#### A FERGUSON SMOKE SCREEN


They are typical Ferguson tactics which are revealed in Jim Ferguson's attack upon the present Highway commission, and the explanation is obvious. Mr. Ferguson is motivated by a desire to detract the public attention from another highway record which is being increasingly called to mind these days-the highway situation under the Ferguson regime while Mrs. Ferguson held the title of governor and Jim carried "wood and water" as he wants to do again. Jim Ferguson apparently considers it better tactics for him to let the public consider how unjust are the charges he brings against the present commission than to have the public dwelling on how just were the charges brought against the highway commission in 1925 and 1926.

When Mrs. Ferguson went out of office in January, 1927, the highway department was in a deplorable condition. It was in debt \$6,000,000; federal aid had been withdrawn because the Federal government felt that "its funds were not amply safeguarded; the administration of highway department affairs during her term of office were being laid bare in the embarrassing American Road company suit, in which the Ferguson administration had used the state funds out of the treasury to hire attorneys to keep the suit from being heard. The new highway commission which followed the Ferguson commission brought the highway department out of chaos, restored security so that the Federal government remain as the Public Phil-again extended road aid to Texas, paid the \$6,000,000 osopher.
