 for abnormally short youthWASHINGTON (AP) In kindergarten, Nicole Costa was too short to reach even the classroom water fountain. At age 6, doctors predicted her adult beight would be just 4 feet 8 inches.
Then she was prescribed almost daily injections of growth hormone for the next seven years - a controversial practice in children, like Nicole whose shormess isn't caused by any known disease. But it worked -at 17 , Nicole. is now a more average 5 feet 2 inches.
She uged govemment sci entists on Tuesday to let other children have the same chance with that drug. "It will make their world a different place" Advisers to the Food and Drug Administration grudg ingly agreed, backing Eli Lilly \& Co.'s bid to become the firs growth hormone maker allowed to market the drug for abnormally short but otherwise healthy children.
The advisers agonized ove the decision, waming that dra matic growth like Nicole's rare - most children will undergo lots of expense and trouble in hopes of growing roughly 2 inches taller. Tm worried about the medicalization of shortness," said women's health specialist Nancy Worcester of the University of Wisconsin Madison, the panel's consumer representative.
"We are talking about treating otherwise perfectly normal kids who are short for five to 10 years," with little infor-
mation about longterm side effects, complained panelist Dr Deborah Grady of the University of Califormia, San Francisco.
Growth hormone has been used for 16 years to trea children who are extremely short because their bodies don't naturally produce th substance, and to treat handful of other growth 200,000 children worldwid have taken itdren worldwide have taken

Lilly's treatment require ments include boys predicted to be shorter than 5 feet 3 inches as adults, and girls shorter than 4-feet 11 inches. Lilly counts some 400,000 such children ages 7 to 15 , bu predicts that only about 10 percent ultimately would receive growth hormone because of tight eligibility cri teria - and because many families simply won't want to endure six shots a week for years.
Lilly's studies of several dozen patients tracked until adulthood found growth hormone treatment can make such children grow 1.5 to 2.8 inches taller than they otherwise would have.

## Senate endorses plan to revive nuclear power

WASHINGTON (AP) U.S. taxpayers may underwrite a new generation of nuclear power plants now that the part of a broad energy bill. Under the measure, the ernment would provide gov guarantees for at least a hal dozen advanced design comdozen, advanced design com-

mercial nuclear power plants expected to cost about $\$ 3$ billion each. The government would guarantee half the cost. An attempt to strip the loan guarantees from the, Senate bill fell short Tuesday, 50-48. Critics called the government help a giveaway to a mature
industry that should be left to industry that should be left to The guarantees are part of broader package of pro-nuclear broader package of pro-nuclear
measures in the bill, which may be approved within weeks, including a plan for the government to build a $\$ 1.1$ billion reactor to make hydrogen and $\$ 865$ million for research into reducing nuclear waste.
The measure marks the móst ambitious attempt to energize the nuclear industry in decades and goes much further to help nuclear power than House legislation passed in April.
Sen. Pete Domenici, RN.M., architect of a package of pro-nuclear provisions, said the

## WHO angers Taiwan by refusing to drop SARS advisory

TAIPEI, Taiwan (AP) - Taiwan was angry Wednesday about a World Health Organization decision not to lift SARS travel advisory for the island as it has done for Canada, where - despite the WHO vote of confidence - a Meanwhile, a top WHO disease expert sought answers from Beijing about a sharp drop in reported SARS cases there that hasn't matched more gradual decreases elsewhere. He declined to say whether WHO was considering lifting a travel advisory for the Chinese capital.
WHO considers the export of SARS cases a key factor in deciding to impose travel advisories, which governments are eager to avoid because of the cloud it casts over their tourism industries
But WHO said Tuesday it decided against reinstating a travel warning to Canada's largest city, Toronto, despite the sickened U.S. traveler and a new suspected hospital outbreak in the Toronto area.
On the other hand, Taiwanese officials said Wednesday that WHO rejected the island's request to have its advisory canceled because the agency feared Taiwan might be expor ing SARS cases.
Severe acute respiratory syndrome has infected more than 8,300 worldwide and has killed at least 790 - most of them Th.
The U.N. health agency has requested more information about six cases involving people who developed SARS
symptoms after leaving Taiwan, said Su Yi-jen, chief of symptoms after leaving Taiwan, said
Taiwan's Center for Disease Control.
The Taiwanese official said the WHO decision was unfair and that Taiwan has filed a protest with the Geneva-based organization.
"None of the countries where those six people traveled to is treating them as SARS cases," Su said.
WHO is especially concerned about a Taiwanese traveler who developed SARS symptoms in Sao Paulo, Brazil, on June 4, Su said. The other sick travelers - who left Taiwan between March 4 and May 22 - went to the United States, South Korea, the Philippines, Germany and Thailand, he said.

## House unveils $\$ 82$ billion tax cut plan

WASHINGTON (AP) Hòuse Republican leaders, yielding to pressure from the Senate and White House to expand the child tax cred it for low-income families, upped the ante with an $\$ 82$ upped the ante with an $\$ 82$ extends the child credits to higher-income couples and higher-income couples and

"What we are interested in is real, solid tax relief for those that are paying taxes," House Majority Leader Tom DeLay said.
The Texas Republican said the House would vote Thursday on the bill. Passage there would send the politically charged measure back to the Senate, where lawmakers voted overwhelmingly last week to pass much smaller legislation expanding the child credit to low-income families.
Both bills call for expanding the $\$ 1,000$ child tax credit to more lowincome families by allowing them to claim a refund worth up to 15 percent of their income over $\$ 10,500$. That would allow the 6.5 million families left out of the tax cut that President Bush signed on May 28 to
