

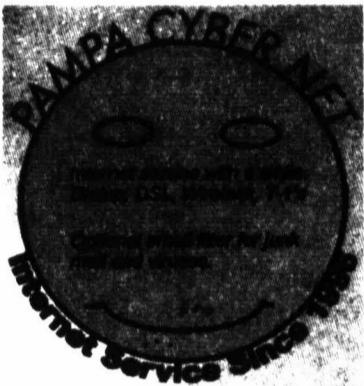

Superman? It's Super-intendent!

After meeting with a cross section of the community last week, consultants hired to help Pampa's school board find a new superintendent unveiled a set of desired characteristics that comes close to being Superman.

Kathee Lupton, field service representative for Texas Association of School Boards, presented the results of the focus group meetings conducted Feb. 12 and 13 at the school board February meeting Thursday night.

Approximately 98 persons submitted written input, she reported, and the

consultants met with 82 individuals personally. Lupton and Don Killough, director of TASB's Superintendent Search Services met with administrators, faculty, parents, students, support staff and other community residents.

After Lupton's presentation, Assistant Superintendent Mark McVay reported on the status of the 2003-2004 budget and average daily attendance. "I don't think we have anything in here for kryptonite," he quipped, drawing a laugh from meeting-goers.

"It should be noted that every community has diverse expectations and desires," the consultants' report said in summary. "No one individual is ever

able to meet or address all the expectations of a community which has divergent opinions and beliefs ... The task that the board and TASB face is to find an individual with many of these desired skills and characteristics and the experience and personality necessary to address the opportunities and challenges awaiting the next leader of the Pampa Independent School District."

These are the 10 qualities the community seems to want most in a school superintendent as gleaned by the consultants from the community's responses:

- Is an effective communicator with

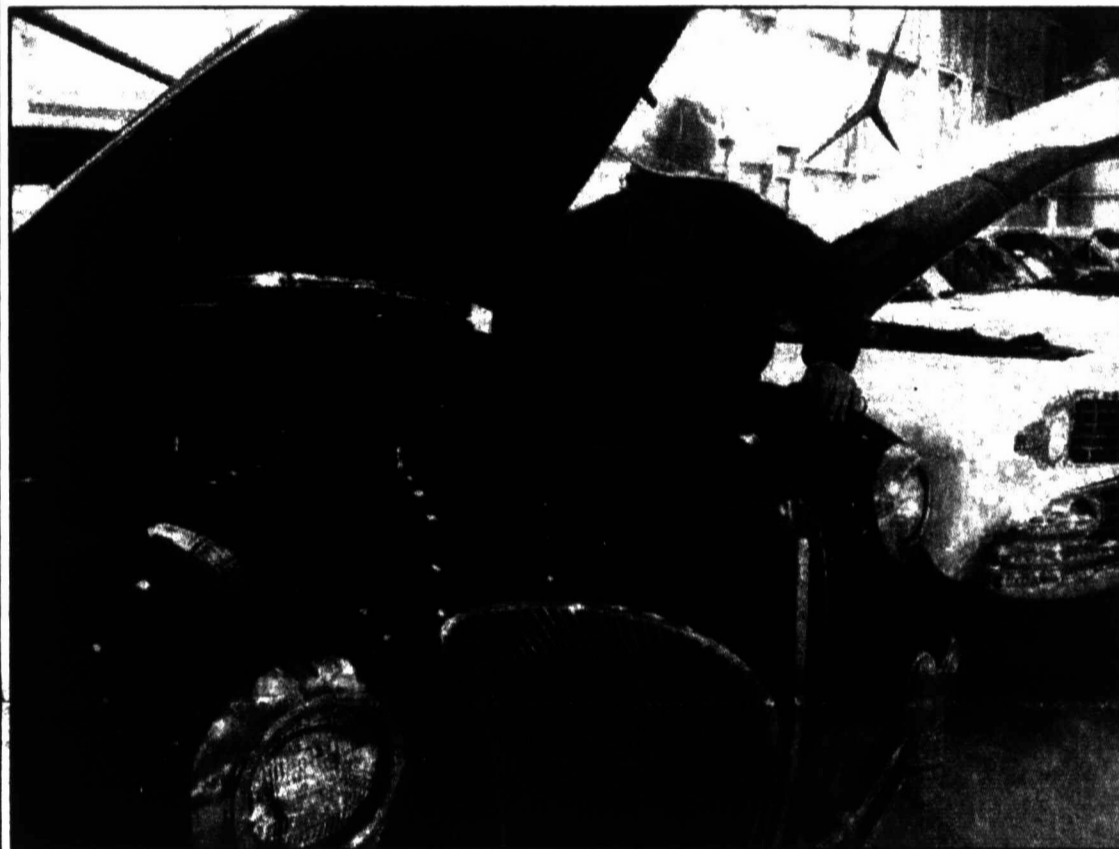
superior interpersonal skills who can make and defend difficult decisions that are best for students:

- Demonstrates a successful record of fiscal planning, management, and projecting future needs;

- Is an education leader with a comprehensive view of education, has proven successful in increasing achievement levels of all students, and has a firm commitment to the full development of all children;

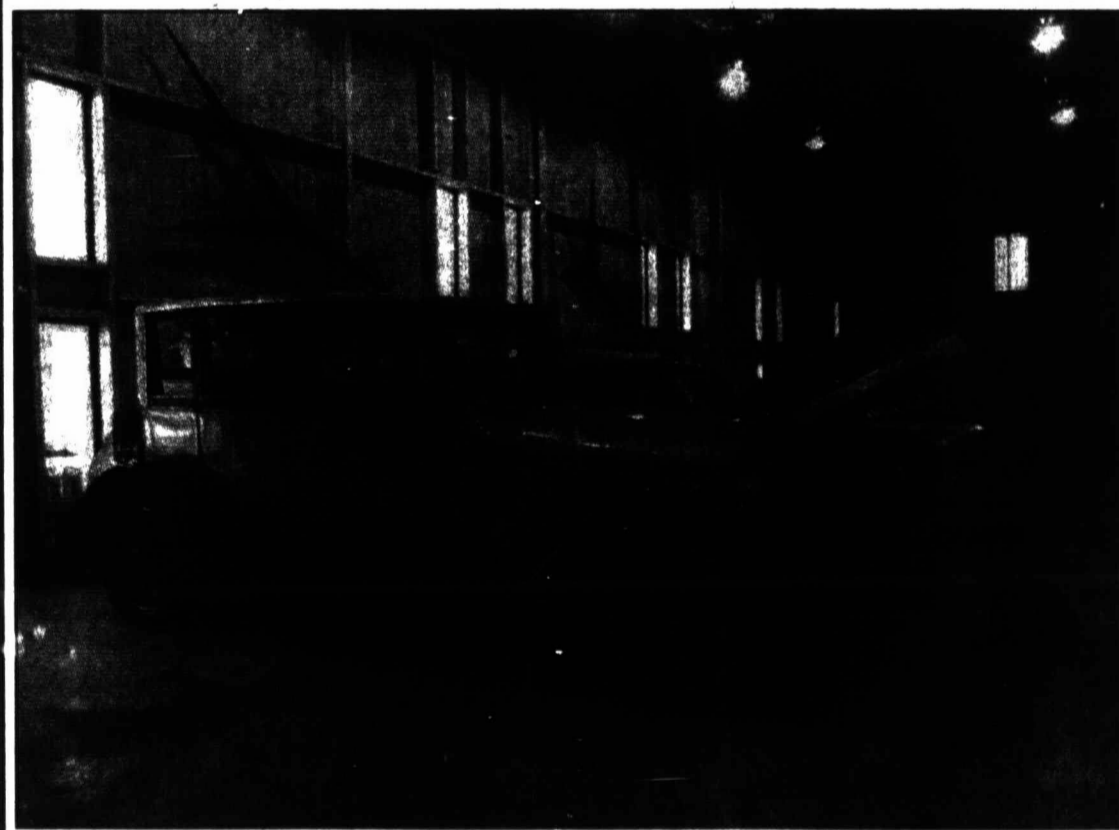
- Is a visionary leader with the ability to build broad consensus in support of district goals, and to plan strategi-

Million-dollar auction starts

Almost 400 automobiles go on the block Saturday and Sunday as a Pampa man's collection of Lincolns is auctioned off.

Rod Egan, chief operating officer of RM Classic Cars, who is holding the auction for the estate of J.C. Daniels, said he expects the proceeds to top a million dollars.

The 388 vehicles are from the collection of J.C. Daniels, a former Lincoln-Mercury dealer in Pampa.

The cars will be auctioned off Saturday and Sunday, beginning at 10 a.m. each day, at the warehouse Daniels built for them at 410 S. Price Road.

Bidders are expected from as far away as Sweden and Germany.

"And every where from New York to California," Egan said.

Some of the bidders have pre-registered and will be on the telephone.

"They will bid over the phones," Egan said. "We have a lot of phone bidders. There are some people that are phone bidders from the East Coast that can't fly in here because of the weather."

Egan refused to confirm rumors that television stars Jay Leno and Tim Allen were expected at the auction, but did acknowledge that they were auto enthusiasts and might have representatives here.

He told an Associated Press reporter Thursday that he had been in contact with the two celebrities.

Egan said the cars include a rare 1938 Lincoln K Willoughby limousine.

"That's an early V-12 car that's quite a great car," Egan said.

There's also a 1941 Lincoln Zephyr V-12 that belonged to actress Gene Tierney and a 1962 Presidential parade-style four-door Lincoln Continental convertible.

Daniels, before his death in 2000, used to tell friends that it was the car in which then Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson was riding the day President John F. Kennedy was assassinated in Dallas.

Egan said that while that may have been true, he could find no documentation to support the claim and can't represent it as an auto with such a history.

"Whoever buys the car, if they research it and prove it, that would be great deal for them," Egan said.

The cars range from fully-restored to parts cars.

"Every car will sell," Egan said. "Even the ones that have been parked out in the field for 15 years."

The oldest car in the lot is a 1922 Lincoln sedan.

Roy Allen, a Lincoln enthusiast from Amarillo, stood in the warehouse Thursday afternoon admiring the 1922 Lincoln that goes up for sale Saturday.

"That's the year that Henry were auto enthusiasts and might have representatives here."

He said Edsel Ford, Henry Ford's son, wanted a luxury car line.

NATO orders surveillance planes to Turkey

Troops build up in the Gulf region

NATO ordered AWACS surveillance planes to Turkey, a key part of preparations for a possible war with Iraq, the alliance announced Friday, while U.N. officials said Saddam Hussein is still not fully cooperating with inspections.

As the United States and Britain worked on a new resolution on Iraq — to be presented to the U.N. Security Council as soon as Monday — Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld said there are now enough troops in place in the Persian Gulf to

go to war.

Iraq allowed a flight by an American U-2 spy plane to search for banned weapons for the second time this week. And chief U.N. inspector Hans Blix planned to send a letter to Iraq on Friday demanding the destruction of Baghdad's Al-Samoud 2 missiles and related machinery.

Rumsfeld told PBS' "NewsHour with Jim Lehrer" that U.S. and British forces massed around Iraq are ready to go to war if President Bush

orders action.

"I would characterize it as ample," Rumsfeld said Thursday of the number of troops positioned in the area.

A majority of the 15 U.N. Security Council members have said they are opposed to war, at least until Blix issues a new report on March 1. On Friday, two French Mirage IV surveillance planes left for the Middle East to help U.N. inspectors in Iraq.

The Iraqi Foreign Ministry said the U.S. surveillance plane spent six

hours and 20 minutes over Iraq's territory. Iraq had initially resisted the patrols by U.S. and British planes but relented as pressure mounted to cooperate.

A U.N. spokesman said Baghdad had also submitted a list of 83 people reportedly involved in the destruction of material from its biological and missile programs. Officials said Iraq still hasn't provided enough information about nuclear, chemical, biological and long-range missile operations.

"Clearly Iraq needs to do more by way of cooperating, particularly on

STATEWIDE

Heavy rain will continue to fall today in Central and Southeast Texas. North Texas should begin to see some significant rain.

Austin recorded nearly three inches of rain Thursday and four inches were recorded in Bryan. A flash flood watch is in effect for all of Southeast Texas today as 1-3 more inches of rain are expected. The Hill Country and south central Texas will see up to three more inches in some areas, with some severe storms, but rain is likely to end there this morning.

A flash flood watch is also in effect today for far East Texas, and central North Texas including Dallas/Fort Worth and Waco. The Coastal Bend and deep south Texas could see some severe thunderstorms today, although rain will not be widespread. The Edwards Plateau will also be under a flash flood watch today.

In West Texas it will be mostly cloudy today with highs in the 50s. In far West Texas, rain is

possible early today. In central West Texas, rain is likely this morning and possible this afternoon.

In southern West Texas, rain is likely all day, with severe thunderstorms and heavy rain possible. Saturday will be breezy and sunnier, with highs in the 60s, and no precipitation in the forecast. Sunday, a cold front will move into the Panhandle, with highs dropping into the mid 40s north, but temperatures will be only slightly cooler than Saturday in the south and west. Monday will be colder and cloudier except in the far west, with a slight chance of rain or snow. Monday's highs will be in the 30s in the Panhandle, 30s and 40s farther south. Tuesday will be cloudy and slightly warmer over most of the region.

South Texas will be rainy this morning in central areas and rainy all day southeast, with flash flood watches in effect. Severe thunderstorms are possible, with up to three inches of rain in some areas.

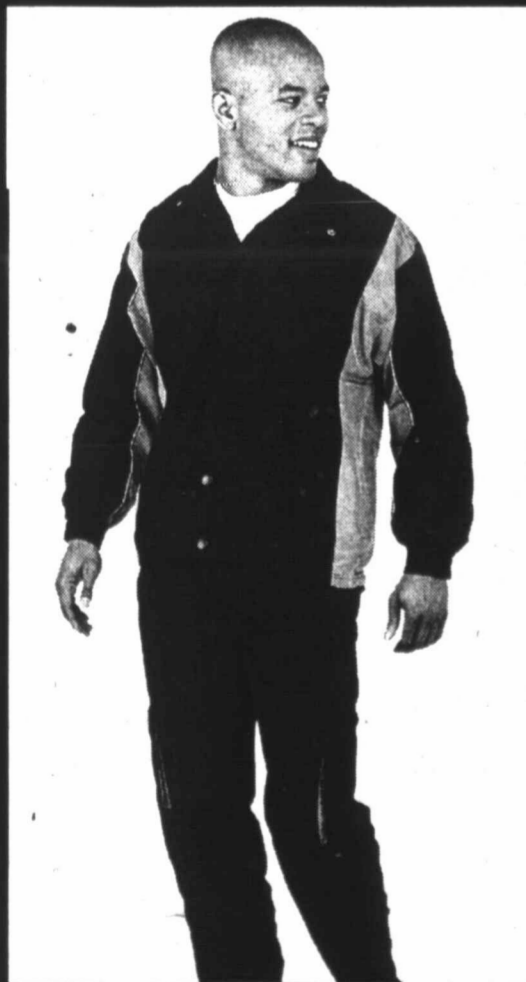

Columbia disaster probe focuses on how foam insulation applied

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — The Columbia accident investigation board is focusing swiftly and intently on how foam insulation was applied to NASA's space shuttles — territory with a troubled track record.

One leading theory is the insulation or the heavier material beneath may have damaged Columbia during liftoff, enough to trigger a deadly breach as the spaceship hurtled toward a Florida landing Feb. 1.

The foam insulation is applied at a Lockheed Martin plant in New Orleans. More of the foam is applied about a month before liftoff in several small areas of the tank needing touchup at NASA's Kennedy Space Center in Florida.

The investigation board has visited both sites and is going back for a second, harder look at the techniques — and safeguards — used.

"That is getting a good bit of attention by more than one of the groups," said NASA's Steve Nesbitt, referring to the board's three working groups. "A couple of the groups are looking at the thermal protection on the tank in this area, and some of them will be going back to see the manufacturing facilities, to talk to the people involved. So it is getting some special attention."

Nesbitt said Thursday the theories that focus on the left side of Columbia — where all the overheating and other problems developed — "will be getting the earliest attention." The board suspects a breach in the left wing led to the shuttle's breakup. 1. All seven astronauts were killed.

Friday morning, searchers gathered in Caliente, Nev., to search the desert hills for what is believed to be a piece of Columbia debris that was tracked falling to Earth by air traffic control radar.

Imagery, trajectory and ballistics experts have been analyzing video images of the shuttle as it flew across California and the Southwest. National Transportation Safety Board officials are using those findings to hunt for any unusual radar trackings in an attempt to pinpoint wreckage.

About 25,000 pounds of Columbia debris is now at Kennedy.

Air Force Maj. Gen. John Barry said earlier this week he and other board members are reviewing NASA's troubled history of foam coming off the so-called bipod area, where a

pair of struts holds the tank to the upper belly of the shuttle.

That is the spot where a chunk of foam came off 81 seconds into Columbia's flight Jan. 16; the debris slammed into the left wing during launch. An engineering analysis days later concluded any damage was minimal and posed no safety threat.

NASA officials said that finding was based, in part, on the fact that previous foam impacts had not caused severe damage.

Barry said four previous shuttle launches had foam falling from the bipod area: Challenger in 1983, Columbia in 1990 and 1992, and Atlantis last October.

Last week, the board inspected Atlantis and its fuel tank at Kennedy and a completely assembled fuel tank at Michoud Assembly Facility in New Orleans that is identical to the one used by Columbia on its doomed flight. The Michoud tank has been impounded by the board for testing.

NASA estimates the chunk of broken foam was 2.67 pounds and 20-by-16-by-6 inches. The weight would be more if ice were attached, a possibility under consideration by the board. The panel also is looking into whether the underlayer may have come off.

Barry said he has learned the heavier pre-molded, ablative material beneath the foam "really doesn't serve a purpose." He asked workers whether moisture could have accumulated there and loosened the insulation.

"We're looking at that as maybe an option on why the foam came off and why we've had some problems in that area," he said.

NASA chief Sean O'Keefe confirmed Thursday that one theory being tested by NASA investigators at Michoud is that air bubbles or ice formed under the silicone-based ablator, possibly causing insulation to break free.

O'Keefe also acknowledged that design changes were being considered for this suspect area of the fuel tank before Columbia's flight, but he stressed they were "very minor."

"Certainly, at this point right now, no one is making any changes to any designs until we find out what was the cause or the probable cause of this accident," he said.

At Michoud, polyurethane foam insulation is sprayed robotically about an inch thick over the entire 154-foot tank to prevent ice buildup on the metal tank, which is filled with super-cold liquid hydrogen and oxygen during the final hours of the countdown.

At least 65 dead, 160-plus hurt in Rhode Island nightclub fire

WEST WARWICK, R.I. (AP) — A nightclub erupted in a raging fire during a pyrotechnics display at a rock concert, killing at least 65 people and injuring more than 160 others as frantic mobs rushed to escape.

The death toll rose Friday as firefighters searched through the charred shell of the one-story wood building. Town Manager Wolfgang Bauer said the number of dead had reached 65 by midday.

"They are still pulling bodies out," Gov. Don Carcieri said after rushing back to the state from a conference in Florida.

It was the deadliest U.S. fire since nearly 80 people died in the 1993 inferno at the Branch Davidian compound near Waco, Texas. It also came less than a week after 21 people were killed in a stampede at a Chicago nightclub.

The entire club was engulfed in flames within three minutes, fire chief Charles Hall said. Club capacity was 300, but Hall said fewer people than that were inside the building.

The '80s hard rock band Great White had just started playing Thursday night when giant pyrotechnic sparklers on stage began shooting up and ignited the ceiling above them and soundproofing near the stage. Some in the crowd said they thought it was part of the act, but the fire quickly spread through the low-ceilinged building, filling it with thick, black smoke.

Robin Petrarca, 44, was

standing within a few feet of a door, but said she couldn't see the exit because of the billowing smoke. In the rush to escape, she fell and was trampled, but made it out.

"There was nothing they could do, it went up so fast," she said.

Hall said the club, called The Station, had recently passed a fire inspection, but didn't have a city permit for pyrotechnics. The building, which is at least 60 years old, was not required to have a sprinkler system because of its small size.

Most of the bodies were found near the club's front exit, some of them burned and others dead from smoke inhalation. Hall said some appeared to have been trampled in the rush to escape.

"They tried to go out the same way they came in. That was the problem," Hall said. "They didn't use the other three fire exits."

More than 100 people were taken to area hospitals after Thursday's blaze, Bauer said. Many were taken to Rhode Island Hospital and 38 remained there Friday, 14 of them in critical condition.

"This program will allow our faculty and students to pursue opportunities in interdisciplinary research in agriculture that is not available at any other university in Texas or the southwestern United States."
 As it was proposed, West Texas A&M's doctoral candidates will be trained in a "systems approach" to problem solving that will incorporate aspects of agribusiness and economics, animal science and plant, soil and environmental science. It will be the only doctoral program in Texas with this particular multi-disciplinary approach. Only Iowa State University has a Ph.D. program remotely similar, Clark said.
 "Our doctoral students will conduct research that will assist in answering real challenges that are facing the agricultural industry in the High Plains of Texas," Clark said. "Each doctoral student's research will address various challenges facing the agricultural industry, from the animal, plant, environmental and economic aspects."
 Though WTAMU's proposed Ph.D. program received full support from the Coordinating Board, Flavius Killebrew, WTAMU provost/vice president for academic affairs, said implementation of the program was made contingent upon the University's ability to finance it.
 "Our plans will provide for the funding and resources necessary to move forward with the Ph.D. program," Killebrew said. "It's important to our University and to our region, and in spite of today's tough economic climate, we will implement this program as soon as it's feasibly possible."
 Approval of WTAMU's newest program comes just one week after Gov. Rick Perry mandated that most state agencies immediately reduce spending by an amount equal to at least seven percent of their 2003 general revenue appropriations. That mandate is what spurred the contingency attached to approval of the University's first Ph.D.

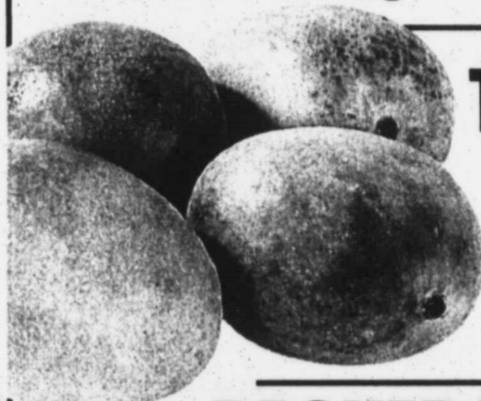

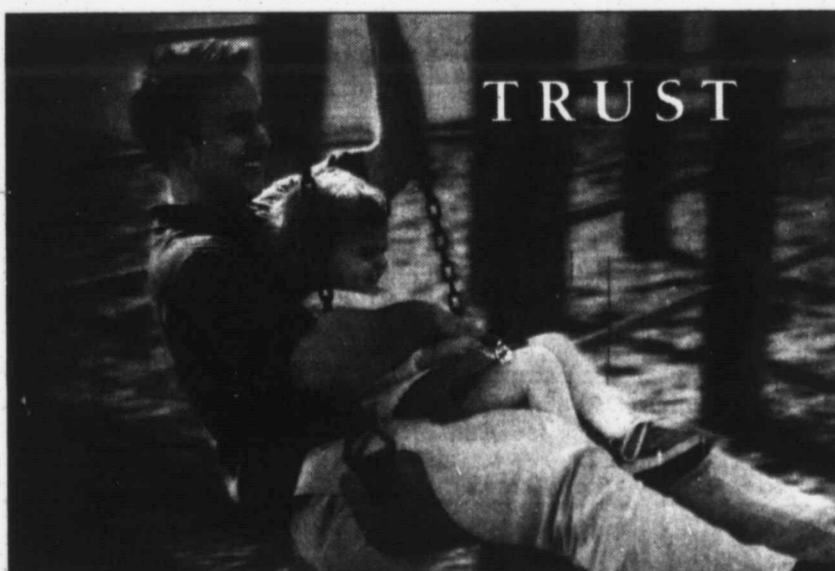

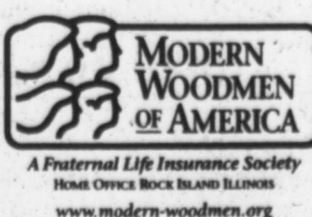

Taking the high road

Do you know the difference between the "high road" and the "low road"? No, this isn't a joke, neither is it about the "bonnie, bonnie banks of Loch Lomond". In Christian living we often find ourselves faced with situations where various options are available. After eliminating the ones that are wrong, we can still find ourselves faced with several correct options. How do we then determine which one occupies the higher ground? How can we tell the difference between the high road option and the low road one?

In Luke 10:25-42 Jesus used two different situations to teach on the difference between the high road and the low road. The first one arises when a lawyer asks Jesus, "Teacher, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?" When the lawyer tried to justify himself by asking, "Who is my neighbor?", Jesus told the parable that we call "the good Samaritan."

In that parable a Jewish priest and a Levite passed right on by an injured man who had been left for dead by robbers. I personally do not believe that the priest and Levite were heartless men. They probably didn't stop because they either thought that: 1.) It was a trap by the robbers who frequented the 20 miles from Jerusalem to Jericho or 2.) That they couldn't touch a dead body without becoming unclean. Had you asked the two men about why they walked on by, they probably would have pointed to personal safety and/or obedience to the Law.

Their explanation would probably have sounded very much like some that we have offered when rationalizing why we didn't stop and help someone broken down along the side of the road. Jesus' point is not that the two men were heartless, but that they chose the low road. It was the Samaritan who traveled the high road. Therefore, Jesus is saying, "Choose the high road!"

Immediately following this high/low road parable comes a high/low road story. Jesus came to Martha's house for a visit. In preparing the kind of dinner that any disciple would

who was entertaining Jesus, Martha became frustrated. Maybe she was trying to do way too much or fix too many dishes. I don't know. But for some reason she became frustrated and then asked Jesus to chew Mary out for not helping her.

Now here is a trap question: When Jesus responded to Martha, was He saying that the "high road" was sitting at His feet and that working in the kitchen was the "low road"?

No! He was not saying that. In fact, how appropriate would it be for a host to have special guests and ignore their physical needs? It was not that the kitchen was the low road, nor was it that the living room was the high road. Both places could have been the high road. It was Martha's attitude and behavior that destroyed the high road possibilities for her work in the kitchen.

How do you think Mary would have responded if Martha had politely motioned for her help? I believe that she would have helped. And then both would have been on the high road. But what if Martha had motioned for help and Mary had said, "No, I don't want to. The kitchen is your thing, not mine." Guess who would have then been corrected by Jesus? That's right, Mary.

Jesus wasn't saying that cooking is low road stuff, but attending a Bible class is high road stuff. Both can be high road stuff, it just depends on our attitude and behavior.

So look for high road opportunities in your Christian life. And if you struggle with distinguishing which option is the higher road, ask the Lord for help. He will always be faithful to show the way. God bless.

All-night dance parties cause rift in church community

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The Episcopal Church of St. John the Evangelist has always prided itself on being a model of inclusiveness and compassion. It welcomed homeless and AIDS-stricken members, hired openly gay priests and adopted the motto, "Diverse People, Inquiring Minds, Open Hearts."

But after some of the congregation's leaders warmed to New Age spirituality, a big rift opened up in the 145-year-old church that has yet to be fully healed.

The problems centered on a church-affiliated dance group, the St. John's Divine Rhythm Society, and allegations that it condoned — if not promoted — illegal drug use at a series of all-night parties modeled after raves.

The Episcopal bishop for Northern California has intervened as a result, the Rev. Kevin Pearson has been ousted as pastor, and four members of

the church's governing board resigned this last month.

"It's not the drugs that are poisoning our spiritual community," one parishioner wrote in an appeal to Bishop William Swing. "It is the lies and the secrets."

The rhythm society was formed in the early 1990s as an exclusive club: The idea was to provide spiritual seekers a way to dance their way toward enlightenment.

Soon after, the society began hosting quarterly, invitation-only gatherings at St. John's, midnight-to-morning celebrations featuring DJ's, light shows and New Age themes such as "Dream" and "Explore."

The society's gatherings drew about 350 people, more than three times the number that belonged to the parish. They ranged from children to seniors, but the core group consisted of young adults in their 20s and 30s.

The group never pretended it would use the dances to further the Christian gospel. But according to parishioners on both sides of the debate, Pearson's predecessor, the Rev. David Nogard, saw it as an opportunity to inject new energy into the dwindling ranks of his congregation and the church's landmark Victorian building.

Although the association seemed to work early on, it took a troubled turn after Pearson's arrival in August 2001. Some veteran church members became offended by what they saw as the 41-year-old rector's embrace of the rhythm society at the expense of the rest of his flock.

They also objected to some of the changes he introduced to the established liturgy, such as directing the church choir to chant the Hindu mantra "Om" instead of the Nicene Creed, and inserting into the

Eucharistic prayer the phrase, "You are loved, you are safe, you are free," an expression allegedly imported from the weekly meditation sessions the society also held at St. John's.

"Unlike the previous pastor, Kevin became very interested in what we were doing," said Michael Lazar, a videographer who has acted as the society's spokesman during the recent

crisis. "Frankly, he saw a group of very active, very bright people coming in and making more use of the space."

The tensions reached a boiling point last summer when a man attending the rhythm society's June function was discovered unconscious in a church bathroom, the victim of an apparent overdose of GHB, the so-called "date rape" drug.

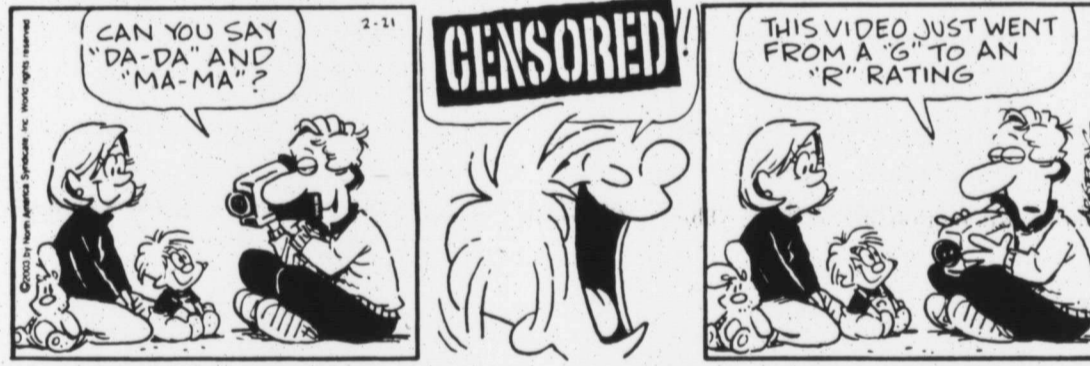

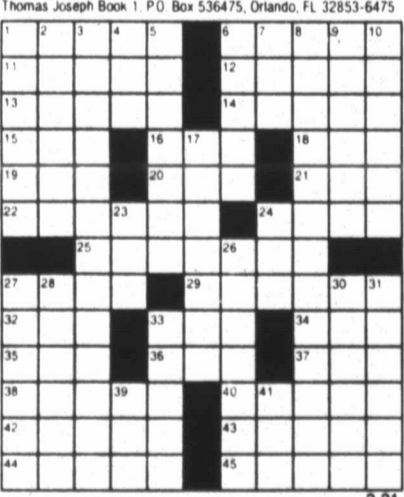

Schiffman makes history at Harvester Lanes

PAMPA — Carla Schiffman made bowling history in Pampa when she rolled a perfect game Feb. 6 at Harvester Lanes.

Schiffman became the first female bowler in a local league, sanctioned by the WIBC (Women's International Bowling Congress), to bowl a 300. Competing in the Lone Star League, Schiffman put together scratch games of 204, 246 and 300 for an outstanding 750 series.

Schiffman wasn't feeling any pressure when she started her string of strikes in the last game.

"Everybody was having fun and I was relaxed," Schiffman said. "If I hadn't been relaxed, I wouldn't have bowled the 300. The ball felt smooth coming off my hand every time."

Schiffman, who carries a 197 average in the league, earned national awards of a watch for 100-pins-over-average on a single game; an emblem for 125-pins-over-average for a three-game series; a 700 lapel pin, and the coveted 300 game ring from WIBC.

She will also receive awards from the Texas Women's Bowling Association for the 300 game and 750 series.

The only other WIBC sanctioned 300 found in past records dated back to the late 1940's when Darlis

Frierson, heeding coach Kurt Budke's admonitions, scored a career-high 28 points, as No. 7 Louisiana Tech defeated Rice 80-63 Thursday night and clinched the Lady Techsters' second straight Western Athletic Conference title.

Ford scored 15 of her 17 points in the second half despite carrying four fouls. Frierson got the message. In her next game after the chat, she scored a career high 26 points and broke that against the Lady Owls. "Yeah, coach talked to us coming back from Fresno," Frierson said. "He told us not to wait for something to happen, to go and make it happen. Tonight, I took him at his word."

Rangers, Davis agree to one-year \$427,500 deal

SURPRISE, Ariz. (AP) — Left-hander Doug Davis, vying for a spot in the Texas Rangers' starting rotation, on Thursday agreed to terms with the team on a one-year, \$427,500 contract.

"I'm happy with it, but it's not the money that is the big thing," he said.

Making the starting rotation is the big thing.

The 6-foot-4, 190-pounder is hoping to join Chan Ho Park, Ismael Valdes and John Thomson as starters. Right-handers Ryan Drese, Joaquin Benoit and Rob Bell are also in the mix

for the final two spots.

"I feel pretty good about what I am doing so far," said Davis, 27.

Since 1999, Davis has spent time between the majors and Triple-A affiliate Oklahoma.

He started last season 2-0 with a 1.88 ERA, including a two-hitter against Oakland. By May 16 he was 2-4 with a 7.00 ERA before being optioned out.

The departure of veteran lefty Kenny Rogers, who declined to re-sign, left a gaping hole in the rotation.

Rogers was the team leader last season with 13 wins and 210.2 innings.

Davis will compete with left-handers Justin Thompson, Ben Kozlowski and John Koronka.

"We know left-handed hitters and pitchers do well in Arlington," said manager Buck Showalter. "It would be good to have a lefty in the rotation, but it's still too early to make those decisions."

Thompson, a former All-Star with the Detroit Tigers, has had four shoulder surgeries since 1999.

Kozlowski was the Rangers' minor league pitcher of the year last season. Koronka went 13-8 last season in Cincinnati's minor leagues.

NOTES: Pitcher Brian Shouse was held out of afternoon practice after an abnormality was found in his EKG taken during his physical. "He's doing just fine, but the medical staff thought it was best to hold him out," said team spokesman John Blake. "He'll be flown back to Texas in a few days and will be checked in at Baylor Medical Center." ... Right-fielder Juan Gonzalez is

expected in camp Friday or Saturday. He told the club he needed to take more time for some personal business in Puerto Rico. ... There still are no suspects in Tuesday's overnight theft of player equipment from the team's locker room. Two bats and a pair of shoes were taken from Alex Rodriguez's locker and Kevin Mench lost a pair of sunglasses. ... Rodriguez has been out on the field 45 minutes before each practice. Michael Young, Hank Perry and Mike Lamb were also putting in extra work.

Cowboys cut Goodrich, two others

IRVING, Texas (AP) — The Dallas Cowboys released three injury-plagued players Thursday, including Dwayne Goodrich, who is charged with two counts of manslaughter following a deadly hit-and-run accident.

Robert Thomas and offensive guard Jeremy McKinney also were released on the first day NFL teams could officially waive players.

Goodrich and Thomas were in the final year of their contracts; releasing them will save the Cowboys \$1.25 million, the team said on its Web site.

Goodrich, a backup cornerback, was drafted by Dallas in 2000.

He suffered a hamstring injury during training camp in his rookie season, then ruptured his Achilles tendon during training camp the following year.

He has been charged with two counts of manslaughter and three counts of failure to stop and render in connection with a Jan. 14 hit-and-run accident that left two men dead.

A man who was injured in the accident sued Goodrich for \$37 million in damages on Tuesday, accusing Goodrich of failing to control his vehicle.

The 5-foot-11, 207-pound Goodrich has said he initially

thought he had struck only debris from an accident on Interstate 35.

Police said the accident happened just after 2 a.m. while Goodrich was on his way home from a topless nightclub.

Thomas, a 6-1, 273-pound fullback in his fifth year with Dallas, missed the final 11 games of the 2001 season after left ankle surgery.

He started last season in place of Jamar Martin, who tore his right knee ligament during training camp.

McKinney was cut by the Houston Texans in September and signed with the Cowboys shortly thereafter.

Player's status on Texas Tech team uncertain after suspension

Dad e-mails apology to the coaching staff

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — A Texas Tech basketball player whom coach Bob Knight suspended earlier this week for one game failed to show up for a scheduled practice, leaving his status on the team uncertain.

Senior Nick Valdez has not attended practice since he and Andre Emmett were benched for Monday's game against No. 3 Texas for missing breakfast and a walkthrough meeting that morning.

Both Emmett and Valdez effectively were reinstated to the team late Tuesday night after finishing disciplinary conditioning work. Emmett was at practice both Wednesday and Thursday, but not Valdez.

Tech athletic director Gerald Myers said that Nick Valdez missed practice Wednesday because his teammates did not want him to practice with him in the wake of an e-mail Valdez's father had sent to a newspaper.

"That's what happened: He came to practice and they said, 'Look, you're airing our problems out in public, and we don't think that's the way it should be handled, and we don't want you to practice,'" Myers told the Lubbock

Avalanche-Journal in Friday's online edition. "So he left."

The Avalanche-Journal reported in its Wednesday editions that Joe Valdez's e-mail, received Tuesday, said his son and Emmett may have been "set up" to be suspended for missing Monday morning's shoot-around in Austin. The e-mail says the two didn't receive a customary wake-up call as punishment for their part in the team's losses.

On Thursday, Joe Valdez sent another e-mail and a fax to the Avalanche-Journal and to the Tech coaching staff, apologizing for the previous e-mail and saying he regretted his comments.

"I am writing to tell you all I was wrong! I incorrectly concluded that my son was being forced off the team Monday when that was not the case," he wrote in the letter. "I overreacted in making a claim and statements that were unfounded."

It continued, "I understand now that Nick was actually being disciplined by the coaching staff to be responsible in his actions."

Joe Valdez wrote in his letter to the newspaper, "I realized my mistake when Nick and Andre Emmett handled

the situation like men, performed and completed their discipline on Tuesday evening and were expected at a team practice Wednesday afternoon. Completely contrary to my supposition, the situation was over."

Knight declined to comment on the situation, but Farley said the team has rules, and consequences for disobeying those rules. Farley said he could not say if Valdez was still on the team after missing a second consecutive practice.

Reached at his home in Colorado, Joe Valdez declined comment on his son's status with the team or his whereabouts during practice Thursday. Myers said earlier that Valdez was still on the team and is in Lubbock. However, it was unclear whether Valdez and Emmett would play in the Red Raiders' game on Saturday against Texas A&M. Emmett is the Big 12 scoring leader.

The team is 14-8 overall, but only 4-7 in Big 12 games and in danger of missing the NCAA tournament.

Knight has said Emmett, who leads the Big 12 Conference in scoring with 21.5 points per game, could be the best college player he's ever coached if he played harder and played defense. Valdez has been criticized for having a poor work ethic in practice.

Mavs win showdown with Spurs

DALLAS (AP) — The Dallas Mavericks weren't looking ahead. They put everything they had into their showdown with San Antonio.

That focus paid off for the Mavericks in a 95-87 victory Thursday night that snapped the Spurs' nine-game winning streak — a stretch that had gotten San Antonio within four games of Dallas for the Midwest Division lead and the NBA's best record.

But now Dallas has three road games in five days, starting Friday night at Houston before returning home in a week for another big game against Sacramento.

"We decided not to worry about tomorrow's game until tomorrow. We made sure that we could win this one," Mavs coach Don Nelson said. "We used all of our bullets up, and I do think I have some guys that I think I overplayed, like (Steve) Nash."

Nash had 29 points and 10 assists in 42 minutes to lead the Mavericks, who held San Antonio's Tim Duncan in check with just 11 points on 3-of-10 shooting.

San Antonio set an NBA record with eight straight road wins on the same trip, including victories at Sacramento and the Los Angeles Lakers, before returning home for a 101-76 victory Tuesday night against Denver.

Even though the Mavericks have the NBA's best record

(42-12), they have struggled against some of the top teams. They've already lost twice to Sacramento — which eliminated them in the second round of the playoffs last season — and once to the Lakers and Spurs (37-17) before Thursday.

"This was the biggest win because this game has been built up and up," Nash said. "I don't think any of us think we shouldn't beat that team."

To beat the Spurs, Dallas knew it had to stop Duncan. The league MVP had at least two defenders in his face almost every time he touched the ball.

"The plan was to limit Duncan's one-on-one catches, always have someone in front of him and somebody behind him," Mavs guard Nick Van Exel said.

Duncan left the game with 8:13 remaining after being poked in the eye by Michael Finley on a hard foul. Duncan walked unaided to the locker room after staying down for a couple of minutes.

While Duncan's eye was swollen and remained sore after the game, Spurs officials said there were no scratches or other damage to the eye.

Once play resumed without Duncan, the Spurs responded with a 16-2 run.

Tony Parker hit a 3-pointer. Malik Rose scored eight of his 25 points in the run, including two free throws with 3:08 left to pull the Spurs to 84-82 — the closest they would get.

"I was really happy with our group for continuing to play. A lot of teams would have cashed it in," Spurs coach Gregg Popovich said. "Dallas played aggressive and went out and got a great victory."

Dirk Nowitzki, playing on a sprained right ankle, hit a 3-pointer from the right corner with 2:53 left to end the Spurs' run.

Nowitzki scored 22 points while playing 37 minutes, a day after twisting his ankle in practice. Finley added 19 points.

"One game, you can't make a statement," Finley said. "You do that by winning a series of games like they did."

Rose made eight of 15 shots, and the reserve keyed another 16-2 run in the second quarter. Parker's 13 points were the most by a San Antonio starter.

"You have to give credit to the Mavs," Parker said. "We knew we were going to lose sometime, but it's still disappointing."

Notes: The Spurs had won four in a row and seven of eight against Dallas. ... Nash has eight double-doubles this season, four of them the last seven games. ... The Mavs placed Adrian Griffin on the injured list because of tendonitis in his left knee. Avery Johnson was activated after missing the last five games with a right calf strain.

Work crews are taking apart Dallas' historic Sportatorium

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Elvis Presley, Patsy Cline and Hank Williams played there. The Von Erich family wrestled there.

But now, the only action seen at the Dallas Sportatorium comes from the crews who are taking apart the historic wrestling, boxing and concert venue.

After a few recent reprieves, the barnlike wood-and-metal arena is coming down.

The city of Dallas granted a

demolition permit last week for the building at Cadiz and Industrial on the southwest corner of downtown Dallas.

The Sportatorium opened in the 1930s and has featured wrestling, boxing and the "Big D Jamboree." The popular honky-tonk show was a Dallas radio and television fixture from the 1940s into the '60s.

The original Sportatorium burned in 1953, but was rebuilt four months later. Famed rockabilly star Ronnie Dawson

played there every Saturday night for four years in the 1950s.

"It's just a big ol' tin building that I can still smell — a smell of stale beer, the Trinity River, popcorn and grease," he told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram in Friday's editions.

There's no word on what the lot will be used for. A telephone number for owner Morton Rachofsky was not listed and he could not be con-

Bonds undergoes elbow surgery

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP) — Barry Bonds had a 10-minute operation Wednesday on his left elbow to remove a quarter-inch ball of scar tissue and a suture from a previous surgery.

San Francisco Giants trainer Stan Conte referred to the procedure, performed by local team orthopedist Dr. David Zeman, as a "bumpectomy."

"It was uneventful, exactly as we planned," Conte said. "We didn't have to dig into the (triceps) muscle or anything else. It was right below the skin. The key to the surgery was we opened up the skin and it was right there."

The five-time NL MVP rested at home after the operation, and was expected to do some running and other cardio work Thursday, the first day of full-squad workouts for the defending NL champions.

The 38-year-old slugger probably won't swing a bat or play in left field for three or four days, but could practice sooner, Conte said Bonds'

incision was about an inch long and that Bonds had three stitches. The surrounding area was tender.

Bonds had local anesthesia, meaning his elbow was numbed. He also was under some sedation. There was a 30-minute recovery period for Bonds before he was allowed to go home, Conte said.

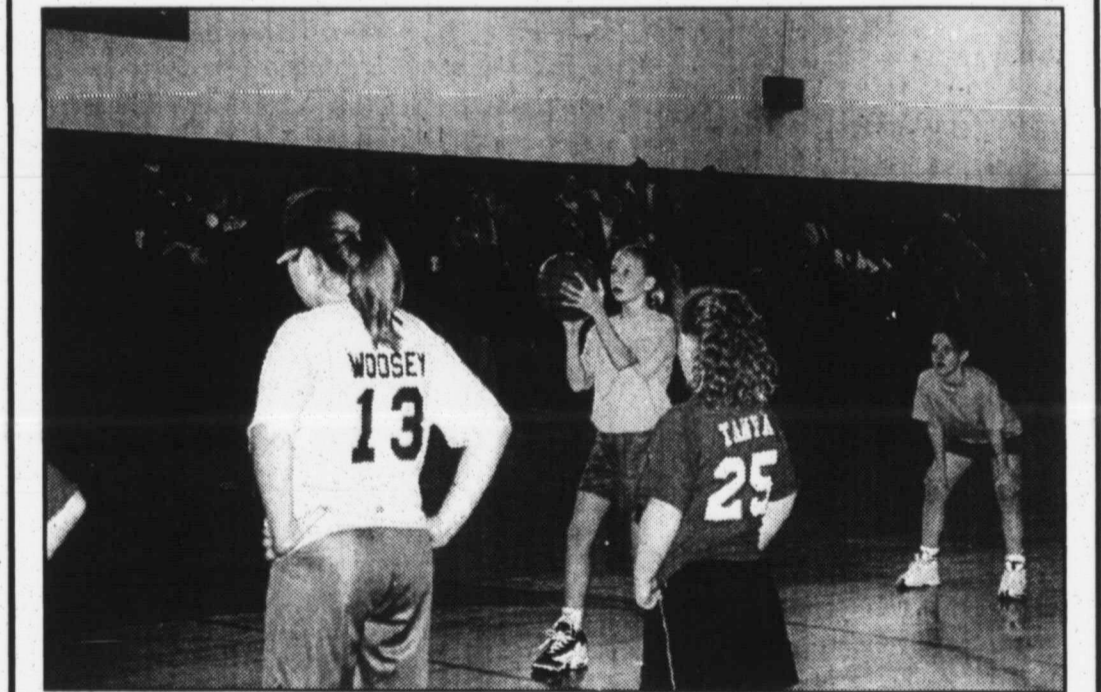
Sosa vowed to make any adjustments needed in a clubhouse of many new faces — even offering to turn down the volume on his boom box if necessary.

Such top stars of country and rock music as Johnny Cash, Buddy Holly, Gene Vincent and Willie Nelson played the venue in the late 1950s and early 1960s.

Presley still had not yet achieved national stardom when he played the Sportatorium in April 1955.

"Like some idiot, I wasn't interested in Elvis at the time," Dawson said. "I was interested

in his guitar player who had done some work on a record I loved."

Such famed wrestlers of today as "Stone Cold" Steve Austin, Shawn Michaels and Booker T got their starts there, but its wrestling mainstays over the years were "Gentleman" Chris Adams, "Playboy" Gary Hart and the Fabulous Freebirds.

But the wrestling icons of the place were Fritz Von Erich and his sons, who drew crowds

of local fans in the 1960s, '70s and '80s with a dynasty built on the elder Von Erich's signature hold, "The Claw."
