



Tulia defendants begin life on outside

TULIA (AP) — Hours after he and 11 others were released from prison on questionable drug convictions, Freddie Brookins Jr. enjoyed the simple pleasure of holding his wife's hand at an indoor

"It feels so good out here," Brookins said as he stood with his wife, Terri, at the pienic about a block from the Swisher County Courthouse, where a judge had released all 12 on bond Monday pending a ruling by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals. "It's weird. It's been so long I'm so excited I can't even eat.

The defendants had been sent to prison on the testimony of a now-discredited white undercover agent in a racially charged case that tore apart this town of 5,000 people and led to investigations by the U.S. Justice Department and the Texas Attorney General's office.

Forty-six people, 39 of them black. were arrested in July 1999 and accused of possessing cocaine following an 18month undercover operation. Undercover alone and used no audio or video surveillance. And no drugs or money were found during the arrests.



Baseball needs more conflicts

MIAMI - Many potential fans (particularly younger ones) complain that baseball is too slow. That's commonly phrased as "games last too long" - yet football games last longer. Baseball's real problem is what I'd call a decline in Confrontations per Hour (CPH).

I came up with my CPH theory while watching three Florida Marlins-Anaheim Angels games here last weekend. At the June 6 game, the Angels scored their first run on a line drive single (which the Marlins centerfielder dove for and almost grabbed), a stolen base, a wild pitch and a sacrifice fly (on which the runner barely scored).

Count the confrontations: pitcher vs. batter, hitter vs. centerfielder, pitcher vs. runner (trying to hold him at first), runner vs. catcher, runner vs. outfielder.

Then the Marlins tied the game on a homerun. Only one quickly ended confrontation: batter-pitcher. The scoreboard showed one run for each side, but the difference in sustained interest was

immense The crowd on June 6 cheered for a few seconds when another home run put the Marlins ahead. But a sustained buzz came only when the Angels opened their comeback attempt in the ninth inning with a single. The Marlins closer then successfully challenged the three top Angels hitters as the crowd roared.

The June 7 game also had a home run as the key blow, but the June 8 game was a clinic in how baseball should be played. In the bottom of the first inning,

center fielder by scoring all the way

from first on a subsequent double. The Angels struck back with a single, a double and an exciting triple, and held a one-run lead going into the eighth. They then scored two runs on daring base-running - three stolen bases, including an exceptionally rare steal of home - and won the game going away.

Major league baseball, with its McGwire-Sosa-Barry Bonds trinity, has become homer-happy. New, smaller ballparks, muscled-up (and sometimes drugged-up) hitters, pitchers throwing cautiously because the least mistake can be hit out of the park, and managers induced to sit back and wait for threerun homers rather than start runners have all contributed to fewer confrontations per hour in baseball. Meanwhile, super-confrontational football has ascended in popularity.

What can be done? Place plexiglass barriers above outfield walls so that towering smashes are still home runs but line drives turn into outfielder vs. runner confrontational doubles. Reduce

the amount of foul territory: A foul popup that is usually an easy catch for an infielder or catcher is one of baseball's non-confrontational plays. Study traditional baseball adjustments -- mound height, strike zone, liveliness of balls to see how CPH could be increased without altering basic pitcher-hitter match-ups.

I would experiment in spring training with one major alteration, based on the need to cut down on intentional walks that zap confrontation at the point where intensity would otherwise be highest. One possibility: Force pitchers to challenge baseball's best hitters by making a walk when runners are in scoring position and first base is open worth two bases rather than one.

What are intentional walks now costing us? Last month, I watched a game in Atlanta where scared pitchers walked San Francisco star Barry Bonds three times. But in the ninth inning, with the Braves holding a 6-3 lead and Bonds coming up with one man on base, there was no possible advantage in walking him, so Braves closer John Smoltz went mano a mano against the hitter with the crowd roaring as loudly as I've ever heard at a ballpark -- and erupting when Bonds hit a weak ground ball to second.

I'd like to see confrontations like that throughout the game. A rise in CPH would also lead to an increase in the number of fans.

North Korea: Blockade could lead to war, put Japan in jeopardy

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) - North Korea warned Tuesday that any economic blockade by the United States and its allies against the communist state could lead to a war that would include Japan.

The warning came as the United States, Japan and Australia, began cracking down on the North Korean trade in illicit drugs, weapons and counterfeit money.

North Korea's main state-run newspaper Rodong Sinmun claimed Tuesday that the United States is "laying an international siege to the North and putting a blockade against it as a premeditated scheme to start a new war on the Korean peninsula.'

North Korea will take "physical retaliation,"

including "all means and methods an independent country can take," if it concludes that the recent moves by the allies violate its sovereignty, Rodong said in a commentary carried by the North's official news agency KCNA.

"There is no guarantee that this blockade will not lead to such a serious condition as a full-scale war," said Rodong. "If war breaks out between the North and the United States, it will not be limited to the Korean Peninsula but all the areas where aggressors are lurking will become our targets."

Three men die rigging bomb

Afghanistan KABUL, (AP) - Three suspected terrorists were killed in Afghanistan over the weekend when a bomb they were trying to plant under a bridge in the east of the country exploded by mistake, a milicommander Tuesday.

remote-controlled The bomb exploded Sunday at al-Tamur, on the main road from Kabul to the eastern town of Gardez, said Gen. Atiqullah Uddin, a military commander speaking by satellite phone from Gardez.

Two of the men planting the device died in the blast, while a third man succumbed to severe wounds after being treated at a local hospital. The bridge was damaged, but cars were still able to move around it, Uddin said.

The three men comprised one of 17 suspected terrorist teams local authorities are hunting down in several provinces in southeastern Afghanistan, Uddin said, adding that each group was being paid \$50,000 to carry out such operations. It was not known who was paying them.

A draft statement by the forum of more than 20 Asian-Pacific countries called for a "peaceful solution of the nuclear problem" on the Korean Peninsula "for the sake of durable peace and security in the region."

Japan has been tightening safety and customs inspections of North Korean ships long suspected of smuggling missile parts and narcotics between the two countries. In the past week, they have detained one cargo ship and blocked another from docking for safety violations.

The move came after a North Korean defector told U.S. lawmakers last month that a North Korean ferry linking the two countries was

used to smuggle missile parts.

Japan allows trade with North Korea on an informal basis, though the two countries have no diplomatic relations. Last 147 in Japan.

In a joint statement in Hawaii last week, U.S., Japanese and South Korean officials expressed concern about the North's narcotics trafficking and counterfeiting, and said they discussed cooperation to stop them.

In the past few days, both Japanese and South Korean officials have said that intensifying pressure on North Korea would force it to accept a U.S. offer for multilateral talks on halting its suspected nuclear weapons pro-

In April, Australian authorities raided a North Korean-owned ship and charged its crew with aiding and abetting the trafficking of

Tensions have increased since October, when U.S. officials said North Korea admitted having a covert nuclear program.

The mayor of Hiroshima has invited North Korean leader Kim Jong II to attend this year's memorial of the 1945 atomic bombing in protest of Pyongyang's plans to pursue nuclear weapons.

World Health Organization lifts travel warning against Taiwan, but not Beijing

LUMPUR, KUALA Malaysia (AP) — The World Health Organization gave Taiwan an improving bill of health Tuesday, canceling a month-old travel warning aimed at stopping the spread of SARS while keeping a similar advisory in place against

The WHO decision underscored claims made at an international SARS conference that the worldwide fight to contain the disease was succeeding — but Canadian officials warned against complacency, noting a second outbreak had struck their country.

Taiwanese officials in Kuala Lumpur sipped Champagne after the warning was canceled, rewarding their efforts to tighten anti-SARS controls after poor safeguards at hospitals had led to a surge in deaths of health-care work-

"This is a turning point for Taiwan," said Dr. Su Ih-jen, Taiwan's director of disease control. If the travel advisory was not removed, Taiwan's economy could not stand much longer."

Hong Kong, Taiwan was hit hardest by severe acute respiratory syndrome with 697 cases, including 83 deaths.

"The overall situation in

Taiwan are now minimal," Dr. Shigeru Omi, the WHO's regional director, told a news

It was "anybody's guess" when the travel warning would be lifted against Beijing, the last area still under a WHO advisory to postpone non-essential travel because of the SARS threat, Omi said. Advisories have already been lifted against other Chinese provinces.

Though Omi said that the situation in the Chinese capital was improving, Beijing still has a large number of existing SARS cases and the source of infection has not been traced for some, Omi

China had suffered 5,327 probable cases, including 346 deaths, as of Monday, Gao Qiang, China's vice minister for health, told the confer-

Gao refused to comment on the travel warning against Beijing, but showed diplomatic goodwill to Taiwan, something rare between the bitter

"I would like to congratu-After mainland China and late them, because we are all Chinese," Gao told reporters. "It's good for the recovery of Taiwan's tourism industry and economic development."

better, so risks to travelers to than 8,400 since first being detected in southern China in November. New cases spiked in March and April, but have plunged in recent weeks.


"The global epidemic is now coming under control, but we must continue the fight against the disease nationally and internationally until the end," said Omi.

SARS exposed weaknesses in information-sharing, surveillance and health care, and countries must "be better prepared next time," Omi said, echoing warnings that new diseases will strike someday.

Dr. Paul Gully, director general of Canada's health department, said even heightened surveillance response mechanisms put in after SARS first broke out in Toronto wasn't enough to prevent a second cluster of cases in late May.

"It's really apparent that the ember can continue to smolder and the disease recur," Gully told the confer-


"San Antonio throws great parties, and this will be another party to be remembered," pledged Mayor Ed Garza in a written statement.

Much of the city was nursing a collective hangover Monday after whooping it up into the wee hours after the Spurs captured the championship by beating the New Jersey Nets, 88-77, on Sunday night.

Thousands of joyous Spurs fans jammed downtown San Antonio after the final buzzer to take part in the victory. Motorists inched bumper to bumper along the main thoroughfares, often with their passengers hanging out windows to thrust their fists into the humid night air or slap hands with sidewalkbound onlookers.

"This is very cool," said Victor Victela, who watched the procession down Commerce Street, in the heart of downtown. "It's better (than 1999) because it's here and they won it at home."

When the Spurs won their first title in 1999, an estimated 300,000 people gathered on the restaurantsaloon-lined and Riverwalk to watch the team and the championship trophy float down the San Antonio River on barges.

Crime less, report says

WASHINGTON (AP) -Crime resumed its decline overall last year, even though the numbers of murders and rapes increased, the FBI report-

The FBI's preliminary Uniform Crime Report found a 0.2 percent decrease in the number of crimes reported to the police or other law enforcement agencies in 2002, as compared with 2001. That resumed a trend that began in 1991, broken only in 2001 when crime rose by 2.1 percent over 2000.

The figures should be considered good news, said James Alan Fox, a professor of criminal justice at Northeastern University.

With financially plagued cities laying off police officers and switching others to homeland security, with people losing their jobs because of the economy's problems and with increases in gang activity, overall crime easily could be going up rather than down, Fox said.

"The fact that it isn't is a success," he said. "We're holding our own despite difficult times that we're in.'

Still, the FBI said in the report released Monday, the number of reported rapes rose by 4 percent and the number of murders grew by 0.8 percent.

The biggest percentage increases in murders were recorded in suburban counties, up 12.4 percent, the FBI's preliminary crime statistics for 2002 showed. Murders declined 1.2 percent in rural counties and were down 14.7 percent in cities of fewer than 10,000 people.

Some city problems are spilling over into adjacent suburbs that have become more urbanized, said David Muhlhausen, a criminal justice expert with the Heritage Foundation, a conservative Washington think tank. 'The distinctions between cities and suburbs are sort of blurred now," he said.

Vehicles without side air bags score poorly

WASHINGTON (AP) -Two small sport utility vehicles with side air bags got high ratings from the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety in its firstever side-impact crash tests.

Vehicles performed poorly in the tests which were among the first to measure what happens when dummies the size of small women are hit in side-impact crashes.

In test results released Tuesday, 2003 models of the Subaru Forester and the Ford Escape performed best among the 42 small SUVs tested.

Both vehicles received a "good" rating. The only other vehicle tested with side airbags, the Hyundai Santa Fe, received the second best "acceptable" rating, while the others earned 'marginal" or "poor" scores.

The results were based on

vehicle performance as well as how much injury was caused to identical dummies in the driver's seat and left rear seat as a result of the 31 mph crash.

The Subaru Forester offers standard side air bags with torso and head protection, while similar air bags are optional in the Ford Escape. The Insurance Institute found that when the Escape was tested without, air bags, it performed considerably

The Mitsubishi Outlander performed the worst in the Insurance Industry's test. In an Outlander with no side air bag, the crash barrier crushed the side of the vehicle and struck the dummy in the head, causing serious injuries to the head, torso and pelvis.

Mitsubishi said it will review the tests results, but added that

the Insurance Institute is using a new kind of test that hasn't been adopted by automakers. The company also pointed out that it received high ratings in a frontal crash test performed by the Insurance Institute earlier this

"In fact, the 2003 Mitsubishi Outlander has demonstrated very good real world safety performance," the company said in

The Honda CR-V and the Jeep Wrangler got ratings of "marginal," while the lowest rating of "poor" went to the Honda Element, the Saturn Vue, the Land Rover Freelander, the Suzuki Grand Vitara, the Toyota RAV4, the Escape without air bags, and the Outlander.

The Insurance Institute automatically tested the vehicles with air bags if the air bags were

side air bags as an option could ask the group to test their vehicles with the air bags as long as they agreed to supply a second vehicle without Otherwise, the vehicle was tested without a side air bag.

Ford was the only company that requested two tests, the Insurance Institute said. The Freeloader, RAV4, Grand Vitara and the Wrangler don't offer side air bags as an

The Insurance Institute said side-impact tests are critical, since many vehicles that perform well in frontal crashes are still vulnerable in side crashes. The boom in large SUVs and pickups also has contributed to an increasing proportion of deaths in side-impact crashes, since vehicles are often mis-

standard. Automakers that offer matched by height and weight, safety experts say.

> In a report released last week, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration said it is considering adopting minimum head and chest protection requirements. The Insurance Institute also is working with automakers to develop voluntary safety standards to minimize damage in side-impact crashes. Those standards are expected to come out in late fall.

In the meantime, Brian O'Neill, president of the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, said he hopes the crash test results will spur improvements more quickly.

"This is what happened with our frontal crash test results, and now we expect consumers will use the new test results to help them choose vehicles," he said.






