**Multimillion-dollar multi-state lotteries woo Texas**

AUSTIN (AP) — Which multistate lottery is best-suited to deliver the \$101 million that Texas officials predict would be generated for the state treasury and help get the state out of its revenue shortfall?

Officials of Powerball, a consortium of 25 individual lotteries, and from the 10-state Mega Millions lottery brought presentations to the Texas state capitol on Monday, each group hoping to entice the Texas Lottery Commission into casting their lot with them.

Going into Monday's hearing, neither side would discuss its proposal in advance. The commission will also hear testimony from anyone who wishes to discuss the matter, lottery commission chairman C. Thomas Clowe said.

"Texas is a real attractive state for either one of them," Clowe was quoted in Monday's editions of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. "That's why I intend to listen very carefully to what they'll have to say, and I'll probably have some questions that I'll want them to answer."

# State lawmakers back in session

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas lawmakers returned to the Capitol on Monday, less than a month after they packed their bags and left town after a 140-day regular session.

House Speaker Tom Craddick gavelled the House to order shortly after 10 a.m., although senators waited until after a caucus meeting to get started on the special session.

## Unresolved redistricting issue tops agenda.

Gov. Rick Perry this month called state legislators back for another 30 days to take care of the redrawing of congressional districts, a topic that remained unresolved when lawmakers adjourned June 2. The issue prompted a Democratic walkout in the House in May.

Minutes before the session

began Monday, more than two-dozen Democrats gathered to again denounce the Republican effort, calling it a GOP "power grab" by U.S. House Majority Leader Tom DeLay.

"This week is independence week, and we're going to find out this week whether the Texas Legislature is still inde-

pendent from the partisans in Washington, D.C.," said Rep. Jim Dunning of Waco, House Democratic Caucus leader.

In a letter announcing the session, Perry said elected officials, not federal judges, should be responsible for drawing district lines.

Lawmakers during the 2001 legislative session could not

agree on how to draw the districts so the current map was drawn by federal judges. Democrats now have a 17-15 majority in Congress.

Republicans argue, however, that Texas should have more GOP representatives in Congress, noting that every statewide office in Texas is ruled by a Republican.

## Officers question man here re: death

Police were questioning a Pampa man today in connection with the beating death of a man in Amarillo early this morning.

Officers responding to a 911 call at 211 S. Nelson about 7 a.m. this morning said they found a young man who was subsequently taken to Pampa Regional Medical Center emergency room by Metro Rural Ambulance Service for treatment of what appeared to be minor injuries.

There was some indication, officers said, that the man feared he had beaten a man to death in Amarillo earlier today.

Pampa police said Amarillo law enforcement authorities confirmed that a man had died of unspecified injuries early today.

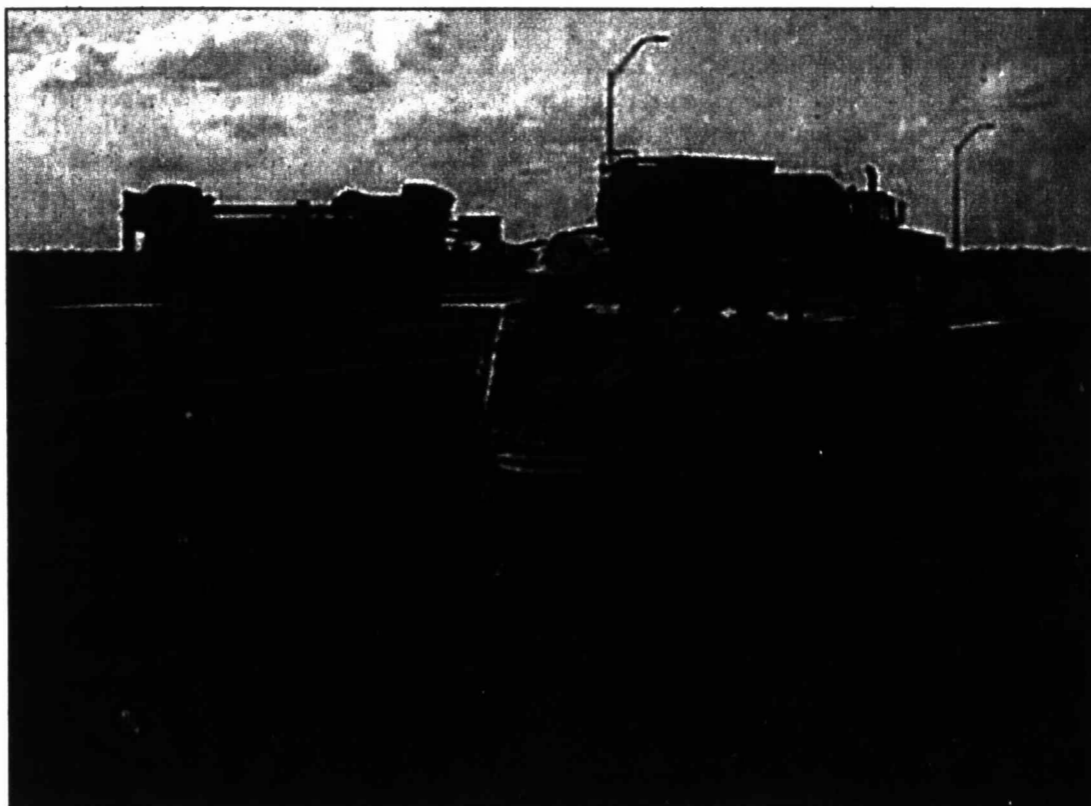
Detectives from the Amarillo Special Crimes Unit were in Pampa this morning questioning a red-headed young man at the Pampa police department shortly before noon today, dressed in hospital gown and slippers.

Pampa police officers booked blood-spattered clothing taken from the man into evidence this morning.

Authorities said the man apparently fled to his home in Pampa early today following a fight in Amarillo.

Pampa police questioned the man's father about 8 a.m. today in connection with the investigation.

## Oil spill blocks highway

### Motorcycle tire blow-out injures couple

A crude oil spill on Texas Highway 70 and a motorcycle wreck on U.S. Highway 60 kept Texas Department of Public Safety troopers busy this weekend.

Gallons of light crude oil spilled across the highway at Texas 70 and Loop 171 at 5:45 p.m. Friday, after a tank trailer pulled by a Taylor Propane tank truck, tipped over onto its side.

Driver of the truck, Donald Eugene Ledbetter, 38, 1122 S. Christy, was turning from the Loop north onto Highway 70 when the trailer turned over onto its left side, according to Trooper David O'Brien's report of the accident.

Ledbetter received a citation for unsafe speed per conditions, according to the report. Ledbetter was reportedly uninjured from the mishap.

Pampa firefighters and local law enforcement agencies spent more than two hours at the scene trying to divert traffic and find the best way to clean up the spill.

Fire officials determined that neither they

nor the City of Pampa had the right equipment to control such a spill. Perfex Energy Consultants were called.

Fire Capt. Mike Day said Perfex brought cottonseed hulls combined with a special bacteria to the site to absorb the oil.

The highway was reopened about 8 p.m.

On Saturday, a couple riding a motorcycle reportedly participating in the David Leudecke Memorial Benefit Run were injured when the motorcycle's back tire blew out about 10 miles east of Pampa U.S. Highway 60.

Kody Shane Patterson, 41, of Amarillo and Becky Edmonson, 45, of Hedley were both thrown from the 2001 Harley-Davidson Heritage when the back tire blew out at about 4 p.m. Saturday, causing Patterson, who was driving to lose control of the bike, according to Trooper Jesse Cerda's report of the accident. The motorcycle skidded on its left side and came to rest facing west in the westbound lane, the report said.

Both riders were taken to Northwest Texas Hospital by Rural/Metro Ambulance Service. Their injuries were listed as non-incapacitating on the DPS report. Neither were wearing a helmet, the report states.

## Dispute erupts in gunfire; five hurt

A neighborhood dispute erupted in gunfire Sunday afternoon in Pampa, leaving four people suffering gunshot wounds.

Pampa police officers continued their investigation today in the Sunday afternoon shooting in the 1100 block of South Christy that resulted in two adults and two children suffering shotgun wounds.

Officers said they were searching for an Hispanic man today in connection with the shooting.

Julian Dominguez Lopez, 23, 1021 Twiford, suffered wounds to his lower back and left hand from a shotgun blast about 5:30 p.m., Sunday, at 1130 S. Christy, officers said. Lopez was taken to Pampa Regional Medical Center by Rural/Metro Ambulance Service for treatment of his wounds. He was listed in stable condition, police said today.

Police records indicate that a 1e-year and a 2-year-old boy both suffered gunshot wounds in the shooting and that two other adults were injured. The 2-year-old was hit in his left index finger by shotgun pellets, authorities said today.

The child was taken to PMRC emergency room by private vehicle and was treated and released.

The other three victims

## City Commission to meet Tuesday

The Pampa City Commission will meet at 9 a.m. Tuesday in their chambers at City Hall in a special meeting to consult with their attorney, hear the second and final reading on two new ordinances and authorize the city manager to lease the old U.S. Bus building.

The city commission will go into executive session Tuesday morning to meet with their attorney in connection with a threatened lawsuit.

In public session, they will hear the second and final reading of Ordinance 1397 amending the city's operating budget and Ordinance 1398 temporarily increasing city water rates.

Because of increased charges from the Canadian River Municipal Water

## Gaza Strip opens with handshake

GAZA CITY, Gaza Strip (AP) — Israeli and Palestinian commanders shook hands Monday, bulldozers dismantled checkpoints and Palestinian traffic flowed freely in the Gaza Strip — significant steps toward ending 33 months of bloody fighting.

A Palestinian shooting killed a Bulgarian truck driver in the West Bank, and gunmen opened fire on workers near the border with Israel, suggesting some armed bands had not been brought into line with the day-old cease-fire called by militant groups.

But after Israel implemented a troop pullout from northern Gaza and agreed to pull out of Bethlehem on Wednesday, Prime Minister Ariel Sharon shrugged off calls to react to the shootings and called for patience.

"Even if the Palestinians were the fastest in the world and the most deter-

mined, you can't expect them to destroy terrorism in a moment, since this morning," Sharon told members of parliament.

In another reflection of disengagement, Sharon was to meet his Palestinian counterpart in Jerusalem on Tuesday, Palestinian sources said.

Several Palestinian militant groups announced a suspension of attacks against Israelis on Sunday. The Al Aqsa Martyrs Brigade, linked to Yasser Arafat's Fatah movement, claimed responsibility for Monday's shooting. Fatah had earlier said Al Aqsa would halt attacks, but the militia consists of bands of gunmen who do not recognize a central authority — unlike the armed wings of Hamas and Islamic Jihad, the other signatories to the three-month truce.

Three hours later, Palestinians opened fire on workers building a security fence near the West Bank town of Qalqilya,

the military said. No one was hurt, and soldiers returned fire.

Both sides have been skeptical the truce will hold, having been disappointed so many times before. A dispute loomed over Israel's demand that the Palestinian Authority dismantle the militant groups altogether.

But there was a first glimmer of optimism as Israeli troops pulled out of the north Gaza town of Beit Hanoun, which had seen most of its farmland razed by Israeli bulldozers.

"You were late," Mohammed Shabat, 65, pointing to the destruction, told Palestinian policemen who took over the Israeli positions. "But, God willing, we will bring this town back to the old days."

Foreign Minister Nabil Shaath said Israel should withdraw from all West

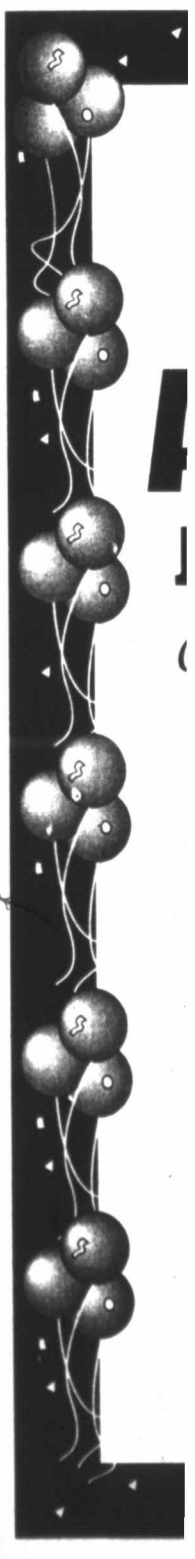

Bank towns within six weeks. "Things are promising and we must seize this moment," he said.

The two largest Israeli dailies, Yediot Ahronot and Maariv, framed their front-pages in blue, normally reserved for editions on Jewish holidays. "Cease-fire," read a banner headline in the Maariv daily, above a photo of soldiers hugging in Gaza. Yediot had soldiers posing on a tank with an Israeli flag.

The withdrawal scenes were reminiscent of the mid-1990s, when Israeli troops pulled out of Palestinian population centers under interim peace deals. Since fighting erupted in September 2000, Israel has reoccupied most of those areas; 2,414 people have been killed on the Palestinian side and 807 on the Israeli side.

Two new ingredients raised hope for the current cease-fire effort: Both sides, exhausted by the carnage, are grateful for the break in fighting; and the United States is intensively engaged in supervising implementation of the so-called "road map" to Mideast peace and Palestinian statehood by 2005.

Over the weekend, National Security Adviser Condoleezza Rice held talks with Israeli and Palestinian leaders on how to move forward.

On Sunday, the three major Palestinian factions announced a truce. The Islamic militant groups Hamas and Islamic Jihad agreed to lay down arms for three months, while Fatah announced a six-month cease-fire.

Israel reacted coldly to the truce announcements, which were accompanied by a number of demands, including a prisoner release and a halt to Israeli military strikes. They were not presented as preconditions.

Israel has refused to make blanket promises but pledged to halt targeted attacks of wanted Palestinians in areas now controlled by Palestinian police.

"The cease-fire agreement (with the militants) was not reached with Israel," said Israeli Foreign Minister Silvan Shalom Monday.

"Since we are not party to it, its conditions are none of our business." Shalom said Israel had U.S. backing in demanding that "the Palestinian Authority dismantle the terror organizations."

A senior security source told AP that this meant confiscating the militants' weapons, destroying bomb factories and arresting anyone trying to carry out attacks — but in an important nuance added that arrests of leaders or militants who carried out attacks in the past would not be required.

In Beit Hanoun in northern Gaza, Palestinian police arrived in a convoy of blue cruisers Monday morning but were forced to stop at the outskirts. Israeli troops had destroyed the main roads, including three overpasses, effectively cutting off the town from the rest of Gaza. A bulldozer was called in to carve a path toward a nearby industrial zone, so workers could get to their jobs for the first time in two months.

Israeli troops had moved in and out so many times that it became routine, as they tried to stop Palestinian militants from firing homemade rockets over the fence at the Israeli town of Sderot, less than a mile away.

Ali Zaaneen, whose four-acre vegetable farm had been leveled by troops, watched the arrival of the police convoy without excitement. "The Israeli aggression has left no space in our heart for hope and joy," he said.

Witnesses said that troops had destroyed dozens of buildings, thousands of trees and a three-mile stretch of road connecting the town with Gaza City. Sufian Hammad, a spokesman for the Beit Hanoun municipality, said many thousands of orange trees had been uprooted.

As the last tanks pulled out of town, two young boys emerged from a house and planted a Palestinian flag in the sand.

"I hope that this will be the last time we see them as invaders," said Rafet Jamal, 45, watching from a balcony with his 12-year-old son.

Later in the morning, Israel dismantled checkpoints along the main north-south roads, which had been a major cause of hardship.

would have probably given Republicans as many as 20 seats. The walkout by the Democrats killed the redistricting bill.

This time around, Republicans are hopeful for a better outcome.

Rep. Phil King, R-Weatherford, filed a redistricting bill during the regular session and said he plans to file another map Monday.

"I don't think there will be a walkout," King said.

"I would expect an awful lot of acrimony but I do expect the Legislature to pass a new plan," said Rep. Mike Krusee, R-Taylor.

Dunnam said last week that the House Democratic Caucus had not yet met to discuss its strategy. He also said he expected that enough Democratic state senators would oppose a redistricting bill to block it from debate.

Republicans rule the Senate 19-12 but under the chamber's rules, set by the senators, two-thirds of the chamber's 31 members must agree to bring an issue to the floor for debate. That means 11 votes would be needed to kill the bill.

The Senate Democratic

Caucus has not yet counted votes to see if it has enough support to block the measure, said Caucus Chairwoman Sen. Leticia Van de Putte.

"Our hope is that we won't have to deal with this," said Van de Putte of San Antonio.

Redistricting already has emotions running high.

A House subcommittee meeting on redistricting last week in Brownsville fell apart when too few members showed up to make a quorum

and the crowd shouted: "Shut it down! Shut it down!"

House redistricting subcommittee meetings were scheduled throughout the state last week. The Senate held a redistricting hearing in Laredo on Saturday and more are scheduled this week across the state.

The special session will be the first since Democratic Gov. Ann Richards called one on public education in late 1992.

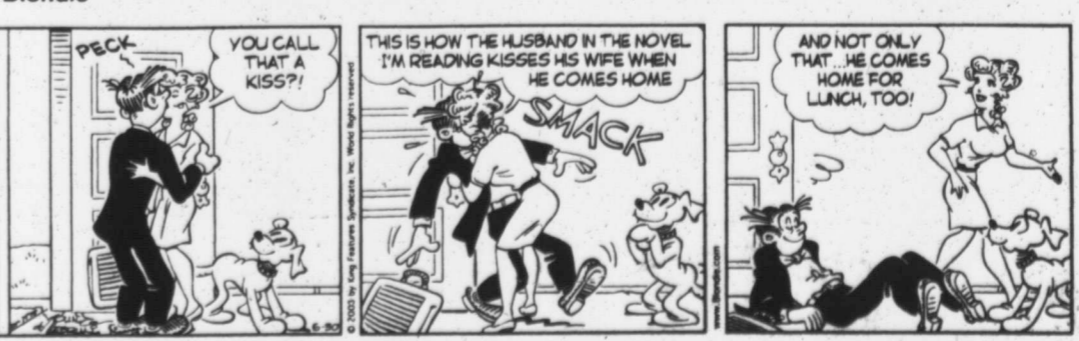

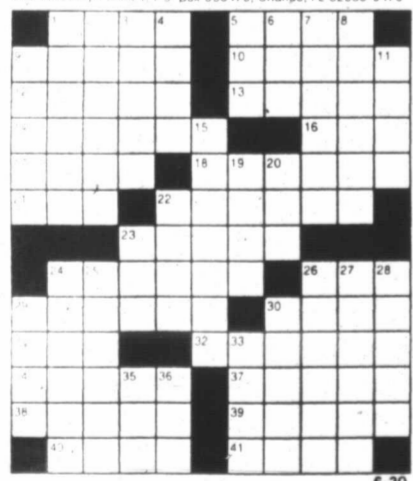

## A's Byrnes enjoys dream game against Giants

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — This was the kind of day Eric Byrnes dreamed about as a kid — getting clutch hits and big cheers in San Francisco.

The only difference was the uniform he wore.

Byrnes hit for the cycle — completing it with a ninth-inning triple — and the Oakland Athletics beat the Giants 5-2 Sunday in the finale of the Bay Bridge Series.

Byrnes, who grew up in the Bay area as a Giants fan, matched the A's franchise record with five hits. His parents were in attendance, as were more friends than he could count.

"Half of them are still Giants fans — punks," Byrnes said. "Half of them were leading the cheer last night: 'What's the matter with Byrnes? He's a bum! I guess this is one way to shut them up.'"

Kingcade also made the defensive play of the game to end North Plains' half of the seventh by jumping and crashing into the screen to snag a pop foul and firing to first base to complete a double play.

# Rangers rally past Astros

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston center fielder Craig Biggio held himself responsible for Texas' decisive eighth-inning rally.

Biggio fell down trying to catch Alex Rodriguez's tiebreaking two-run triple as the Rangers beat the Astros 8-5 Sunday.

"I don't know what happened," Biggio said. "I slipped and fell. It was a terrible play. I would have caught it if I hadn't fallen down. I feel horrible. The situation was it was a tie game so if you want to blame this one on me, I'll take the heat."

Houston led 3-2 before Rafael Palmeiro's 509th homer tied it in the seventh. The blast tied Palmeiro with Sammy Sosa for 17th on the career list.

In the eighth, Octavio Dotel (6-3) allowed a single to Michael Young and walked Hank Blalock before Rodriguez tripled over Biggio's head. Although Biggio fell down trying to chase the hit, Rodriguez wasn't sure the center fielder could have caught it.

"I don't think if he would have had it, but I don't think so," Rodriguez said. "I hit it pretty well. It landed about 12 feet from him so it would have been a great play for him to catch it."

Dotel allowed three hits, three earned runs and two walks in the inning.

"Ask him if he could catch it, not me," Dotel said. "I just control myself and the ball that I throw to home plate. Sometimes you lose, sometimes you win. I felt good today, very good."

The victory didn't help the Rangers win the Silver Boot, which goes to the winner of the season series. The Astros took four of six games this year and lead the series 11-7.

Houston starter Ron Villone didn't allow a baserunner until he walked Gonzalez to start the fifth inning. After Palmeiro popped out, Kevin Mench hit a two-run homer for the Rangers' first hit, cutting Houston's lead to 3-2.

"He had a perfect game going into the fifth," Rangers manager Buck Showalter

said. "I think that bases on balls got us going. Then, Mench's home run got us to thinking we could win."

"It was pretty ugly before that." The Astros took a 3-0 lead in the first inning off Mario Ramos, who got his first major league victory in his last start. Ramos couldn't find his control this time. He threw 39 pitches, 24 for balls, in the first inning.

After getting two straight outs to start the game, Ramos walked Jeff Bagwell, gave up a double to Richard Hidalgo and walked Morgan Ensberg to load the bases.

Ramos hit his former Rice teammate, Lance Berkman, with a pitch to force home the first run. He then walked Brad Ausmus and Adam Everett to force in two more runs for a 3-0 lead. Ramos finally struck out Villone to end the inning after nearly hitting the Astros' pitcher with an inside pitch.

Ramos left after 3 1-3 innings, having allowed two hits, three runs and seven walks. He was optioned to Triple-A Oklahoma after the game and said he'd learn from the experience.

"I was having trouble getting the ball down," Ramos said. "I've got to relax. I'm trying to do something extra. That's when something like seven walks occur. Whether it's here or someplace else, I'll just try to work hard."

Juan Gonzalez hit a two-run single in the ninth to put the Rangers up 8-3, and Bagwell hit a two-run triple in the bottom half.

Rosman Garcia (1-0) pitched a perfect seventh inning for his first major league victory. Ugueth Urbina struck out Richard Hidalgo with a runner on for his 21st save in 25 chances.

## THE GREAT OUTDOORS

Camping is a great way to see and feel the outdoors up close and learn more about nature. Before you start out, take time to go over these safety guidelines with the adult(s) who will be accompanying you.

- Take along a good first-aid kit that includes a snakebite kit.
- Find a campsite before dark and make sure you have given yourself enough time to get your camp set up and the food, water and wood you will need before it gets dark.
- Check for potential hazards, such as poison ivy or insects.
- Pitch your tent upwind, away from your campfire. Don't pitch it under a tree. Branches can fall and hurt you or your equipment.
- Be prepared for the worst when it comes to weather.
- When setting up camp, be sure you are far enough from rivers, streams and other water sources.
- Cook outside the tent whenever possible.
- Follow the rules and local laws when it comes to fires. Watch for overhanging branches and be careful when lighting a fire near grass or underbrush.
- Keep a pan of water near a fire in case you need to put it out quickly.
- Drown a campfire with water and make sure coals and sticks are wet. When your fire is completely out, cover it with more water, then dirt.
- Keep water, food, maps and a compass close.
- Dispose of all trash before you leave your site.



Taking these precautions and following these rules will make your camping trip more enjoyable.

## A FIRST AMONG WOMEN



When it comes to firsts, Julia Morgan has sure had her share.

Born in 1872 in San Francisco, Morgan received a degree in civil engineering from the University of California at Berkeley. She was the first woman to be licensed to practice architecture in California, and the first woman admitted to the architectural studies program at the École des Beaux-Arts in Paris.

Morgan returned from Paris in 1902 and worked for a well-known architect in California before opening her own office in 1904.

Morgan designed many private homes and institutional buildings. She became known for reinforced concrete projects, and one such project made her reputation. Morgan's bell tower on the campus of Mills College in Oakland, California, withstood the 1906 San Francisco earthquake.

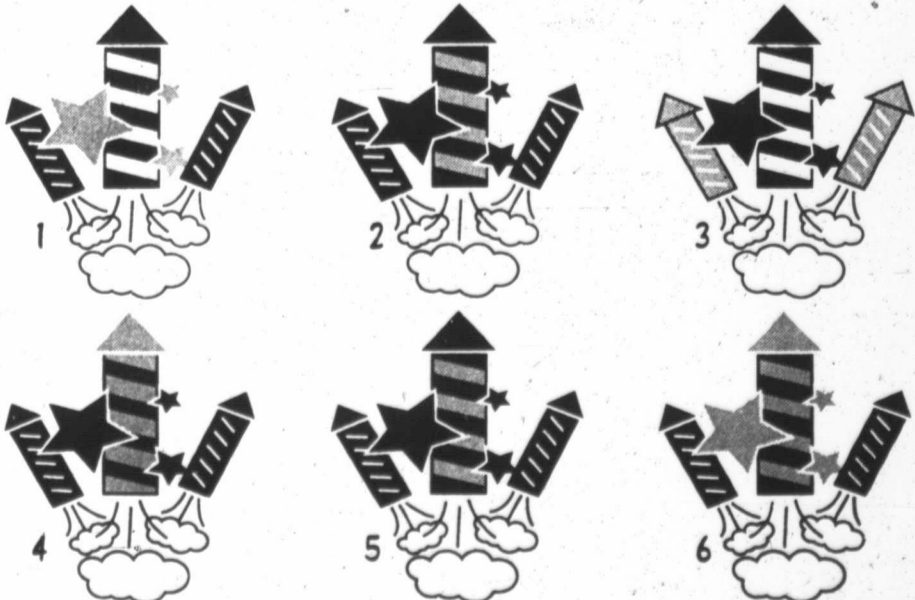
La Cuesta Encantada ("The Enchanted Hill") was Morgan's most famous reinforced concrete project. It was William Randolph Hearst's romantic name for his mountaintop palace in California.

Hired by Hearst in 1919, Morgan was to design a main building and guest houses to replace the tents at Hearst's ranch, San Simeon. The construction of the estate continued until 1947. During that time, Morgan supervised almost every detail of the construction, including the purchase of moss to feed reindeer on the estate. The project included 127 acres of gardens, terraces, pools, guest houses (each a mansion) and the 137-foot-high mansion, Casa Grande, which had 130 rooms.

During her career, Morgan designed more than 700 projects in Hawaii and throughout California. She retired in 1951 and died in 1957.
