# WTO appeals panel confirms U.S. steel duties are illegal

Monday that U.S. duties on imported steel introduced last year are illegal, and the European Union is threatening to retaliate with \$2.2 billion in sanctions unless Washington lifts the tariffs swiftly.

The White House quickly disputed the decision by the World Trade Organization panel, which rejected the bulk of the U.S. appeal seekbreak WTO rules.





# Sooners set in Big 12 South; K-State controls North

WACO, Texas (AP) -There's no question Oklahoma will clinch its first title of season next weekend. It's just a matter of by how much.

The Sooners (10-0, 6-0 Big 12), the No. 1 team in every poll, wrap up the Big 12 South title and their spot in the league championship game if - no, WHEN - they win Saturday at home against Baylor (3-7, 1-5).

With a seemingly unthinkable 77-0 rout over Texas A&M, Oklahoma continued its dominating run through the Big 12 while solidifying its standing as the nation's best team.

The Sooners remained on track for a national title by handing Texas A&M (4-6, 2-4) its worst loss ever Saturday. Meanwhile, the top-six teams other than Oklahoma playing Florida State, Virginia Tech and Miami - all lost.

Next comes sacrificial lamb Baylor, a 62-14 loser to Texas Tech. More telling than that is their 73-10 loss last month at Texas A&M. That's a 140-point differential between the Aggies' win over Baylor and their loss to Oklahoma.

"It's kind of scary," Baylor coach Guy Morriss said.

The Bears have lost all 12 games against Oklahoma, including 49-9 last season. Since winning their Big 12 opener, they've lost five straight by an average margin of 40 points and have one offensive touchdown the last three games.

As for Oklahoma's opponent in the Big 12 championship game Dec. 6, Kansas State has resurrected from an 0-2 Big 12 start to take control of the division.

Kansas State (8-3, 4-2) seemed out of contention after a three-game losing streak. The then-No. 6 Wildcats lost to Marshall, their first non-conference loss at home in 42 games, before starting Big 12 play with a pair of four-point road losses against Texas and Oklahoma

But the rest of the North teams started losing, and the Wildcats have reeled off four straight wins, the latest 45-0 over Iowa State. They get to the Big 12 title game for the first time in three years with wins at Nebraska (8-2, 4-2) and against Missouri the next two weeks.

"We know we can do it," Wildcats linebacker Ted Sims said. "We know we can get to the Big 12 championship. It's just one step at a time."

Wildcats outscored their opponents 174-36 during their four-game winning streak. And their defense hasn't allowed a touchdown the

"We're a better football team than we were seven days ago. I believe that," K-State coach Bill Snyder said. "After the game last week (38-10 over Baylor), I said I wanted to be a better football team than we were a week ago, and last week, I couldn't say that."

Missouri (6-3, 2-3), already

Kansas State, had the upperhand in the North until a 21-16 loss at Colorado. The two-time defending division champion had won just one of its previous seven games.

"I can't tell you how disappointed I am in that," Missouri coach Gary Pinkel said. "When I see half my team, half the time, playing with great, championship intensity, and half the time, not loafing, but not with the intensity necessary to win at a high, high level, it burns me."



### Prisoner swap could unravel

JERUSALEM (AP) Israel's Cabinet narrowly approved a prisoner swap with Hezbollah after eight hours of anguished debate, but the deal could still collapse over a Lebanese inmate who killed

three Israeli civilians in 1979. Hezbollah leader Sheik Hassan Nasrallah reiterated Monday that the inmate, whom Israel refuses to release, has to be part of the deal. However, Nasrallah did not slam the door, saying he still waits to hear from a German mediator.

The 12-11 vote Sunday reflected widespread concern that the lopsided deal - hundreds of prisoners in exchange for an Israeli businessman and bodies of three soldiers would signal weakness and encourage more kidnapping of

## Japan's ruling bloc wins parliamentary elections but faces still more opposition

TOKYO (AP) — Prime Minister Junichiro of their massive bad loans to revive the world's Koizumi's ruling party on Monday clawed its way back to a simple majority in parliament following elections that strengthened the main opposition party and signalled a shift away from a political system that has long been dominated by a single party.

Sunday's balloting was the first major test for Koizumi since he took power more than two years ago, and he said the results gave his Liberal Democratic Party-led bloc the mandate it needs to forge ahead with reforms.

The LDP initially won only 237 seats but later regained a simple majority in the 480-seat lower house of Parliament by merging with one of its junior partners and converting three independent lawmakers.

The announcement means the ruling party, which also is supported by the Buddhistbacked New Komeito Party, tightened its grip on the powerful chamber — retaining control of all committees as well as the ability to pass legislation.

"We have won the people's support," Koizumi told reporters at LDP headquarters on

The centrist Democrats, meanwhile, boosted their seats to 177 - 40 more than they previously held - assuring a more unified opposition than its fragmented and powerless pred-

Koizumi, 61, said his administration would immediately start hammering out details for tax cuts, public pension reforms and privatization of the highways administration. He also pledged to continue prodding banks to dispose coalition in Iraq.

second-largest economy.

But the vote was hardly a resounding victory for the LDP, which failed to win a simple majority on its own, and it reflected growing dissatisfaction with the conservative party's inability to end an economic slowdown that has persisted for 13 years.

"Koizumi won't face any major hindrance in Parliament. But the opposition has established a beachhead from which it can creep closer to taking power or actually oust the LDP in future elections," said Shige2o Hayasaka, a former aide to the late Prime Minister Kakuei

According to unofficial results, the LDP had 240 seats, including three independent legislators who Koizumi said joined the party on Monday. The merger with the New Conservatives gave it four more seats, while its other junior partner, the Buddhist-backed New Komeito Party, had 34, giving the bloc a total majority of 278 — down from 287 before the election.

"To revitalize Japan, to jointly realize our parties policies and to benefit the people, we decided to join forces with the LDP," New Conservative secretary general Toshiro Nikai said in a televised news conference.

The opposition gains could embolden anti-Koizumi factions within the ruling party who oppose his belt-tightening policies. It also might force the prime minister to pause before moving ahead with an unpopular plan to send Japanese peacekeepers to support the U.S.-led

Jordan will be replaced by


