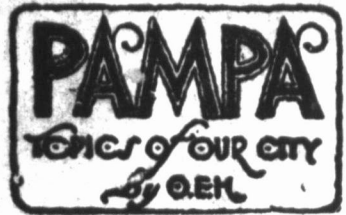

ASK 44 MILLION FOR RELIEF

YOU'VE READ about that belt of trees which Uncle Sam proposes to spread in a north-south direction across the country to stop the wind and, it is hoped, increase the rainfall. Maybe you didn't think one of the vagaries of the new deal. Maybe you consider it another costly experiment of the Roosevelt administration. Or did you seize upon the idea with enthusiasm of approval?

MAYBE YOU didn't know, until now as we tell you, that Pampa is receiving national publicity by reason of being one of the southern-most cities affected by the plan. But that is true. We have before us a small publication, Forestry News Digest, which contains a map showing the proposed tree belt. The belt starts at the Canadian border and runs straight south with Bismark, N. D., Pierre, S. D., Garden City, Kans., and Pampa marking the western border. The magazine says that "in Texas the lines run through Pampa on the west and Arapaho on the east, with a line drawn parallel to the Canadian boundary through the town of Childress."

POSSIBLY WE'll be able to adopt a motto, something like "The trees begin where we consider that this is known in some parts of the country as a treeless desert. Such a motto would have great value. But seriously, Uncle Sam thinks this belt of trees 100 miles wide would give us, or at least the people east of us, a more temperate climate, fewer dust storms, and possibly more rain. A Missouri university soils specialist says "the idea of a belt of trees bisecting the central part of the country is not a hair-brained plan concocted for political reasons, nor it is a waste of taxpayers' money."

SINCE PAMPA would be on the western edge of the tree belt, the benefit to us presumably would be small. We read that "persons living east of the tree belt would have more moderate weather, fewer spring dust storms, and would note that the water run-off after rains would be lessened. . . . Land near the proposed tree belt has been cultivated so much that the menace of soil erosion has greatly reduced the value of the land and threatened other great sections because of the hot, dry winds which blow from the bleak prairies."

WE NOTE two words especially emphasized: Hot and dry. It seems to us that lakes will be needed, along with the trees. Evaporation cools the air. Hot air and cool air, mingling, precipitate water vapor and cause rain. Differences of pressure cause movements which result in thunders and lightning. Before dawn yesterday we had terrific thunder. Did we have that thunder because of the heavy rain or a heavy rain because the thunder shook the moisture out of the clouds? If the latter is true, bombing the clouds may have a scientific basis, although our theory is that differing temperatures have more to do with it.

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT has set aside 15 millions to finance the protective strip in the plains region "for ameliorating drought conditions." This seems like a big sum. But if it works, it will be trivial. It will be necessary to purchase or lease the land on which the trees will be placed. How to make them grow in dry seasons will be something else. Work will start at once. Twenty million acres will be affected. Windbreaks will be planted one mile apart, more or less, giving one hundred windbreaks across the 100-mile strip. What effect on the wind will one hundred rows or clumps of trees have? Ah, there's the rub!

THE LAND used will, for the most part, remain in private hands. Farming will not be affected. Con-

8. He hath showed thee, O man, what is good; and what doth Jehovah require of thee, but to do justly, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with thy God?

9. The voice of Jehovah crieth unto the city, and the man of wisdom will see thy name; hear ye the rod, and who hath appointed it.

10. Are there yet treasures of wickedness in the house of the wicked, and a scant measure that is abominable?

11. Shall I be pure with wicked balances, and with a bag of deceitful weights?

12. For the rich men thereof are full of violence, and the inhabitants thereof have spoken lies, and their tongue is deceitful in their mouth.

Golden Text: He hath showed thee, O man, what is good; and what doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with thy God.—Micah 6:8.

Introduction: Micah prophesied a little later than Hosea, and was a contemporary of Isaiah; indeed he may be regarded as of Isaiah's school or following. His time would be somewhere from 745 to 700 B. C. Micah is a shortened form of Micaiah, and means, "Who is like Jehovah?" In the general outlines of his teaching Micah does not differ greatly from Amos, Hosea, and Isaiah. Distinctively, he is a strong champion of the cause of the poor and oppressed. On this account he has been called "the democrat among the prophets." Because Samaria and Jerusalem were especially unjust, heartless, in their treatment of "the common people," his condemnation of these cities is almost bitter. Samaria met her doom during his lifetime (722 B. C.), and in the plainest terms he predicts the destruction of Jerusalem (3:12). It was spared for a time, on account of Hezekiah's repentance and prayers; a generation later the prophet Jeremiah recalls Micah's influence over king and people (Jer. 26:16-19).

The Book of Micah.

Micah's prophecy was addressed to both Samaria and Jerusalem, although it chiefly concerned the former. It contains a denunciation of Israel, a promise to the remnant, a prediction of the captivities, the announcement of the coming of the Kingdom and the peace to follow, and points out the birthplace of Jesus Christ. "But thou, Bethlehem Ephratah, though thou be little among the thousands of Judah, yet out of thee shall he come forth unto me that is to be ruler in Israel."—Micah 5:2. See fulfillment Matt. 2:6.—Charles A. Shook.

The Book insists on the leading themes of Amos, Hosea, and Isaiah, the protests against the high places and their corrupt rites, against social wrong, sanctioned by the ministers of religion. The wrongful accumulation of great estates is specially mentioned as a flagrant social evil.—Prof. W. H. Bennett.

The teaching of Micah possesses remarkable qualities both in style and thought. His language is vigorous, graphic, and varied. He does not quite command the grand style of Isaiah, but he is more sharply telling and direct.—Prof. W. C. Elmslie, D. D.

"Like Amos, Micah took up the cause of the poor. His was the first voice to be raised against child labor, a crime even more deadly in the east than in the west."—Prof. Charles Arthur Hawley.

Micah denounced the oppressors of the poor, crying we upon them. They were so busy in evildoing that they planned it in the night, on their beds. They coveted fields, and seized them; and houses, and dragged them away. The evil of large estates conducted to the wretchedness of the poor. "The rulers whose chief aim should be the doing of justice, hated the good and loved the evil. They abhorred justice and perverted all equity. The judges made a mockery of law with their taking of bribes."

Micah Prophesies Better Days.

Chapter 4. But a different time is coming, and Micah's fourth chapter is one of the most glorious in the Bible. It looks forward to "the better days" when all the nations will seek Jehovah in his holy city, to learn of his ways and walk in his paths.

In those days "they shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more. But they shall sit every man under his vine and under his fig tree; and none shall make them afraid."

Micah 4:3. If Micah is the prophet of hope, he is also the prophet of peace.

What Doth Jehovah Require? v. 8. "He hath showed thee, O man, what is good." How has God made this revelation of goodness to us? By Moses and the Law in the Old Testament, by Christ and his teachings in the New Testament.

"The voice of Jehovah crieth unto the city." The city is Jerusalem, for Micah was a prophet of Judah. What follows is a denunciation of the corrupt commercial life of the city. More persons in our nation are now living in the city than in the country. In the city is the center of wealth and power. The voice of Jehovah cries to our cities, bidding them stand firmly for the gospel of Jesus Christ.

\$2,250,000,000 IN GOLD MOVED FROM 'FRISCO MINT TO DENVER

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 31. (AP)—One of the great movements of gold in the history of the world was under way today.

Ingots of the yellow metal, variously estimated as worth from \$1,500,000,000 to \$2,250,000,000, were en route to the Denver mint from the San Francisco mint under a heavy guard of picked soldiers.

While machine guns bristled from short and simple; their fulfillment long and laborous.

nearby buildings, fire truck searchlights flooded the area and hundreds of soldiers, postal inspectors and city police surrounded the mint, a dozen mail trucks backed up to a temporary loading platform at the side of the old stone structure last night to take on their precious cargo.

When all were loaded, each with a top of gold, they moved as a caravan, heavily guarded and with powerful searchlights lighting the way, to the depot where the metal

was placed in three mail cars. For hours this procedure was repeated. Finally the last ingot of gold, at least in the present shipment, apparently had been moved. Officials declined to disclose the hour of departure of the special train. Presumably it left for Denver as soon as it was loaded.

Besides the three mail cars, the train had two pullmans for the postal inspectors and soldiers. George Austin, veteran postal inspector, was in charge of the train.

Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau, in ordering the transfer, said it was being made because of the "earthquake hazard."

With official comment lacking, another reason advanced for the transfer was that it is the first

step in anticipation of building a new mint here. A \$1,500,000 structure, equipped with every modern safety device will supplant the 60-year-old stone building.

Russia Will Enter League of Nations

LONDON, Aug. 31. (AP)—Hope that the United States will be the next in line is held in unofficial circles today, with Russia's entrance into the League of Nations all but assured.

Swift action to give the Soviet a permanent seat at Geneva—on a par with Great Britain, France, and Italy—is expected when league sessions begin next Friday.

Diplomatic quarters recall that old aspirations of league adherents are only half-way realized by this step. The group has held out hope for several years that when the opportune time came both the United States and Russia would join simultaneously.

After early years of the league, when aversion to the Bolshevik regime in some quarters was wearing away, the world's two largest non-members were invariably linked as possible converts. Japan and Germany are now the only other major powers which are not members and they resigned.
