8 indicted for money laundering

AUSTIN - Indictments were obtained yesterday by Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott's money laundering enforcement team against eight persons arrested for transporting large amounts of cash, allegedly linked to drug transactions, in Gray and Wheeler counties.

All eight were stopped for traffic violations along Interstate 40. In every stop, trained K-9 drug-sniffing dogs alerted arresting officers to the presence of drug residue on the money.

All are charged under the state's money laundering statutes. The eight defendants, along with the amounts and location of money found by arresting officers and the K-9 teams, are as follows:

Gray County

• Eduardo Fernandez, 49, with addresses in Nevada and Florida, was stopped on May 8. Found hidden in a large plastic bag under the real seat of his rental car was \$220,941. He is charged with a first-degree felony because the amount seized exceeds \$100,000. The offense can carry a punishment of up to life in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

• Felix Rupert III. 39, of El Paso, had three outstanding warrants for his arrest when he was stopped on Feb. 19. Officers found a backpack containing \$49,960 in cash in his possession.

 Kenneth Vernon Reynolds, 32, of Lakemoor, Ill., was stoped July 11. Officers found almost \$49,000 in cash in a bag in the car's trunk.

Wheeler County

• Felicia Camille Kemper. 46, and Donald Owens, 32, both of Indianapolis, Ind., were arrested when \$110,464 was found in the spare tire compartment of their vehicle. A year earlier, they were stopped in Kansas under similar circumstances with more than \$61,000. The two are charged with first-degree felonies.

 Osbaldo Garcia, 23, of Hammond. Ind., accompanied by his pregnant wife, who was not arrested, reportedly had \$62,000 in his vehicle when he was stopped on Oct. 30, 2002. Garcia gave an officer consent to search his vehicle after he initially told the officer he had only \$9,000 in cash.

Texas Democrats aren't happy with redistricting lines

AUSTIN (AP) — Congressional redistricting is on its last round in the Texas Legislature.

With just four days left in the third special legislative session, lawmakers began Friday to debate the divisive map that its creators say will put more Republicans in the Texas congressional delegation, where Democrats hold a 17-15 edge

After fending off the issue for almost six months. Texas Democrats acknowledge they've reached the end of their fight in the Legislature. But, Gerry Hebert, an attorney for Texas Democrats in the Legislature and in Congress, said a court challenge will be filed "promptly." He would not specify how soon.

Democrats, the minority party in the Texas Legislature, maintain that violations of the Voting Rights Act in the map are so egregious Republicans face an uphill court battle.

The map would add as many as six Republicans to the Texas congressional delegation, an aide to House Speaker Tom Craddick said. Democrats put the number at seven. The additional Republicans come largely at the expense of white Democrats.

Texas Rep. Barry Telford. D-DeKalb, said the Republicans are trying to paint a picture of the Democratic party as minority only. Other Democrats, including several minorities at the news conference, agreed

"Am I being a little emotional? You're damn right I am. This is utter thuggery," Telford said. He said a small community in his part of the state was split. Similar populations around Texas also were split.

The conference committee agreement still must be approved by the majority of the Texas House and

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. trade deficit declined to \$39.21 billion in August, the smallest gap in six months, reflecting a big drop in imports of cars and foreign oil.

America's trade deficit with China surged to an all-time high, a development certain to add to the pressure in Congress to punish China for what critics contend are the country's unfair trade practices.

The Commerce Department reported Friday that the August deficit was 2.1 percent lower than a revised July imbalance of \$40.03 billion. That caught analysts by surprise because they had been forecasting the deficit would widen in August.

The improvement reflected big declines in imports of cars, auto parts and oil which helped to offset a smaller drop in U.S. exports. That was the result of a big plunge in ship-

However, even with the string of declining deficits, the overall imbalance through the first eight months of this year is running at an annual rate of \$433 billion, far above last year's record high of \$418.04



That allowed Canary to cash in on after-hours news ahead of other investors, who at that hour would be forced to chance buying at the next day's closing

Market timing, which aims to take advantage of short-term movements in stock prices with quick "in and out" trading of shares, violates the rules of

funds, and investors plowed most mutual fund companies. It can have a detrimental effect on the long-term shareholders for whom mutual funds are designed.

New rules being weighed also include requiring mutual funds to clearly disclose their market-timing policies and procedures in sales material.

The Investment Company Institute, the mutual fund industry's lobbying group, expressed support Donaldson's plan. However, the group said laws alone "cannot ensure that fund shareholders are protected."

Last month, Canary and its managers agreed to pay \$30 million in restitution for profits generated from improper trading, plus a \$10 million penalty to settle Spitzer's allegations. The hedge fund neither admitted to nor denied wrongdoing in the settlement.

Several dozen mutual fund companies, including giants Fidelity Investments and Franklin Resources, and a smaller number of hedge funds have been subpoenaed in Spitzer's investigation. As the investigations expand, a growing list of mutual fund companies have fired or suspended employees following internal investigations of trading activities. Merrill Lynch, Alliance Capital Management Holding and Prudential Securities have suspended or fired at least 17

Veteran lawmaker gives self up

NEW YORK (AP) - A veteran state lawmaker and Democratic party leader is accused of accepting state money for expenses already covered by his political party and faces charges including grand larceny, a law enforcement source said.

Clarence Norman, an assemblyman from Brooklyn, confirmed his indictment Thursday and surrendered to authorities. "I shall return," he said before hugging supporters and walking into the district attorney's office. He was scheduled for arraignment Friday.

Norman, who has been an assemblyman since 1982, became the first black to be elected chairman of the Brooklyn Democratic Party in 1990. He met with Brooklyn Democratic leaders Thursday and said he would keep his posi-

Norman's indictment remained sealed. But according to a law enforcement source speaking on condition of anonymity, Norman, 52, is accused of accepting state funds for expenses already covered by his political party - grounds for grand larceny and other charges.

The source said prosecutors claim to have evidence that a \$5,000 check written to a campaign committee allegedly wound up in Norman's personal bank account.

BALTIMORE (AP) The wife of Gov. Robert Ehrlich apologized for saying she would shoot pop singer Britney Spears, but reiterated her message about the difficulty of raising girls in a society saturated with sexually provocative images.

Kendel Ehrlich uttered the statement Oct. 3 while speaking in Frederick at a conference on domestic violence.

Ehrlich, 42, talked about the need for "educating our women to get as much schooling as possible, to not become dependent on anyone else."

"It is incredibly important to get that message to young women. You know, really, if I had an opportunity to shoot Britney Spears, I think I would," Ehrlich said, laughing. "I hate to say that, but you know, like I said, I'm raising a boy ... and I think, 'Oh my goodness, what would I do if I had a daughter who is seeing these images and having peer pressure?"

After the story broke this week, a spokeswoman for Ehrlich said she "inadvertently used a figure of speech." A day later, Ehrlich apologized to Spears.

"It was off-the-cuff and in jest, and that's stupid when you're in public life, and I should know better," she said Wednesday.

Ehrlich said that while she regrets her remarks, she stands by her message that sensational images in popular culture make it difficult to raise confident young women who will stand up against domestic violence.

Ehrlich said she'd like to apologize personally to Spears and suggested the singer give a concert in Maryland to raise_money for domestic violence awareness.

"As of yet we have not heard from Britney Spears or her publicists," a spokeswoman for Ehrlich said Thursday.

Jive Records, the New York-based label that represents Spears, issued a statement earlier in the week saying Ehrlich "shot her own self in the foot." A spokeswoman for the company, asked Thursday for comment on Ehrlich's latest remarks, declined to comment.

OSLO, Norway (AP) -Human rights activist Shirin Ebadi won the 2003 Nobel Peace Prize on Friday for her work fighting for democracy and the rights of women and children, the first Muslim woman and the first Iranian to receive the accolade.

Ebadi, 56, the first female judge in Iran who also was jailed on charges of slandering government officials, was praised by the Norwegian Nobel Committee for promoting peaceful, democratic solutions in the struggle for human rights.

"This prize doesn't belong to me only - it belongs to all people who work for human rights and democracy in Iran," Ebadi told The Associated Press in an interview in Paris, where she was visiting.

She said she was completely surprised when told she had won. "And then I was very happy and glad," she added.

At a later news conference, where she appeared without a head scarf, Ebadi said that in her view, "there is no difference between Islam and human rights."

"Therefore, the religious ones should also welcome this award," she said. "The prize means you can be a Muslim and at the same time have human rights."

She also said she hoped the award would send a message to the Iranian government, which has been accused of pursuing a nuclear weapons program. The International Atomic Iran until the end of the nuclear program is strictly effect.

The news made headlines around the world but was not reported immediately by Iran's state-run media. Government spokesman Abdollah Ramezanzadeh said there was no immediate official comment on Ebadi's

The Nobel committee said Ebadi is well-known and admired by Iranians for her defense in court of victims of attacks by hard-liners on freedom of speech and political freedom.

"As a lawyer, judge, lecturer, writer and activist, she has spoken out clearly and strongly in her country, Iran, far beyond its borders," the awards committee said in its citation.

It said she has stood up as a "sound professional, a courageous person, and has never heeded the threat to her own safety."

"I am extremely happy. This is a great day for reformers in Iran. It's great for her and great for the country," her husband, Javad Tavassolian, said from Tehran, where she was expected to return from Paris next week.

China confirms launch date for manned space mission

BEIJING (AP) — The an English nickname based on Chinese government confirmed Friday that it would attempt its first manned space launch next week, saying the mission would begin between Wednesday and Friday "at a proper time."

the the party's leadership with one The spacecraft, Shenzhou 5, will orbit the of the most patriotism-Earth 14 times before landing at a "pre-selected area," the official Xinhua News Agency reported.

"China plans to launch its first manned spaceflight at a proper time between Oct. 15 and 17, said an official in charge of the country's manned spaceflight program on Friday," Xinhua said in a statement.

A successful launch would make China the third country in the world to put a human being into space. The former Soviet Union put Yuri Gagarin into space in 1961; the United States sent Alan Shepard up less than a month later.

"Now all preparatory work for the launch is progressing smoothly," Xinhua quoted an unnamed space-program official as saying.

The government has not announced the identity of the space traveler, and the Xinhua dispatches did not specify how many astronauts, or "taikonauts," the craft would con-

The government said the Shenzhou 5 would fly on an elliptical orbit with the orbital inclination angle of 42.4 degrees. It will then shift to a circular orbit at an altitude of 1213 miles.



Teen Misses Her Friends After Leaving Drunk Dad

DEAR ABBY: I am a 16-year-old girl. My parents have been divorced for many years. Just before starting high school, I moved in with my father and my older brother an hour away, because I was not getting along with Mom's new husband.

It didn't take long to realize how bad my father's drinking had become since the divorce. He had a gun and shot holes in the walls, took a shot at my brother's car, and cursed my brother and me almost daily.







Bears have momentum against Aggies

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — There may have been times Texas A&M could have taken Baylor lightly. This isn't one of them.

In a surprising role reversal, Baylor (3-2, 1-0 Big 12) takes a three-game winning streak into Saturday's game at Kyle Field. And the Aggies (2-3, 0-1) have lost three in a row for the first time in 23 years.

"It's in a fragile state in the fact that ... if the leaders don't step up and lead this team in the right direction, things could get worse," Aggies offensive tackle Alan Reuber said. "You can't just give them (Baylor) a loss."

Still, the Aggies are three-touchdown favorites for the 100th meeting between the former Southwest Conference rivals. Even after their 59-28 loss at Texas Tech in their Big 12 opener last week, on the same day Baylor upset Colorado 42-30.

Texas A&M leads the series 61-29-9, with 12 straight wins and a 17game unbeaten streak.

Baylor will try to avoid a repeat of last season, when it lost 41-0 against the Aggies the week after winning its Big 12 opener. That started a season-ending seven-game losing streak in which the Bears were outscored 334-58.

"The process now is can we get them to believe they can go to A&M and beat A&M," said first-year Baylor coach Guy Morriss. "(Beating Colorado) was just one little step. It would be a shame to have such a nice win and then go lay an egg in College Station."

A key for Baylor will be Big 12 rushing leader Rashad Armstrong, who is also ninth nationally with his 118 yards per game.

Not only did the Aggies give up a Big 12-record eight touchdown passes and 505 yards to Tech quarterback B.J. Symons last week, they are 87th nationally against the run (170.2 yards per game). They are uncharacteristically 96th in total defense, allowing 421 yards per

Last week, Armstrong's 55-yard TD run capped a 97-yard drive that was an indication to the Bears of how much they have improved since last season.

"I think now they understand they can do it against a quality opponent," Morriss said. "I'm not sure they really thought they could. We've been telling them every day, 'You can do this, boys.' But if they don't believe it, it doesn't really matter what I think."

The Bears have lost 15 straight road games. And they are just 1-34 against South Division opponents and 5-52 overall in conference games - in the Big 12's eighth

Gun industry close to winning national exemption from lawsuits

WASHINGTON (AP) — Lawsuits blaming firearm makers for gun crimes may soon become a thing of the past, as the Senate nears approval of a legal exemption for the industry.

Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, has 44 Republican co-sponsors for his bill to immunize gun manufacturers and distributors from lawsuits arising from crimes in which guns were used.

Despite a threatened filibuster by some Democrats, the bill also has the support of 10 Democrats, among them Senate Minority Leader Tom Daschle of South Dakota.

Ending a filibuster requires the votes of 60 senators. Craig said that with 10 Democrats now on his side, he is confident that five of the six Republican senators who are not co-sponsors

of the bill will supply the votes he needs to break any filibuster. "I think I have my 60 votes to proceed when necessary," Craig said.

Philadelphia mayor saying FBI confiscated computer

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Mayor John F. Street said FBI agents confiscated his BlackBerry handheld computer shortly after police discovered hidden listening devices in his City Hall offices earlier this week.

The revelation Thursday came as the Democrat tried to get his re-election campaign back on track two days after the bugs were found, insisting that he has done nothing wrong and has been assured by prosecutors that he is not the target of a federal probe.

The BlackBerry, the mayor said, was taken by an FBI agent just hours after the devices were found by city police during a routine security sweep Tuesday morning.

Asked why he had not previously disclosed that agents asked for the BlackBerry, Street said, "Because nobody asked ... I just didn't think about it."



Daschle agreed to get behind the legislation after gun supporters agreed to specify that firearms manufacturers and distributors would not be protected from lawsuits involving defective products or illegal sales.

"It is a misuse of the civil justice system to try to punish honest, law-abiding people for illegal acts committed by others without their knowledge or involvement," Daschle said two weeks ago.

Since 1998, at least 33 municipalities, counties and states have sued gun makers, many claiming that manufacturers, through irresponsible marketing, allowed weapons to reach Gun advocates say firearm makers shouldn't be forced to criminals. None of the suits so far has resulted in a manufactur-

· Home Fires

-Somewhere in the nation, a home fire death occurs approximately every three hours.

—The peak time for home fire fatalities is between 10

p.m.-6 a.m. - when most people are asleep. —Only 25 percent of families in the United States have developed and practiced a home fire escape plan to ensure they could escape quickly and safely. Developing a family

emergency escape plan can be crucial to everyone's safety. -Households with non-working smoke alarms now outnumber those with no smoke alarms.

—Smoke alarms most often fail because of missing, dead or disconnected batteries.

Fire deaths peak in the winter months - December through February. Smoking materials (cigarettes, cigars, pipes, etc.) and poorly installed, poorly maintained or misused portable or area heating equipment are leading causes of fatal home fires.

-Tragically, many people mistakenly believe they'd be awakened by the smell of smoke in time to escape. Clinical experiments have found that the sense of smell actually lessens when people are asleep. Therefore, when smoke enters a bedroom it does not always awaken the individual. In addition, smoke disorients people and dulls their senses, making it less likely that other cues, such as cries for help, will awaken them. This is why working home smoke alarms are so important.

-Home fires caused almost \$5.5 billion in direct property damage during 2000.

• Children and Home Fires

—Children are particularly vulnerable during home fires. Children ages five and under are twice as likely as the population as a whole to die in home fires.

-Three out of five child fatalities from home fires are a result of children playing with fire, igniting mattresses, bedding, upholstered furniture or clothing.

—An average of nearly three children under the age of 20 die each day in home fires - roughly 1,000 children each year. In addition, about 4,200 children under age 20 are injured in home fires each year.

-Eighty percent of the fatal home fire victims who were children were killed by fires in homes without working
