Smokin' Armadillos to headline Country Jam '94

Joe's Boot Shop and KKYC Radio will proudly present 'Country Jam '94' on Friday, April 8, 1994 at 8;00 p.m. at the Bailey County Coliseum in Muleshoe, Texas.

Featured at the jam will be the Smokin' Armadillos, from Bakersfield, California, with special guests Tom Mann & the Ace of Hearts Band, The Cox Bothers Band, and Casey

In March of 1993, the band opened for Steve Wariner and received two standing ovations. That was only the fourth time the "Smokin' Armadillos" had ever played in public.

An opening act generating that kind of fan excitement, let alone a group just getting started, is pretty rare.

Featuring top notch musicians, bringing a range of influences to bear on their music, and writing most of their own material, they sport more than just good surface appeal. Perhaps most impressive is the fact that they have carved a special, distinct style into the music world, starting with a bit of the old classic country sound, and adding a youthful, rock-tinged edge to it.

The six members of 'Smokin Armadillos' range in age from 17-24. They met at North High School in Bakersfield while they were students; in fact, fiddle player Jason Theiste is still a student there.

They have gained label attention in Nashville, a rapidly growing fan club, and the support of Wrangler jeans, which turned its admiration for the boys' wholesome approach into merchandising support.

Their first release was a hit single - My Girlfriend Might from their five song CD Out of the Burrow - which took them to #4 on the national Mac Indle chart. It helped put the Armadillos on the map throughout California's Central Valley, and got them airplay across the U.S. After that first single, the Armadillos were well on their way to being well-sought fan material.

Their second single and accompanying video, Red Rock, tells the story of the late legendary bull rider, Lane Frost,

Davis lived in the Three-Way area from 1935 to 1956. His family farmed in the Three-Way community.


They farmed around the Goodland and Stegall areas.

The cost of the class will be \$125.00, plus a book fee of approximately \$30.00. A qualified trainer from Texas Tech University will be

teaching the course.

Fifteen people are required to register to take the class in order for the class to be held. The course will consist of probably two nights a week for approximately six to eight weeks.

The E.C.A. personnel are strictly on a voluntary basis. Upon certification, you will be qualified to work on the ambulance service.

There was once a Texan farmer who came to town twice a week, each time going to the feed store and buying ten ax handles. After awhile, curiosity got the better of the storekeeper. He said, "What are you doing with all these ax handles?" "Selling them," was the reply. "I'm getting five dollars apiece." The storekeeper was shocked. "That's crazy!" You're paying me seven!" The farmer replied "I know, but it sure beats farm-

A joke? Sure it is, but unfortunately, it's gallows humor that many Texas farmers and ranchers find less than amusing. I hope that our future in

agriculture is a lot brighter than that, and I expect it to be. Still, for agriculture to achieve its potential, we must see a change in attitude from some of our elected officials, regulators and professional activists. Traditionally, on the first day of Spring we observe National Agriculture Day. This year, this celebration of the world' most successful food and fiber production machine falls on March 20.

It is an event worthy of celebration, but agriculture is an industry with many unresolved problems. Many in Congress would all but eliminate price supports for agriculture. Others would impose so many

Study: Farmers earn less in profit

AUSTIN - In Texas, an average farm or ranch grossed about \$78,000 in 1992, but after paying expenses for nearly \$59,000 saw a profit of only about \$19,000, according to the latest economic figures.

Gross income included money earned for crop and livestock sales, property rentals, home consumption of production and other farm-related income.

Expenses included on average about \$8,400 for feed; \$8,400 for livestock; \$4,600 for interest payments on land and equipment; \$4,400 for labor; \$2,300 for fuel and oil; almost \$1,000 for electricity and \$1,700 for property taxes.

Each year, Texas agriculture earns about \$12 billion in cash receipts and generates more than \$36 billion dollars in economic activity across the Lone Star State.

However, at the supermaket, farmers earn only about a quarter for every dollar spent.

In Texas, agricultural production more than likely involves cattle, cotton, hay, sorghum and winter wheat. Other major Lone Star State crops include barley, corn, grapefruit oat, oranges, peaches, peanuts, pecans, potatoes, rice, rye, soybeans, sugar beets, sugarcane, sunflowers, sweet potatoes and vegetables.

The state's 185,000 farms and ranches encompass 130 million acres with each operation averaging more than 700 acres. Each acre of land including buildings in Texas is valued at \$470 on average.

regulations that it will become impossible to participate. Before we allow anything drastic to happen, it might be useful to remember why we have federal farm programs.

Agriculture is a business that is extremely risky. Weather and other factors can have a profound effect on our food supply. The farm program actually plans a surplus to get us through droughts and other natural disasters.

Farm programs also have an effect of holding down market prices for consumers. On average, Americans spend about 11 percent of disposable income on food. This is the lowest in the world. Without income protection for farmers, prices would rise to much higher levels.

Historically, government has manipulated markets for political reasons. Embergoes,

tariffs, trade sanctions and actions that ensure cheap food for consumers, have all had an impact on farm prices.

Federal regulations add heavy costs to agriculture. If these actions are necessary, it is also necessary to support the farm families. In the process, the American people are assured of an adequate, high quality and reasonably priced supply of food and fiber.

From the consumer's standpoint, it may be one of the most outrageously successful programs in history. It would make more sense to argue that the Dallas Cowboys are not the best team in the NFL.

Farmers and ranchers, however, are not enjoying an end zone celebration of this food and fiber miracle. Instead, we are under attack by elements that range from the ill informed to those that should know bet-

The public is generally not aware that farm program benefits are but a small percentage of the USDA budget. USDA feeds millions of school children, many of them for free. Rural development, nutrition training and many other worthwhile programs fall under the huge umbrella of what Abraham Lincoln called, "The peoples' department."

Add it all up and farm program benefits total less than one percent of the federal budget...not a bad price tag for food security.

Our farm program is an investment in the future. A trip to any grocery store, filled with high quality food, should convince anyone that U.S. farm programs have served consumers well...Food for thought on National Agriculture Day. Bob Stallman, President Texas Farm Bureau





Protect your rights! "Render" your taxable property by April 14th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year. The rendition form is available at your local appraisal district office... or you may draft a similar form.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income—such as the inventory and equipment used by a business.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district believes the value is higher, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 1993. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1994.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing or postmarking 1994 renditions is Thursday, April 14. You can get an extra 15 days if you ask for it in writing by the April 14 deadline.

He hadn't always been a dragon. Once not very long ago he had been a little boy--a surly, selfish, snobbish boy, but a boy nonetheless. In fact, since he was quite sure that he'd been a genuine human being when he rose that very morning, he was under the impression that the transformation from boy to dragon had been amazingly rapid.

He was wrong. Scrubb had been on the road from boy to dragon for quite some time, although the physical change had indeed been very recent and quite sudden. In fact, each time the boy Eustace had chosen to be selfish and "sit on his treasure" or to be abusive and spew words of fire he had become more and more beastly and that much less human. The transformation from human to fiery serpent was really not sudden at all.

It rarely is. Like this little boy from one of C. S. Lewis' children's stories, we all are being changed slowly but very surely. With each day and each decision, we plot our courses in one of two directions. Jesus himself has given us the choices. Either we enshrine him as Lord of our lives and allow him to change us into his likeness, or we bow down to change us into his likeness, or we bow down to ourselves and our own passions and become, like Eustace, monstrous.

Most of us are quite familiar with the predicament of Eustace Scrubb. We rush through life and only begin to see what our carnal dispositions have made of us when we catch a glimpse of our reflections--and, all too often, green, scaly, fire-breathing creatures peer back! What then?

Then we either proceed on the course which has begun to destroy our humanity or (like Eustace later in the story) we allow the Son of Man to peel the scaly serpent skins off, washing us, and healing us with His blood.

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption. your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$45,000.

Who qualifies for an exemption?

Anyone who owned a home on January 1st (and used it as their primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$5,000 homestead exemption to lower their school taxes this year... and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. (Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)


