We have received no definite proposition as yet from the Railroad company nor have any preliminary lines been surveyed. but it is generally understood that a route through Snyder and Gail would be the smoothest, most practical and least expensive for the ruad. One indispensable to a Railroad is a plentiful supply of pure water for engines and that could be easily obtained bere. A res orvoir affording an inexhautible supply of rain water could be easily made. We have a depression like a basin, a natural slope from the mountains and a soil that holds water like a jug. The Appalling Deficit
Samuel Walker McCall, Repub lican, who has represented for several terms in congress the eighth district of Massachuetts, in a recent lecture to the students of Harvard University, said:
-We have been passing through a wild orgy of extravagance, in which very much has been consumed in fireworks and fustian, and great burdens of expense have been unnecessarilly fastened upon the country. Now, as a result of it all, we are to have tax ation of a sort such as the country has usually known only as a re sult of war, and the people will have an opportunity of paying the bills.
'Our national expenditure doubled in a decade, and the expense of govenrnment during that period has increased more than four times as fast as the population We have been accustnmed to point to the Wilson tariff act as standing for a great deficit in national finance and yet the aggregate of de ficits during the whole 35 months of the life of that act was $\mathbf{\$ 1 0 5}^{105}$. 000,000 , as compart d with more than $\$ 140.000,000$ of deficiency during the last 16 months of the administrat:on which has just ended "

the increase of population. Are not these figures appalling? Is it to be wondered that the great bread lines-dead lines-continue in the large cities. And yet ber culeanefforts are now being made to continue the Dingley tariff. The contest now between the trusts and the consumers of the country is over a substantial reduction of the oppressive tariff ducies.

## The First Message.

If the length of President Taft's first message to congress is to be taken as a precedent establishing the basis of measurement of future messages during his term, there is much to be thankful for. The message was a model of brevity and, while lacking in the picturesque language and the fire and brimstone of the public documents of his predecessor, we do not see that Mr. Taft's production suffers by comparison with the more lenythy and lurid works of Citizen Roosevelt. It stated the facts concisely-notably that the nation is rapidly approaching bankruptcy and that business is stagnant-and put the matter of relief squarely up to congress, with the admonition (not especially complimentary either to congress or to the activities of Mr Taft's predecessor) that "the less time given to other subjects of legislation (than the tariff) in this session, the better for the country.'
'Why, after years of watching the process of nature, I can no more doubt the existence of an Intelligence that is running things than I do of the existence of my self. T'ake, for example the sub. stance water that forms the crystals known as ice. Now there are hundreds of combinations that form crystals. and every one of them save that of ice sinks in water. Ice, I say, doesn't. And it is rather lucky for us mortals, for if it had done so we would all be dead. Why? Simply because if ice sank to the bottom of rivers, lakes and oceans as fast as it froze those places would be frozen up and there would be no water left. That is only one example out of thousands that to prove me beyond the possibility of a doubt that some vast intelligence is governing this and other planets."

I notice the representatives of the liquor interests are issuing lengthy communications through the press which contain many harsh things about ministers of the Gospel und the Anti-Saloon Leagus. I do not deem it neces. sary for $m \in$ to say anythirg in defense of either the ministers or the Anti-Salonn League, as the work of each is well kniswn to the people. No class of men on Earthi stand closer to the peo plethan the ministers of the Gospel, and I am prepared to say that no class of men make such sacrifices as they. I know of men in the ministry who receive small salaries, scarcely enough to support themselves and those dependant upon them, who hava the ability to engage in other pursuits and earn many thousands of dollars annually.

Many years ago the ministere recognized the fact that the sa* loon was the grectest evil in the land and was retarding the work expected of them more than all else. For this reason they have actively assisted in the work of putting the saloon out of business, hence the abuse of preachers by the liquor interests

During the year 1908, the Anti-Saloon League was instrumental in driving ten thousand saloons, from business, in the United States, and have the number set at twenty thousaná, this year. There is little the liquor interests can do, except to abuse the preachers and the

Anti-sialoon League, for they cunnot stand before an intellig. ent people and defent the sqoon. Their tactics remind one of the practices in which some lawyers are accused of indulging, when the law and evidence in the case on trial are against them. They go before the jury and abuse the witnesses upon the opposite side of the case, instead of defending their cause. The real issue is:-shall the saloons remain in Texas? If the liquor intorests believe the saloon is a good institution and should remain in Texas, let them stand up like men and eay so, and the Anti-Saloon League will meet them upon that issue. This is no personal fight, and we have not a word to say about those personally, who oppose us. But let us stick to the text. It is the Saloon we are after.
As to democracy, we who favor Submission are standing squarely upon the democratic platform, and those who cppuse Submission are upon the repub lican platform. I refer to the platform of the two parties to bear me out in this statement. As the subn issionist occupy the deniveratic position they intend to go before the demncracy of Texas upon the issue of People's Rule against saloon rule, and ask that men be elected to office who will stand by the people.
our Slogan will be;-"Shall the Saloons rule," and we will not be driven from this position. The democracy of Texas will have to make tho choice, and as the Demouratic party is the. party of the people we have no fear as io the results.
