## RICHBOURG IS DOING WELL IN CUYLER SHOES

### BILL JURGES ALSO IS SENSATION AT SHORTSTOP

For a team shot with injury and illness, the Chicago Cubs have managed thus far to get around surprisingly well in the national league.

They were a half-game ahead of the Boston Braves today and have made their upward surge with three of their greatest stars, Hazen Cuyler, Elwood English and Burleigh Grimes out of the lineup.

Lance Richbourg, obtained from Boston, has been filling Cuyler's outfield spot in fine style and Bill Jurges has done well at shortstop. English will have a hard time jarring him loose. Each knocked across two runs yesterday as the Homebysmen rang up their fifth straight win at Pittsburgh's expense, 8 to 4. Pat Malcho had a bid first inning, in which the Pirates batted him for four hits and as many runs, but he settled down to allow them only one blow the last eight frames.

The one other National League title saw Cincinnati, battling to keep away from their old basement berth, slug out a 6 to 4 win over the Cardinals.

The American League leadership also changed hands, the Yankees securing ahead remaining (the white Detroit dropped a 4 to 3 decision at Chicago. The White Sox committed errors but Sam Jones went ahead until the ninth inning. Then, when the Tigers threatened, his old Washington mate, "Bump" Hedley, went to the rescue and struck out two men to end the game with the bases loaded.

Wes Ferrell limited St. Louis to five hits in registering his fourth straight victory, 7 to 1. Earl Averill led the Cleveland assault on Stewart with a homerun and a double.

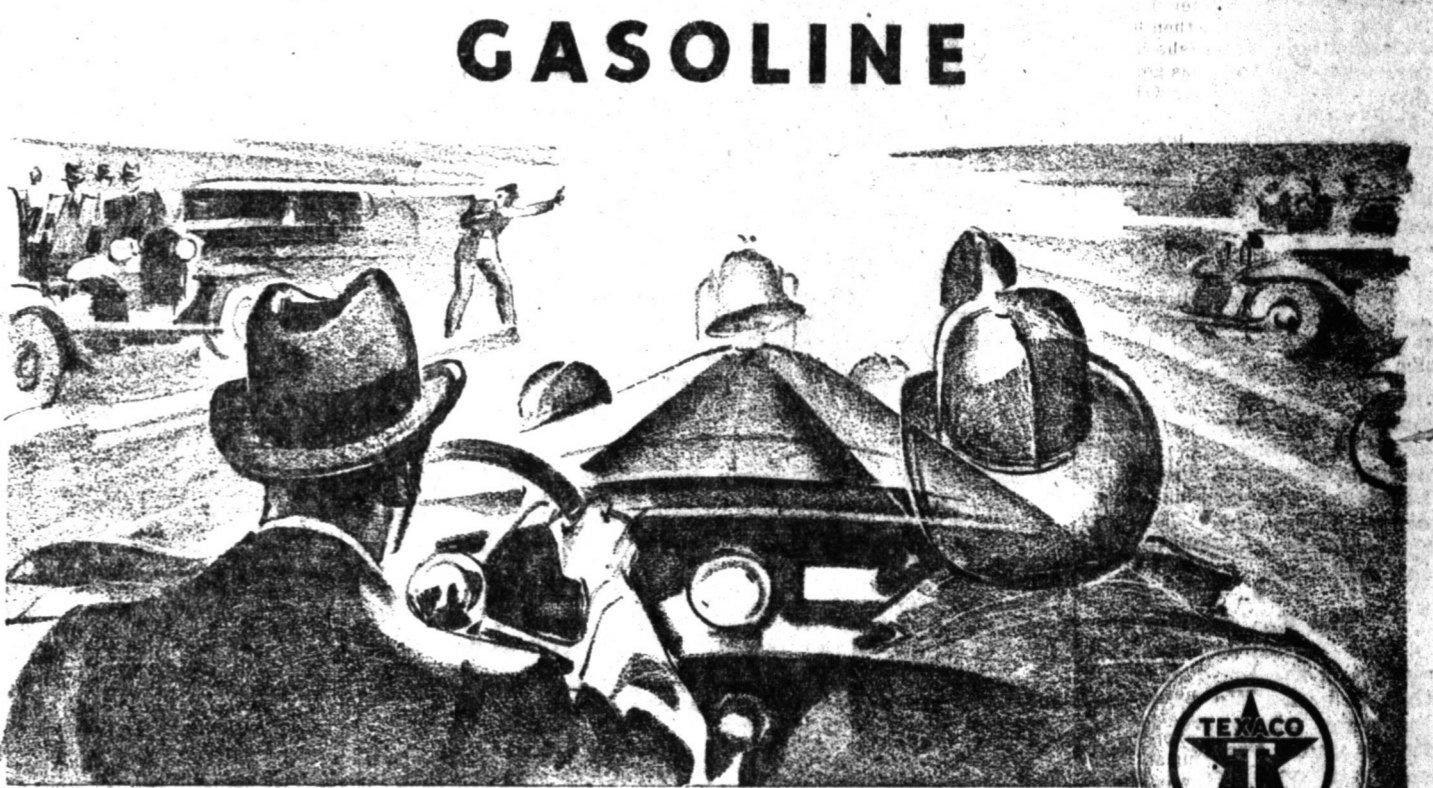

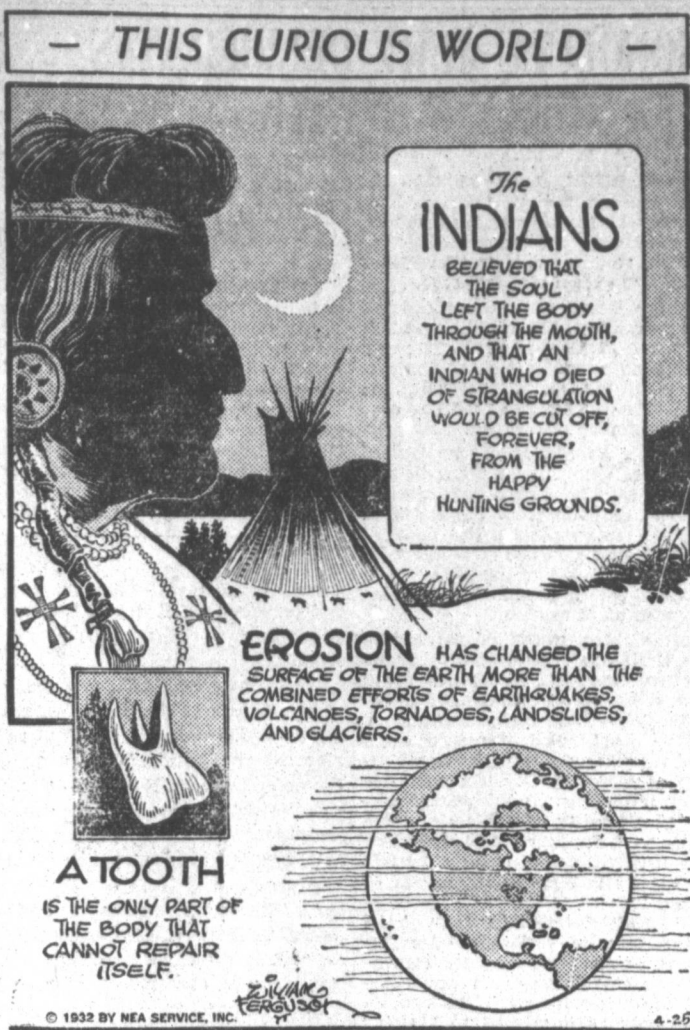

Together the pair managed to sweep the cash, about \$5,000, into a brief case, but as they stepped out of the cage toward the bank's vault the pupil's pistol arm was shaking so violently it accidentally discharged the weapon, the bullet going harmlessly into the floor.

"Quit picking on me," complained the blond. "I'm doing the best I can."

"Shut up," yelled the machine gunner, "and let's get out of here!" They were still arguing about the pupil's inability as they drove away in an automobile.

### This Game of GOLF

One reason for the prodigious hold this game of golf has on its addicts is the astonishing collection of funny stories it produces, especially of what is called the human interest variety.

Not long ago Eddie Conlin wrote and asked me for the funniest golf story I knew. I was present when this one developed; so I gave it to Mr. Conlin at first hand.

It was at Oakmont, in the National amateur championship of 1925 — the one where Watts Gunn became hypnotized and shot round after round of the most devastating golf ever seen in the amateur class.

**Fanning Wind**  
Watts' playing his first major tournament was matched in the first round with Vincent Bradford, a Pennsylvanian; and was trying altogether too hard to steer his shots at the beginning. He was 3 down through the eleventh hole of the morning round. Then something happened.

Watts went into a sort of trance in which it appeared utterly impossible for him to do anything wrong.

He established a world's record by winning the next FIFTEEN holes in succession; Bradford did not get even one half from the eleventh green to the twenty-sixth, where the slaughter ended, 12-10.

Watts went out with Jess Sweetser in the next round; and he was 7 up on Sweetser at lunch-time. In the afternoon, Watts fired eight consecutive pars and then a birdie at the famous Sitwanoy player, winning 19-9.

This was the worst drubbing Sweetser, one of the greatest match-players American amateur golf has produced, ever got.

Next day in the third round, Watts began to regain consciousness, and Dickey Jones gave him a hard fight. Watts was 2 up going to

the eighteenth in the morning round and Dickey won that with a birdie 3, reducing the lead to one hole as they went to the clubhouse.

"Hello, Watts," said Jess, cordially. "How are you coming?"

"Gee," said Watts, "I've got a tough one today! I'm only 1 up!" And he had been 7 up on Sweetser, the day before, at the same stage!

Jess got as big a laugh out of this bit of perfect naïvete as anybody else—which was quite a laugh, you did."

**DEAD ROBBER IS NOT KNOWN**

POTEAU, Okla., April 28 (AP)—An unknown robber was killed here today by officers after a 13-day chase. His companion escaped.

Sheriff Maxwell of Van Buren, Ark., had been pursuing the man, driving a car stolen in Muskogee, and loaded with clothing stolen in Seminole, since April 15.

The alleged robber was slain by a deputy sheriff near the Kansas City union depot here. He was about 36-years old, six feet tall, and weighed 170 pounds. Efforts to identify him through finger prints at the state bureau of criminal identification, Oklahoma City, were unsuccessful.

**DENVER POST TO USE PICTURES OF CITY SOON**

Pampa and Gray county will get plenty of free publicity from the Denver POST this summer according to a letter received by George W. Briggs, manager of the Board of City Development, this morning.

The letter said that an eight-page photograph section of Texas scenes will be run in a special issue of the POST this summer. The date has not been set.

The letter asked for unusual pictures of Pampa and surrounding country, preferably showing the remarkable growth of the city and oil, wheat and cattle scenes. Mr. Briggs says he would like to get in touch with Pampans who have unusual pictures of Pampa and this vicinity.

The pictures are to be 5x7 or 8x19 inches in size.

**A Remote Grandstand**  
Directly above the miniature bleachers in Brooklyn is a tier of \$1 "grandstand" seats. There are seats for about 2000 people there.

Since these seats are far enough away from home plate to be known as "bleachers," the Flabush fans are demanding that they be thrown open to the public at a 50-cent charge.

The practice of making row upon row of ordinary grandstand seats into "reserved seats" for big games with an extra charge is not confined to Brooklyn.
