During the holiday entertaining season, a spot of red, so long as it's not on the white tablecloth, is a welcome sight at any meal.

Winter Red Sherbet.

(Serves 4 to 6.) One pound cranberries, 2 cups water, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 3/4 cup orange juice, 1/2 cup pineapple juice, juice of 1 lemon, grated rind of 1 orange, pinch salt, 2 egg whites.

Baked Cranberry Pudding.

(Serves 6 to 8.) Two cups cranberries, 1 cup water, 1 1/8 cups sugar, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/8 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/2 cup coarsely chopped walnuts.

Wash and pick over cranberries. Place an 8-inch glass baking dish. Use the cleaned cranberries in it. Combine sugar and water, then pour over cranberries. Cover the dish and bake in moderately hot oven (400 deg. F.) for 45 minutes.

25 OIL FIELDS DISCOVERED IN COAST AREAS

HOUSTON, Dec. 27. (AP)—Twenty-five new commercial oil fields were brought in during 1937 in the upper and lower Texas coast areas.

It was a banner year for wild-catters with an average of two new fields a month coming in. Independents were responsible for most of the new fields with the major companies moving in later.

Five hundred thousand Texans found employment in the huge \$10,000,000,000 industry which has a payroll in this area of around \$720,000,000 annually.

The upper Texas coast area had 15 new fields developed and the lower coastal area 10. The new fields brought the number of producing areas in South Texas to 200 oil fields.

Even the submerged lands along the coast and in the Gulf of Mexico did not escape the drillers' bit. Wells were sunk in lakes, streams and along the edge of the Gulf.

New fields brought in in the upper Texas coast were Aldine, Friendswood, Big Hill, La Belle, North Creek, Call, Segno Sandy Point, Danbury Hitchcock, Garwood, Mauritz, Edna and Lost Mule.

In the lower Texas coast the new fields developed were Chapman Ranch, Mineral, Lamar, Luby, Midway, Sandia, Slick, South Burnell, Stratton and Strauch. Nueces county led in the volume of oil development.

Aside from the vast oil field development in the coastal area, the huge refineries at Houston, Baytown, Texas City, Fort Arthur, Beaumont and Ingleside were kept running full blast throughout the year except for the short-lived strike at the Shell refinery near Houston.

Petroleum and petroleum products were the chief exports of Texas during the year.

South Texas refineries handle crude oil piped from Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado, Wyoming and New Mexico. In addition much crude oil is imported from South American fields. More than half of the oil produced west of the Mississippi river is moved to the Houston district for refining and vessel movement.

New producing stratas in old fields were found in many sections of South Texas during 1937. The new sands revived lagging interest in many fields, particularly around the Victoria area, where explorations at the close of the year were being made.

The daily average South Texas production under Texas proration was 500,000 barrels.

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When Marines Turned Back Japanese



It was 2:30 on Saturday afternoon, Dec. 4, and history was being written as these Japanese soldiers started a triumphant "victory march" down Shanghai's bund and past the famous Palace hotel, where they are pictured above. The Japanese had taken Shanghai, they were marching onward toward Nanking, the heart of China. Proud, a little imperious, they marched. Suddenly there was a clattering hand grenade explosion in the ranks. Soldiers fell. Sharp commands barked out and green-coated men broke and scurried to nearby buildings.



That was a step too far. At 4:30 p. m., Col. C. F. E. Price (indicated by arrow) drove to Nanking and Yuyaching Roads, where he is pictured above telling Japanese officers that if they did not immediately clear all Japanese soldiers and barricades from the American defense sector, Colonel Price's U. S. marines would clear them out. The bayonet at left didn't intimidate the colonel. The Japanese commander apologized. In 10 minutes all encroachments in the American sector were gone. By 8:50 that night the Japanese had left the International Settlement.

U. S. RESIDENTS CAN BE EXECUTED BY JAPS

Japan today established rigid new laws for the conquered areas of China, making foreigners as well as Chinese subject to the death penalty for crimes against Japanese armed forces.

The new regulations, intended to strengthen Japan's hold on the areas she has taken, were promulgated as Japanese troops continued to advance both in North and South China.

Japanese reports said Tsinan, capital of Shantung province, had been captured. Other reports said seven Japanese war vessels were sighted off Tsinngao, Shantung seaport, ready to enforce a newly ordered blockade.

In Cheiang province, south of Shanghai, Japanese columns aimed at Pengwha, birth place of China's leader, Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek, and Ningpo, important Kanchow bay port.

The Spanish civil war continued active both at Madrid and Teruel, 135 miles east of the former capital.

Government advisers said insurgent troops and civilians held out in two towns. The couple will make their home in Canyon.

YOUTH CHARGED WITH ASSAULT TO MURDER

PALESTINE, Dec. 27. (AP)—Horace Lewis, Baylor University student, today suffered from serious knife wounds received when he stopped his automobile to purchase fire-crackers for a holiday celebration.

Marshall Morris, Palestine youth, was charged in Justice of the Peace Ira Cook's court with assault to murder and placed under \$2,500 bond. Physicians said Lewis may lose the sight of an eye.

EIGHT PERSONS HURT IN BUS-TRUCK CRASH

INDIAHOMA, Okla., Dec. 27. (AP)—Eight persons were injured, one critically, when a bus carrying 28 passengers collided with a truck taking 13 persons home from a Christmas celebration on a fog-blanketed highway three miles west of here last night.

Lawrence Reagan, Oklahoma City driver of the bus, said his machine ran into the rear of the parked truck when he was blinded by fog lights.

Miss Carrie Wheeler, 18, Snyder, Okla., the most seriously injured, was taken to a Lawton hospital with a fractured skull.

SIX SENTENCED CORDOBA, Argentina, Dec. 27. (AP)—Six men were sentenced to life imprisonment today for the sensational kidnaping and slaying of wealthy Abel Ayzert in 1932. Five other members of a band convicted for the crime were given prison terms ranging from 10 to 20 years. Three were women.

SCHOOLBOY INDICTED FOR ROBBERY, SLAYING

DALLAS, Dec. 27. (AP)—Schoolboy George McFall Nance Jr., 16, today was indicted for the slaying of Tom B. Cathy, 27, last November 30 which grew out of Nance's asserted desire to "get his automobile."

The grand jury also returned a robbery with firearms indictment. Defense attorneys Jimmy Martin and Leo Darley said they would file motions tomorrow seeking to transfer the case to juvenile court on the grounds that Nance is still of juvenile age.

District Attorney Andrew Patton was expected to contest transfer of the cases. Nance becomes of adult age on Feb. 18, 1938.

KILLED BY 22. BIG SPRING, Dec. 27. (AP)—Services were to be held here this afternoon for James Howard Lester, 8-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Lester, fatally injured Sunday afternoon when shot through the abdomen with a .22 calibre rifle. He was hunting with two young cousins when he and one of his companions reached simultaneously for the gun, a Christmas present, causing it to discharge. He died about an hour later.

Glorifying Yourself

To the girl who wants to know if spending time keeping young-looking is really worth while and why can't she just grow old peacefully and as nature intended anyway?

Look at the throats of a half a dozen older women. It won't be difficult at all to tell which have intelligently pampered their skins, which have just let nature take her course.

If beauty routines keep you young-looking, well-groomed and lovely, then they are worthwhile. If they occupy entirely too much of your time, become your chief topic of conversation, are something for which you neglect reading and conversation which makes for real thinking, then they are not worthwhile. One should strike some kind of happy middle ground, doing a few simple things to keep hair shining, skin smooth and as outlined as possible, yet not centering her life around creams and lotions or developing a complex about growing older. There is really much to be said for maturity. And old age, with its wealth of charm, tolerance and genuine understanding is wonderful.

CHICAGO GRAIN (CHICAGO, Dec. 27. (AP)—Big buying of corn futures was the outstanding feature of grain trading today, with Argentine corn prices skyrocketing ¼¢ cents a bushel. In Chicago corn rose 2½¢ cents maximum.

Renewed activity of export demand for United States corn brought out estimates that upwards of 1,000,000 bushels had been taken today for shipment overseas, and that only 18,000,000 bushels of corn remained in Argentina for export. At Buenos Aires, both January and February corn shot up to 80½¢ a bushel, nearly 20¢ over the December delivery price in Chicago.

At the close, Chicago corn futures were 1 cent to 2½¢ above Friday's finish, Dec. 21½¢, May 61¾¢, July 61-61½¢, wheat ¼-½¢ up, up 92½¢, July 88½¢, and oats ¼-½¢ advanced.

# Camera Goes On 'Last Mile' With Condemned Killer



Why does Carlos Garcia Martinez sit so dejectedly in his cell above? In a few minutes, he will say goodbye to his old pal, below, then goodbye to life.



An ingrate who murdered the woman who had sheltered and fed him, Martinez was doomed to die before the firing squad, the first slayer executed at Puebla, Mexico, since the revolution. Above he has reached the end of his "last mile." Nonchalantly smoking a cigarette, he surrenders to the prison keeper his few possessions.



Quickly Martinez' eyes are bandaged. He is backed against straw filled sacks, provided not for his comfort but to backstop bullets. His shirt slipped off his shoulders, he throws out his chest in a defiant gesture to death. So nerve wracking is the instant that the photographer's hands shake and blur the picture.



Only an instant does Martinez stand, braced for the death blow. A sharp command breaks the deathly silence. A dozen muskets crackle the prisoner's knell. He reels crazily, tries with a final dying effort to catch his balance, topples forward. An officer advances, pistol drawn, to snuff out any lingering spark of life.

## WOMAN JAILED IN SLAYING OF HER MOTHER

WARREN, Ohio, Dec. 27 (AP)—Miss Louise Campbell, 28, slim, blond granddaughter of a pioneer Ohio steelmaster, awaited today in jail here a call from authorities to describe the tragic Christmas eve party at which her mother was fatally shot.

Mrs. Cordelia Campbell, 55, daughter-in-law of the late James A. Campbell, former head of the Youngstown Sheet & Tube Co., fell with a bullet wound in her abdomen Christmas eve in the Campbell mansion north of Youngstown. She died Sunday.

Trumbull County Detective Joseph Luarde questioned servants and a few guests in the home. He said he hoped an inquest scheduled by Coroner J. C. Henshaw for today would "clear up the circumstances of the shooting."

Luarde said he was "not satisfied" with what he had been able to learn about the shooting. He said Mrs. Campbell apparently was shot when she attempted to take a gun from her daughter after the daughter had fired it once in the house.

Prosecutor Paul J. Regan said the inquiry indicated that "Miss Campbell had been drinking before the shooting."

No charges were filed against her. She was described by Prosecutor Regan as being "pretty well un-nerved" by the events of the tragic Christmas party and her subsequent experiences in the jail.

She was taken to the jail after giving blood for her mother in a transfusion operation at Youngstown hospital.

## 7TH CHINESE CAPITAL TAKEN BY JAPANESE

SHANGHAI, Dec. 27. (AP)—The Japanese army tonight announced the complete occupation of Tsinan, capital of Shantung province and the seventh Chinese provincial capital to fall to Japanese forces.

Tsinan was the objective of one of several Japanese columns that swarmed across the Yellow river over the week-end with the evident purpose of adding all Shantung to Japan's zone of conquest.

Nearly 300 Americans remained at Tsingtao, ready to take refuge on three American warships in the harbor if necessary. Yesterday the Japanese navy announced a blockade of Tsingtao to Chinese shipping.

Americans were made subject to the death penalty today for crimes against Japan's armed forces under a Japanese decree establishing rigid law for China's conquered areas.

New rules and regulations for all persons, "including the nationals of third powers," in Japanese-controlled areas apparently raised the question of the treaty rights of other foreign powers in China.

A Japanese spokesman acknowledged that the measures put Americans and other foreigners under Japanese military law which provided, among other things, death for acts against Japan's armed forces.

A Japanese embassy spokesman said foreign embassies had not been informed of the regulations which would abridge extra-territorial rights.

Authoritative sources said Japan also had requested foreign embassies, the American among them, not to reopen immediately their offices at Nanking, captured Chinese capital.

The request may prevent the reopening of the United States Embassy. The United States gunboat Oahu had been ordered ready to sail up the Yangtze river Tuesday with Consuls John B. Allison and James Epsy to reopen the embassy.

Any issue over the new regulations or crimes against the Japanese armed forces, the embassy spokesman declared, would be between Japan and the third power because China, no longer in control of the territory covered by the rules, would be unable to fulfill her treaty obligations.

Americans and other foreigners living in Japanese-occupied areas, he said, will be subject hereafter to the usual legal restrictions under extraterritorial treaties and ten new regulations. These rules against "subversive activities," violation of which would be punishable under Japanese military law, cover:

1. Hostile acts against Japan's armed forces.
2. Espionage.
3. Endangering or causing bodily harm to persons belonging to Japan's armed forces.
4. Interfering with or destroying any communications line.
5. Destroying electricity or water supply systems.
6. Stealing or destroying arm or munitions.
7. Using poison bacteria with intent to harm Japan's armed forces.
8. All other activities designed to disturb the peace of the armed forces.
9. Planning, instigating or assisting in any of the proscribed activities.
10. Harboring persons engaged in them.

## TEXAS SCHOOLS RECEIVE MORE AID IN '37 THAN EVER BEFORE

### DEATH TAKES NEWTON BAKER

AUSTIN, Dec. 27 (AP)—From the "Little Red Schoolhouse" to the oil-rich state university, Texas schools received more financial aid from the state government in 1937 than ever before.

86¢ per capita apportionment to public elementary and high schools for the year starting last September is 22, three dollars greater than in any previous 12-month period. Since the state has \$1,506,544 children of school age (six to seventeen, inclusive) that means an increase of approximately \$4,700,000.

Texas apparently will be able to pay that large a per capita by the close of the fiscal year, notwithstanding the state ad valorem tax for school purposes was trimmed from 20 to 16 cents on the \$100 valuation. Oil, which pays a production tax of 2 3/4 per cent of value, is the big reason.

Three years ago the per capita apportionment was only \$16.50. School people already have started talking of a \$25 allotment in 1938 or 1939.

The legislature last spring appropriated an additional \$1,080,000 for rural school aid for the 1935-37 biennium. The regular allotment for the 1937-39 biennium is \$11,000,000, higher by \$1,000,000 than ever before.

The rise in financial support of the higher educational institutions was even more marked. The appropriation for colleges for the current fiscal year aggregates \$8,694,886. That for the first year of the preceding biennium was only \$5,564,681. Continued enrollment gains were partly responsible for the big increase.

According to the scholastic census rolls, Texas has only 4,117 more school age children than in 1930. Education department officials say the rolls are not an accurate index, however, because a few years ago they contained many names which should not have been listed.

Two of the outstanding trends of 1937 were increasing interest in vocational education and school district consolidations. Still more consolidations would be beneficial, in the opinion of State Superintendent L. A. Woods. He says administrative expense thereby would be reduced and educational opportunities more nearly equalized.

## SCOUT NEWS

## NEW CHEMICAL HEALS SERIOUS BURNS QUICKLY

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 27 (AP)—A mysterious new chemical made by injured yeast cells, which heals terrific burns quickly and without scars, was reported to the American Association for the Advancement of Science here today.

The chemical, a watery fluid, grows fresh, normal skin over the burned areas, instead of the usual, tightly-drawn, disfiguring scar tissue. It gets the victims out of the hospital, the association was told, faster than any other remedy.

It is a by-product of discovery of a new principle of tissue growth found at the Institution Divi-Thomae, of Cincinnati the discoveries were made by George Sperry Spertl, John R. Louwborow, John C. Fardon, Andre Cuetio and Elton Cook.

The burn remedy is one of several seemingly miraculous effects on growth, and the only one which has been applied to human beings. The treatment for burns has been tried for about a year at St. Mary's hospital in Cincinnati.

To prepare the chemical, yeast is mixed with a salt solution and subjected to lethal ultra-violet rays. The yeast cells are not killed immediately, but are injured continuously for at least an hour.

Then the liquid is filtered off and contains the unknown new chemical.

The chemical is non-living, because if the yeast liquid is boiled, the vapor collected from it still contains the healing principle.

Evidence that here is a new principle of nature is found in the fact that not only yeast, but other living cells, if injured long enough, will manufacture growth stimulating chemicals. Each chemical is different, with power to cause rapid growth of new cells of the same kind that were destroyed.

Thus with an extract from injured liver cells, the Cincinnatians caused a bit of liver in a test tube to grow new cells. "This kind of growth of liver is a new scientific feat. No tests have been made to find out whether such an extract could be used in the living body to cause a partly destroyed liver to replace itself."

## 'CUSTER'S LAST STAND' RE-ENACTMENT FATAL

REDLANDS, Calif., Dec. 27. (AP)—Injuries he received in a comic re-enactment of Custer's last stand proved fatal to Lew Shaw, 29, of San Pedro, the coroner reported today.

Shaw was stabbed accidentally, the coroner was informed, when he and E. S. Duffy, playing the parts of General Custer and Sitting Bull, fell over a radio bench during a Yucalpa party Dec. 19.

Shaw died yesterday.

## Bob McCoy's Auto Found at Matador

Police Chief Art Hurst spent Christmas day en route to and from Matador where he recovered a Buick coupe belonging to Bob McCoy.

The car was stolen Monday night between 7:30 and 8:30 o'clock from where it had been parked in the 100 block on East Kingsmill avenue.

A youth has been arrested in connection with the theft but no charges have been filed. The car had been driven 1,500 miles and one fender had been damaged, Mr. McCoy said.

## 2 MILLIONS IN DIVIDENDS TO BE RECEIVED

LITTLE ROCK, Ark.—Special—Dividends through December 31, in excess of two million dollars will be received by the 43,470 shareholders in the 112 insured savings and loan associations in Texas, according to figures just compiled by the Federal Home Loan Bank.

The current year has been a very satisfactory one for the Texas associations which have been quite active in the home financing field. In the past five months they have made 3,777 home loans aggregating \$7,019,456. Of these, 1,750 loans, aggregating \$3,515,000 were for new construction and repairs of Texas homes. Since July 1, the Texas associations have made 1,011 loans totaling \$1,942,000 to assist owners in the purchase of their homes.

The aggregate loans in November for the five states of Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, and New Mexico, comprising the Ninth Federal Home Loan Bank District, were \$2,910,000, being \$370,000 less than the total for the month of October. This decrease is in keeping with the expected seasonal decline in building activities.

The First Federal Savings and Loan Association in Pampa whose shares are insured, had a substantial gain in assets during the year, the bank stated, and their figures are included in the report.

Officials of the bank said the current newspaper advertising campaign has resulted in better informed the public and increased protection afforded savers through insurance up to \$5,000 for each account by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation. They said this added safety doubtless has been responsible for much of the increased volume of new investments received, which since July 1, in the entire district, amount to \$9,399,810.

## SENATORS WILL BATTLE FOR CONTROL OF PARTY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27. (AP)—Some senate Democrats forecast today that an open battle for control of the party would develop between liberal and conservative legislators during the coming session of congress.

Although unwilling to be quoted by name, they predicted the present division would carry over into the 1940 national convention.

Seriousness of the party split was acknowledged generally by congressional Democrats in private conversation. Most of them deplored it, but some said they welcomed it as a means of bringing a realignment of parties along more realistic lines.

Possible long-ranged results of the division were outlined differently by almost everyone discussing the subject. Many believed that President Roosevelt's course during the next three years would be the determining factor.

The belief in some quarters that the fight would be carried on more openly during the next congressional session was based on two factors — the number of controversial issues coming before the legislators, and the approaching off-year elections.

Administration friends have made no secret of President Roosevelt's intention to continue his fight for wage-hour legislation, blocked earlier this month by southern Democrats in the house.

DALLAS, Dec. 27. (AP)—Touted almost from the start, Longview's Lobos, powerful East Texas entry, today held the Texas interscholastic football title after a 19-12 Christmas day victory over Wichita Falls.

The Lobos, led by Dandy Dick Miller, a loose-hipped back, were forced to rally to bring in the title. Wichita Falls took advantage of two breaks in the first period to roll up a 12-0 lead, mainly due to Harold Fleming's sturdy play, but Longview came back with crushing offensive power to pile up three scores and threaten many other times.

HOLLYWOOD, Dec. 27. (AP)—Tyler Brooke, 49, film comedian and former musical comedy favorite, was threatened today for what police reported as an overdose of sleeping powders. 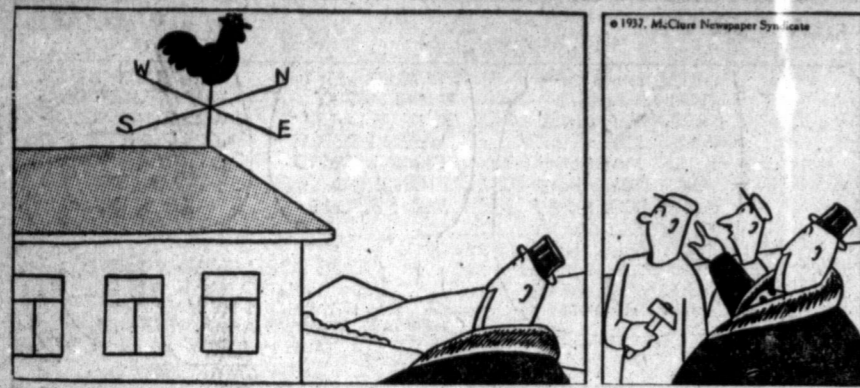

### Today's Answers to Cranium Crackers

### MALE CHARACTERISTICS IN AGED WOMAN HALTED

**SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 27 (AP)—**How a rare operation halted the development of male characteristics in a 61-year-old woman was revealed here today in records of the University of California Medical School.

The operation, performed several months ago on an unidentified patient, called for removal of an ovarian tumor.

Before submitting to the operation, performed at the university hospital here by an unidentified surgeon, the woman said growth of hair on her face had become so pronounced she found it necessary to shave daily.

Her voice became deep-toned and hoarse, her shoulders broadened, and her hair showed marked recession at the temples common to males.

Eighteen days after the operation, the patient was discharged. Four months later, the medical school reported, examination disclosed her facial contours had softened, the body hirsutism had definitely diminished and the voice had lost its masculine timbre.

### BOMBING OF GUNBOAT IS 'CLOSED INCIDENT'

**WASHINGTON, Dec. 27 (AP)—**The State Department indicated today it considered a "closed incident" the international situation arising from the bombing of the gunboat Panay, although the indemnity remains to be fixed.

Officials made it plain that this government would watch closely to see Japan carries out its assurances that there would be no unlawful interference with American nationals and interests in China.

Secretary Hull, replying Saturday to Japan's promises of respect for American rights in China, said the United States considered them "responsive" to its protests and demands.

State Department officials said the amount of indemnification would not be determined for some time. Besides the property loss resulting from the bombing, three men were killed and several seriously wounded.

Japan was described in Japanese circles here as ready to pay whatever figure the United States set.

While apparently closing the incident, Hull's note Saturday implied strongly that the United States could not accept Japan's explanation that the bombings were caused by mistaking the American vessels for Chinese craft.

After noting this explanation, he said the United States would "continue to rely" on the findings of its naval court of inquiry.

## LETTER 'Y'S SINGLE CLUE IN KIDNAPING

**TACOMA, Dec. 27 (AP)—**A scrawled letter "Y" today was the single clue leading United States law officers on the cold, year-old trail of the kidnap-killer of Charles Mattson, 10.

In the Washington state capital at Olympia, a staff of federal bureau of investigation agents s thumbed through mountainous records, hoping to find somewhere among the automobile license applications, tax returns and labor records another "Y" corresponding to the letter noticed in a stolen demand received by the boy's parents.

Their activity was the only visible sign that search for the killer was still alive on the anniversary of the kidnapping in this city a year ago today. Even that activity, in progress for months past, was revealed only by casual sources. The FBI itself continued the "no comment" attitude it has maintained since the physician's son was stolen from his father's home. Charles' beaten and nude body was found 15 days later in an Everett, Wash., snow thicket, after attempts to pay the \$28,000 ransom had failed.

Despite the detention for questioning of hundreds of men, from Maine to California, no one has ever been charged with any part in the crime.

Entered are 12 Oklahoma teams, including Oklahoma A. & M., defending Missouri Valley conference titles, and winners of last year's tournament, and Tulsa University, another Missouri Valley loop team.

Seven teams are entered from Texas, including the Rice Owls and Baylor's Bears, of the Southwest Conference. Another conference member, Arkansas, also is entered.

Some of the boys passed up single wings for turkey wings over the week-end, but all were back at work today or speeding to the scenes of the various games.

Here are the latest developments from Pasadena to Miami:

Rose Bowl—Alabama, unbeaten in the Rose Bowl, takes the odds favoring California lightly. Observers on the coast continued to marvel at the Crimson Tide's fighting spirit as shown in practice. The Tide had the day off yesterday but was back at work today. California, after a week-end vacation, also returned to action.

Sugar Bowl—Santa Clara, after a final two and a half hour on the home field, set out for New Orleans and the game with Louisiana State. The Broncos reported improvement in the condition of Everett Fisher, injured fullback, and Bryce Brown, end. They will be able to play Saturday.

Cotton Bowl—The only ailing member of Colorado University's squad, Ray Tomilson, was back in harness. He understands Whizzer White, the Buffaloes' all-America back. Colorado went through a brief drill yesterday and Rice, after a three-day layoff, returned to the practice field today.

Orange Bowl—Auburn's squad of 36 started drills after a ten-day vacation. Coach Jack Meagher warned the players they could expect a scrimmage session Wednesday. All members of the squad took their football shoes home with them and worked out during the vacation.

Michigan State, journeying to Miami, scene of the game, by easy stages arrived yesterday and will drill today. Charles Nelson and Frank Gaines, ends, were injured during the last drill at Gainesville, Fla. Nelson has his knee in a cast and Gaines has an injured hand.

Sun Bowl—West Virginia inaugurates secret practice with today's drill. The Mountaineers will stress offensive formations during the week's workout after a day off yesterday. Texas Tech, the Mountaineers' opponent, has been training steadily since renewing practice last week.

East-West—No rest for these boys. The West scrimmaged yesterday with Grant Stone, Stanford end, shifted from the right to the left flank, as the Westerners will run most of their plays from an unbalanced single wing formation to the right. The Easterners had a long scrum Saturday against a pickup team from Oakland.

# Armstrong Named Two-Class Champ

NEW YORK, Dec. 27 (AP)—There's an argument brewing in fistic circles that promises to continue until next summer when Lou Ambers defends his lightweight championship against Dusky Henry Armstrong of Los Angeles, the featherweight king.

The ring magazine, announcing results of its poll of the world's boxing writers on the top fighting men for 1937, conceded Ambers' crown to Armstrong without a blow having been struck. Ambers' following isn't going to like that.

So struck were the 393 participating fight experts by Armstrong's record of 27 straight victories—26 knockouts—that they not only nominated him top featherweight but went right on to name him the best lightweight.

The lightweight award was surprising. Armstrong only recently began taking on some of the better 135-pounders, whereas Ambers has for a year held the title without much difficulty.

The projected meeting of Armstrong and Ambers therefore becomes the second most attractive battle on the 1937 schedule, out-ranked only by the Schmelling-Louis tussle.

The ring's poll offers no other surprises to speak of, Ambers being the only champion not listed at the top of his division. Joe Louis' strong comeback enabled him to poll 354 votes to 41 for Max Schmelling.

# College Football Powers in Powow

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 27 (AP)—The men who rule the collegiate athletic world began arriving today for their annual huddles on everything from rules to gate receipts.

First of the 1,500 coaches, athletic directors and assistants to arrive was Coach C. E. "Tiny" Thornhill of Stanford University.

He said he thought the game was getting "stagnated" and that "the defense is getting the best of it."

The National Collegiate Athletic association will open its 32nd annual convention tomorrow night. Athletic directors will debate through Thursday such topics as financial aid and control of inter-collegiate sports.

The coaches convention will convene Wednesday. The gridiron mentors will view motion pictures of play development and great plays of former years.
