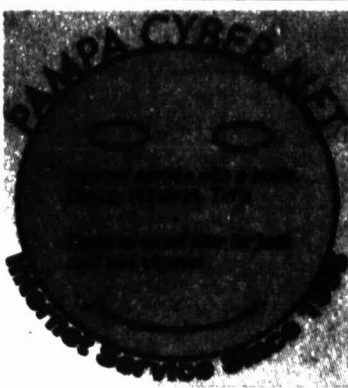

Down to five

School board narrows field of superintendent applicants

After a closed meeting with superintendent search consultants at Carver Center Tuesday night, Pampa school board members narrowed the field to five applicants.

Board President Lee Porter this morning said the applicants are to come to Pampa later this week for face-to-face interviews with the board. Special meetings for the interviews have been set at 5:30 p.m., Thursday and Friday, and 9 a.m. on Saturday. One applicant is to be interviewed Thursday, and two each are scheduled for interviews on Friday and Saturday, Porter said.

"I'm excited with the quality of the applicants," he said. "All are from districts that are exemplary or have been exemplary in the last two years."

All five applicants have come from the general West Texas area, Porter said, adding that, "they know about the Panhandle and that helps."

The Pampa school board hired the superintendent search consultants from the Texas Association of School Boards earlier this year to help find a replacement for Dr. Dawson Orr who resigned to accept the superintendent post with Wichita Falls Independent School District.

Porter said the consultants reviewed and did background searches on 51 applications before narrowing them down to the approximately 20 applications presented to the board Tuesday night.

"We won't release the names until we're down to the finalist," Porter said. The finalist will be announced at the school board meeting set for 7 a.m., April 23, at Carver Center, he said.

In other action Tuesday, the board unanimously agreed to build a girl's softball field that complies with federal Title IX requirements.

"Whatever it says we have to do, we'll do," said Jay Johnson, board member, when making the motion.

Johnson said that he expects school administrators to let the board know what is needed to be sure the district complies with Title IX, a federal law that ensures equality in public school sports programs.

Acting Superintendent Jane Steele said she would present a plan to bring the district into compliance to the board by September along with the facilities budget.

"I'm in favor of supporting all the activities we can afford," Johnson said. "I'm not looking at getting around Title IX. I'm looking at getting

Cheering, looting erupts in Baghdad

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — Jubilant crowds swarmed into Baghdad streets Wednesday, dancing, looting and cheering U.S. convoys before residents and a Marine tank toppled a 40-foot statue of Saddam Hussein in a sweeping, symbolic gesture. American commanders declared that his regime's rule over the ancient capital had ended.

In the most visible sign of Saddam's evaporating power, a towering statue of the Iraqi

president was brought down in the middle of Firdos Square. Cheering Iraqis, some waving the national flag, scaled the statue and danced upon the downed icon, now lying face down. As it fell, some threw shoes and slippers at the statue.

The scene was telecast worldwide by CNN and others.

"I'm 49, but I never lived a single day," said Yusuf Abed

City commission combines two boards

Pampa City Commissioners took the first steps to shrink the size of several advisory boards this week.

At a Tuesday night meeting in City Hall, the commissioners passed the first reading of two ordinances that would decrease the size of one advisory board and combine two others.

Commissioners voted unanimously to decrease the number of people on the Cable Advisory Board from seven to five, while Commissioner Jeff Andrews questioned the need

to combine the M.K. Brown Auditorium Advisory Board with the Parks and Recreation Board.

"Why do we want to get rid of that board?" Andrews asked during the commission's work session prior to their meeting as they discussed the possibility of rolling the M.K. Brown Auditorium Advisory Board into the Parks and Recreation Board.

Commissioner Faustina Curry said that the M.K. Brown board had not been meeting. The board had apparently brought several proposals to the city commission, but the commission didn't act

upon them. "The M.K. Brown board has been frustrated with us," Curry said. "Why meet? We've failed to support them."

Curry said she hopes that the auditorium board will draw strength from those on the Parks and Recreation board.

Andrews said he was concerned about the two boards meshing.

"I think it's a perfect fit myself," said Commissioner Robert Dixon.

"It's not something we can't redo," said Mayor Lonny Robbins.

In the end, four of the five

commissioners voted to combine the two boards into one seven-member board. Andrews was the lone dissenter.

The commission passed on second and final reading an ordinance that would raise the base fee at the city landfill for solid trash and rubbish by a dollar to \$24.50 a ton with certain exceptions.

Commissioners also passed a resolution that would put any money over \$176,649.51 from proceeds on the sale of the U.S. Bus building, 822 E. Foster, into the coffers of the PEDC. The \$176,649.51 would go into the city's

revolving loan fund. The city's depository contract was awarded to First Bank Southwest. The contract will run from May 1, 2003, to April 30, 2008.

Commissioners also approved a measure declaring used dumpsters as surplus so they may be sold off as needed.

Taking almost two hours, the commissioners went into executive session for the three month evaluation of City Manager Mitch Grant and to discuss possible lease terms for the U.S. Bus building. No action was taken when the

Kazim, a Baghdad imam who pounded the statue's pedestal with a sledgehammer. "Only now will I start living. That Saddam Hussein is a murderer and a criminal."

Others marked the regime's dissolution more passively, picking flowers from a nearby garden and handing them to Marines. While the capital was celebrating, the fate of Saddam and his sons remained unknown, two days after they

were targeted by four 2,000-pound U.S. bombs in Baghdad.

"The capital city is now one of those areas that has been added to the list of where the regime does not have control," said Brig. Gen. Vincent Brooks at U.S. Central Command in Qatar.

Brooks said that Saddam loyalists were holding out in the north, notably at Saddam's hometown of Tikrit, and still posed a threat, including the possible use of weapons of mass destruction.

Even as they encountered sniper fire and fierce resistance from roving bands of holdout fighters, Marine and Army units swept through Baghdad, seizing or destroying buildings that once housed some of Saddam's most feared security forces. Gunshots and explosions rocked the University of Baghdad, where smoke rose over the campus after a fire-fight, CNN reported.

Marine tanks rolled into the heart of the city, on the east bank of the Tigris, greeted by people clapping and waving white flags. Civilians gestured to the Americans with V-for-victory signs. "We were nearly mobbed by people trying to shake our hands," said Maj. Andy Milburn of the 7th Marines. One Army contingent had to use razor-wire to hold back surging crowds of well-wishers.

At police stations, government ministries, the headquarters of the Iraq Olympic

Committee, looters unhindered by any police presence made off with computers, furniture, telephones, even military jeeps. One young man used roller skates to wheel away a refrigerator.

"Thank you, thank you, Mr. Bush," some of the looters shouted. An elderly man beat a portrait of Saddam with his shoe, while a younger man spat on the portrait.

Not everyone rejoiced. "This is the destruction of Islam," said Qassim al-Shamari, 50, a laborer wearing an Arab robe. "After all, Iraq is our country. And what about all the women and children who died in the bombing?"

The U.S. Central Command reacted cautiously to the euphoria and chaos in Baghdad, pointing to locations in northern Iraq where significant pockets of pro-Saddam fighters remained.

"We'll continue to go where those pockets are and reduce

them," said command spokesman Jim Wilkinson. "It'll just take time to find those pockets and destroy them and hopefully they'll surrender."

U.S. commanders focused attention on Tikrit, still a stronghold of loyalist troops, and the northern city of Mosul. Lt. Mark Kitchens, a Central Command spokesman, said special operations forces and airstrikes were "actively engaging" Iraqi forces in both cities.

U.S. special forces and Kurdish fighters seized a strategic hilltop near Mosul; senior Kurdish leader Hoshiyar Zebari called it the most important gain in the region thus far.

Back in Baghdad, U.S. forces steadily expanded their reach, securing a military airport, capturing a prison and setting fire to a Republican Guard barracks. Milburn said the house of Saddam's son Qdai was on fire, apparently hit by a bomb.

The Iraqi government's efforts to sustain its public relations campaign collapsed. State television went off the air Tuesday. On Wednesday, foreign journalists said their "minders" — government agents who monitor their reporting — did not turn up for work. There was no sign of Iraqi Information Minister Mohammed Saeed al-Sahhaf, whose daily briefings had constituted the main public face of

the regime during the war.

While intent on consolidating their hold on Baghdad, U.S. commanders also were turning their attention to Tikrit, about 90 miles to the north. Defended by well-trained troops, and home to many of Saddam's most devoted followers, the city of 260,000 is considered one of the few remaining strongholds of the Iraqi regime.

The Central Command said coalition airstrikes were targeting the Republican Guard's Adnan division in Tikrit, "shaping the battlefield" before U.S. ground forces move in. Brooks said Iraqi reinforcements were reaching Tikrit, apparently after retreating from positions to the north and south.

The Patriotic Union of Kurdistan, one of two main Iraqi Kurdish groups opposing Saddam, claimed Tuesday that Saddam already was hiding in Tikrit. U.S. officials said they didn't know if he had escaped Monday's bombing of a site in Baghdad's al-Mansour neighborhood where he and at least one of his sons reportedly were meeting.

The toll of journalists killed in the war reached 10, with three killed in U.S. military strikes in Baghdad on Tuesday.

Two cameramen, one from Ukraine and one from Spain, were killed when a U.S. tank fired into the Palestine Hotel, where hundreds of journalists are based.

commission reconvened.

During the work session prior to their meeting, the commissioners heard a report on Promote Pampa Goals, an outgrowth of a goal-planning meeting the commission and city staff had in March at Pampa Country Club.

They also heard a recommendation to extend an audit agreement with Brown, Graham and Company in connection with implementing a new accounting system over the next year. John Horst, the city's director of finances, told the commissioners that it might be difficult to meet the mandated deadlines with a new audit firm. The only other firm that had bid on the auditing contract last time, he noted, has gone out of business and there appears to be no other local firm interested in bidding.

The commission listened to recommendations from Bill Hildebrandt, city services director, and Sandy Burns, animal control supervisor, concerning rabies regulations. While the state recently changed rules allowing rabies vaccinations every three years, Hildebrandt and Burns recommended staying with the annual vaccination program because of the number of cases in Pampa.

Burns said there were 27 cases last year and three cases so far this year.

The commission also heard a request from the High Plains Cruisers Car Club to use the M.K. Brown Auditorium parking lot Saturday without having to post liability insurance.

City Attorney Don Lane said the city regulations requiring insurance were developed for activities that required heavy equipment such as carnivals. He said the city could waive such requirements.

around the money we don't have. It's the monetary situation we're going to have to look at."

"We're caught between a rock and a hard place," Porter said this morning. He said he finds it difficult to justify building while also decreasing staff.

"Our intent is to obey the law," he added. "We've approved to go ahead with the construction that meets Title IX requirements. Dr. Powers will go forward with the bidding and all that is needed to do that."

Porter said \$175,000 has been set aside in the current budget for the girls softball field construction which should cover much of the preliminary work that needs to be done as soon as possible. The remaining costs can be covered in the next budget and beyond, if needed, he said.

"We should have the field ready and playable by the 2004 season," he said.

Also on Tuesday, the board approved a report by Brown, Graham & Company on the school district's drop out reporting procedures. Gary Brown of the firm said they found seven student files from a total of 142 files tested in which documentation did not support the drop out code assigned to them and three files that had incomplete documentation according to Texas Education Agency requirements.

Brown attributed the problems to primarily to coding and clerical errors and recommended that the school district provide additional training in documentation and withdrawal paper work.

"None of these would change the number of dropouts (reported by Pampa ISD)," Brown said.

Communist regime sees at least 75 dissidents convicted

HAVANA (AP) — Cuban courts have tried at least 75 government opponents in lightning-fast trials as the communist island presses ahead with a crackdown on dissent, human rights activists said.

The known sentences for about half of them reportedly ranged from 15 to 27 years; the remaining sentences were expected by week's end. None of the trials has lasted more than one day, activists said.

Another four of those arrested in the crackdown were prosecuted on lesser crimes and received much shorter sentences, measured in months rather than years, veteran activist Elizardo Sanchez said Tuesday. He was among the few leading government opponents not arrested last month.

International condemnation of the trials continued, with Peruvian writer Mario Vargas Llosa and the governments of Mexico, Canada and Sweden voicing protest on Tuesday.

The crackdown is "the natural expression of a dictatorship that has been oppressing human rights for years," Vargas Llosa said.

Some of the longest sentences were reserved for independent journalists, including 27 years for reporter and photographer Omar Rodriguez Saludes; and 20 years each for poet and writer Raul Rivero, magazine editor Ricardo Gonzalez, and economics writer Oscar Espinosa Chepe.

One woman linked to 100 SARS cases

SINGAPORE (AP) — Esther Mok went to Hong Kong to shop but came home carrying a deadly flu-like virus that has since spread to more than 100 people in Singapore and killed both of her parents and her pastor.

Miraculously, she has survived.

Mok, a 26-year-old former flight attendant, was one of three original cases of Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome, or SARS, to emerge in Singapore early last month.

Mok was very sick — and very contagious — when admitted to a Singapore hospital on March 1, but doctors had no idea that she was suffering from the strange form of pneumonia that had already killed dozens in China.

She had regular visits from her family and members of her church — all oblivious to the fact that they were exposing themselves to SARS.

Her father, mother and pastor have since died of SARS. Her uncle is in intensive care battling the illness. Mok's grandmother and brother are also sick but in stable condition.

In fact, all but a handful of the 118 reported cases in Singapore have been traced to Mok, and health officials have dubbed her a SARS "super spreader."

Two other Singaporean women also traveled to Hong Kong in February and developed SARS after exposure to a Chinese doctor, Liu Jianjun, while staying at the Metropole Hotel. They have not infected

others, the health ministry said.

"Esther Mok infected the whole lot of us," health minister Lim Hng Kiang said at a recent press conference.

Two other so-called super spreaders, Canadian Kwan Siu-Chiu and American Chinese businessman Johnny Chen, fell ill after a stay at the Metropole hotel and have helped spread the illness around the world. Unlike Mok, both died.

"We don't know why some people are able to spread it so easily and some don't," said Chew Suok Kai, health ministry's director of epidemiology and disease control.

Experts from Atlanta's Centers for Disease Control will be in Singapore later this week to further analyze data from SARS patients here in a bid to find out how the "super spreader" phenomenon works, Chew said.

"There are so many things we want to know about this disease but don't know yet. One of the key things we are working on is how the super-spreader spreads," said Chew.

Mok herself has recovered and could be released from a hospital, but authorities are reluctant to let her go, fearing the media frenzy that is likely to greet her.

Like "Typhoid" Mary Mallon, who famously infected dozens of people in the New York area in the early 1900s and was forced by the government to live alone on an island, Mok is living her own modern-day exile in a hospital room networked with televisions and telephones.

Israeli airstrike kills Hamas leader

GAZA CITY, Gaza Strip (AP) — A missile fired by an Israeli aircraft blew up a car in Gaza City, killing a top Hamas commander and six other people in an attack that ended a lull in Israeli airstrikes since the beginning of the war in Iraq.

The killing of Saed Arabeed, 38, on Tuesday was followed by a string of attacks. Hamas militants retaliated by shooting a rocket at the Israeli town of Sderot on Wednesday, and Israeli troops said they opened fire on another group of Palestinians approaching a rocket launcher. Doctors said two farmers were wounded by gunfire.

In a separate clash, troops shot and killed a 21-year-old man who was standing near a group of children throwing rocks at soldiers, Palestinian doctors said. Army officials did not immediately comment.

On Tuesday, two Israeli F-16 warplanes flew low over Gaza City after nightfall, breaking the sound barrier minutes before a missile slammed into a white Subaru on a street in Gaza City, turning the vehicle into a pile of flaming rubble. A second missile exploded in the street,

wounding at least 50 bystanders, witnesses and doctors said.

Israeli security sources said the airstrike had targeted Arabeed, a senior Hamas commander responsible for a series of deadly raids against Israelis over the past decade. Two of the other dead were Hamas militants, Palestinians said.

The other dead and wounded were civilians, including children, doctors said. They

were hit by shrapnel from the second missile, which exploded after people had run into the street to see what had happened.

Hamas officials threatened revenge and tied the airstrike to the war in Iraq, though Israel had toned down its military operations during the fighting in the Gulf, an apparent effort to keep a low profile amid Arab charges that Israel was the main beneficiary from the Iraq war.

Jane Fonda fears reprisals for war

VANCOUVER (AP) — Jane Fonda told a Canadian audience that she fears the U.S. campaign in Iraq will turn people all over the world against America.

"What it's going to mean for (America's) stability as a nation, for terrorism, for the economy — I can't imagine," Fonda said Tuesday. "I think the entire world is going to be united against us."

That frightens her, she said, but she isn't sure what Americans can do about it.

"I don't know if a country where the people are so ignorant of reality and of history, if you can call that a free world," she said.

Fonda, 65, has been the target

of criticism for decades for her opposition to the Vietnam War and for posing overseas with members of the opposition's military.

When she was in North Vietnam during the Vietnam War, Fonda said she saw a small performance of a play intended to teach villagers that there were "good Americans" and "bad Americans" even as U.S. bombs fell on their country.

She said she hopes Iraqis and others who might suffer from American attacks will feel the same as Vietnamese people she met, who told her "someday the war will be over and we're going to have to be friends again."

It was a crazy night at Coors

There have been plenty of crazy nights at Coors Field the last eight years. This one might rank with the best of them.

The St. Louis Cardinals and Colorado Rockies combined for 36 hits and used 15 pitchers Tuesday night in a 13-inning game that lasted 4 hours, 38 minutes.

"I'm tired," Cardinals outfielder Jim Edmonds said. "In a game like this that goes so long, you just hope nobody gets hurt and somebody wins eventually. We were very lucky."

Mike Matheny's three run homer in the 13th sent St. Louis to a 15-12 win, ending Colorado's four-game winning streak.

Scott Rolen led off the 13th with a walk. With one out, Eduardo Perez singled and Matheny hit his first homer of the season off Dan Miceli (0-1) — the ball bouncing out of left fielder Gabe Kapler's glove as he hit the wall.

"It's not like I crushed it, but I hit it good enough for this park," Matheny said. "They told me (Kapler) had it in his glove. We'll take it. It's great to see this team fight."

In other NL games, it was: Chicago 6, Montreal 1; Milwaukee 5, Pittsburgh 3; New York 4, Florida 2; Philadelphia 4, Atlanta 3 in 10 innings; Cincinnati 2, Houston 1 in 10 innings; Los Angeles 5, Arizona 3; and San Diego 9, San Francisco 4.

It was the first big offen-

sive outburst this season at homer-happy Coors, which opened in 1995. The Rockies began their home schedule with a three-game sweep of Arizona last weekend, allowing just seven runs the entire series.

But when the bats finally came out, not many fans were there to see it. The crowd of 21,563 Tuesday was a record low for the Rockies — the previous low was 25,197 on Saturday.

The teams traded five-run innings. Except for four starting pitchers, St. Louis used all of its players, and the Rockies had only reliever Brian Fuentes and backup catcher Bobby Estalella left on the bench when it ended.

Cal Eldred (1-0), who entered with a 135.00 ERA, pitched two perfect innings for the win.

"This is a game we won't forget all year long," Cardinals manager Tony La Russa said, "because there were so many heroics, and it ended up with Cal, knowing he's the last guy out there, getting six outs. That's unbelievable."

Edmonds had a three-run homer and matched career highs with four hits and five RBIs.

Todd Helton's homer tied it at 12 in the seventh, and he finished with four hits and three RBIs for the Rockies. With three walks, Helton reached base in all seven plate appearances. Jay Payton added four hits and two RBIs.

Colorado hit into double plays to end the eighth, 10th

and 11th innings. Payton was thrown out at the plate in the ninth.

"We had ample opportunities to win this game, and we did not do it," manager Clint Hurdle said.
