Bridge collapse report pending after 3 years

HARLINGEN (AP) Three years after a quartermile stretch of wayward barges knocked a hole in the roadway of the state's longest bridge, killing eight, the Coast Guard's report on the accident is still pending.

The report was expected to summarize weeks of testimony taken within a month of the Sept. 15, 2001, collapse of the Queen Isabella Memorial Causeway and provide federal insight into the accident.

At issue is everything from the question of pilot error to whether the Coast Guard itself lapsed in maintaining channel markings or the depth of the water. The report could also lend weight to an allegation that an "S" curve in the waterway just before the bridge makes for a too-dangerous straightaway, Pierson said.

A report into the May 2002 collapse of the Interstate 40 bridge that killed 14 people in Oklahoma faulted the tow company for not allowing its captain enough rest and requiring him to work too long before the crash. It was released last month.

What did change the Jewish community, apparently, was a debate about what that biblical faith was. "Biblical Anatolia" notes that some Jews "were absorbed into the Christian Church," and quotes a mournful Talmud passage about a rabbi's visit to Jewish Christians in Sardis: "Rabbi Eleazar ben Arak visited the place. He was attracted to them, and his learning vanished."




Totem Pole Puzzle







Tiger Woods, who lost his No. 1 ranking two weeks ago for the first time in five years, held a corporate clinic about 20 miles from Oakland Hills on Monday.

The U.S. team met for the first time together for dinner Monday night, although a few of them played casual practice rounds Monday -Phil Mickelson, Jim Furyk, Fred Funk, Chad Campbell and David Toms.

Mickelson was particularly dialed in. He took nearly six hours to play a practice round by himself, preparing for these matches like he does a major. A caddie placed six tiny flags at various spots on the green, and

Mickelson chipped to all of them, pausing time in 50 years. to fill his yardage book with notes.

The Americans have five Ryder Cup rookies, and not all of them can be called fresh-faced kids. The newcomers include the 47-year-old Funk and 44-year-old Kenny Perry, both of whom played in the Presidents Cup in South Africa last year against an International team comprised of players from everywhere in the world

except Europe.


