## WELCOME IN RIGHT SPIRIT

## ISLAND OF FROZEN AMMONIA ON JUPITER IS 30,000 MILES LONG

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., Nov. 22 (AP)—An island of solid, frozen ammonia, floating on a hydrocarbon sea is the new explanation of the famous red spot on the giant planet Jupiter given by astronomers.

The red spot, 30,000 miles long, 7,000 wide, when first seen in 1878, is today rounder than then, but just as vast. There has been no doubt that it was some sort of an island, for in the 56 years it has moved—floated—some 20,000 miles east and west and several thousand north and south.

The evidence for the reality of this grotesque sort of world on Jupiter is supplied by the known intense cold there and the spectroscopic which informs astro-physicists of the nature of the substances that reflect sunlight from Jupiter. This evidence is set forth by Dr. V. M. Slipher, of the Lowell observatory here and A. Adel, of the University of Michigan, in the physical review. At Michigan a giant tube was set up to be filled with gas and to simulate the depth of Jupiter's atmosphere and the immense pull of gravity upon it. In the Michigan tube the gas was compressed to times that of earth's atmospheric weight.

"The unanchored motion of Jupiter's great red spot suggests that it is an island of solid hydrocarbon, or ammonia, floating in a vast hydrocarbon ocean as extensive as the planet's surface itself."  
Pure ammonia is a gas. It becomes a liquid at about 28 below zero Fahrenheit. It freezes solid at about 103 below zero Fahrenheit. The hydrocarbons are most familiar on earth as constituents of petroleum and coal. In pure form many of them are gas at ordinary earth temperature. They liquefy with increasing cold and in this state might form Jupiter's queer hydrocarbon oceans.

## WOMAN SLAIN BY CHAUFFEUR POLICE CLAIM

### SHE REFUSED TO GIVE HIM \$10 TO BUY LIQUOR

MILLVILLE, N. J., Nov. 22 (AP)—A 31-year-old chauffeur's confession that he battered in his woman employer's skull with an automobile jack and propped her body against a tree at nearby Laurel Lake because she refused to give him \$10 to buy liquor was claimed by police today as the solution of the 4-day-old mystery of the slain woman in "black."

The chauffeur, George Pettit Jr. of City View Heights, near National Park, admitted the slaying, Police Superintendent Richard Haines said, within several hours of identification of the woman's body as that of his employer and neighbor, Mrs. Mathilda McGee, 55.

In a statement, Haines said Pettit blamed the slaying on a drinking party in which he, his father, George Sr., 65, of Porchtown, and an uncle, Harry, 57, joined Mrs. McGee in a Millville taproom on Sunday morning last.

An argument developed among the three men over how the woman could be forced to give him \$10 to pay for more drinks, Haines quoted the younger Pettit as saying, and it was finally agreed that they would take her "for a ride" from which she would not return unless the \$10 was forthcoming.

The four got into Mrs. McGee's automobile, the statement continued, and drove to Laurel Lake. There the woman was killed.

## Four Men Lose Lives In Great Lakes Accident

PORT HURON, Mich., Nov. 22 (AP)—The federal steamship inspection service started an investigation today of the season's first major ship accident of the Great Lakes, which cost the lives of four men.

The 5,300-ton freighter, Edward E. Loomis, the survivor of the crash, lay at the dock here with the bow stove in after making a hazardous trip down Lake Huron with Captain Alex McIntyre and 15 other survivors of the crew of the freighter W. C. Franz, which sank after colliding with the Loomis in a fog.

A. D. Reecer of Toronto, wireless operator on the Franz, told about the crash.

"The crew attempted to lower one boat with 12 men aboard," he said, "but the cable broke and the boat tipped over throwing the men into Lake Huron. That was the only life boat lowered. I swam a few strokes until I was able to cling to a ladder which was floating in the water. In about 20 minutes I was picked up by a life boat from the Loomis."

"The water was cold and very choppy, making swimming difficult. The boat took two hours to sink, going down first by the bow. I was on the Loomis by the time the Franz went down. None of us knew exactly what happened to cause the accident and none of us know exactly how our four shipmates lost their lives."

## Million Texans On Relief Rolls

AUSTIN, Nov. 22 (AP)—The near approach of winter today found the state relief organization as well fortified with food, clothing, fuel and bedding as its means have permitted.

E. A. Baugh, assistant director of relief, estimated there are now 250,000 families, or 1,000,000 persons, on the relief rolls in Texas.

During December, he said, the commission will authorize an increase in grants to take care of clothing needs. In October 93,500 garments were made in the sewing rooms of the organization in 208 counties and plans have been laid to step up the rate of production during November and the winter months.

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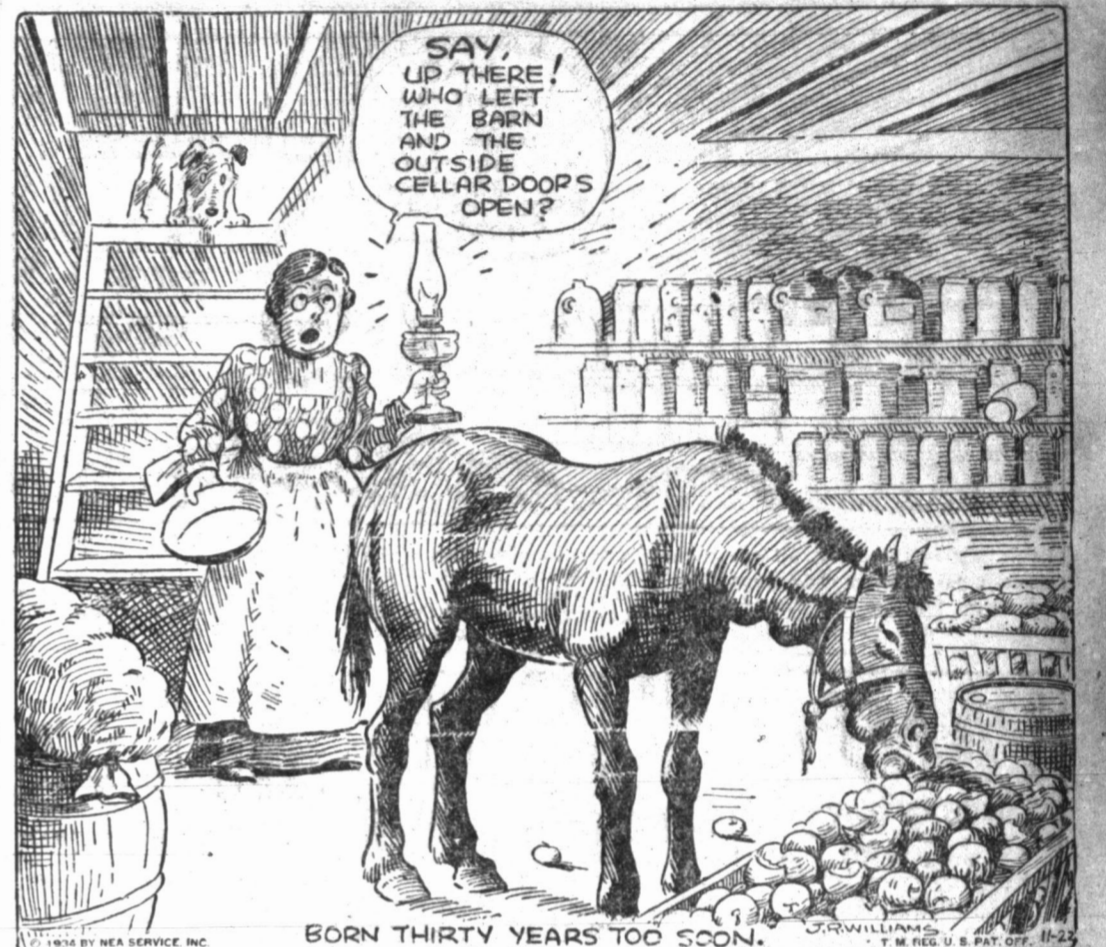

VAST PLATEAU IS DISCOVERED BY BYRD PILOT Area Believed To Be Link Between Ranges

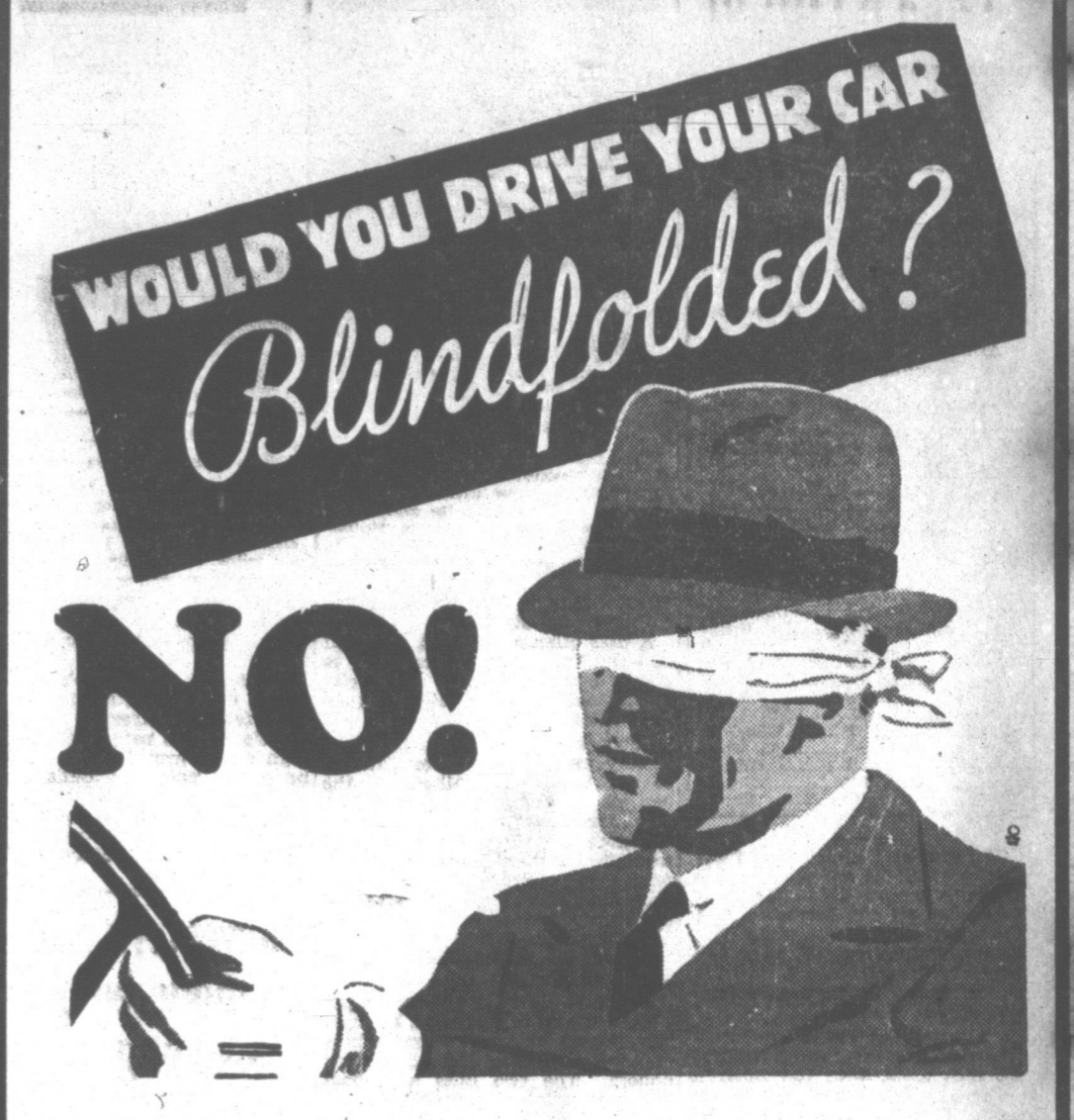
LITTLE AMERICA, Antarctica, Nov. 22 (via Mackey Radio) (P)—A vast new Plateau, "flat as the plains of Kansas," was added today to the maps of the Byrd expedition. Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd said he believed the area was the long-sought link between the Andes ranges of South America and the mountains of West Antarctica. The discovery was made by an aerial survey crew under Harold June, chief pilot. Members of the expedition said the flight broadens American claims in the area, east and south of the Edsel Ford range and adjoining Marie Byrd land. An airplane piloted by June traveled for some 270 miles over the plateau two days ago, on an eight-hour hop from headquarters. He did not fly completely across it. "As flat as the plains of Kansas," was the way June began a description of the area in a radio message to the base. But most of the glaciating land was at an elevation of 4,300 feet, spreading in all directions. The flight added to geographical information gained by Byrd on a flight Nov. 15 and extended and consolidated discoveries of two previous Byrd expeditions. In Admiral Byrd's opinion the discovery indicated the Andean Mountain system, which swings eastward in the vicinity of Tierra Del Fuego and runs in a sweeping curve under the southern ocean to Graham land, goes westward across the rim of West Antarctica to join the Edsel Ford range. A theory is held it may pass again under the sea and reappear in New Zealand. 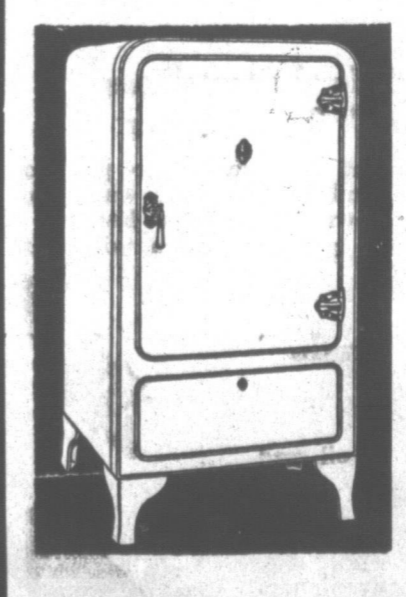
