mussolini today following the collapse of its central district last week into ancient caverns with which it is underlain. The premier's order was issued after experts found that the partially-wrecked town rests on volcanic rock honeycombed with caverns which may collapse at an moment and swallow the remaining 200 houses.

MECHANICAL PICKER
