MEXICO CITY, March 29 (AP)—The lack of foreign markets pressed urgent problems today upon the Mexican government's newly acquired oil industry.

Following a similar one cent reduction yesterday, which was the first change in more than two years, the price was cut to 43 cents per ounce.

Today's reduction apparently confirmed fears of London silver speculators that the United States was withdrawing its support of the world price.

HOUSE 'GREAT MAN' STATES C. V. TERRELL

AUSTIN, March 29 (AP)—C. V. Terrell, state railroad commission chairman, recalled today that when Colonel Edward M. House was active in Texas politics he was quiet but nonetheless effective. Terrell served in the state senate before House left Texas.

"He was a great man—modest, courageous and able."

Governor James V. Alford, hunting in Southwest Texas, ordered capitol flags lowered to half staff and issued the following expression regarding the death of Col. E. M. House:

"I am deeply shocked and grieved, as all who knew him must be, at the passing of Colonel House. It has been my personal good fortune to count him as a friend, and, on occasion, I have sought his advice and found it good.

"The colonel was one of the race of giants which has made Texas the great state it is today. We can never hope to live up to the standards set by such men as House and Hogg; we can only strive to follow their splendid examples as men and as statesmen."

NEW YORK, March 29 (AP)—James W. Gerard, wartime ambassador to Germany, said of the death of Col. Edward M. House:

"I regret his passing extremely. I had occasion to come into contact with him often and he was a powerful personality in his own quiet way. He visited Berlin several times while I was ambassador there and possessed not only the confidence of President Wilson but seemed to be able to act for him."

PROSPEROUS ERA AHEAD BELIEVES HENRY FORD

DETROIT, March 29 (AP)—Henry Ford, back at work after a two months vacation on his Georgia plantation, reiterated in an interview today his conviction that a prosperous era is ahead, talked about wars, dictatorships and immigration, and said he was plunging into preparations for cologne production of his cheap tractor.

"Nothing that has occurred during the last few weeks," he said, "has changed my belief that a prosperous era is ahead of us. It will come through a greater realization that all wealth comes from the soil and that there must be a greater cultivation of the land."

Ford, nearing his 75th birthday anniversary, said he had spent much of his Georgia vacation conducting experiments with his new tractor.

He said he has not changed his convictions about the futility of wars. "Nobody wins in a war but the

STALIN FLAYS ACTIVITIES OF ARCTIC GROUP

MOSCOW, March 29 (AP)—The government said today that "criminal, anti-Soviet activity of wreckers" was found in the northern sea route administration which is headed by Dr. Otto Schmidt, who directed last summer's polar flights to America and polar weather observations by four Russian scientists.

Without naming Dr. Schmidt, the council of the people's commissars, which is equivalent to the cabinet, adopted a resolution severely blaming the sea route administration for the perilous position of Soviet ice breakers and ships drifting helplessly in the arctic ice.

The resolution found the work of the northern sea route in 1937 "unsatisfactory" and called for a detailed report by April 15.

The specific criticism dealt with the fact that almost the entire ice breaker fleet, and nearly half of the freighters that ply the northern route and were caught in the ice last autumn, are "exposed to imminent danger."

The resolution attributed "blunders" to the "inactive and concealed attitude" of the sea route administration.

The resolution obviously was prompted by the plight of three ice breakers conveying ships which have been drifting toward the polar basin the past five months.

Schmidt Was Hero It was the first time the northern sea route, with the picturesquely bearded Dr. Schmidt, one of the foremost official heroes of the Soviet union in command, has been publicly criticized.

The N. S. R. not only has charge of the great Soviet program for settlement and economic development of the arctic reaches but also supervised such spectacular feats of exploration as the flights over the north pole to America in 1937, and the drift of the four polar scientists.

Their ice floe drifted into the Greenland sea whence they were rescued by a Soviet aerial-ship expedition Feb. 19. The ice floe commander, during eight months of taking daily weather observations, was Ivan Papanin. He has been appointed first assistant to Schmidt in management of the N. S. R.

The government resolution was adopted after the cabinet heard a report by Schmidt and another by Stanislaw Kossior, chairman of the Soviet control committee which is

a committee of inspection within the government. The resolution observed the government "does not consider accidental under the present management of the N. S. R. the unacceptable fact that almost half of the transport ships and almost the entire fleet of ice breakers of the N. S. R. are spending the winter drifting in the ice, exposed to imminent danger." The management was ordered to clean the N. S. R. of "suspicious elements" and to submit a plan for 1938 which would strengthen the organization. Foreigners recalled that S. A. Bergavinoff, who was one of Schmidt's assistants in the N. S. R. administration was implicated in the trial of Nikolai Bukharin, former editor of the government newspaper Izvestia, shot for treason.

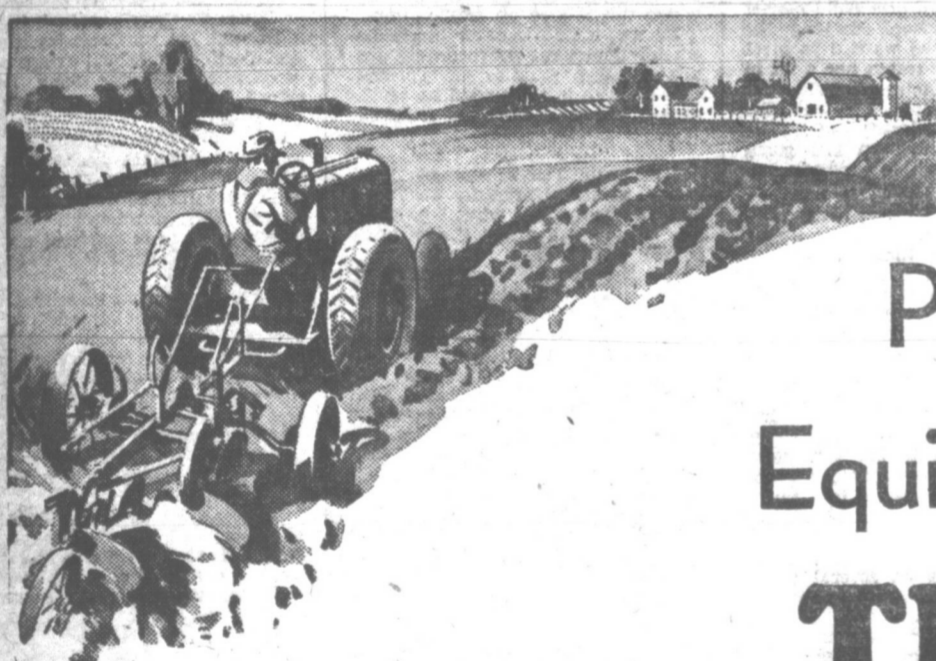
