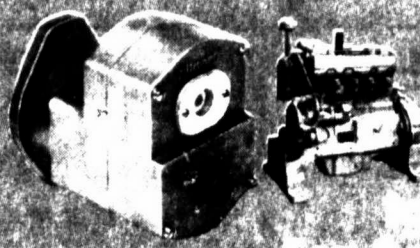


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Mother denies leaving son, 11, alone

Margaret Stevens denied ever having left her 11-year-old son alone overnight or longer at their house at 414 E. Browning, during a child custody hearing that began yesterday afternoon in Judge

Phil Vanderpool's court. The hearing, held in the second-floor courtroom of Gray County Courthouse, had originally been scheduled for 9 a.m. yesterday, but Vanderpool rescheduled it and one other hearing to 1:30 p.m. Stevens' hearing was the second of the two

heard yesterday afternoon. Stevens, 44, has been charged with abandoning/endangering a child after Pampa police on Aug. 13 found her 11-year-old son apparently living alone at the Browning Street house, which was filled with trash, animal feces and

urine, fleas and dirty clothing, according to police. Stevens was charged with abandoning/endangering a child and is free on \$2,500 bond. The child is in the temporary custody of Child Protective Services. Sgt. Alvin Johnson of

Pampa Police Department was the first witness to testify. He described the reason for police officers' visit to the house, and the condition of the house and the boy at the time they arrived, about 3:45 p.m.

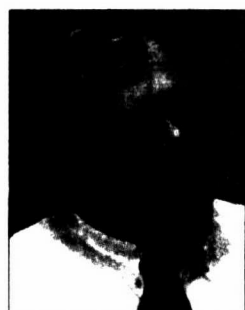

City budget: Not perfect

Pampa Interim City Manager John Horst said the city needs to either cut another \$150,000 or come up with that much additional revenue.

"It's certainly not a perfect budget," Horst said during a public hearing on the city's proposed budget Tuesday afternoon, "but it's as close as we can come at this time."

There was no public comment during the hearing on the new budget.

"We've got a lot of capital expenditures in here," Horst said.

There are some \$613,000 in capital expenditures in the new budget, he said.

In presenting the proposed budget for public examination, Horst once again noted that the city had used extremely conservative numbers in projecting the revenues it expects next year.

Sales tax revenue is expected to be over \$2.2 million next year with the new Wal-Mart Super Center opening. Sales tax revenue for the first 11 months of this year, Horst said was up 38 percent.

There will also be increased fees for sewage and solid waste pickup. New health inspection fees are expected to raise another \$10,000 next year. The tax rate, however, will remain the same, Horst said. The 69.5 cents per \$100 valuation will not be raised for 2004-2005.

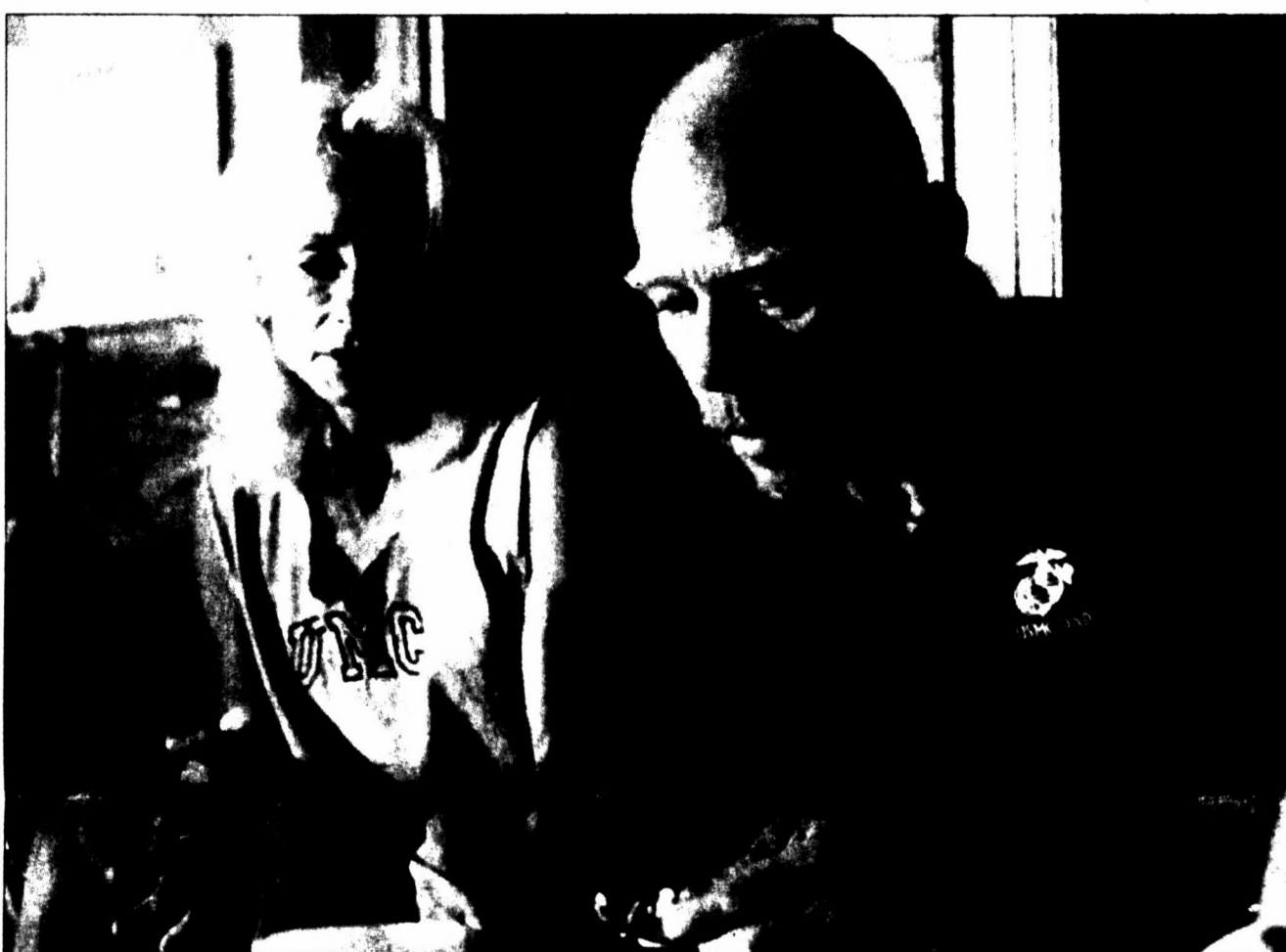

Fallen soldier

Marine's mother says he never wavered in duty

PERRYTON (AP) — The mother of a 19-year-old Marine from the Panhandle says that Iraq was tough for her son, but he never wavered in his commitment.

Perryton native Lance Cpl. Seth Huston was killed Saturday during fighting in the Al Anbar province, the Department of Defense confirmed Monday.

"I talked to him two days before he died," his mother, Renee Huston, told the Amarillo Globe-News for its Tuesday online editions. "He said they were still getting mortar attacks."

"He's always been gung-ho and proud to be a Marine. But he said,

"We're tired, we want to come home." They were just doing what they had to do to come home."

Huston said her son joined the Marines in June 2003 and deployed to Iraq in March. She said he decided to join the Marines in 10th grade after running into a recruiter at a high school. The events of Sept. 11, 2001, made him even more sure of his decision.

"I've always been proud of him no matter what he did," Huston

said. "I didn't like him going in when all this was going on after 9/11, but that capped it off for him. He was so (mad) about that. He was going in there with no fear."

The chance to come home would have arrived in just more than a month for the Marine, who wanted some time to indulge his love of the outdoors.

"He said he was already packing up (to come home on leave),"

Downtown Kiwanis Club.

Bob traveled the world, but he always returned home expressing his respect and admiration for democracy and the freedom we have in America. Despite his travels, Bob was never happier or freer than while working at the ranch. He farmed and ranched until his death.

Survivors include his wife of almost 53 years, Marty Price, of the home; one son, Carl Price, his wife Kelly and their children, Courtney, Grayson, Bridget, and Daniella, all of Houston; one daughter, Janice Johnson, her husband Marc and their children, Nicholas, Miles, and Elise, all of Indianapolis, Ind.; one brother, Ben Price, Jr. of Reading, Kan.

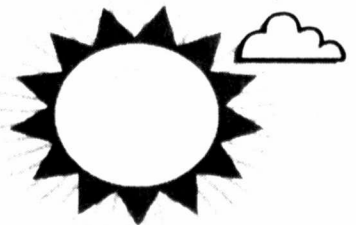

Lubbock man enters guilty plea in slaying

LUBBOCK (AP) — A 64-year-old Lubbock man who pleaded guilty to gunning down his son-in-law in a dispute over the discipline of his granddaughter has been sentenced to 12 years in prison.

Leroy Ward entered the guilty plea Monday, the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal reports in its online editions.

According to police records, Ward shot

Michael Keith Jones during an argument over a spanking that Jones gave to Ward's 14-year-old granddaughter.

During the July 23, 2003, confrontation at Jones' home, Ward threatened Jones with a knife. Ward then left the home and removed a shotgun from his truck. He fired the first of two shots through the closed front door, striking Jones in the chest.

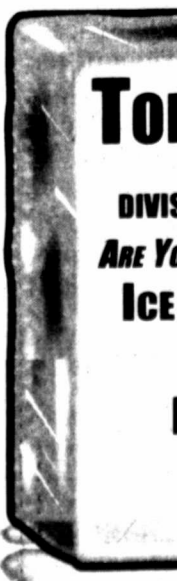

"The home was totally full of trash throughout all the rooms. The stench from animal feces and urine was tremendous," Johnson said. Later in his testimony, he said, "I couldn't stand the smell at all."

Thirty-three photographs taken by police of the home were admitted into evidence.

There was food in the refrigerator, along with wine, Johnson said.

In a press release after Stevens turned herself in to authorities, police said the boy told them he had last seen his mother about a week before. Police estimated that the boy had been living alone at the house for one to two months, with Stevens coming by once or twice a week to leave food. The boy has two adult sisters in Pampa, one of whom had

taken him to school orientation at Pampa Junior High School and then returned him to the Browning Street residence, the release stated.

Lucynda Wood, an attorney with offices in Pampa who represented Child Protective Services at yesterday's hearing, asked Johnson if he had ever before encountered a home in such disarray.

Johnson, who had said he had been an officer for 15 years, answered, "No."

Stevens followed Johnson on the witness stand. She said the Friday afternoon that police found her son alone at the house was the first time she had left him alone there. She had done so because the boy didn't want to go with her to Amarillo to shop for clothing, and she left him at about 10 a.m., with a cell phone number written on a piece of paper so that he could call her. The utilities were still on at the house, including cable tele-

vision, electricity and telephone service.

Stevens said that the trash found in the house was from two 55-gallon barrels of trash that a dog had knocked over inside the house. At the time the boy was found by police, two cats, a Chihuahua, a guinea pig and a turtle also inhabited the house. The animals were turned over to Animal Control.

Stevens said she and her son are currently living at 1704 Hamilton with a man named Larry Davis. She said they had moved in with Davis three weeks ago. She had begun dating Davis in February.

She said that for the last several weeks, she and her son had spent "four to five hours per day" at 414 E. Browning to "feed and care for her son's animals" and to "go through her husband's things." Her husband, David Stevens, died Jan. 15, 2003.

The refrigerator was full of food so that she and her son would have something to snack on while at the house, she said. She testified that most of her son's belongings were at the Browning Street house as of Aug. 13. She did not leave her son at Davis' house on Aug. 13 because Davis does not have satellite or cable television service. Her son's

pets had not been moved to 1704 Hamilton because Davis "already has two dogs," she said.

The hearing will continue at 1 p.m. tomorrow.

Stevens' attorney, Mark Buzzard, has included at least 12 witnesses on his witness list for the defense, including the boy's two adult sisters and Davis.

Revenue from the possible sale of water to the City of Lubbock is not reflected in the new budget, Horst said. That could add as much as \$400,000 of income for city coffers.

Horst said he had talked with Kent Satterwhite, general manager of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, and Satterwhite had assured Horst that while a water deal with Lubbock would have to be approved by the CRMWA board, Satterwhite didn't see any problem with it.

Lubbock City Commissioners are expected to take action on the water deal during their meeting Thursday, Horst said.

In other business, Pampa City Commission awarded a contract to Fuqua Enterprises for 126 dumpsters for a total purchase price of \$52,290.

"We're currently out of dumpsters for replacements," said Richard Morris, director of public works.

He said the purchase of the new dumpsters should alleviate the problem for a year or more.

Commissioners awarded a contract to Advantage USA for \$121,700 to replace the upper roof of the M.K. Brown Civic Center and Auditorium.

The roof was sliding down and gaps were appearing, said Jim Miller with BGR Architects, a consulting firm hired by the city to oversee the roof repairs.

The commission approved a \$15,000 budget for the tourism committee of the Pampa Area Chamber of Commerce.

Paula Goff, appearing before the commission on behalf of the tourism committee, told commissioners that the committee was trying to build up the Woody Guthrie Folk Music Center.

"You would not believe how many people like Woody Guthrie," she said.

The tourism committee is also interesting in establishing an interpretive center concerning the Red River Indian War battle sites around Pampa and wants to help develop a website for the White Deer Land Museum.

Goff said there has been a lot of interest in rodeos in Pampa and events like the High Plains Cruisers' "Burning the Bricks" car show and cruise weekend and Golden Spread Antique Machinery Show.

The tourism committee, she said, is also pursuing nature tourism in the area.

The commission also approved the Pampa Economic Development Corporation's budget.

The PEDC is expected to have revenues of \$374,000 next year and expenditures of \$144,270.

Huston said. "He was leaving for Baghdad first week in October. He was really looking forward to coming home to do some deer hunting."

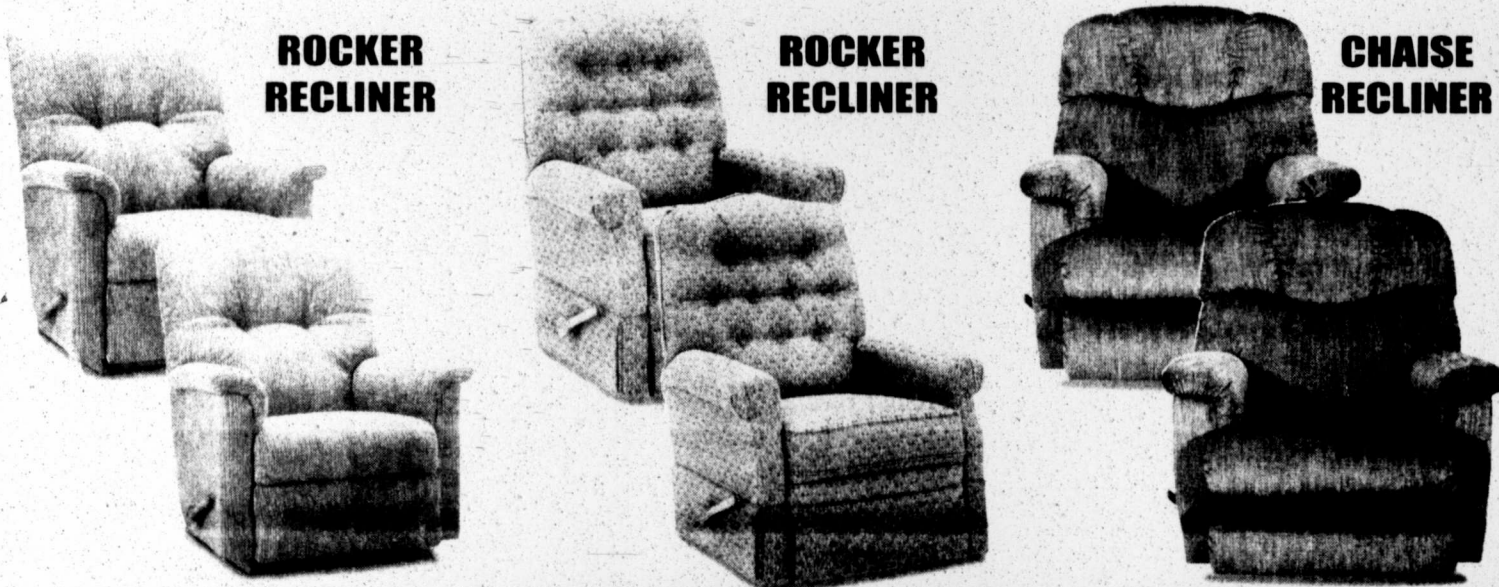

He was assigned to the Second Battalion, First Marine Regiment, First Marine Division of the First Marine Expeditionary Force at Camp Pendleton, Calif.

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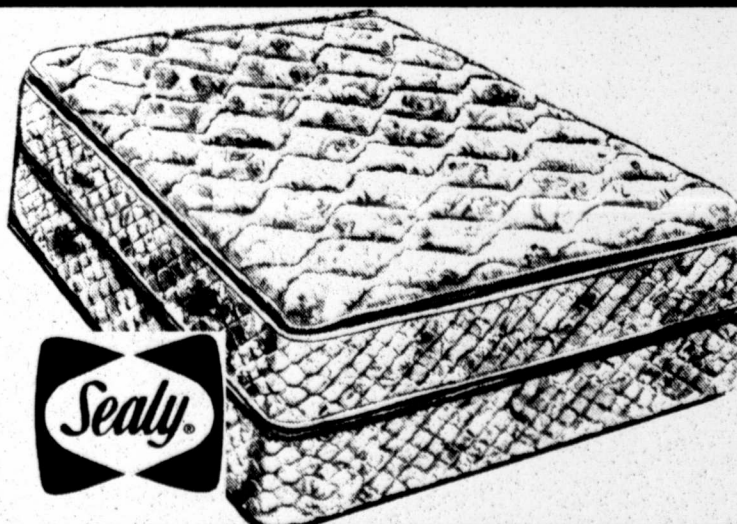

Kerry unfit for command

In an Aug. 23 article, David Bowser described as "despicable" the "Republican" attacks on John Kerry's war record and stated "I respect him for what he did..."

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Truth, even when inconvenient

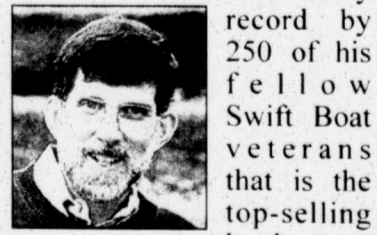
Forty years ago, Barry Goldwater triumphed at the Republican convention with his offer to provide "a choice, not an echo." Overall, I'm glad that our two major political parties are more ideologically based than they used to be. (From 1972 to 2002, the average Republican in the House of Representatives jumped from voting 63 percent conservative to 91 percent, according to the American Conservative Union, while the average Democrat's score dropped from 32 percent to 13 percent.)

And yet, be careful what you ask for. The problem

with two differentiated parties (although still not as differentiated as some Christian conservatives would like) is that when a governor or president is a scoundrel, voters ideologically aligned with him don't have a good choice. They either have to vote for a person without character or for someone personally right but ideologically wrong.

That's where we are now, as Democrats and their press

allies try to ignore or deal offhandedly with "Unfit for Command," the searing indictment of John Kerry's military record by 250 of his fellow Swift Boat veterans that is the top-selling book at both Amazon.com and Barnesandnoble.com.



The book shows why the debate over Kerry's Vietnam record is not about 35-year-old trivia but about whether a potential president imbeds in his brain a fantasy life.

For example, take Kerry's frequent claim to have spent a fighting Christmas in Cambodia in 1968. He said in 1986, "I have that memory which is seared -- seared -- in me." Over the years he has added seemingly fantasy details involving a CIA agent and delivering weapons to anti-Communist forces. "Unfit for Command" says the "seared" memory is all smoke. Kerry crewmates denied ever going to Cambodia. His commanding officer said the trip never happened.

U.S. must end dependency on oil

Houston Chronicle on alternative energy sources:

As the price of crude oil on the spot market approaches \$50 per barrel, administration officials warn that high energy prices are applying a brake to the economy. Unless the increase is arrested, higher gasoline prices will follow.

Global factors contributing to the sharp rise in crude prices could further aggravate the imbalance between high demand and slow gains in production: Continued conflict in Iraq chronically interrupts oil exports; a high-stakes showdown between President Putin and the oli-

garchs who control Russia's largest oil company casts doubt on the flow of Russian crude; guerrilla attacks threaten Saudi Arabia's ability to increase its output. All of these factors will deter investment needed to capitalize on reserves.

Rather than kinks in the supply of crude, today's shortfall results from economic growth throughout the world. So far, low inflation and interest rates have enabled the U.S. economy to

weather the energy price storm with little damage.

Sen. John Kerry has called on the Bush administration to stop filling the Strategic Petroleum Reserve. A recess to await lower prices would be reasonable, but now is not the time to discharge oil from the reserve. The reserve is needed for a time when the country cannot meet its crude oil needs at any price.

The Chronicle supports exploration in the Arctic

National Wildlife Reserve, if it can be done without destruction of wildlife and wilderness. But the rosiest scenario puts significant production 10 years off, too late to affect today's crunch and insufficient to halt future growth of oil imports.

Some of the majors have been able to increase their reserves, but not their production — a bad omen if those companies are to deliver the country from foreign oil dependence. As the Chronicle's business columnist, Loren Steffy noted Sunday, oil companies are

Researcher criticizes Texas high school dropout count

AUSTIN (AP) — The graduation rate from Texas schools is "woefully inadequate" because of lax state dropout standards, an education researcher testified

Tuesday in the trial challenging the state's method of funding public education. Walter Haney, a researcher from Boston College who has spent years researching

Texas, said many schools fail to meet the Texas Education Agency's standard of 74 percent graduation to be considered "acceptable." "Even by this low standard

implied by TEA accountability rules, 40 percent of the 50 largest school districts are failing," Haney said. He was testifying for the plaintiffs in the case brought

by hundreds of school districts challenging the state's share-the-wealth school finance system. Haney calculated the rates by comparing the number of

eight-grade students to the number of graduates four years later, using data provided by the TEA. He also accounted for out-of-state migration using Census data.

Why have ABC, CBS, NBC, The New York Times, and The Washington Post not paid attention to these charges?

The contrast with coverage of the Bush/National Guard story early this year is striking: According to the Media Research Center, "From Feb. 1-16, ABC, CBS and NBC aired 63 National Guard stories or interview segments on their morning and evening news programs."

My guess, based on conversations with leading journalists over the years, is that many are resolute: Can't aid and abet those right-wing Republicans, can we? That was the attitude among many New Jersey reporters covering Gov. Jim

McGreevey. You've probably heard the story by now. Said governor, while posing as a dedicated family guy with a young daughter, made his homosexual lover, a public relations man, his personal advisor on homeland security matters (this is not a joke) and then appointed him to a \$110,000-a-year job without specific responsibilities.

That all came out when McGreevey announced on Aug. 12 that he was resigning, thus pre-empting his now-estranged lover's threat either to blackmail or file a sexual harassment suit. But the basis of this news was old: The Trenton Times noted on Aug. 14 that New Jersey Democratic leaders had feared for two years that the affair was "a time bomb likely to go off."

Many Jersey journalists might have inquired had the governor been heterosexual

and his appointee curvaceous, but even then (as with Bill Clinton) ideology often buries reportorial digging. With a gay or bisexual governor involved, reporters

certainly did not want to be considered "homophobic."

Two political implications of the rule of ideology: First, character counts. Since ideologically committed voters have less opportunity to choose, behind-the-scenes politicians need to do charac-

ter checks on prospective nominees and kick out those without self-control. That's in the self-interest of the political class — otherwise, "In McGreevey's fall, we sinned all," and many staffers are out of work because of the self-indulgence of their boss.

Second, when the power-brokers mess up, a free press should be the last refuge for ousting scoundrels — but we journalists can fulfill that function only when we grasp once again that our job is to tell the truth, even when it is politically inconvenient.

not counting on ever-higher prices and are being cautious about new drilling. Oil plays abroad have left U.S. companies vulnerable to charges of corruption. If

they don't play ball with corrupt dictators and their clan, contracts can be elusive.

In December, the bipartisan National Commission on Energy will release its recommendations for a national energy policy. Funded by the nation's leading philanthropic founda-

tions, the panel will no doubt mention conservation, greater efficiency standards for vehicles and equipment, and development of alternative energy sources.

If Americans wish to escape acute dependency on precarious foreign energy supplies, the country will have to mount something

akin to Project Apollo. During the race to the moon, a NASA engineer characterized the space program as "impregnating nine females in the hope of getting a baby in a month."

With the time between now and the next oil crisis seeming to grow short, there is not a moment to lose.

Museum Mementoes: Well-known store closing doors

For 70 years, 123 N. Cuyler has been the address for an outstanding retail store of clothing for women. The building at the corner of North Cuyler and West Kingsmill was completed for J.N. Duncan in December of 1926.

The **Eloise Lane** Duncan Building, 45-foot by 90-foot, was designed for businesses on the ground floor (121 and 123 N. Cuyler) and office spaces on the second floor (121-123 N. Cuyler).

Seaborn Maps for 1929 and 1930 show the Crystal Palace Confectionary and the French Shoppe at 121 N. Cuyler and Wade's Store at 123 N. Cuyler. Nine tenants on the second floor included an attorney, a realty company and the R.A. Webb Emergency Hospital.

Wade and Ferne Duncan had bought the Fitzgerald Variety Store in 1925 and then

operated it for eight years during the oil boom. They named their store

"Wade's Store — If it's in town we have it."

Ferne said, "Living through an oil boom while you are young and involved has to be one of the finest, interesting, educational and revealing eras that people will ever experience."

The oil boom was followed by great drought and depression, and the Wade Duncan family moved to a ranch in Wheeler County.

Pampa city directories for 1931, 1932 and 1933 show that 123 N. Cuyler was occupied by Brownbilt Shoe Store with Joseph R. Lazarus as manager.

Bernard M. "Bunny" Behrman, born May 16, 1908, in Toronto, Canada, married Leah Winer on Oct. 22, 1933. They came to Pampa in April 1934 and began to prepare to open a retail store of clothing for women. The space at 123 N. Cuyler was completely renovated for the grand opening on Aug. 16, 1934.

The formal opening of Behrman's store was heralded by announcements claiming rich-hued frocks, accessories and items with New York stamps. Leah Behrman had returned from New York with a full inventory line and was planning future trips to "keep Pampa women in the latest modes."

In following years, she went to market with her customers in mind. It was not

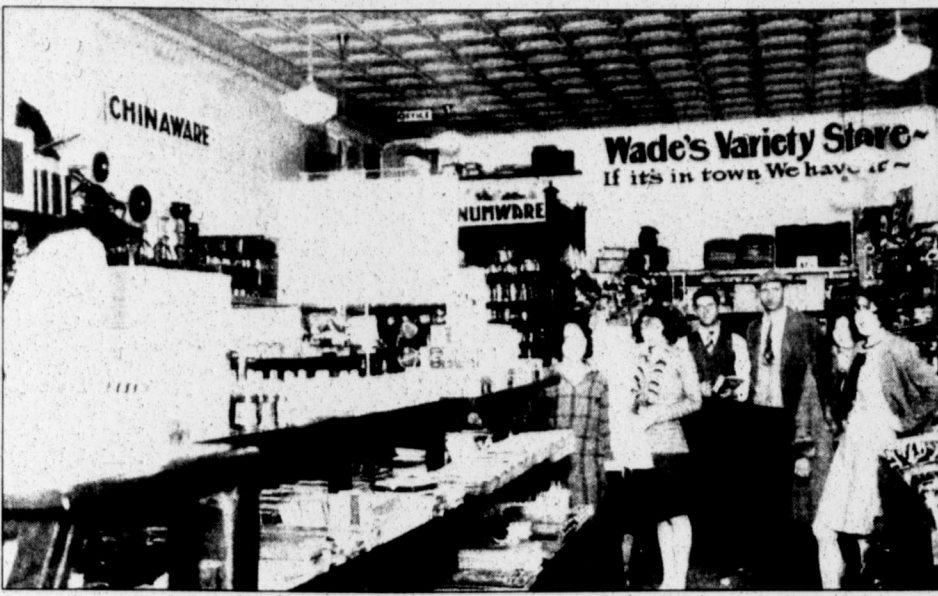

▲ Wade's Store, 1929-1930 — Wade and Ferne Duncan.

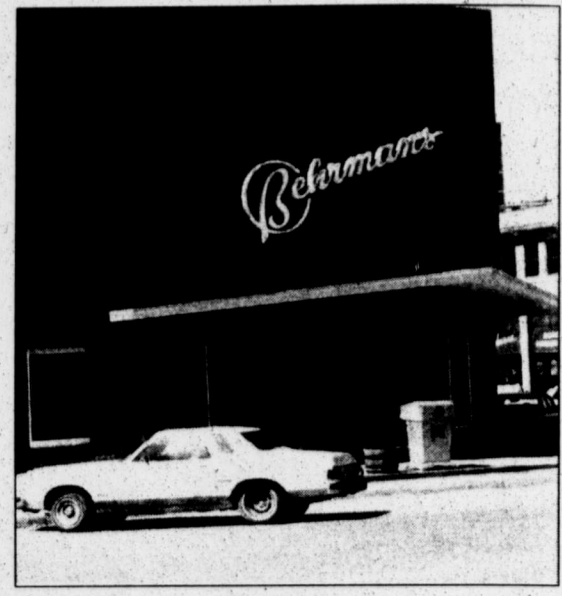

▲ Behrman's, 1934-1969 — B.M. and Leah Behrman and 1969-1987 — Doug and Georgia Coon.

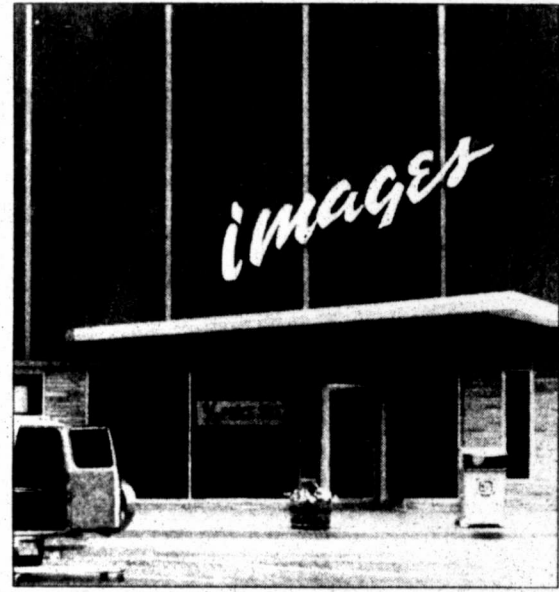

uncommon for regular customers to receive late night calls with a cheery, "I'm back from market and I have something for you. You'll love it."

On Aug. 9, 1965, Bernard M. Behrman, Demaris E. Holt and Clayton W. Husted were returning from a fishing expedition in Great Bear Lake near Alberta, Canada. The three men were killed when their plane crashed in Wyoming.

In June 1969, Leah Behrman sold the store to Louis Saied whose son-in-law, Doug Coon, took over the operation. Coon commuted from Perryton until he and his wife, Georgia, moved to Pampa in 1970.

Coon continued to operate the store with the Behrman eye for fashion and design, the same desire for quality and the same traditions so important to the Behrmans.

The 50th anniversary of Behrman's was on Sept. 10, 1984. Coon announced that Leah Behrman would be present to receive a big welcome from former employees and patrons, friends and neighbors, and that an attempt was being made to have as many retired employees as possible to attend a

reception on Saturday night.

He said, "Leah knows that we care about the tradition the Behrman's established and that we still pursue the same course."

On Oct. 1, 1987, Coon closed Behrman's, and the space was rented to Images, owned by Jaclyn Pearson, Ginger Pittman and Susan Pearson of Spearman. With Betty Johnston as manager, the owners continued the tradition of providing fashionable clothing for women.

Images has been a Brighton Store with a full and complete line of Brighton products at all times. Also Images has carried a complete line of Estee Lauder treatment, fragrance and makeup.

After 17 years of operation, Images is closing its doors for the last time, so that the owners can spend more time with their grandchildren. This closing is the end of a 70 year old chapter on one of Pampa's oldest, most successful and well-known downtown stores.

Mark Thatcher, son of former British prime minister, arrested

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP) — South African police arrested Mark Thatcher, the son of former British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, early Wednesday on allegations he was involved in a plot to overthrow the government of oil-rich Equatorial Guinea, police said.

Thatcher, 51, was taken into custody during a raid on his home in the upscale Cape Town suburb of Constantia shortly after 7 a.m. by police armed with search warrants. He was expected to be charged with violation of the Foreign Military Assistance Act, police spokesman Siphon Ngwema said.

"We have evidence, credible evidence, and information that he was involved in the attempted coup," said Ngwema. "We refuse that South Africa be a springboard for coups in Africa and elsewhere."

Thatcher, who has a twin sister but is the only son of Lady Thatcher and Denis

Thatcher, was in his pajamas when police arrived and he received permission to take a shower before they began their search, Ngwema said.

Investigators searched his records and computers for evidence.

Australian detainee sees father, goes before military tribunal

GUANTANAMO BAY NAVAL BASE, Cuba (AP) — The father of an imprisoned Australian cowboy accused of fighting with Afghanistan's ousted Taliban saw his son for the first time in five years Wednesday, as he prepared to go before an American military tribunal on war crimes charges.

After the meeting, David Hicks, 29, wore a suit and tie as he arrived for a tribunal hearing on charges of conspiracy to commit war crimes, aiding the enemy and attempted murder for allegedly firing at U.S. or coalition forces in Afghanistan.

"My expectation was that we would have David back to Australia after the first three months," said his father, Terry Hicks, 58, after arriving Tuesday from Adelaide with his wife, Beverly, who is Hicks' stepmother. "I don't think it is a fair and honest system."

The U.S. military said it would allow Hicks to meet with his parents after the preliminary hearing. They held a 15-minute meeting Wednesday morning before the proceedings. There were no guards present, and it was unclear whether Hicks was shackled.

Hicks, who arrived at the prison camp in Guantanamo in January 2002, could be sentenced to life in prison if convicted. He was expected to plead innocent at Wednesday's hearing.

On Tuesday, the first day of the tribunal, Osama bin Laden's chauffeur, 34-year-old

Salim Ahmed Hamdan of Yemen, declined to enter a plea. That hearing marked the start of the first U.S. military tribunal since World War II.

Hamdan withheld his plea until motions filed by his military-appointed lawyer are decided. A ruling is not likely until November.

His defense is challenging whether the hearing should proceed without a ruling on his "enemy combatant" status, which allows fewer legal protections than for prisoners of war. That classification was used to justify trying Hamdan and others before the tribunals, which will allow secret evidence and no federal appeals, rather than at courts-martial or in U.S. civilian courts.

Hamdan's defense attorney, Navy Lt. Cmdr. Charlie Swift, has filed a lawsuit in U.S. civilian courts in Washington

alleging the illegality of commissions. Swift also challenged the capacity and impartiality of four panel members and one alternate.

"It is important that these proceedings not only be fair, but appear fair to the world," Swift said in the hearing Tuesday that lasted more than eight hours.

Hamdan is charged with conspiracy to commit war crimes, including attacking civilians, murder and terrorism. He isn't charged with any specific violent act.

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Russia investigates possibility of terrorism in twin crashes

BUCHALKI, Russia (AP) — Russian emergency workers searched heaps of twisted metal and tall grass Wednesday for clues to what caused two airliners to plunge to Earth almost simultaneously, killing all 89 people aboard. Officials said one jet sent a hijack distress signal, raising fears terrorists had struck.

Flight recorders from both planes were found and taken to Moscow for investigation. ITAR-Tass reported, indicating the question of what caused the twin disasters soon could be answered.

Russia's main intelligence agency, however, said it had found no evidence of terrorism in initial investigations at the crash sites.

The Federal Security Service, or FSB, said it was

investigating other possibilities such as technical failures, the use of poor quality fuel, breaches of fueling regulations and pilot error, its press service told The Associated Press. Rain and thunder was reported in the regions where both crashes occurred.

Rebels fighting a protracted war for independence for Chechnya, the troubled southern Russian province, have been blamed for a series of terror strikes that have claimed hundreds of lives in Russia in recent years. Rebel representative Akhmed Zakayev told Russia's Ekho Moskvy radio from London that Chechen forces and rebel leader Aslan Maskhadov were not connected to the crashes. Russian officials had

expressed concern that separatists in the war-ravaged republic might carry out attacks ahead of a regional election Sunday to replace its pro-Moscow president who was killed in a May bombing.

A Sibir airlines Tu-154 jet, carrying 46 people, took off from Moscow's newly redeveloped Domodedovo airport at 9:35 p.m. Tuesday and the other plane, a Tu-134 carrying 43 people, left 40 minutes later, according to

state-run Rossiya television. The Tu-134 was headed to the southern city of Volgograd, while the other plane was flying to the Black Sea resort city of Sochi, where President Vladimir Putin is vacation-

ing. The planes disappeared from radar screens about 11:00 p.m., and by early Wednesday morning, the wreckage of both had been found. Domodedovo airport said in a statement that both planes "went through the

standard procedure of preparation for flight ... (and) the procedures were carried out properly."

Uncertainty over the cause of the crashes came after Sibir said that it was notified that its jet had activated a hijack or seizure signal shortly before disappearing from radar screens. Officials said the crew of the other plane gave no indication that anything was wrong, but witnesses on the ground reported hearing a series of explosions.

"There were three loud bangs on the window, like someone knocking," said Nikolai Gorokhov, a local resident who was in his home at the time of the crash.

Putin ordered an investigation by the FSB, and secu-

city was tightened at Russian airports, where extra security officers and sniffer dogs were called in to check passengers and luggage, as well as other transport hubs and public places.

The FSB sent experts to determine if explosions caused the crashes, Interfax reported.

At about the same time the Tu-154 disappeared, the Tu-134 airliner crashed in the Tula region, about 125 miles south of Moscow, officials said. ITAR-Tass reported that the authorities believe the Tu-134 fell from an altitude of 32,800 feet.

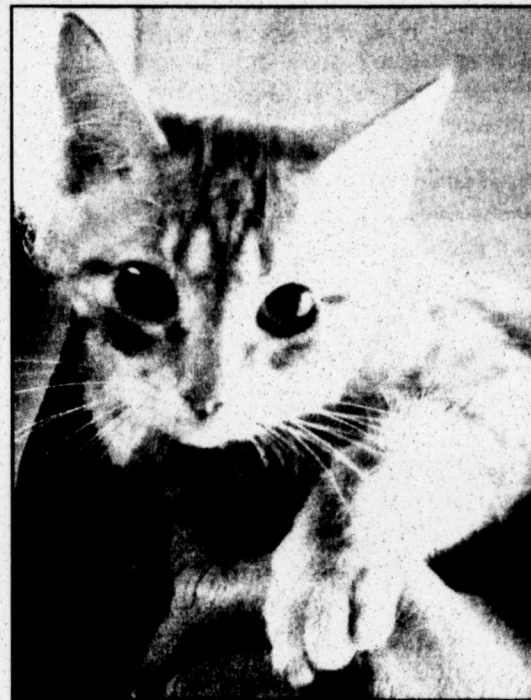
Wreckage of the Sochi-bound Tu-154 was found in the Rostov region, about 600 miles south of Moscow about nine hours after it disappeared.

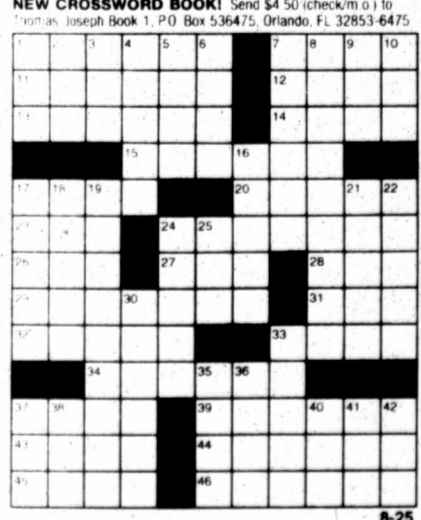

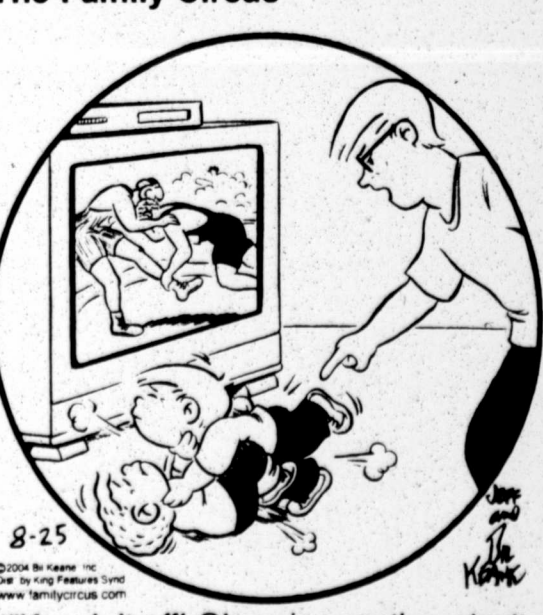

Texas ends Twins' four-game win streak

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — It didn't take long for the Texas Rangers to solve Joe Nathan.

Mark Teixeira singled home the winning run with two outs in the ninth inning, and the Rangers rallied to beat Minnesota 5-4 Tuesday night and stop the Twins' four-game winning streak.

"I had never faced him before," Teixeira said. "We knew he was going to throw hard and around the plate. So I was just looking for something hard."

With the Twins in front, 4-3, Gerald Laird led off the ninth with a single off Nathan (1-2). After Alfonso Soriano and David Dellucci struck out, Michael Young doubled into the left-field corner to tie the score, giving Nathan just his third blown save in 37 chances.

"He's one of the best closers in the game," Young said. "I was just trying to put the ball in play."

Hank Blalock was walked intentionally, Nathan threw a wild pitch and Teixeira singled just inside the right-field foul line.

Nathan has failed to convert consecutive chances after coming through in 27 straight.

"Right now, it's a bad stretch," he said. "It's been a tough week. But I felt I threw the ball great today except for the last pitch. The rest, I don't think I missed. I hung a curve to (Teixeira), and he got good wood on it."

Pinch-hitter Justin Morneau had out the Twins ahead in the top half with an RBI double off Francisco Cordero (3-0). The Rangers rallied from a final-

inning deficit to win for the first time this season.

Texas, which remained one game behind Boston in the AL wild-card race, trailed 3-0 in the seventh but loaded the bases against Twins starter Carlos Silva on consecutive singles by Teixeira, Nix and Kevin Mench.

After Mench's single, Minnesota trainer Jim Kahmann and manager Ron Gardenhire ran to the mound to check on Silva, who had a knot in the back of his neck. Silva, who allowed two runs and six hits in 6 1-3 innings, is day to day.

Silva said he felt the knot in his neck on Monday but never told Gardenhire. Silva said the problem began to bother him in the sixth.

Astros double-up Phillies

HOUSTON (AP) — Roy Oswalt wanted to help his team more than he did in his last outing.

So, the right-hander volunteered to pitch in relief in the Houston Astros 4-3 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies on Tuesday night.

Lance Berkman and Mike Lamb hit RBI singles to break a 2-2 tie in the eighth after Oswalt (14-9) made his rare relief appearance. Oswalt had not relieved since July 2, 2002.

He had made 64 straight starts since, but went only 2 2-3 innings Sunday against

Chicago before being ejected for hitting Michael Barrett with a pitch.

"I only threw 50 pitches Sunday," said Oswalt, who pitched a perfect eighth, striking out two. "So when I came in today, I told (pitching coach) Jim Hickey that if he needed me, I'd be glad to pitch out of the bullpen today."

Carlos Hernandez, making only his third start of the season, pitched seven strong innings for Houston, which has won seven of its last nine games.

UT sports on new cable network

AUSTIN (AP) — True Orangebloods in Central Texas can now get an around-the-clock fix of University of Texas sports.

The university and Time-Warner Cable on Tuesday launched BEVO-D, a 24-hour Longhorns sports channel with rebroadcasts of classic football games, highlights programs and interviews with coaches and players from a variety of sports.

Cowboys trade Collins to Carolina

IRVING, Texas (AP) — The Dallas Cowboys traded offensive tackle Javari Collins to Carolina on Tuesday for a conditional 2005 draft choice.

Collins was signed by the Cowboys as a free agent defensive tackle from Northwestern in 2001. He was moved to the offensive line midway through his rookie season.

In three seasons with the Cowboys, Collins played in 11 games — nine at right tackle in 2002, including the game in which Emmitt Smith

became the NFL's career rushing leader. He played just twice last season, primarily on special teams.

The Panthers' have been searching for a right tackle since projected Adam Meadows retired just months after signing a five-year, \$15 million contract. That left the Panthers with Matt Willig and Melvin Tuten at the position.

Willig has been bothered by a knee injury, but is expected to return to practice next week.

Women's basketball Quarterfinal U.S. 102, Greece 72
ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Hushing a boisterous crowd with its all-around domination, the United States advanced to the semifinals. Now, only two games stand between the Americans and a third straight gold medal.

After playing their preliminary games in a small arena at the Helliniko complex on the coast, the teams moved to the spacious 19,250-seat Olympic Indoor Hall for the medal round. The Americans measured up to the big stage.

Lisa Leslie and Yolanda Griffith dominated inside, Tina Thompson hit a succession of jumpers, Shannon Johnson had her best game of the tournament and Tamika Catchings was everywhere on both ends of the floor.

Shannon Johnson and Tina Thompson scored 20 apiece to lead the United States, which had six players in double figures.

Greco-Roman Wrestling
ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Rulon Gardner was in another Olympic wrestling upset — his own.

One of the biggest stars of the 2000 Summer Games, Gardner was thrown to the mat in overtime by Kazakhstan's Georgi Tsursumia and lost 4-1 in his Greco-Roman semifinal match. The best he could get was a bronze.

Gardner was as shocked as anyone when Tsursumia somehow pulled off the winning 3-point move in their 264 1/2-pound (120kg) match.

Sailing
ATHENS, Greece (AP) — A windsurfer whose first name means "wave" in Hebrew gave Israel its first Olympic gold medal ever.

Gal Fridman sailed a remarkably consistent regatta, never finishing worse than eighth in the 11-race series. He placed second in Wednesday's decisive race.

After Fridman crossed the finish line, he took a victory dip and then wrapped himself in an Israeli flag when he came out of the water.

In 12 previous Olympics dating to 1952, Israel had won only one silver and three bronze medals. Fridman won a bronze in his event in 1996.

Nikolaos Kaklamanakis of Greece won the silver, and Nick Dempsey of Britain took the bronze.

Faustine Merret of France won the gold in the women's race. Yin Jian of China won the silver, and Alessandra Sensi of Italy got the bronze.

Women's Triathlon
ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Kate Allen, a former Australian now Austrian by marriage, passed half of the field during the final leg of the swim-cycle-run endurance test, finishing in 2 hours, 4 minutes, 43.45 seconds.

Closer to the rear of the pack than the front for most of the race, she passed everyone during the closing 10-kilometer run, including leader Loretta Harrop of Australia only a few strides before the finish.

Susan Williams, the last American to qualify for the race over the summer, won the bronze despite crashing early in the cycling race.

Baseball Japan 11, Canada 2
ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Kenji Jojima hit a two-run home run and Tsuyoshi Wada struck out six batters in five solid innings, leading Japan to victory over Canada for the bronze medal.

Jojima put Japan ahead 2-0 in the first, driving a two-out homer off Mike Johnson, and Takuya Kimura hit a two-run single as Japan scored four runs in the third. Jojima added an RBI double to make it 7-0 in the fourth.

He finished with four RBIs as Japan collected 13 hits off six Canadian pitchers.

Japan finished fourth in the Sydney Games.

Diving
ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Yulia Pakhalina of Russia led the Olympic preliminaries of 3-meter springboard diving Wednesday, beating out Canada's Blythe Hartley and China's Guo Jingjing.

The Americans had another frustrating day at the pool. Rachele Kunkel of West Valley City, Utah, advanced to the semifinals with a 12th-place showing, but Kimiko Soldati of Magnolia, Texas, was quickly eliminated from her only event.

Soldati, who won springboard at the U.S. trials in June, had a poor opening dive and never recovered, winding up 21st. The top 18 moved on to Friday's semifinals.

With only two events left, the Americans have yet to win a diving medal. Once the dominant power in the sport, they're trying to avoid their first medal shutout since the 1912 Stockholm Games.

"That was awesome to have him come in," Hernandez said. "From the dugout, I saw him working in the bullpen in the sixth inning and I thought that would be great to have him relieve me."

Oswalt thought Hernandez should've been credited with the win.

"I figured I might help them out. I thought Carlos pitched a great game," Oswalt said. "He deserved the win more than I did, but the biggest thing was we kept battling and got the win."

The Astros planned all along to use Oswalt.

"He was going to throw an aggressive bullpen today anyway so we thought, why not use him in the game?" manager Phil Garner said.

"The plan was to use him in the game and I just had to pick my spot."

Still, the move surprised a lot of people, especially the Phillies.

"We didn't expect to see him," Bobby Abreu said. "He's a stopper. It was a surprise to everybody."

Manager Larry Bowa agreed.

"I've never seen him in relief before," Bowa said. "But he's got a good arm. And somebody said that their bullpen is tired."

The Phillies fell two games behind the Astros for sixth place in the NL wild-card race.

"As long as the numbers indicate you're not done yet, you keep battling," Bowa said. "But we're two games under .500. You've got to get to .500 and then go from there."

Brad Lidge worked the ninth for his 16th save in 19 chances.

Brad Ausmus opened the eighth

with a single that knocked Todd Jones (8-5) to the ground. Jones took several warmup pitches and stayed in.

With two outs, Jeff Bagwell singled to set up the run-scoring hits by Berkman and Lamb.

Phillies starter Brett Myers gave up two runs and four hits in seven innings.

Jimmy Rollins led off the game with a bunt single. He stole second as Hernandez made a pickoff throw and continued to third on first baseman Bagwell's throwing error. Placido Polanco drove in Rollins with a sacrifice fly.

Polanco hit his 11th homer in the third for a 2-0 lead.

Houston scored in the third when Raul Chavez walked, moved up on a sacrifice and Craig Biggio hit an RBI single.

Carlos Beltran's 16th homer with the Astros — and 31st overall — tied it in the sixth.

Vick? Favre? Young?

Carter's resume doesn't quite measure up to superstar level yet. But he comes off leading the Cowboys to 10 wins and a playoff berth in Bill Parcells' first year in Dallas. And he comes off a three-week layoff after the Cowboys stunningly released him.

Carter was cut Aug. 4 amid reports he failed a drug test and the NFL Players Association has filed a request for arbitration in the case. Gene Upshaw, the union's executive director, told The Associated Press on Tuesday that the NFLPA will continue to press the case.

"We have to," he said, adding that part of the grievance involves potential salary loss to Carter.

"You'll have to ask Dallas why they released me," Carter said. "All I got was the papers."

He now has a new start with the Jets, who were not comfortable with a pair of inexperienced backups to Chad Pennington: second-year pro Brooks Bollinger and CFL refugee Ricky Ray.

"Anything in the past, we got to move forward from here," said Carter, entering his fourth NFL season. "Definitely it's a different position for me. I'm a competitor. At this point I understand what situation I'm in. All I want to do is help this football team win football games the best way I can."

For now, that means Carter must learn a complex system, although the Jets will go slowly with his education. He threw only a handful of passes in a lengthy practice Tuesday, often standing near the offensive huddle while listening to Pennington or the other quarterbacks call plays.

He also spent time listening to Hackett as he instructed all the other QBs.

"Now, the last thing we're going to do is have him swallow the whole

banana here," Hackett said. "We've been working for four years for this offense. When you get someone of his stature, you want to tailor things to him and we want to put him in the things in our offense that are going to best fit him. That will be the main focus of the next two or three or four weeks until we get a handle on it."

Carter, a second-round draft choice in 2001, started all 31 games in which he played for Dallas, including 17 last season. In his career, he has 507 completions in 902 attempts for 5,839 yards with 29 touchdowns and 36 interceptions.

Known for his mobility, he has run 140 times for 498 yards.

He isn't likely to play Friday night against the Giants, but probably will see extensive action Sept. 3 in the pre-season finale against Philadelphia.

"I'm looking forward to being a Jet and also helping this football team winning games however I can," Carter said. "I'm just so excited to have a job right now."

Police question Wisconsin man in Christian counselors' deaths

SANTA ROSA, Calif. (AP) — A 21-year-old man who recently left his Wisconsin home to roam California has contacted police after learning from media reports that he was a potential witness in the mysterious shooting deaths of two Christian camp counselors.

Sonoma County detectives sent out a statewide alert Tuesday seeking Nicholas Edward Scarseth, a skateboarder from Chippewa Falls, Wis., as a "potential witness" in the killings.

"We have located him and we are speaking with him," Sheriff's Lt. Dave Edmonds said. "We want to question him to determine what he knows about this case. ... This is consensual contact. We're not holding him."

Edmonds wouldn't say why detectives are interested in Scarseth but described him as a "person of interest."

Edmonds also said detectives were investigating other leads. No weapon has been found.

"We have information that suggests that a person matching that description was in Jenner during the time frame of the killings," Edmonds said. "Mr. Scarseth does match the description and may well have been in Jenner at that time."

Scarseth was stopped for violating a skateboarding ordinance Friday in Fort Bragg, about 100 miles north of Jenner.

That's where Lindsay Cutshall, 23, and her fiancé, Jason Allen, 26, were found last week shot to death in their sleeping bags on a remote beach.

Cutshall, of Fresno, Ohio, and Allen, of Zeeland, Mich., were reported missing Aug. 16 after they failed to show up at a Christian adventure camp in Coloma, about 40 miles

east of Sacramento.

Scarseth's father, Mark, said the fact his son reported to police for questioning demonstrates what kind of person he is.

"It would be fantastic if he could help them, too," he said from Chippewa Falls.

The father said Wednesday morning he had not yet spoken with his son, but was waiting for a call.

Joel Martin, 47, who owns a gift shop in Jenner, said he saw a man resembling Scarseth in his store not long before the couple was reported missing but didn't remember exactly when.

He said the man didn't buy anything.

"He stood out with the dreadlocks," said Martin, who also saw the couple in his store.

Scarseth's mother, Karen Scarseth, said that he was last home about a month ago and she last talked to him on the telephone about a week ago from California. She said her son has an alcohol problem

but is not violent. Court records show he has had various minor scrapes with the law.

"He's just roaming around," she said. "If he ran into those people (who were killed), he would have befriended them."

She also said her son, who was raised Roman Catholic and attended Bible school, harbors anger toward religious people.

"He'll go down to the bars where he knows where the jocks hang out and he sticks out like a sore thumb, so he knows he can irritate them," she said. "He brings up religion and politics to irritate people. He likes to stir people up."

Frey testifies Peterson never said he loved her

REDWOOD CITY, Calif. (AP) — Scott Peterson's former mistress wrapped up her testimony under a mostly cordial cross-examination, saying he neither told her he loved her nor tried to stop her from telling police about their affair that prosecutors claim drove Peterson to kill his pregnant wife.

Amber Frey's testimony concluded Tuesday, after jurors heard about 40 wire-tapped telephone calls between her and Peterson.

Defense attorney Mark Geragos, in his cross-examination of the massage therapist, noted that Peterson never said anything incriminating during the calls.

In the phone calls, Peterson romanced Frey while denying his involvement in the disappearance of his pregnant wife Laci, and

proclaiming his love for the missing woman. Frey recorded their calls for months before police told her she could stop.

"They didn't get anything incriminating on him," Geragos said. "He kept telling you specifically that he didn't have anything to do with it, right?"

"There were times he said there were some things that he couldn't talk about," Frey replied. She told Geragos she could not remember if police told her she was not getting any useful information.

Geragos played a tape on which Peterson could be heard saying: "I also have nothing to hide in her disappearance. And if you, you know, if you want to go to the police, that's, you know, fine."

"He told you it was your decision, right?" Geragos asked Frey.

"Correct," Frey said.

Geragos suggested Peterson's evasive answers on many of the taped telephone calls came at the advice of his previous attorney. In a call played for the jury, Peterson could be heard saying of his lawyer: "He said, 'You should not be talking to her.' And he said, 'They are going to try to make a case against you.'"

Frey testified Peterson never told her he loved her: "Not in those words."

Prosecutors claim it was Peterson's love for Amber that drove him to murder. The defense has sought to portray Frey as a calculated seductress and liar who was more obsessed with Peterson than he was with her.

GOP platform takes hard line on tough social issues

NEW YORK (AP) — Republican leaders are pushing for a constitutional ban on gay marriage in the GOP platform, opening a new point of contention between social conservatives and outnumbered but vocal factions fighting to give the party's statement of principles a more moderate tone.

A draft of the platform, shown to delegates on the eve of hearings Wednesday, set up a noisy debate just days before the

Republican National Convention, highlighting divisions over gay rights, abortion rights and President Bush's restrictions on stem cell research.

If the marriage plank is approved as expected, it would mark the first time the GOP has gone on record in its platform as supporting an amendment against those unions. The 2000 platform settled for a more general statement supporting the definition of marriage as being between a man and a woman.

Over the next day or two, delegates will pore over platform language that hews closely to President Bush's agenda, sings his achievements and jabs at his Democratic challenger John Kerry.

"We show a safer world and a more hopeful America on all fronts," said Ginny Wolfe, speaking for the platform committee.

About half the nearly 100-page document deals with national security and foreign policy, a foreign-vs.-domestic ratio also found in the Democratic platform approved last month in Boston, as both parties compete to demonstrate a tough stand against terrorism.

Most attention will be paid to the uncompromising language against abortion and gay marriage, as well as to a plank supporting Bush's restrictions on federal financing of stem cell research.

The platform, while not binding on Bush or any candidate, is a delicate dance for the party as it tries to stage a unified convention and satisfy conservative activists without alienating swing voters or more liberal Republicans.

The party is putting forward moderate

figures in most of its prominent convention speaking slots next week. But behind those faces is a struggle over party principles that Republicans who favor abortion rights and gay rights are hard-pressed to win.

Senate Republicans last month had to set aside their proposed marriage amendment for lack of support but the platform draft makes clear the issue is not going away.

"We strongly support President Bush's call for a constitutional amendment that fully protects marriage," it says.

Campaigning in Iowa on Tuesday, Vice President Dick Cheney made it clear he does not favor the amendment supported by his boss, saying existing federal and state laws "may be sufficient to resolve this issue." But he deferred to Bush in saying "the president makes policy for the administration."

Cheney, whose daughter Mary is a lesbian, said: "People ought to be free to enter into any kind of relationship they want to."

On abortion, the proposed platform again calls for a constitutional ban, asserting "the unborn child has a fundamental individual right to life which cannot be infringed."

Republicans who back gay rights and abortion rights had little chance of shaping those planks more to their liking. But they hoped, at least, to have the party offer a strong statement declaring its openness to opposing views on those subjects.

The gay-rights group Log Cabin Republicans, abortion-rights group Republicans for Choice and the Republican Youth Majority have proposed a much more expansive "unity" plank that promised to be a hard sell in the hearings.

The platform draft, "refusing to unite our party and refusing to recognize that people of good faith can disagree over contentious social issues, sends the wrong message to fair-minded voters," said Patrick Guerriero, executive director of Log Cabin Republicans.

Ann Stone, national chair of Republicans for Choice, said: "It was their chance to show George Bush as a uniter not a divider, but clearly they have failed."

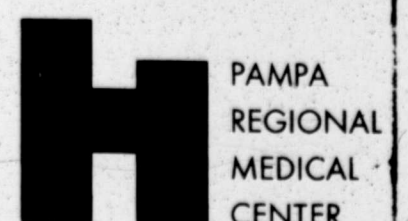
