PEDC looks at possible dairy sale

A California dairy could have cows grazing east of Pampa before the end of summer, according to Gary Sutherland of the PEDC.

Sutherland reported at Monday night's meeting of the PEDC that he had spoken with Rick Roden about his dairy operation east of Pampa and was told that DuVuyst Farms of Nuevo, Calif., had expressed an interest in buying Roden's Pampa dairy operation if the PEDC was willing to transfer what remained of a \$250,000 forgivable loan to the new operation.

About \$150,000 remains of the loan. Some \$100,000 of the original loan has been forgiven based on employment at the dairy.

Sutherland said the sale to DuVuyst could close within the next 30 days.

Roden indicated, Sutherland said, that the DuVuyst operation would have between 2,500 and 3,000 cows.

The PEDC board Monday night agreed to extend the loan to DuVuyst, stretching the maturity date to three years from when operations begin.

The board also heard from Vanessa

Buzzard, their attorney, concerning ant review the company's finances. Buzzard, who said she got the accountant's report Monday, told the board that the company could not afford the

\$1,500 real estate payments and \$500 equipment payments on a PEDC loan.

The board agreed to hold a special meeting next Tuesday in the main floor conference room of City Hall and invite Heard to see if something could be worked out.

Board President Doug Locke said that if no agreement could be reached, the PEDC would have to initiate foreclosure proceedings.

While Crall is paid up to May 22 on the equipment loan, board member Dalton Lewis noted that the company was \$15,000 delinquent on the real estate loan.

Board member Bill Allison opposed foreclosing, saying it would effectively put Crall out of business and the 28 people employed there out of a job.

"We're between a rock and a hard place," Sutherland admitted.

"We've been trying to collect," Buzzard said.

Locke indicated he would favor taking ownership of the real estate back and leasing it to Crall.

Burglary arrest turns into wrestling match

A Pampa police officer was nursing a skinned knee today after a wrestling match that sent one man to Gray County jail Monday afternoon.

Ashley Dawn Ragan, 25, 500 1/2 N. Ward, was in Gray County jail today on bonds

totaling \$7,000 after being charged with burglary, evading capture and resisting arrest.

Officer Bryan Denham suffered minor injuries Monday afternoon in a wrestling match as he arrested Ragan.

Authorities said investigators were able to get a warrant for Ragan's arrest on burglary

charges in connection with a break-in on North Dwight. Several DVDs and Playstation games were taken in the burglary of a home in the 800 block of North Dwight earlier Monday.

Officer Denham, authorities said, pulled his patrol car up in front of Ragan's home Monday afternoon and ques-

tioned two men standing by the curb. One of the men identified himself as Ragan.

Officials said that when Denham told Ragan he had a warrant for Ragan's arrest and got out of the patrol car to handcuff Ragan, the man ran. Denham chased after him as deputies from the Gray County Sheriff's

office arrived. A chase and wrestling match ensued before Ragan was subdued.

Gray County Justice of the Peace Kurt Curfman set bond for Ragan on the burglary charge at \$5,000. He set bond on the evading charge and the resisting arrest charge at \$1,000 each.

Water quality tests to begin this week

WHITE DEER - The Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District will begin collecting water samples this week in the district's annual water quality program.

Some 275 sample gathered between now and the end of August will be tested for nitrates, sulfates, iron, fluoride, ammonia, chloride, alkalinity, hardness, specific conductivity, dissolved solids and acidity, according to C.E. Williams, the district's general manager.

The Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District covers all or parts of eight panhandle counties, including Gray County.

Williams said that wells in the program with odd state well numbers and any well that exceeded a state secondary drinking water standard in the past will be sampled. Depending upon whether a well has ever exceeded the state standard, a well may be tested every year. Otherwise, wells will be tested every other year.

"Knowing the water came from the same well and water source enables the district to compare past results to newly gathered data," Williams said.

He said anyone wanting well water tested can contact the district office at 883-2501.

Family quarantined with possible monkeypox

WAUSAU, Wis. (AP) — When a young family of three brought home two \$95 prairie dogs from a Mother's Day event, they never guessed the furry little additions to their five-acre hobby farm could confine them to their home.

That's just where Tammy Kautzer is biding her time with her husband and 3-year-old daughter, quarantined after coming down with a suspected case of monkeypox, a virus

linked to the burrowing rashes, fevers, chills and sores.

"They said we can't leave until the scabs fall off the sores," said Kautzer, 28, of nearby Dorchester in central Wisconsin. "I only have a few more scabs to fall off. My daughter's are gone."

Health officials were working to contain the spread of the monkeypox virus, which is related to smallpox and apparently never before found in the Western Hemisphere.

The disease in humans is not usually fatal but causes

At least 38 cases of monkeypox are suspected or have been confirmed in three Midwest states. In Wisconsin, four human cases have been confirmed and 16 others are suspected. Dr. Mark Wegner, chief of the state's communicable disease section, said Tuesday. Thirteen cases are suspected in Indiana and Illinois has four suspected and one confirmed case.

Investigators say a shipment of prairie dogs likely was infected with the virus by a

giant Gambian rat, which is indigenous to Africa, at a Chicago-area pet distributor, Phil's Pocket Pets. Federal and state health officials were trying to track down 115 customers that bought animals since April 15 from the business.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention could not say how many people or animals may have come in contact with the virus.

The distributor, Phillip Moberley, said Monday that he

voluntarily quarantined his home-based business and has destroyed 70 prairie dogs. An employee of Moberley's was Illinois' confirmed monkeypox case.

Wisconsin officials had accounted for two-thirds of the 30 prairie dogs shipped to the state and issued quarantines barring people from moving mammals on their property to help stem the spread. Health officials also issued an emergency order banning the sale,

Perry signs homeowners insurance bill

TEMPLE, Texas (AP) — Gov. Rick Perry on Tuesday signed into law legislation that gives the state more control over homeowners insurance premiums.

"This legislation will give Texans the most fair and reasonable prices that they can have," Perry said. "We expect to see a substantial number of Texans get some rate relief because of this legislation."

The bill had been one of the top issues of the spring legislative session after lawmakers and candidates for statewide office promised voters last fall that they would work to lower homeowners' premiums.

Insurance Commissioner Jose Montemayor has said homeowners insurance premiums increased on average 45 percent since 2000 even as coverage was scaled back.

Before the new law was enacted, there was little the state could do because about 95 percent of homeowners insurance policies written in Texas were not regulated.

The bill aims to give regulators more oversight of rates. It also sets new restrictions on how

an insurer can consider a person's credit history when setting rates. Perry signed the bill in newly built home in a Temple neighborhood. Perry also signed two other pieces of homeowners insurance legislation.

One protects consumers from unlicensed mold remediators, and the other gives the state Department of Insurance the authority to require more prompt response to water damage claims, Perry said.

Lieberman presses White House for response on Texas search

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democratic presidential candidate Joe Lieberman is pressuring the Bush administration on whether any White House official contacted federal agencies to track down missing Texas Democrats last month.

Dissatisfied with the verbal response from White House Chief of Staff Andrew Card, Lieberman sent a letter June 8 to Card asking for answers in writing, saying "where questions have been raised about whether scarce homeland secu-

resources were misused for public purposes, the public should not be forced to rely on private reassurances."

At issue is May's flight of Texas Democratic state representatives, who left for Oklahoma to prevent action on a controversial congressional redistricting bill pushed by U.S. House Majority Leader Tom DeLay, R-Texas. The departments of Homeland Security and Transportation are investigating whether their agencies' assistance to Texas law officers in the search was inappropriate.

White House press secretary Ari Fleischer said Monday that

neither President Bush nor anyone on his staff authorized using federal agencies to track down the legislators. He dismissed the request by Connecticut's Lieberman, the ranking Democrat on the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee, for Card to put the denial in writing.

"This is the second letter that was selectively given to certain media outlets before it was given to the White House ... It was sent to the White House on one day and the date of the letter was the following day. I mean, this is publicity seeking, not serious. And the

questions have been answered," Fleischer said.

In response to a May 27 letter, Card called Lieberman and said neither Bush, political adviser Karl Rove nor any other White House staffer had contacted federal agencies about the missing lawmakers, according to Lieberman.

Lieberman's spokeswoman Leslie Phillips said the letter was sent to the White House last Saturday morning before 10 a.m. and was not made available to the press until Saturday afternoon.

"This is Ari's M-O. He said the exact same thing regarding our May 27th letter. He focuses on process as a way to divert attention from substance. In both cases he's got his facts wrong on the process," Phillips said.

Democrats are questioning

whether the agencies acted at the request of DeLay, who has said he contacted the Justice Department and the Federal Aviation Administration but did nothing inappropriate. The FBI also has said one of its Texas agents helped in the search on his own.

DeLay said last month that he told Bush at an April breakfast about the redistricting bill that favored Republicans, and Bush told him he'd "like to see that happen." But that conversation occurred before the May 12 Democratic walkout in Texas.

In related news in Austin, the Texas League of Women Voters said in a statement that it opposes reopening congressional redistricting.

The organization said the Legislature should focus on changing the redistricting

process for the 2010 census. It should create an appointed, small, bipartisan commission with an odd number of members to do the work, the league said.

The Legislature should become involved only if the commission fails to come up with a plan. Then the district lines should be drawn in a special session designated only for redistricting. The Texas Supreme Court would have automatic review of any plans, the league said.

"The next actual redistricting should be done after the 2010 census. It should be done in a way that precludes repeated court challenges that take years and untold costs in taxpayer funds, not to mention the distraction to legislators who have more pressing responsibilities," the league said.

importation and display of prairie dogs.

Eileen Whitmarsh, who fell ill after handling an infected prairie dog at her suburban Milwaukee pet store, said at first one of the animals just seemed fatigued. Then the symptoms spread to another prairie dog in the store.

"Nobody knew. Everybody thought 'Oh, just a prairie dog not feeling well,'" Whitmarsh said.

Kautzer said she bought her two 6- to 8-week-old prairie dogs at a Mother's Day event in Wausau for \$95 apiece. Two days later, the eyes of one crusted over and swelled up.

"I figured it had a cold," she said Monday in a telephone interview. By then, she said, the animal had bitten her daughter on the finger.

Her daughter developed a 103-degree fever — and the

prairie dog died May 20.

"I just threw it in the garbage. I didn't think nothing of it," Kautzer said.

That day, she took her daughter to a doctor and mentioned the bite. "That started a scare, especially since they found it had died," she said.

Health professionals had her retrieve the animal's body for testing.

By May 22, her daughter was admitted to a hospital; the child began feeling better by the fourth day. The Kautzer

home and, five-acre hobby farm were quarantined Friday.

The second prairie dog — named Chuckles — also got sick but is recovering, she said. Health officials will decide his fate.

"Why get rid of it because it caught something like we caught something? It is not its fault that it caught it from a rat," Kautzer said.

Hearings indicate redistricting issue to return

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The setting of public hearings next week point to the possibility that Republican legislative leaders intend to follow through on plans to renew the congressional redistricting fight.

Monday, Rep. Garnet Coleman, D-Houston, said a redistricting hearing will be conducted at the Texas Southern University campus in Houston on June 21.

The office of House Speaker Tom Craddick has sought and secured hearing rooms at University of Texas System campuses in San Antonio, Brownsville and Dallas next week, sources told the San Antonio Express-News in a report for Tuesday editions.

The hearings could be a prelude to a special session this summer. By law, a special session can last no longer than 30 days. The agenda topics are set by the governor.

Gov. Rick Perry has not con-

firmed if he intends to bring up redistricting.

Meanwhile, Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst told the Houston Chronicle editorial board on Monday that he is inclined to

use a procedure that would mean two-thirds of the state's 31 senators would have to agree to consider the redistricting issue before there could be debate on the topic.



Area fire statistics indicate use of volunteers effective

To the editor:
 I developed a great respect for volunteer firefighters when I did some research on the subject.

Did you know that volunteer firefighters have to be certified the same as paid firefighters? Before they can help at a fire scene they have to have the basic firefighting certificate. They continue their training through intermediate, advanced and master firefighting certification at the same schools our paid firefighters attend. Many of the instructors at the schools are volunteer firefighters. The only difference between the volunteer and the paid firefighter is the volunteer has a paying job and fights fires because he is dedicated to fighting fires and wants to contribute to the community, and the paid firefighters work at the job for a living.

Most of the towns in the Texas panhandle the size of Pampa have all-volunteer fire departments, and one or two have a combination paid and volunteer department.

Canyon has a population of 13,000 plus approximately 9,000 university students. Their fire department consists of three paid firefighters and 36 volunteers to protect 23 square miles of city and 350 square miles of county. Their current ISO rating is 3 (one being the best possible rating) and they expect the next inspection to give them a rating of 2. They respond to an average of 194 EMS calls, 46 rescue calls and 27 structure calls per year. They are responsible for responding to wrecks and spills on I-27 in their county.

Dumas fire department services a population of 14,000 in the city and about 6,000 in the county. Their service area is about 920 square miles. They have 12 paid firefighters and 20 volunteers. They respond to an average of 590 EMS calls, 136 rescue calls and 18 structure calls per year. The towns in their surrounding area have all-volunteer fire departments and Dumas responds to their calls also. The Dumas ISO rating is 2. They are responsible to wrecks and spills on Hwy. 87 and Hwy. 152 in their county.

I wonder if anyone has thought of using a few volunteer firefighters in Pampa. As one commissioner pointed out, we will have to make some budget cuts or, as our city manager suggested, raise water and sewer rates and increase property taxes about three percent. Pampa has 26 paid firefighters and, the last I heard, our ISO rating is 5. The ISO rating helps determine the insurance rate for the area.


Medical-malpractice crisis

The medical-malpractice crisis, which seems to occur about every 10 years, is back again and essentially unchanged. The causes of it are the same. The proposals to correct it are the same. The self-interests of two organized groups that profit from the health care system - doctors and lawyers - are the same. And, indeed, the high degree of self-righteousness in both groups is the same.

Lawyers blame doctors; doctors blame lawyers. Neither group seems to give a hoot about the one group that doesn't make any money out of the system - the patients. They, in fact, are the source of income for the lawyers and doctors.

Doctors want legislatures to set caps on punitive damages. That's the solution most often proposed. Sometimes they want the legislatures to set up what would amount to a doctor-dominated screening committee to prevent a lot of people from ever getting to court. In other words, doctors want to be protected from the consequences if they, by gross incompetence or carelessness, kill or permanently disable one of your children.

Doctors, in fact, are the only people who can commit manslaughter and never face criminal prosecution. Get drunk or doped up and kill somebody with your car and you face criminal charges. Get drunk or doped up and kill somebody in a surgery and maybe - if somebody in the

room rats you out - you might get sued in civil court. High-toned scholars at Harvard have estimated that doctors knock off about 90,000 to 100,000 people a year with innocent mistakes or plain malpractice. That compares, by the way, with about 1,400 accidental deaths from firearms.

Lawyers blame high insurance rates not on outrageous jury verdicts but on the bad stock market. They essentially want the legislatures to do nothing. After all, for them, it is a profitable system as is.

Here's what should be done:

1. Regulation of the conduct and competence of lawyers should be taken away from lawyers. Lawyers are as reluctant to dump an incompetent or even criminal lawyer as they are to volunteer to clean toilets in a leper colony. A good bit of housecleaning needs doing, and lawyers will never do it.

2. Regulation of the conduct and competence of doctors should be taken away from doctors. They are as bad as the lawyers about protecting their own tribe.

Their code of silence is as strict as the Sicilian Mafia's. They don't murder doctors who testify against other doctors, but they sure try to drive them out of business if they can figure out a way to do it.


3. Cap lawyers' fees at no more than 10 percent of the amount recovered. Some lawyers take one-third to one-half of settlements from dying patients for cases that involved no more than a few phone calls and a letter or two.

4. Stop electing lawyers and doctors to legislative positions, and get rid of every judge who thinks the tort system should be a no-fault tort system.

5. More strictly regulate insurance companies. Some states do, and some states don't. An insurance company ought to be forced to show some rational justification for rate increases.

That should be a start. In fairness, both doctors and lawyers are right about some points. Medicine is still more art than science, and the only doctors who should be sued are those where it can be proven they committed acts of gross negligence or incompetence. But the right of the people to seek redress for injuries in court should not be curtailed.

We have evolved a health care system nobody can afford but the government - and even it is now having second thoughts - and a court system that has become a national lottery.




Putting Christianity on trial

The sole sound in the hushed Asheville, N.C., courtroom on June 2 was Eric Rudolph's leg shackles dragging on the floor as he shuffled in. The navy blue bullet-resistant vest against his orange jumpsuit displayed the official desire to protect his life even though, in his misapplied ardor to protect unborn children, he allegedly took the life of a police officer in Alabama and harmed others, as well.

At the arraignment, Rudolph responded with a polite, "Yes, Your Honor," to the judge's question about whether he needed a lawyer. He'll need several lawyers, because he will stand trial in Alabama and Georgia for bombings there. But Christianity, according to The Washington Post, might also need legal representation, or at least public relations help. "Is Terrorism Tied to Christian Sect?" a Post June 2 headline asked, and a prominently displayed photo depicted a metal cross at the entrance to a possible Rudolph hangout in the North Carolina mountains.

The lead paragraph of the story asked, "Is he a Christian terrorist?" Following paragraphs quoted a political science professor at Syracuse University saying the answer is yes and Idaho State University sociology professor James Aho offering an aha, gotcha: Christians who protest the juxtaposition of "Christian" and "terrorist" may understand "how Muslims feel" when they hear the term "Islamic terrorism."

It's fine to understand feelings, but

facts are also important. The Post did not point out that leading American pastors have universally condemned bombing of abortion businesses, but many leading Islamic clerics in the Middle East have refused to condemn the murder by Muslims of innocent civilians. Nor did it note that the Quran (in contrast to a document of similar length, the New Testament) has only a few statements promoting peace but over 100 advocating warfare. (Example: "Believers, make war on the infidels who dwell around you (9:123))."

The New York Times also needs some theological education. That newspaper began its five-article coverage during the first four days of June by quoting one North Carolina woman as saying, "Rudolph's a Christian and I'm a Christian, and he dedicated his life to fighting abortion. Those are our values." Why, of all the possible quotations to be used, did the Times choose that one, and why did a later article report on "extremist Christian" groups?

(Earth to New York Times editor: No one is a Christian because of ethnicity or location or opposition to abortion.

Christianity is a matter of belief in the Christ shown in the New Testament, and nothing in the New Testament justifies the killing of innocent people by individuals. Besides, would you write about "liberal extremists" and highlight a quotation from an ignorant person who supported the alleged killer of a pro-life leader by saying, "He's a liberal, and I'm a liberal"?)

Many other newspapers, such as USA Today, did not display such ignorance. The Los Angeles Times, on its toes after editor John Carroll's wake-up call (WORLD, June 7), ran six Rudolph-related articles during the first three days of June. None of them suggested a Christian/terrorism connection. Carroll had complained in a May 22 memo to Times section editors that he was "concerned about the perception -- and the occasional reality -- that the Times is a liberal, 'politically correct' newspaper."

Carroll also wrote, "We may happen to live in a political atmosphere that is suffused with liberal values (and is unreflective of the nation as a whole), but we are not going to push a liberal agenda in the news pages of the Times." That's a great declaration of intent, and one its East Coast brethren should agree to as well.

As it is, The Washington Post will occasionally offer corrections of misspellings -- my recent favorite is, "The last name of National Spelling Bee winner Sai R. Gunturi was misspelled ..." -- but not misthinkings.

International mediators head to Liberian capital

MONROVIA, Liberia (AP) — Civilians took advantage of a lull in explosions around Liberia's besieged capital to stock up on food Tuesday, as a West African team headed to the country to try to broker a truce in fighting threatening the government of President Charles Taylor.

As the bread, milk and sugar disappeared from shelves, Liberians continued to line up outside tiny, ramshackle stores in Monrovia's diplomatic quarter. "It's no time to be choosy," said Sarah Menoh, 41, as she waited patiently for her chance at one store's dwindling stocks.

"Whatever can enter the stomach is good to have." Others, with no money to buy supplies, could only stand and watch. "If we go on like this for more than two weeks, the suffering will become untold," said James Kollie, 35. "Our actual plight seems to be

unheard of outside of Liberia." Fighting between Taylor's forces and rebels has raged for days on the outskirts of the Monrovia, forcing civilians to barricade themselves in their homes. Sounds of battle continued until late Monday, sending thousands of people fleeing for

the eastern side of the city. Fighting appeared to subside overnight and the city was quiet Tuesday morning. Liberian troops patrolled downtown Monrovia in a show of force. Outside the E.U. compound, about 300 Ivory Coast nationals clamored for sanctuary. Bit by bit, some were allowed inside.

and won presidential elections in 1997. The rebels' drive gained momentum last week, when a joint U.N.-Sierra Leone court charged Taylor with war crimes for allegedly aiding Sierra Leone's notorious rebels over a decade. Taylor now controls little territory outside the capital. Insurgents pushed several miles inside Monrovia's western outskirts Monday.

Gunfire and explosions sounded in the distance as French helicopters swooped in to rescue Europeans, Americans and other foreigners who gathered overnight at the European Union and U.S. Embassy compounds. They were taken to a French warship, which was headed Tuesday to neighboring Ivory Coast.

It is the second time in a year France has orchestrated the hasty departure of foreigners from a West African nation in crisis. French troops evacuated hundreds of foreigners. France has a heavy presence in West Africa, where many nations were once French colonies. It took a lead role in Liberia in part because a French warship was offshore, American officials said.

Israel targets Hamas leader in missile strike

GAZA CITY, Gaza Strip (AP) — Israeli helicopters fired missiles at a car carrying a senior Hamas leader Tuesday, wounding him, killing his bodyguard and a bystander and jeopardizing the U.S.-backed road map to Mideast peace. The Palestinian prime minister called it a "terrorist" attack.

Abdel Aziz Rantisi said he jumped out of his car when he heard the choppers overhead. Rantisi underwent surgery for injuries to his leg.

Palestinian Prime Minister Mahmoud Abbas told Palestinian Satellite TV the helicopter strike was a "terrorist attack in the full meaning of the word because it targeted innocent people." The incident came four days after Hamas broke off talks with him on halting violence and refused to agree to a cease-fire.

Hamas then participated Sunday in a rare joint operation with Islamic Jihad and the Al Aqsa Martyrs' Brigades to kill four Israeli soldiers at an army outpost in Gaza. Hamas has killed hundreds of Israelis in bombings and shootings in the fighting.

Some Hamas leaders said before Tuesday's strike they were considering resuming truce talks. After the strike, however, Hamas threatened to target Israeli politicians in revenge.

"We will continue with our holy war and resistance until every last criminal Zionist is evicted from this land," Rantisi told the Arab TV satellite station Al-Jazeera from his hospital bed.

Abbas accused Israel of trying to destroy the "road map" plan to get out of its commitments. The prescription for Mideast peace and Palestinian statehood by 2005 was launched last week by President Bush, Abbas and Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon at a summit in Jordan.

Israeli security officials confirmed that Rantisi was the target of the strike, but political leaders declined to comment publicly.

Israel sent mixed messages with its actions Tuesday. On the one hand, Israeli troops dismantled 10 tiny, uninhabited settlement outposts in the West Bank overnight, in line with the first

requirements of the peace plan.

The missile strike threatened to unleash more attacks on Israelis, just as Egypt was trying to persuade Hamas to resume truce talks with Abbas.

Israel has accused Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat of trying to undercut Abbas in trying to negotiate a truce. Israel Radio on Tuesday quoted Defense

Minister Shaul Mofaz as saying Israel may soon expel Arafat, a step that, according to Israeli reports, has been blocked by the United States. Mofaz spoke at a closed-door session of a parliament committee.

The attack on Rantisi further weakened Abbas, who has been criticized at home for pledging to end the "armed intefadeh"

while getting little in return from Israel. Abbas said Tuesday he asked the United States to intervene and he would continue trying to resume talks with Hamas.





Phillies beat Angels in first-ever meeting

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — Given a choice, Larry Bowa would rather get a successful sacrifice bunt out of leadoff hitter Jimmy Rollins than a home run.

So the Philadelphia Phillies manager was visibly frustrated in the dugout Monday night after Rollins tried to bunt two runners over with no outs in the sixth inning and popped out to first base.

But Jim Thome picked up Rollins later in the sixth with an RBI single, triggering a 3-0 victory over the Anaheim Angels in the first-ever meeting between the teams, and the only game on the major league schedule.

"You've got to lay bunts down, and I know Jimmy understands that," Bowa said after his 200th win as Phillies manager. "That's very important for us to be successful. I know he didn't do it on purpose, but those are little things that you have to do to win games — and we didn't get it done."

Rollins and Thome hit solo homers in the eighth, giving Jose Mesa some breathing room for his 16th save and 103rd with the Phillies, which tied Steve Bedrosian's club record.

"Jimmy redeemed himself a little bit with a home run, but we're not hitting the ball that good to not execute in that situation," Bowa said.

The only Philadelphia baserunner through the first five innings was Mike Lieberthal, who singled leading off the second and fifth innings against Jarrod Washburn (6-6). The Angels' ace left-hander was charged with three runs and eight hits over 7 2-3 innings.

"I actually don't think I threw very well," Washburn said. "I made a lot of mistakes early in the game that I got away with and there were

some hard-hit balls that were right at guys. And late in the game, there were a couple of mistakes that I didn't get away with. It could have been a lot uglier than it was."

Padilla (5-7) allowed five hits, struck out two and walked none. The right-hander, who joined the Phillies in July 2000 as part of the five-player deal that sent Curt Schilling to Arizona, had faced the Angels only one other time in his career — pitching an inning of scoreless relief for the Diamondbacks.

"Usually you don't win with three runs against American League teams, but we were lucky tonight. Vicente pitched a good enough game where it stood up," Bowa said. "That's a good offense over there. I know a lot of those guys, and they're scary. You never feel safe."

Scott Spiezio led off the third and fifth innings with singles for the Angels' only hits to that point — although Padilla hit two other batters.

Spiezio singled again in the seventh, but Brad Fullmer overslid third base and David Bell tagged him for the second out after taking a one-hop throw from right fielder Bobby Abreu. Padilla then retired Benji Gil on a comebacker.

"Bobby made a great throw, and then David kept the ball on the runner," Bowa said. "A lot of guys don't do that, but David stayed with him. That was a big turning point for me."

Spiezio was stranded at third base in the third when Adam Kennedy struck out and Darin Erstad grounded out. Erstad, sidelined since April 20 because of tendinitis in his right hamstring, was activated from the DL before the game.

Townsend pitches Rice to victory over Cougars

HOUSTON (AP) — The Rice Owls should be familiar with the College World Series by now. They'd just like to improve on past performances.

They'll return to Omaha, Neb., for the fourth time in seven years this weekend after Wade Townsend struck out nine and allowed four hits over eight innings Monday, leading the Owls to a 5-2 victory over the Houston Cougars in their Super Regional.

They'll take a 1-6 CWS record into their weekend game against Southwest Missouri State. Back-to-back losses to Texas and Notre Dame sent Rice home from last year's tournament.

"Most of us were there last year and we really didn't like how we did so that gives us drive and motivation to do better this year," center fielder Austin Davis said. "We have the experience of being there and how the crowds can be and what to expect. That's an advantage going back."

Townsend (10-1) retired 11 in a row at one stretch. He allowed only one hit after the third inning. He had two walks and allowed one earned run.

"I think this is our most solid team," Rice coach Wayne Graham said. "We have more pitching depth than in the past. I feel we've got a shot."

"Right after the Notre

Dame game last year, I think it was kind of a team decision that we were going back no matter what," Davis said. "Our guys battled the whole time. Now we've reached our goals and now we've got one more goal, to win it."

The Owls certainly convinced Houston coach Rayner Noble, who served as an assistant under Graham at Rice before taking over the Cougars.

"I think the team that we played three games here is one of the best teams I've seen in college baseball," Noble said. "If they just do what they did to us this weekend, there's no reason they shouldn't win the whole thing."

After a triple by Michael Bourn in the third inning, Townsend retired 11 batters in order before walking Tully with two out in the sixth inning.

"Bourn hit a 2-1 pitch and after that I started getting ahead of the hitters and we were playing great defense," Townsend said.

Houston got a run in the first on an RBI single by Tully. Matt Farrington's sacrifice fly in the third tied it at 2-2, scoring Bourn, who had tripled to the right-center-field wall.

NFL fan gathering scheduled in Houston convention center

HOUSTON (AP) — An event expected to draw tens of thousands of fans daily during the run-up to next year's Super Bowl here will be at the George R. Brown Convention Center, a National Football League official says.

The league chose the downtown site for the NFL Experience over Reliant Park, partly because of the success enjoyed when the attraction was held near the Gas Lamp District in San Diego, a popular tourist mecca, in January.

Jim Steeg, NFL senior vice president

in charge of the Super Bowl, made the announcement Monday at a Houston Super Bowl XXXVIII Host Committee luncheon.

The Feb. 1 game at Reliant Stadium will mark the Super Bowl's return to Texas for the first time since 1974, when roofless Rice Stadium played host.

The pavilion housing the NFL Experience has typically been set up near the stadium where the game has been played. But Steeg has said he likes the

idea of having the pavilion near Houston's downtown, where people can walk to restaurants and other attractions.

Fans at NFL Experience can run pass patterns, compete in football-throwing games, obtain autographs, hear live music and buy souvenirs.

Among other preparations, Don Henderson, chairman of the Host Committee's hotel oversight committee, said most local hotels have agreed not to engage in price-gouging during the weeks before the Super Bowl.





